



The 500 floor "Nerds" won the competition, breaking the 600 Floor's two year winning streak.









The Master Chorale assumed a number of new roles this past year. In chapel they sang not only to inspire the student body, but also to



How effective is Northwest College in training students to think, communicate and apply knowledge to the crucial issues of our day? One way to judge is by looking at the results of debate competitions. At weekend debates held throughout the nation, our students are matched against the best and brightest from dozens of major colleges and universities.

From September to March of the 1998-1999 season, Northwest College made final rounds at 12 of the 13 tournaments attended. NC ranked in the nation's top six percent, placing 14th out of 225 schools for total winning points throughout the year. Last year the Eagles brought home six first place awards, including the Willamette University national championship. The team won 14 other awards.

The 1999-2000 year continued the winning tradition. Eagle debaters won three first place awards fall semester: University of British Columbia, Oregon State University, and Linfield College. The first place win at Linfield was the sixth year in a row that NC placed in the top three.

On November 4 in Millard Hall, team captain Josh Brittingham and national allstar debater James Stewart challenged the British National Debate Team on campus. It was the only time in the Briton's ten week US tour that they faced off against a member of the United States Debate Team. Last year Stewart was chosen to represent our nation by the same organization that brought the British to Kirkland. He was one of only two Americans chosen for this honor. Stewart traveled to Europe in March of 1999 for six weeks of debates in England, Ireland, and Scotland.




SIFE




Off Stage at the Globe

For three glowing nights in November, students from the fall NC Shakespeare class performed *Offstage at the Globe*, a play by NC English Professor Julia Young. The general format of the play centers around two hosts interviewing three Shakespearean characters: King Richard III, played by Josh Johnson; Feste, played by Jake Young; and Titania, played by Annette Holmquist. Puck, played by Josh Holden, also made a special, unexpected appearance. The play takes place in an "offstage" room at the Globe Theater, and in its introduction, it gives some historical accounts of that theater.

The two hosts are Guy Jones, a lowbrow American played by Doug Lloyd, and Roz Robinson, an elegant Englishwoman played by Julianna Skaff. Guy falls immediately for Roz and continually tries to impress her, but in the wrong way to capture her attention or heart. The Shakespearean characters appear for interview in the order listed above; they move in and out of "character." Meanwhile, the interview turns into all but the expected: Feste also falls for Roz; Richard falls for Titania; and Puck loves Titania as well. The NC actors took the new play from the page to the stage, breathing into it life and vitality.








Resident life staff is all about community. Resident Assistants, Directors, and the Director of Student Life never stop working to ensure that community is not only maintained, but fostered.

The whole team cares, and that's what keeps Resident Life Staff doing its job.








CONCLUSION




tered rocks, shaking their sticks at their enemies.


Pottery is thought to be one of the first manmade synthetics. Potters create the clay through heating and dehydrating the water found naturally within the clay. The product of the irreversible, dehydration process is ceramics.

To enhance the qual-

ity of pottery, most potters temper their clay, meaning they add a number of different materials that reduces cracking in the final stages.

One important contribution to ceramics is the potter's wheel, though no one knows when it was introduced. The wheel frees both hands to symmetrically shape and mold the clay. Another aspect includes decoration, which increases the pottery's value. One of the earliest methods of decorating was through impressions of fingerprints and rope.







In Process 132 Dut now, O LORD, thou art our father, we are the clay, and thou our potter, and we are all the work of thy hands. Isaiah 64:8





After forming the pot's shape, they must be dried and smoothed in a process called turning. The pottery is then fired in a kiln where the atmosphere contributes greatly to its coloring.

The scripture has much to say about the ceramic process. Isaiah 64:8 states: "But now, O LORD, thou art our father, we are the clay, and thou our potter, and we are all the work of thy hands." We believe our Father forms us and has a plan for our lives that began prior to our birth. We are His clay; He molds and forms us after His likeness.



Perhaps the processes of turning and firing are most difficult. God, our Potter, smooths our imperfections with His hands. He scrapes away the scars and sins that cover so many areas of our lives. He places us in the fire to create a firmness and strength that only comes through knowing Him. He molds, forms, and shapes while leaving His imprints in our lives. The process never ends.




