## REPORTS FROM OUR MISSIONARIES

Dear Fellow Alumni.

Here we are back in America again after spending two years in the East Indies; seven months on the Island of Ambon, and one and a half years in the hot, humid swamplands of southeastern Borneo.

Our principal work was located in Bandjermasin, Borneo, a city of 100,000 population consisting of Indonesians, Arabs, and Chinese. We have a church and Sunday School in the Chinese section of the city and two works in the Indonesian section.

Part of our work there was training some of our Christian Dyak boys for missionary work "Inland." We missionaries knew that a certain amount of preparatory work was needed to be done inland before sending any of our boys there, so several trips were made by us, thus laying the foundation for future gospel work. As all the villages inland are built along the river's edge, the only means of travel is by native boats as there are no roads.

At every village we were given a warm welcome and permission by the chief to hold a gospel service for them. The response that we received from the Mohammedan villagers was most inspiring, and every village gave us an enthusiastic invitation to return for which we praise God.

We send our greetings to all the Alumni on home and foreign soil and may God bless each one of you.
