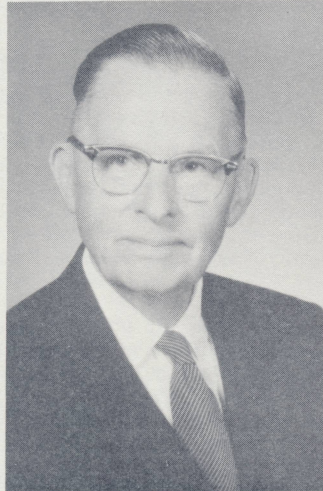
Attendance at homecoming has been gratifying in the last two years, and officers expect this year's turnout to be the largest yet.

NESS HAD ACTIVE MINISTRY

Dr. Henry H. Ness, Northwest College's founder and its president for fifteen years, is well known nationally and internationally for his many religious and civic activities. He has pastored churches in Minnesota, North Dakota, Washington, and California, and established several churches in both Minnesota and Washington. He served as an official in the North Central District and was a member of the board of North Central Bible College

in Minneapolis. While serving as president of the then Northwest Bible Institute, he was pastor of Calvary Temple in Seattle.

In 1949 he was appointed by former Governor Arthur B. Langlie as chairman of the Washington State Board of Prison Terms and Paroles, and served in this capacity for six years. He also served as chaplain of the King County Jail for thirteen years, and conducted daily radio broadcasts for over twenty years.

During trips to Europe he has had audiences with such persons as the late King Haakon and King Olav of Norway, Prince Bernadotte of Sweden, King Umberto of Italy, the late King Carol of Roumania, the late Archbishop Damascinos of Greece, and the

late Pope Pius XII with whom he had a thirty-minute private audience.

Dr. Ness is the author of several publications, and has been listed in Who's Who in the West since 1953. He holds three doctorates from Bob Jones University.

CHAPEL TO BE ERECTED

Another forward step in the development of the campus was taken this June when the Board of Directors authorized construction of a 600 seat, \$100,000 chapel and made personal contributions totaling \$1,000 toward the project.

Plans are now being drawn up.

After completion of the new building the present temporary chapel is to be converted into a laboratory/classroom building. It is hoped this will be done before the start of the Winter quarter.

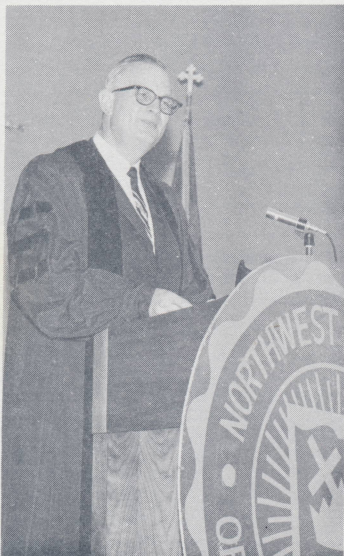

ZIMMERMAN GRANTED DOCTORATE

Rev. Thomas F. Zimmerman, General Superintendent of the Assemblies of God, was honored at the June Commencement by conferral of the honorary degree Doctor of Divinity. Bro. Zimmerman was the speaker for the commencement services, which were held on the new campus for the first time. A capacity crowd was present in the Pavilion for the service.

Only two honorary doctorates had previously been granted by the college. The first of these went to Dr. Frank Gray, a Pentecostal pioneer in the Northwest, and the second to the late Dr. A. M. Shaffer, founder of Canyonville Bible Academy. Bro. Zimmerman was cited not only for his spiritual leadership in Pentecostal circles but also for his activity among other organizations such as the National Association of Evangelicals, and the National Religious Broadcasters.

PRESIDENT BUTTERFIELD TO SPEAK IN MIDWEST, ORIENT

NC President C.E. Butterfield will spend two busy months this August and September as a conference speaker in Wisconsin and the Orient.

From July 29 through August 9 Bro. Butterfield will be Bible Teacher at Spencer Lake Bible Camp near Waupaca, Wisconsin, sponsored by the Wisconsin & Northern Michigan District Council of the Assemblies of God.

Upon his return from Wisconsin he will leave for the Orient for a series of conferences for missionaries and national Christian workers in Korea. He will then visit several mission fields in Southeast Asia including Cambodia. Since Cambodia has never had a Pentecostal missionary, Rev. Butterfield hopes to explore the possibility of opening up this field for the Pentecostal Christian testimony.

Bro. Butterfield expects to return to Kirkland by September 15 in time for the beginning of the new school year. This will be his twelfth trip abroad in the interest of foreign missions and his third trip to the Orient.

NICODEMUS HONORED

Rev. WALDO NICODEMUS, currently in El Salvador, was nominated to membership in the Delta Epsilon Chi Honor Society during the recent commencement exercises. The Rev. Glenn Horst, pastor of Calvary Temple, Seattle, received the membership certificate and key on behalf of Bro. Nicodemus. Delta Epsilon Chi is the honor society of the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges, and it is customary to grant honorary membership each year to an outstanding alumnus as well as to outstanding members of the graduating class.

MEETINGS TO BE HELD ON CAMPUS

The Northwest College campus will be the scene of several events of interest to alumni this summer.

The Full Gospel Business Men's Committee of Seattle will sponsor a week of workshops and conferences on the subject of the Holy Spirit from August 10-14.

Following these meetings will be a week-long Summer Bible Conference sponsored by the Northwest District. This will mark the revival of the adult camp program formerly conducted at Silver Lake. The speaker will be the Rev. Arthur H. Graves of Flushing, New York. A veteran camp teacher, Bro. Graves will minister on the topic "The Spirit Filled Man." Services will begin Sunday night, August 16; continue Tuesday through Friday with services during the day and at 7:30 PM; and conclude with a Sunday afternoon rally August 23. Housing and meals will be available on campus; services will be in the Pavilion.

A Women's Missionary Council Retreat September 15-17 will feature Mrs. Mildred Smuland, National WMC Secretary, as main speaker. A variety of other activities are scheduled for the retreat, including prayer meetings, workshops, films, and panel discussions.

NEW STAFF MEMBER ADDED

Miss Juanita Belcher of Boring, Oregon, joined the NC office staff as a full-time receptionist and secretary following her graduation with honors from the college this June. Juanita has been President Butterfield's secretary for several years; she is originally from Quality, Kentucky.

GERMAN, HEBREW, MATH
TO BE OFFERED

NC's Dean of Education, John W. Lackey, has announced that the College will offer courses in German during the coming school year. Mrs. Helen Wolfe, a Kirkland resident who has been teaching in the Bellevue Christian School, will be the instructor. Mrs. Wolfe earned her Bachelor's degree at Ohio Wesleyan College and is completing her Master's degree from the University of Washington this summer.

Another first in language study at the college will be the offering of Hebrew to theology students. Professor Daniel B. Pecota will be the instructor.

It is planned that a full year of mathematics will be offered, including Intermediate Algebra, College Algebra, and Trigonometry. Of these only Intermediate Algebra has been taught previously. Mr. Wilbur Metcalf, a graduate of the University of Alberta and presently a student at NC, is to teach the courses.

Plans are also going forward to teach chemistry during the Winter and Spring quarters, dependent on construction of the new chapel and conversion of the present chapel building to laboratory facilities.

More sidewalks are being constructed near the Pavilion and Student Union. . . A committee of pastors and college officials met recently to study the ministerial curriculum.
