DVH spoke of the many small and large miracles which have help NC along the way; "Now, however, it is time to set out in a new direction. *It is time to endow the operations of the College.* This is necessary in order to further enrich and undergird the programs, to insure the continuing functions of the College, to keep the cost to students as low as possible and to raise faculty salaries." New music center dedicated on April 22 with 55,000 sq.ft. of space for instructional and practice studios, offices, sound room, and two classrooms.

Dec-Jan

Semester system to start in fall of 1986. Ming announced conversion process being done by four task forces chaired by Drs. Gerald Mercer, Robert Parlotz, Dan Pecota, Bob Swaffield. Pres. Hurst's column exults over the "quantum leaps forward" by the college, and lists reorganization of administration, Rich Wilkerson's coming as VP at Large, Seahawks coming and \$5 million developments, new Behavioral Science program, Elem. Ed. program, One-Year Certificate of Christian Studies, Christian Formation Dept., conversion to semester

system, and the Funding and Endowment Board. Elsewhere the faculty is praised as "the first Assemblies of God College to form a core curriculum of Christian Formation!"

Randall Barton reports the inaugural meeting of the Funding and Endowment Board on Oct 25-26. Includes attorneys, accountants, bank officers, insurance advisors, businessmen, pastors and church leaders.

Seahawk ground breaking Oct. 21, 1985, with John Nordstrom of the owners, Mayor Doris Cooper, Pres. Hurst, and Gen.Mgr. Mike McCormack wielding the shovels.

1986

June-July

Skip Bennett resigns to join Calvary Temple's pastoral staff with Warren Bullock, with whom he had served before at Spanaway. Bob Foster new Asst. to the President for College Relations. June 2.

New faculty include Dwayne Turner returning as Coordinator of Missions and Christian Education, Raymond E. White as El.Ed. Coordinator, and Larry Malcolm as first Prof. of Christian Formation.

Board honors DVH's 20 yrs in luncheon at Red Lion. Notes the doubling of enrollment, campus increase to 55 acres, multi-million dollar plant development, regional accreditation, state approval of El.Ed. program, faculty growth from 19 to 28 FT with 40% doctorates.

Aug-Sept

Stan Durst joins ElEd faculty with 34 yrs as teacher, counselor, vice-principal, and principal in Seattle schools.

1987

July-Aug

Owen Hodges retires in August after 20 yrs. Richard Garrison, veteran of the banking world, replaces him as VP for Business Affairs.

Clifford Hobson dies after one-day illness. Alum and board member for 16 yrs. NW district secy.

1988

May-June

Ming leaves to be Academic Dean at FEAST. Marshall Flowers new VP for Academic Affairs. Was Dir. of Advancement at SCC. Doctoral candidate at Claremore Graduate School.

July-Aug

NASC continues accreditation. Team commends NC for "climate of mutual trust and respect" on campus, a "caring, Christian environment," "an enviable record of sound management and solvency in financial affairs," "functional and aesthetically pleasing" facilities, and high quality of instruction.

God has graciously blessed our joint efforts as we have sought to fulfill His purposes for the College. I believe it is time for someone else to assume the leadership of Northwest College. Whoever is chosen will have my blessing and help in whatever way can best be given."

Randy Barton elected mayor of Kirkland on Jan. 2.

"Pacific Rim Centre for Cross-Cultural Studies" formed in partnership with the Dept. of Foreign Missions.

Board instructs the college to continue to qualify as a Bible College under AABC definition.

DVH makes \$110,000 in retirement gifts to establish endowed scholarships for students. Barton comments, "Normally, an institution or college makes a retirement gift to its president. It's fantastic that Dr. Hurst has shown his commitment to Northwest College, not only during his over 24 years of service, but even in his retirement."
