Isolation Is Not An Option

I was standing in chapel my Freshman year at Northwest College when I was struck with a thought. We were singing—but I was thinking about Professor Leroy Johnson’s history class. I realized that he had brought to me most of what I knew about the periods of time we were studying. If he had not told me the things he had, I may have never known them.

Almost as quickly as that thought came, the next thought was pushing into my mind. I have never known anything that a person did not pass on. Books have authors; movies have screenwriters; newspapers have journalists. All I know was someone else’s knowledge first. If I have a “new” idea, it is really only the combination of others’ ideas given to me. My eyes skimmed across the heads in the chapel—before me and beside me. These people all tell me what life is about. They affect what I know and how I know it. I have gone nowhere where someone has not taken me. There were devoted persons who spent years copying the Bible into English, careful to be precise with the Words of God. There were people who sat around and hashed out the Trinity.

I could never go back so far. What if I began my Christianity by translating the Words of God into English? What if there had not been philosophers that had asked my same questions? Could I have ever thought of all the questions they have asked and all of their answers? Never. My knowledge and wisdom was worked hard for by others.

I owe everything to these people. There is a sense of deep gratitude in me toward those who have given me their time, their thoughts, their questions, and their answers.

This was not a truth discovered about me this day, it was one discovered about all people. People don’t live alone. There is no going about creating oneself alone. Simon and Garfunkle, two songwriters who keenly expressed both the sentiment of their time and our time, wrote a song called “I am a Rock.” The unidentified singer says:

“I am alone . . . I touch no one and no one touches me. I am a Rock. I am an island....”

But this song is ironic; the very tone of the song, the bitterness of the singer, is evidence in and of itself that he is not alone, that someone has touched him very powerfully and very harshly. I heard Dr. James Dobson of Focus on the Family once say, “Unfortunately, rocks and islands have wives and children.” I know that not only is the singer affected; not alone, he is affecting.

So, as there is this deep gratitude and awe for the way we affect one another, there is also this deep fear. A fear that realizes that indeed “Rocks and islands have wives and children.” A fear because not only are there Professor LeRoy Johnsons, Alan Patons, and C. S. Lewis, but there are also Hitlers, Madonnas, and Nietzsches.

I come to you not to ask you to be active in your world. That is not an option; you simply are. But I am

coming to ask you to remember what Paul said about the way we work—as a body. And if the hand can wash and cleanse the body, it can also knife and mutilate it. And what does James say of our tongue? That it can set the course of a person’s life on fire and is itself set on fire by hell.

And who does not know that these scriptures are true because they have experienced their truths? Who does not know that he or she is capable of mutilation, of burning a hole through the human heart with their tongue? We know it is so, experientially! We do have the power to destroy. But we also have the power to build each other up, or Christ would not have told us to do so. We have the power in Him.

Think on those who have affected you. I write to you not as just me. It is not the goodness in my heart that you sit down to read, but the good things I have attained from others, others who have lived like Christ.

I want to extend the thought I have presented you with—that others have donated so much to the creation of all of us—there was a First Donor. The First Donor set it up this way. He created us, told us some things about life and then instructed us to care for Him and to care for others. He set up the whole system of living this life connectedly, and there simply is no other system than that one.

I am Corrie ten Boom. I am Paul the Apostle. I am Professor Johnson. I am Alan Paton. I am Professor

Blaine Charette. I am Billy Graham. I am Professor Marjorie Stewart. I am C. S. Lewis. And in the face of all of these, with the knowledge of those who have created me, I must ask, "Who will I be when you come to me? Who will you be when I come to you?"

Paul explains connectedness to the Corinthians in this way: "This service that you perform is not only supplying the needs of God's people but is also overflowing in many expressions of thanks to God. Because of the service by which you have proved yourselves, men will praise God for the obedience that

accompanies your confession of the gospel of Christ, and for your generosity in sharing with them and with everyone else. And in their prayers for you their hearts will go out to you, because of the surpassing grace God has given you" II Corinthians 9:12-15.

No, it is not now my turn; it has been my turn since my first breath. It has been your turn since your first breath. You are on my list, and I on yours. Observe those around you. They have given part of who you are to you, and you have given part of you to them. They do not exist without you, nor you without them. We are part of each other.

Thank you, Lord, for the lives of others; others who have created me. Thank you that obedience has accompanied their confession of the gospel of Christ, that they have been generous in sharing with me and with everyone else. Thank you for giving them such grace that they were able to do good things in this world. May we perpetuate the grace given us, and may we be a blessing on the lips of others. ☒

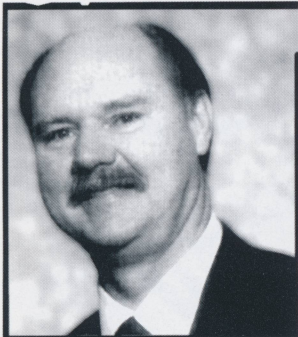

Business Administration Major Announces Startup of Two New Program Concentrations

Northwest College's Business Administration department is proud to introduce two new cutting edge program concentrations for its fall line-up of classes. The two new, concentrations, Computer Technology and Health Care Administration, represent two of today's most rapidly growing fields of employment. High demand for professional personnel in these arenas has led Northwest College to develop programs which will fully train students for success in these careers. Students will take the core curriculum in business management, then add the elective courses in the concentration of their choice.

In the Computer Technology Concentration, students will take classes over the course of three semesters to pass the required tests for Microsoft Certified Professional status for each course. Students must pass six tests (two per semester) to become a Microsoft Certified Systems Engineer, an international standard. As Systems Engineers, they are then able to design, install and maintain computer networks using Microsoft Windows NT 4.0 software.

The Health Care Administration Concentration offers training in both health care and long term care as well as in the operation of institutions which specialize in each of these areas. Taking one course per semester enables students to complete the certification in their junior and senior years. The program is designed to prepare students to manage health care facilities, personnel, and to oversee quality patient care.

Both the M.C.S.E. Computer Certification and the Health Care program will be offered as concentrations in the Organizational Management (L.E.A.P.) degree completion program as well as in the traditional college classes. ☒

Northwest's Psychology Major

In an ever-changing and growing society, it is imperative that Christians strive to meet the needs of their community. According to the Occupational Outlook Quarterly (Spring 1996), occupations offering such "community" careers as social workers, counselors, and human service personnel rank among those with the largest number of openings. For a person interested in pursuing such a career, a psychology degree is a valuable asset. With this need in mind, Northwest introduces a Psychology Major beginning the fall semester of 1998.

The Psychology Major is designed as an intercollegiate, interdisciplinary program reflecting the body of rules, customs, ideas, and methods which form the foundation of the American psychological community. Utilizing a broad-based approach, the major helps unify and increase students' appreciation of several disciplines in Psychology, helping them develop a foundational understanding of psychology, its application and its phenomenal significance to the social community. Additionally, the major provides this training in an evangelical Christian context, where students integrate faith and learning, where they develop Christian ethical foundations along with a broad psychological understanding of the world into which they have been called to make a difference.

As a broad-based humanities major, psychology has a large target audience. Psychology is a viable major for the following students:

- those seeking to pursue professional studies in psychology in preparation for careers as psychologists;
- those seeking careers as counselors, social workers, and therapists;
- those seeking to pursue professional studies or careers in government (state department, elected office, etc.), criminal justice, or military vocations;
- those seeking a broad-based liberal arts education with an emphasis in psychological studies in preparation for graduate education or careers in humanities fields, such as history, philosophy, sociology, and communications; and
- those pursuing vocational ministry who are seeking a broad-based liberal arts education with an emphasis in psychological studies prior to attending seminary.

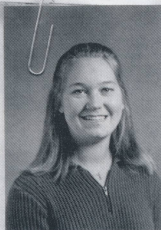

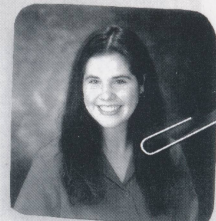

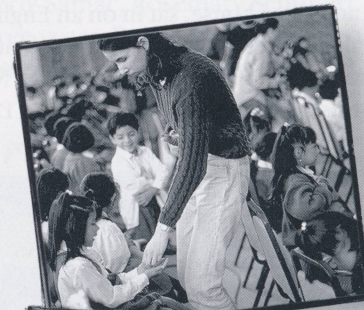
Since its inception in 1934, Northwest College has prepared students for missionary service. Sixty-four years later, the passion for missions continues.

In March 1998, NC Missionary in Residence, John Wilkie, and I went with twenty-three students on a Spring Break Mission to Ecuador. Our primary goal was for students and leaders alike to expose our hearts anew to God's heart, to see firsthand God's love for the peoples of the world.

On the trip, students learned about missionary life and experienced other cultures as they identified unreached people groups and studied strategies for penetrating them with the gospel. They saw first-hand the high priority that Assemblies of God missionaries place on building indigenous churches. They observed and participated in missionary activities: evangelism, church planting, Bible schools, children's evangelism, Latin American Child Care schools, Christian radio, church building teams, teaching English as a second language, and spiritual warfare through focused intercessory prayer. On the front-line themselves, at least for awhile, students experienced the immeasurable joy that results from missionary ministry. Further augmenting student experiences and their beliefs, thirty people responded to an invitation to receive Christ at services in which the students participated.

Several students gave testimony of how God used this experience to change them, to clarify their calls, to call them back to divine priorities, and to give direction to their lives. Leah Gardner said, "This trip confirmed my call to be a missionary to Latin America, [a call] that God placed on my heart many years ago." Each student was responsible for securing his or her personal costs for the trip. Trusting God to supply the finances for the trip was a faith building experience. After his success in finding funds for the trip, Aaron Hunter said, "Now I can trust God for anything." Adding to the personal value of the trip, Don Stenbak said, "Our professors not only talk about missions, they actually do what they tell us. I can sense their passion for reaching the lost."

CHINA AWARENESS ON-SITE SEMINAR

From May 13-26, the Pacific Rim Centre for Cross Cultural Studies conducted a China Awareness On-Site Seminar. During this time, I led five students to Beijing, China, to learn about Chinese life and culture with a view toward considering opportunities for bi-vocational missions. These students attended classes in Chinese language, history, and culture, and they visited several important sites: Tiananmen Square, the Forbidden City, Summer Palace, Temple of Heaven, Great Hall of the People, the Great Wall, and the Ming Imperial Tombs. They also visited a local factory, attended a traditional Tea House Opera in a three-hundred year old tea house, sat in on an English as a Second Language class at Beijing University, and enjoyed interaction with university students at the "English Corner." NC students also learned about Chinese religious thought and spiritual needs and attended a Sunday service at the Kuanjie Protestant Church. The NC 1998 China Awareness Seminar was the fourth such experience conducted in cooperation with the Sunrise Educational Foundation LTD, of which Ken Benintendi, NC alumnus ('67), serves as the executive director. ☪

MEETING THE CALL TO EXCELLENCE

Class of 1998 – At the 1998 Awards and Honors Convocation and at the sixty-second Commencement exercises for the Class of 1998, NC recognized and honored students for excellence in scholarship, character and spiritual maturity. The academic achievements, student life service, and graduate honors bestowed upon these students exemplify the quality of their college experiences.

The top graduate for the four year Bachelor of Arts degree was **Deborah Anderson**, majoring in Behavioral Science. Deborah graduated with a cumulative grade point average of 4.000.

The graduate with the highest grade point average for the Associate in Arts degree was **Tracy Boatsman**, whose cumulative grade point average was 3.940.

The 1998 Graduation Events included the 62nd Commencement exercises for Northwest College. The 244 graduates marked the largest class to meet the degree requirements for graduation, bringing the number of NC graduates to 5,602 students. There were 30 (A.A.) candidates for the Associate in Arts Degree and 214 (B.A.) candidates for the Bachelor of Arts Degree. The graduating class included 141 women and 103 men, and ninety-four students graduated with academic honors.

Sigma Chi Pi Award – The Sigma Chi Pi Award is an honor society established for graduates and alumni of endorsed Assemblies of God Colleges. Graduates and alumni chosen for the honor society are selected by the faculty on the basis of outstanding academic scholarship, approved Christian character, and recognizable achievement in leadership, service, or vocation.

Sigma Chi Pi Award, Alumni – The Sigma Chi Pi Award is presented annually to three alumni who graduated from the college ten or more years ago, who have manifested outstanding Christian character and have made recognizable achievement in leadership, service, or vocation.

THIS YEAR NORTHWEST COLLEGE HONORED THE FOLLOWING ALUMNI

Class of 1938 – Rev. Eva Radanovsky – Pastor, Missionary Nurse, Missionary Educator and Bible Translator. Eva Radanovsky was a member of NC's second graduating class. After graduation, she served as pastor in Goldendale, Washington, and Medical Lake, Washington. Ms. Radanovsky left the pastorate to attend the Missionary Health Institute in Toronto, Canada, from which she graduated in 1945. Immediately, she departed for Haiti as an Assemblies of God Missionary nurse.

After service in Haiti, Ms. Radanovsky studied linguistics at the Hartford Seminary Foundation in preparation for a new assignment in Burkina Faso, West Africa. During her missionary career in West Africa, she served as a Bible School teacher, nurse, and Bible translator. Upon returning to the U.S., Ms. Radanovsky has volunteered as a hospice nurse in the Spokane, Washington area.

Class of 1968 – Dr. Robert Stone – Pastor, Mentor, Discippler, and Presbyterian. Robert Stone has served in pastoral leadership at Assemblies of God churches in Poulsbo, Wenatchee, Spokane, Seattle, and Bellingham, Washington. During the last 20 years, he has been the senior pastor of Hillcrest Chapel, in Bellingham, which has grown from 125 parishioners to over 1,400.

In 1980, Pastor Stone completed his Master of Arts degree from the California Graduate School of Theology, after which he earned a Doctor of Ministry degree at the Western Conservative Baptist Seminary, graduating in 1985.

During his career, Dr. Stone has served as a mentor to over 150 people who have entered the vocational ministry or missionary service. Additionally, he was the founding pastor of Calvary Chapel, Seattle, from which outreach ministry to the University of Washington has continued to this day. For the past nine years, he has been a Presbyterian for the Northwest District Council.

Class of 1988 – Dr. William Randolph – Professor of Life Sciences, Non-traditional missionary, and Advisor. William Randolph entered Northwest College in 1958 as a relatively new Christian. His initial three years at NC had a profound impact on his life. As he observed the faculty and their deep commitment to Christlikeness, he prayed that God would allow him to be a part of such a program that would help others establish their faith in Christ.

Mr. Randolph transferred from Northwest College to work toward his bachelor's degree at Cascade College. He graduated from Cascade College in 1964 and began his teaching career in a public school a year later. In 1968, Mr. Randolph joined the faculty of Northwest College, and by 1971, he had completed the Master of Education degree from Seattle Pacific University. In 1988 Professor Randolph completed a second Bachelor of Arts degree from Northwest College in Biblical Literature, and in 1992, he earned a Doctor of Education degree from Washington State University.

For the past decade, Dr. Randolph has been instrumental in establishing the Applied Science Center at Northwest College. Under the auspices of the Center, he has led teams of students to Mexico, Romania, and Zambia to apply eco-intensive science methods for life-sustaining purposes. This non-traditional approach to fulfilling the Great Commission has motivated Dr. Randolph throughout his thirty-one years of faculty leadership at Northwest College. Today, Dr. Randolph holds the rank of Professor of Life Sciences and teaches full-time at Northwest.

Delta Tau Faculty Award of Honor – This year's Delta Tau Faculty Award was given to Rev. Dennis A. Davis, Northwest College President 1990-1998. Though the award names the faculty as its sponsor, it is actually a conferral of honor from the entire college community. The faculty voted to bestow this honor on Rev. Davis, who has enjoyed a long and meaningful relationship in service as President and Board Member of Northwest College.

Distinguished Service Award – Selected by the Board of Directors, the Distinguished Service Award is presented for outstanding service to Northwest College plus significant contributions to students, colleagues, and the entire college community. This award was presented to Ms. Kristi Brodin, NC women's volleyball and basketball coach 1973-1998, who was responsible for beginning and directing women's sports at Northwest College for the last 25 years. She started the volleyball program in 1973 and women's basketball in 1977, and served as the women's basketball coach through the 1998 season.

President's Award – The President's Award is a formal and public acknowledgment of significant and meritorious service given to the College. Initiated and sponsored by the Office of the President of the college, the award this year recognized Dr. Roger Butz. Dr. Roger Butz, a Brigadier General, began his thirty year military career as an intern at the U.S. Navy Hospital in Oakland, California. He has had various assignments and command positions, all as a medical officer. Then, after serving as the Vice President and Medical Director for SAFECO Life Insurance for thirteen years, Dr. Butz took retirement at the age of 55. Both as a professor at NC and as an overseas missionary, he has dedicated the rest of his life in service and education as a missionary educator throughout Asia Pacific.

He is involved in medical missionary work in Vietnam and Cambodia. He serves as an instructor at the Asia Pacific Theological Seminary in Baguio, Philippines, and has recently been in China lecturing to medical personnel on AIDS.

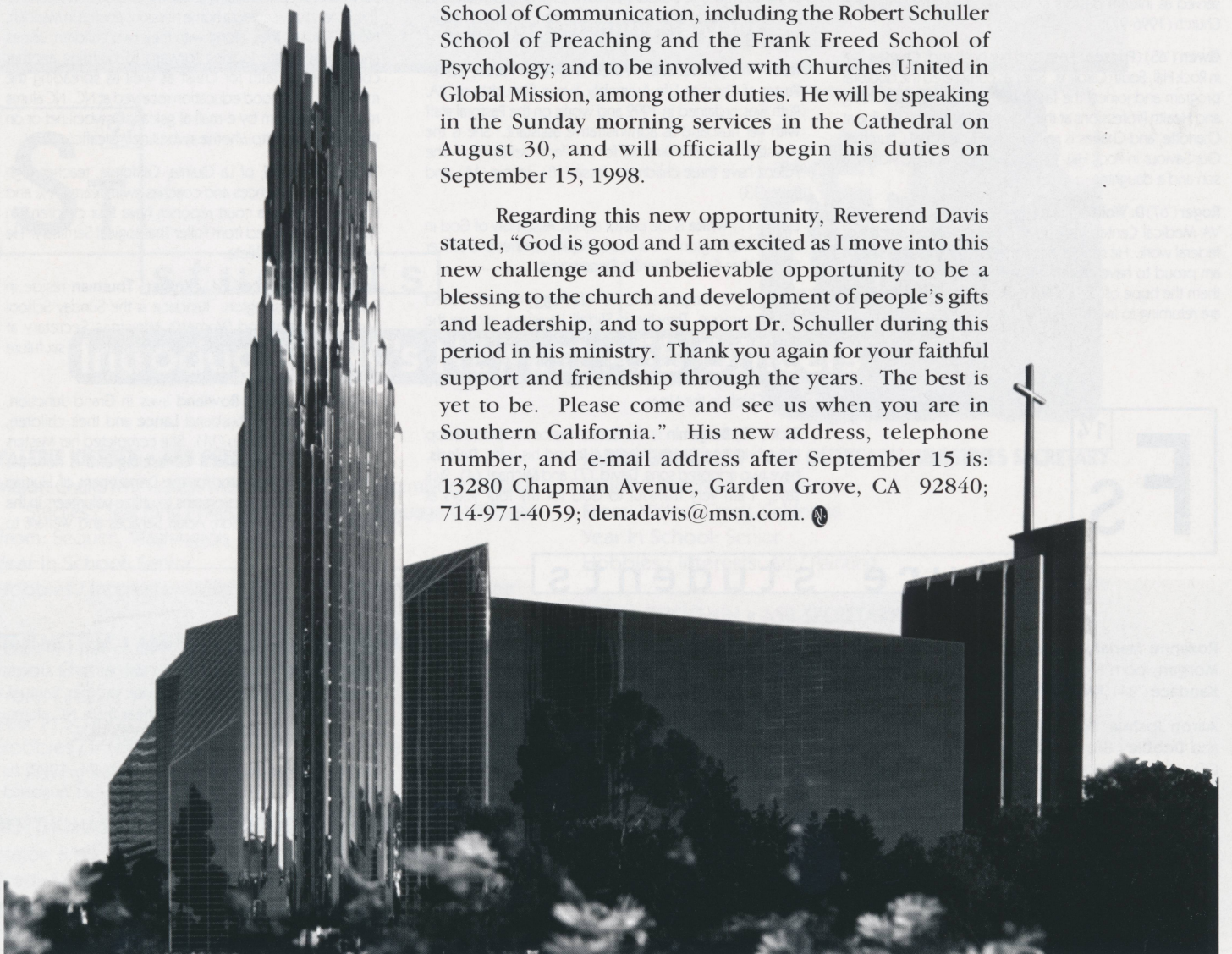
**Reverend Dennis A. Davis to Join

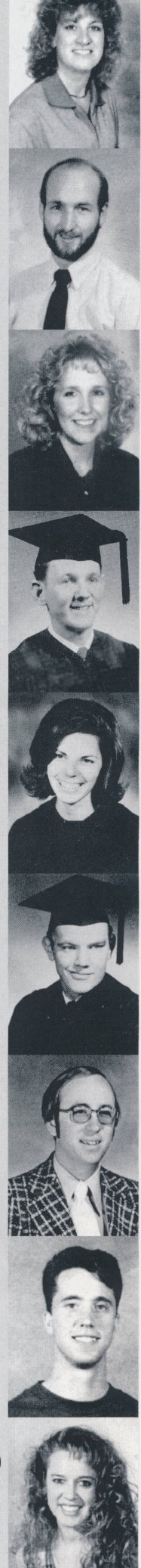
