He was born in Springfield, Colorado, and completed his public school in that state. He attended





A Message From Our President . . .

THE BUZZER SOUNDED-



—At 9:45 a.m. on Wednesday, September 12th, and from every available classroom students filed into the main auditorium for the first chapel service of the 1956-57 school year. Soon all of the chapel seats were filled with happy, bright, eager-

Rev. C. E. Butterfield faced young people. As I sat on the platform and gazed into the faces of these earnest, young, Christian men and women, my heart was thrilled. I was happy that we were to have the glorious privilege of commencing another school year for the purpose of leading these young people into a deeper knowledge of God, and to assist them in their preparation for places of leadership in the Christian World

Student voices soon rang out in joyful songs of worship. Then the room was filled with praises to God from the lips of these young people as they expressed their thankfulness to Him for His blessings. Earnest prayer was offered, petitioning God for His continued guidance and blessing, and for the presence of the Holy Ghost to rest upon the Student Body and Faculty. So, the first chapel service of the new school year was in session. We felt we could say with assurance: "God's Presence is here: His Presence is real."

In retrospect, we recall that it was in the year 1934—before most of the present Student Body members were born, that the Northwest Bible College was launched in faith. I often reminisce and marvel at the way God has blessed the school through the years. Its phenominal growth and success, without portentousness, indicates that God was in the plan from the beginning. How wonderfully He has led through the years

ble College during the past twenty-two years, has become the pathway leading ultimately to the "Door of Service" for many hundreds of young men and women. It seemed that the students seated before me, in this first chapel period of the 56-57 school year, were now echoing the praises of those students of all the past years—with the voices of each succeeding year catching the note and joining the "great company" until it seemed to become a swelling throng giving to God a great crescendo of praise which witnessed that only God could have wrought what was accomplished in each of their lives during the years spent at N.B.C.

Is God in this work? The question seems to fall away in helpless futility before the mighty testimony of the Missionaries who have left these doors to tread upon the soil of every continent on the face of the earth: Evangelists who have gone forth to proclaim the message of deliverance to a lost world: Of the hundreds of young men who have laid aside their textbooks to undertake the task of "shepherding flocks of God's people." There seems to be no end of counting the congregations around the country into which some person from N.B.C. has come to be a blessing by his or her steady, consistent, Christian life; taking a place of leadership, and offering assistance to pastors everywhere. We will never cease to praise God that He pointed the "road' 'to us a few years ago, and God's men obediently launched the Northwest Bible College Program. There is no accumulate measure of the total results that will evolve from this step of faith and vision. The blessing has and will continue to be far greater than we know.

As we think of these things, our hearts do not swell with pride in an institutional sense, nor do we feel inclined to boast of any human accomplishments or achievements that could be attributed to personalities. With my consecrated colleagues in this work, I

bow my head to thank God for the privilege of another year to serve Him in an effort which we know, deep down in our hearts, has the smile and favor of our God.

And now, as we are gathered here at the Northwest Bible College for this new year, in the Name of the Lord, our Blessed Saviour, we, the Faculty and Administrative Officers, greet our many friends and co-workers who are scattered throughout this great Northwest. We ask that you will share the blessing and responsibility of this work in your daily prayers, for we need you to bear a part by remembering the school in prayer. May God bless you all!
