
Theme

Gladly accepting Christ as the pilot of our lives, we have chosen the theme, "On Board Ship with Christ," for the 1954 Karisma.







SPIRITUAL EMPHASIS WEEK






HOMELAND AND ALASKA




EUROPE









LATIN AMERICA


STUDENT COUNCIL
