



GLACIER IN THE OLYMPICS





A TYPICAL NORTHWEST VISTA






WINTER AT MAJESTIC MOUNT RAINIER




# THE CHALLENGE

#### PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

"Giving no offence in any thing, that the ministry be not blamed."—II Corinthians 6:3.

The most essential part of our ministry is not the presenting of masterly sermons or the persuasive expounding of Bible truths, but rather the manifesting of these Bible truths in our lives. A person may be a brilliant preacher, but, if he fails to live what he

preaches, his whole ministry becomes a reproach and a stumbling block.

Throughout Paul's epistles, he reminded the believers not only of the things he had preached to them but also of the life he had lived among them. ## BIOGRAPHY OF OUR PRINCIPAL REV. HENRY H. NESS

August 6, 1894 was a day of rejoicing in a certain home nestled in the shadow of the king's palace in Oslo, Norway, as Hans Nielsen Ness and Dora Ness welcomed the birth of a son, the first of five children. Henry Ness was not born heir to earthly millions, but his spiritual heritage was rich. Godly Pentecostal parents had dedicated their child to the Lord even before birth and were determined to bring him up "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord."

As a boy, he regularly attended the Philadelphia Church in Oslo, of which T. B. Barratt was, and still is, the pastor. Our Principal retains vivid memories of the great

revival and outpouring of the Spirit which swept Norway in 1906.

Boyhood days quickly passed, and in the autumn of 1911 an enthusiastic youth left the shores of Norway to seek his fortune in the promised land of gold and silver. Upon arrival in this country, he made his way to Chicago and began a career in the drug business. His next abode was in Minneapolis, Minnesota, where he operated his own drug store in the commercial center of town. Soon after arriving in that city he met a young lady of Danish birth, who became his wife on the eighth day of April, 1919.

Brother Ness finally sold his business interest and accepted a position in the service station department of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana. He rapidly advanced until he became leading man on the sales force, with prospect of promotion to a high official position with the company. It seemed that the success of which he had dreamed

was nearing realization.

It was at this time in the life of our Principal that God began to deal with him. One Sunday night his wife was saved at a revival service. Two weeks later he knelt in his own home, definitely consecrating his heart and life to the Lord. The change was radical. The call of God came. Brother Ness resigned his splendid and remunerative position to accept a call to a small, dilapidated church in northern Minnesota at a salary of less than ten dollars a week. God's seal upon his ministry was evidenced by revivals which resulted in several places.

Our Principal went to Fargo, North Dakota, in April, 1926, and there pioneered a Gospel work. Within a few years a beautiful tabernacle was built which seated one thousand people. In addition to pastoral work, Brother Ness was active as an officer in the Assemblies of God, serving for years as general presbyter, district presbyter, and a member of the board of directors of the North Central Bible Institute in Minneapolis. For a time he labored as assistant superintendent of the North Central District.

In the latter part of 1933, Brother Ness accepted a call to be pastor of Hollywood Temple in Seattle. The Lord has blessed his ministry here, and a twenty-five thousand dollar addition to the building has been necessitated to accommodate the increasing membership. Recently another church has been purchased in the north end of Seattle,

which will be conducted as a branch of Hollywood Temple.

The Reverend Mr. Ness became principal of the Northwest Bible Institute when it was opened on October 1, 1934. The Institute has made remarkable progress. It began the first year with eighteen students and is closing the fourth year with an enrollment of two hundred and thirty-six. In addition to his administrative, teaching, and disciplinary contributions, our Principal's spirituality has greatly influenced the School. He has been at the helm through stormy seas and fair weather and has been enabled by God's grace to guide the ship steadily forward. What further should we add, except to say with heartfelt thanksgiving, God bless our Principal!




If the curtains of time were drawn back from the historic past, permitting a glimpse into the life surrounding a medieval castle, perhaps a scene such as this would first greet our eyes:



### OUR IDEAL FOR THE CONQUERORS


"Whereto we have already attained, let us walk by the same rule, let us mind the same thing." —Philippians 3:16.

# JESUS—CONQUEROR OVER SIN, DISEASE AND DEMONS

Conqueror over Sin. The Old Testament revealed that Christ was coming as conqueror over sin, which had entered the world through Satan's deceiving Adam and Eve. Man needed a Saviour, and one was promised. The Seed of the woman was to bruise the serpent's head, but, in so doing, He would be bruised. This promise was fulfilled when Christ died on the Cross. There Satan received his deathblow, for Jesus came that He might destroy the works of the devil.

When Christ said, "It is finished," the whole plan of salvation was fulfilled; nothing was lacking and nothing could be added. He who knew no sin was made to be sin for us. Christ not only conquered sin in a general sense, but He also conquered it in the individual life. Although helpless in ourselves, we are more than conquerors in His name and through His power. He delivers us from the guilt and the dominion of sin.

Conqueror over Sickness and Disease. Sickness and disease came into the world as the result of sin; therefore, the atonement for sin also includes healing for our bodies. Jesus healed all that were sick that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by Isaiah, the prophet, "Himself took our infirmities and bare our sicknesses." Christ never failed in any instance, for He healed "all manner of sickness and all manner of disease among the people."

Jesus conferred this same power upon others also. He called unto Him the twelve apostles and gave them power "to heal all manner of sickness and all manner of disease." Later the seventy disciples were sent forth with authority to heal the sick. As they went, preaching everywhere, the Lord worked with them and confirmed the Word with signs following. The book of Acts is a record of signs, wonders, and mighty deeds wrought by believers in the name of Jesus. The Lord did not confine this power to the apostolic age; He still empowers believers. "These signs" still follow them that believe.

Conqueror over Demons. Jesus "cast out the spirits with His word"; demons were forced to obey His will. At His command, the man in the synagogue was delivered, the epileptic boy was restored, and the Gadarene demoniac was loosed. Recognizing the Lord's power, unclean spirits pleaded with Him not to command them to go into the abyss nor to torment them before the time.


Jesus, the Captain of our salvation, has never lost a battle, and as we follow Him, the mighty Conqueror, we too shall overcome.



"Let us all bow our heads, close our eyes, and just count our blessings for a few minutes."






# JUNIOR CLASS





# JESUS CONQUERS THE ELEMENTS

The book of Genesis is a history, an epitome of divine revelation, and not a treatise on any scientific question or a philosophy of human existence. It emphatically is a narrative, authentic and most instructive to mankind. It does not present man with a geological, a botanical, or an astronomical account of how the world came into existence, but it simply asserts, "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth" (Genesis 1:1). If we read Colossians 1:16, we learn that Christ was the Master who performed the marvelous task. It was He who conquered the unruly mass (Genesis 1:2) by causing the Spirit to move thereon until it took a definite form. He conquered chaos by compelling everything to go to its proper place. He took the unorganized elements in His fists (Proverbs 30:4) and made the most wonderful and accurate system known to man by causing both celestial and terrestrial bodies to move in their proper orbits.

Millenniums later this Creator looked down from the battlements of Heaven and viewed the miserable estate of man. He took upon Himself the form of man and came to earth to show His conquering power. He performed numberless miracles and wonders, but one of the most astonishing is recorded in Mark 4:35-41, where we find Him asleep in the boat that was filling with water on the stormy sea. He was awakened by His disciples who saw nothing but death before them. The Conqueror of the elements calmly arose and rebuked the wind, and to the raging sea He said, "Peace, be still." His words were not those of a man, but of a conqueror. At once there was a great calm, and fear gripped His fellow-travelers, who asked, "What manner of man is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?"

In recent years the Conqueror has displayed His power to His believing children by overruling the laws of nature. A few years ago a cyclone was utterly destroying everything in its pathway. Some Christian young people gathered in a certain building, together with a number of unsaved. As the cyclone approached, destroying everything in its wake, the Christians fell on their knees, despite the jeers of the unsaved, and besought Jesus Christ to save them and the building for His glory. Everything around the building was wrecked, and even parts of the concrete sidewalk were torn up, but not a window was broken or a shingle touched on the building which contained the praying people.


Friends outside of Christ, facing you is another mountain.

# MUSIC DEPARTMENT

Prof. Delbert L. Cox, B.A., M.A.


The Music Department of the Northwest Bible Institute is focusing its entire attention on the practical musical development of the student body. Within the past four years we have noticed a distinct growth in the understanding of music and its important place in religious activities. Along with this growth has come a desire to qualify for these activities.

All students are required to take a three-year course which stresses fundamentals of music, conducting, hymn-composition, and part-singing.

In addition to regular classes, the Music Department offers special opportunity for the orchestra and choir. During the orchestra period students work on orchestrations to develop skill and accuracy in sight-reading. The student choir has had several engagements to sing, both over the radio and in high schools of the district. During our graduation exercises the choir will sing an anthem, "The Promise," by Edward C. Bairstow.

To provide extra-curricular activities for those especially interested in music, different ensembles have been formed, the best known of which is the Evangel Quartet. Many of the groups are making splendid progress.


The Music Department has a definite aim. We feel that each student should be given an opportunity to express himself musically and should be provided with a background that will enable him to contribute something in any religious service.

# PRACTICAL WORK

There are two distinct phases of Bible School training, academic instruction and practical application. Having dealt primarily with the classroom side of N.B.I. in the preceding sections, we now draw your attention to its practical work program. Friday evening is, in a special sense, practical work night at the Institute. The following narrative, using incidents that have taken place, is typical of our Friday night activity and is designed to give you an insight into this phase of School Life.

## A "SCATTER NIGHT"

"All aboard," calls our dispatcher, and, as the bell rings, the students gather in the lower auditorium of N.B.I. to unite in prayer, asking God to bless the various meetings to be conducted this "scatter night." As the groups depart on assignment, those students do not feel that they are going to "just another meeting." They see another opportunity to witness for the Master to the hundreds and thousands in and around Seattle who have not yet accepted Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour.

Come with me, and we shall follow the group of students just boarding the Gospel bus. Hear them sing as they ride, "Following Jesus, ever day by day." We recall the times that Jesus in person ministered to the needs of a sin-sick world and realize that these students are truly "following Jesus" as they carry on His work. As they go we pray, "God keep them true as they enter upon the battlefield. May they ever follow Thee as they do this night."

When the bus stops we find ourselves in the slum district of Seattle—"below the line," they call it. Again we hear the strains of a song, this time an invitation, "If you from sin are longing to be free, Look to the Lamb of God." The students have formed a semi-circle in the street, and, as they sing, men of the district stop one by one to listen, attracted by the sound of the instruments or by the words of the song. One of the young men from N.B.I. now steps to the center of the semi-circle and testifies to the saving grace of God in his life.

We leave the street meeting and travel to a town south of Seattle. Stopping at the little Full Gospel Church, we glance inside and see that a group of Christians has gathered. We recognize on the platform some of our students. A capable leader is in charge, and songs of praise are rising from the hearts of the redeemed.

# PRACTICAL WORK

In addition to Friday assignments, students are receiving an increasing number of calls to varied types of service on Sundays and week nights. Jail and street services are conducted, Sunday School classes taught, and hospitals visited. Students frequently are invited to preach or to take part musically in services at churches and missions. On week-end assignments, groups have traveled far afield—to Eastern Washington, Oregon, and Canada. Three of our students are serving as pastors of small churches in and near Seattle.



## WITH THE STUDENTS

We must hasten on—to the north this time. But wait; as we pass through Seattle, let us stop to see what is happening among the students who remained at N.B.I. Listen! Someone is testifying. It is a student, and there is another, and another. As the testimony meeting progresses, we realize that they are relating the goodness of God and His blessing upon them during the past week. Looking from one to another, we see many faces alight with the glory of the Lord as the students state their determination to "follow to the end the Man of Calvary."

It would be pleasant to remain here longer, but we must hurry on to visit other assignments. Our next stop is at a little town on the shores of Lake Washington. While approaching the little church, we hear the last strains of a Gospel hymn sung by a girls' trio. A young man takes his place behind the pulpit and tells the redemption story. It is the same story that has been told for two thousand years and that will be told till Jesus comes.

There is one more place to visit before our travels are over. We are back in Seattle again, this time in the Filipino section of town. The student in charge of the service has just given the altar call, and one young Filipino is making his way to the front. We rejoice with the angels in Heaven as this young man weeps his way through to salvation.

So ends another students' "scatter night," and, as we recall the services of the evening, we feel it was well worth while because of the wonderful presence and guidance of the One who said, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men."

Christ is Victor!




Adequate armor has been given to the knight, and he now stands on the threshold of a new experience, ready to go forth to battle in the name of his king and country.

## WE ARE MORE THAN CONQUERORS THROUGH CHRIST

Jesus Christ, our Lord, conquered all things. At His command, when He walked on earth, demons had to release their victims; the very devil himself bowed to His mandates. The elements were subject to Him; when He spoke, the winds ceased to blow and the raging sea became calm. He walked upon the water as if it had been terra firma. Thousands of hungry men, women, and children were fed to the full from a boy's meager noon-day lunch when Jesus pronounced His blessing upon it.

Death could not hold Him in its clutches; Hades was not strong enough to retain Him in its confines; the grave could not detain Him long.

He was, and is today, Master of every situation, equal to every emergency, and more than a match for every opposing force. He yet will subdue every enemy and conquer every foe.

For a Christian to claim to be a conqueror may seem somewhat boastful, and to declare himself more than a conqueror appears to be the height of presumption. But, based upon the Word of God and the experience of multitudes of God's children, the status of every Spirit-filled Christian is "more than conqueror."

Nothing can hinder the progress of the people of God but themselves. No difficulty is so great that they can not overcome it; no enemy is so strong that they can not conquer him; no barrier is so high that they can not curmount it. Death loses its sting and the grave its victory as we journey triumphantly up this pilgrim way toward the "Land of pure delight, Where saints immortal reign; Where infinite day excludes the night, And pleasures banish pain."

Every difficulty becomes a stepping-stone to loftier heights, for we are "more than conquerors through him that loved us."


