
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

This old world has been the stage for many wonderful events, all the time since God spoke the Word and brought it into existence, up to the time when the heavens suddenly bent low and became aglow with the glory of God and the angel choir sang forth the glad news that Christ was born. Many wonderful events have taken place since that time, but I want to call your attention to an event that is yet future, more glorious and wonderful than all the others combined, and that event is the Second Coming of Christ!

If the Bible speaks more emphatically about any one thing than any other, except the saving grace of Christ, it is certainly of the second coming of Christ. It does not say when He is coming, but it does make plain that He is coming. It tells us of certain signs that shall appear on earth just prior to His coming, and when these things begin to come to pass our redemption draweth nigh.

When is Jesus coming? "In such an hour as ye think not." "Watch therefore, for ye know neither the day nor the hour wherein the Son of man cometh." The exact time none know, not even the angels. watchword should be "Watch therefore," "Be ye ready." Many have made mistakes in setting dates for His coming. Other guesses, no doubt, will be made, but mistakes do not alter the truth. The fact remains, "Behold He cometh!"

Someone may say, "Since we know not the day nor the hour, perhaps we are not living so near His coming as some think. We feel certain, as well as millions of others, that we are now living in the days of His preparation. All the signs Jesus foretold in Matthew, the 24th chapter, are displayed throughout the world in a vast panorama.

Paul, in writing to Timothy, says "This know also that in the last days perilous times shall come." Then he pictures the true condition of the world at the time of the Second Coming of Jesus in such a vivid manner that anyone reading it, and comparing the conditions of the world to his description, will understand that the coming of the Lord draweth nigh (II Timothy 3:1-7).

Have you read the parable of the ten virgins? (Matthew 25:1-10). Whom did they go out to meet? They went out to meet the Bridegroom. Five were wise and five were foolish. 

Only four school sessions have been held and the enrollment has climbed to more than 230 from a mere "corporal's guard." Last year 40 students were graduated, and this year 57 are scheduled to receive their diplomas—nearly a hundred fine young harvest hands thrust out into the field to gather in the golden grain. What these may accomplish remains to be seen, but we feel confident many of them will make full proof of their ministry. In fact, some are now successfully engaged as pastors, helpers and evangelists, and others are preparing to enter the ministry in some of its several ramifications. Two are now on the foreign field as missionaries.

If our Lord Jesus shall delay His coming, the indications are that N. B. I. will continue to send out, at each graduating period, valiant soldiers to join the fighting forces in God's great army.

Last year we called the graduating class the "Pioneers." This year we have named the class the "Conquerors." Both names are significant of what we are confidently expecting of them. In the name of Jesus Christ, their Great Commander, they are going into undeveloped territory as real "Pioneers" of the Gospel and their aim is to conquer for Him. May God grant them abundant success in the winning of souls for the Savior.

Pray-ers Man the "Ship"

One of the outstanding features of this school, almost from the start, has been the presence of many splendid musicians and singers. The world has not taken all the good talent. Thank God we have much of it here which, combined with deep heart consecrations, is of inestimable value.

The music, however, is not the outstanding feature of N. B. I. The "pray-ers," who know how to lay hold upon God and pray things through, are first in importance, and we have a goodly number of them. They constitute the crew that keeps the "Old Ship of Zion" moving.

It is our policy here to plan and labor as if we had years of opportunities ahead, but at the same time to watch and pray as if our days were numbered. Our Lord has told us to occupy until He comes, and this is our eternal purpose. Surely we know not the day nor the hour when He will appear but we are warned that His coming will be like a thief in the night.

Signs on every hand indicate that the day of our final and glorious redemption is not far distant. The voice of the archangel and the trump of God may be heard even tonight, and we shall be caught up to meet our Lord and so shall we ever be with Him.

"He's coming soon, He's coming soon:

With joy we welcome His returning. It may be morn, it may be night or noon:

We know He's coming soon."

Look to Your Garden

(Hosea 10:12)

SPRING months see much activity in gardens—primarily the breaking up of fallow ground fine and small, ready for the sowing of seeds. The thought comes that at N. B. I. there continually is spring work being carried on.

Many students hope to be sent forth to sow the seed of the Word, which is the seed of righteousness, but Hosea warns us to sow it to ourselves. It will be of little avail to broadcast this precious seed by word of mouth, if at the same time the gardens of our own lives are full of pernicious weeds scattering their seeds all around us.

Weeds flourish on fallow or uncultivated ground, and it is part of our work at Bible school to look to it that there is none such left in our gardens. In addition to the all too apparent weeds, there are all sorts of unsuspected seeds lying dormant, too far below the surface to germinate. If left, later on, exposure to the lime-light of some success may start them growing, to cause untold

harm to the Lord's work before we even suspect their presence in our lives.

The need is urgent that we break up all our fallow ground while at school, that growing weeds may be rooted up and destroyed, and the hidden seeds discovered and dealt with in their turn, before they cause damage in our own lives and in those around us. Jeremiah and Hosea both stress the need for this work, and the latter tells us how to set about it:

"It is time to seek the Lord."

There are two ways to do this: First, by meditating on His Word, then waiting before Him that He may reveal the weeds that are spoiling our work for Him. Second, by waiting long enough for Him to dig deep and bring to light the things whose presence in our hearts we hardly even suspect. Praise Him! He works, too, through His gardeners, our teachers. Things they say, the lessons they teach, often set in motion some thought which turns over the soil to good purpose.

Next comes the need to pray that He will break us fine and small. "The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit: a broken and a contrite heart, O God, thou wilt not despise" (Psalm 51:17). That surely is the essential thing in every life, for it is the breaking that gradually kills the self in us, so making it possible for the Master Gardener to use us to the full, according to His plan and purpose for each one. That breaking done, the coveted "rain of righteousness" will be able to soak deep, and the good seed, unhindered by weeds, will be able to spring up, filling the gardens of our lives with the sweet fragrance of the flowers of purity, love, gentleness and humility, and producing the rich fruits of righteousness.

Solomon tells us: "The fruit of the righteous is a tree of life: he that winneth souls is wise."

Wisdom Where Needed

AM as good a Christian as anyone in the country, and I'm prepared to knock the daylights out of whoever says I'm not!"

In that arrogant manner a University behavorism (psychology) student expressed himself recently when a Christian, explaining the way to Salvation, incidentally dropped the comment that a person is not a Christian just because he goes to church but that he must repent of his sins, accept Jesus Christ as his personal Savior and be born again, of the Spirit of God, before he can become a genuine Christian.

The University student further asserted that churches were fine things and that it would be a better world if more people attended church. But, when the Christian worker pressed on for the salvation of his friend's soul, the one who so forcefully proclaimed that he was a good Christian, then replied (as the first two pages of his psychology book had taught him): "There is no such thing as a soul!"

Proverbs 19:8 informs us: "He that getteth wisdom loveth his own soul; he that keepeth understanding shall find good."

What hope is there for the person who disregards the Book of Truth, the Book of Life—God's own Word—and accepts as positive fact the inconsistent philosophy and ignorant assertion of a certain college textbook? What hope is there for a church which permits such contrary-to-truth teaching to go unchallenged and which fails to inform its congregation about the very truths upon which life, Salvation and the church

are founded? What hope? May God be merciful on the day of Judgment!

To ignore God's Word is to ignore Him; to deny Christ's teachings is to deny Him. The Bible from beginning to end is God's Word on Salvation — the Book of Life. Christ's birth, life on earth, death, resurrection and ascension, and His teachings, all were and are for the salvation of SOULS!

He who denies the existence of a soul, denies the plan of Salvation, provided by God Jehovah, Creator of Heaven and earth and all therein. He who denies or rejects Salvation, as purchased for us by the Lord Jesus Christ's lifeblood upon the cross and by His resurrection from the dead, denies or rejects the divinity of the ascended and living Christ, Son of God. What hope? The words of the Savior:

For the Soul of Man

"God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. For God sent not His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved. He that believeth on Him is not condemned; but he that believeth not is condemned already, because he hath not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God. And this is the condemnation, that light is come into the world, and men loved darkness rather than light, because their deeds were evil. For everyone that doeth evil hateth the light, neither cometh to the light, lest his deeds sould be reproved." (John 3:16-20)

"He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life; and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abideth on him" (John 3:36). "I said therefore unto you, that ye shall die in your sins; for if ye believe not that I am He, ye shall die in your sins" (John 8:24).

But these are written that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through His name (John 20:31). He that keepeth the commandment keepeth his own soul; but he that despiseth His ways shall die (Proverbs 19:16).

Prayer, a Privilege

A GOOD day begins with God. Whether we be students, housewives or business men, we should no more think of commencing the day without communion with our Lord Jesus Christ, than of going to a wedding without wearing coat or shoes. We do not set our watches by guess, and since our souls are poor time pieces, utterly disordered, every morning we should set them by the Sun of Righteousness.

Before we start off to the day's tasks, we need to pray for faith, patience, and wisdom. We will be harrassed and perplexed; others may wrong us, impose upon us; there is need for laying up a large supply of grace to meet these demands. We need to pray for spiritual strength. The great enemy will assail each day, not in some grand sweeping chargewhich every energy of the soul should be forewarned and forearmed to encounter—but in detail; in a multitude of light skirmishings and small ambushes. But remember that a succession of little defeats disarms any soul. At the close of the message the students moved into the prayer room to pour out their hearts to the Lord and to make a deeper consecration to Him.

Orient Customs Told

DURING his recent campaign in Fremont Pentecostal Tabernacle in Seattle, Evangelist William Nagel visited N. B. I. in the morning, lecturing on world conditions. Having travelled extensively in both Europe and Asia, he spoke with authority on conditions there.

in Manchuria. The Gospel alone is presented on the street and in the mission hall. As people come in and are saved, services are conducted to instruct the born-again natives in the ways of God. Meetings are held every morning, in which the Bible is explained. Special services are held for women and extensive Sunday school work is carried on.

The people do not readily accept the Gospel and thus the number of converts is small. However, the efforts put forth are not without fruits. The need of this field was made very real through Brother Kvamme's profitable message to the students.

Can Music Preach The Gospel?

MANY stirring sermons have been preached and yet thousands of people have never come to

see the light of Salvation. Many examples and illustrations have been used to show the masses the "upward way", but their hearts have not been made to feel the love of God.

Music is not the only way to spread the Gospel, but it is one way of expression in a heavenly language that causes men to ponder the hidden truths of God. Words have definite meaning and cause the audience to think in terms of words, while music is a "universal language" that speaks to the heart. It is true that there are many types of music heard today, but when Spirit-filled believers sing and play in the Spirit there is an enlightenment that brings many unbelievers to the foot of the Old Rugged Cross.

The singing of sacred music takes the words that are common to man and clothes them with resurrection power, and thus causes the message to have double understanding. Even during King Saul's fury, David knew how to play his harp so as to calm and soften his spirit. There is something divine in real music that creates an atmosphere such as was felt in the tabernacle near the Holy of Holies. THE definition of health that I have given my Hygiene class is, "that quality of life which renders the individual fit to live the most and serve the best". We remember God's Word says: "David served his own generation by the will of God"; and so must we if our life will be one that is lived at its highest and best. On analyzing this we find three principles laid down that, if taken to our own hearts, will keep us on the firing line constantly for our Master. Remember, first, that David SERVED—and we must serve also. Service is the Great Master's test of our usefulness—"By their fruits ye shall know them."

One example of a real serving Christian is worth a thousand arguments. The world is tired of theories and mere talking, they want you to so keep yourself fit that you might really serve; and doesn't that, after all, mean living the Christ-life and pointing others to Him? Charles Finney said, "The Christian that is not making others Christians by his life and service is as much a contradiction in terms as a fire that is not heating or a flame that gives no light."

Secondly, we find that David served his own generation. This is your generation. Look about you, wherever you are, and especially N. B. I. students, you are in a sphere where you can serve and live the life at its highest and best; all doors and avenues are thrown open to you as fields of service while at school—the mission, the jail, the hospital, the country church. Now is the only time that you may ever be able to serve; its your generation; can you afford to be idle?

"In this generation" certainly is a challenging motto that should go deep in every heart, for the one door of hope in this generation is Christ.

The one supreme and sufficient physician to heal the hurts of a bruised and sinning world is Jesus. You and I today must be His witnesses and remember He said, "All the world" and "Every Creature".

Gospel Wins Souls Through Jail Bars

E ACH Sunday afternoon finds many N. B. I. students with their Bibles, song books, and musical instruments entering the door of the County-City Building, Seattle, to deliver the glorious Gospel to the sinsick, hell-bound, souls behind prison bars. Many of those souls have thus received Heavenly pardon during the year by repenting and accepting Jesus Christ as their Savior.

Our students, with many other Christian workers, meet on the main floor before separating into the several groups. After prayer for God's blessing upon the words about to be spoken, the groups—each composed of six or seven persons—go to their assigned "tanks". A jailer unlocks the door and allows the group to enter, then with a hollow clang the door is closed, the lock is turned, and the service is ready to begin.

Soon strains of Gospel songs are filling the air as each group endeavors to reach the hearts of its audience through the singing of inspiring songs.

The prisoners have a share in the service also; for they thumb through the pages of the hymn books to locate and call out the numbers of their favorite hymns. Between the songs and special musical numbers, testimonies are given as to the saving power and grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, who loved us and gave Himself that we might be cleansed of our sins and have eternal life.

Usually a brief evangelistic message is given at the conclusion of the testimonies and invitation is extended to the prisoners to accept Salvation or at least to raise their hands for prayer.

All too soon the hour slips by and the jailer comes to unlock the door and usher the Lord's messengers out of the cellblock. With parting smiles and words of encouragement, and exhortations to the prisoners to seek the Lord, the young people leave the tank with a prayer in their hearts and a greater zeal burning within their souls to reach those wretchedly unhappy men and win them to

Some of the most precious services conducted in the name of the Lord have been within the steel-barred doors and windows of the county jail, where God's marvelous power has been manifest to an unusual degree.

Great Change in Norway By EVANGELIST MAURICE NESS

U NDER the masterful, God-inspired leadership of the Rev. T. B. Barrett, Norway has experienced

the most remarkable revival in scope, ever to be recorded. Sinners have been thronging the churches until larger places are being built and new churches appear everywhere throughout the land. This revival has not only brought about the salvation of thousands of souls, but the power of God's Word has penetrated the very heart of Norway as a nation until its influence is felt from the King's palace to the humblest home; from the Bank of Norway to the pawn shop; from the largest factory to the smallest farm. In Norway I saw Christianity as a spiritual and practical force changing the ways of man — from the materialistic laissez-faire point of view to the Biblical "Do unto others as you would have others do unto you." Consequently, the whole social system has undergone revolutionary changes. The working man gets good wages and the factories are modern and sanitary. To mention

The Freia Candy factory has its own beautiful park with trees, flowers and water fountains, where the workers may spend their rest hours. Everybody seems to be happy. The wheels of industry are spinning, the pulp and paper factories running three shifts. The government is loaning money to homesteaders, paying them for every acre of new broken ground.

In Oslo I had the opportunity to view one of the gigantic municipal apartment projects, housing 5000 people, built for the working class. The flats were modern in every respect yet reasonably priced. The

court yards were beautified with flower-filled gardens and water fountains.

For a small nation, Norway's school system is one of the finest in the world. The public schools have dining rooms where the children are given what is called "The Olso Breakfast". The children are given breakfast in school, to teach the value of proper eating of wholesome foods. Each child is weighed regularly. If the child can not be brought up to normal weight in the school the child is sent to a sanitarium until it does, without any expense on the part of the parents. "The Olso Breakfast" system is being tried in all the principle cities of Europe.

No Smoking in Autos

In Norway all building value is insured. Automobile insurance is compulsory. Smoking while driving a car is forbidden, and this law is enforced. There are 35 agricultural schools, seven schools for small land holders, seven horticultural schools, five schools for dairying, four schools of forestry, and 63 schools for the training of housewives.

There are cooperative societies for buying of raw materials, machinery,

fertilizer, and feed for cattle. A cooperative marketing system and cooperative stores do away with the profit of the middleman and assure the consumer of the best quality at the lowest possible price. In fact there is social security for all, including the old-age pension, and sick benefit for all who are unemployed.

May these evidences of the power and the influence of Christianity to change the hearts and the thinking of man, stir us to greater efforts for God and our fellow man. And may it bring us down upon our knees in consecration, praying for a revival in our land—until it is felt from the White House at Washington, D. C., to the fisherman's home in Alaska!

I believe that the secret behind this great revival in Norway lies in the fact that the Christians are not depending upon the evangelistic method, but upon God. Simplicity marks their meetings, and they do not resort to high pressure through the newspapers or the radio, but high pressure in the prayer room! To sum it all up, this great revival in Norway is expressed in real Christianity in the church, on the street and in the home.

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What Is the Future Of the Jews?

1938

WE believe according to prophecy that Italy will eventually replace England in the Mediterranean. Revelation 13 clearly indicates the fact that the Roman Empire must be revived. Throughout the Mediterranean countries there is a great deal of Italian propaganda

today. Damascus has become a center of political activity, where many Italian agents are spreading anti-French and anti-British propaganda. While in Egypt, I learned that there were 50,000 Italian agents at work in that country stirring up sentiment in favor of the Italians. I was surprised to learn that in Greece and Bulgaria there was considerable sympathy for Mussolini and his future program.

One of the most outstanding examples of Italian victory in the Mediterranean occurred on October 17, 1935. At that time there was considerable friction between England and Italy. The French premier who was negotiating between the two countries called Mussolini by telephone one morning and asked him for his best terms. The Duce replied that if England would not reduce the size of her fleet in Alexandria within 24 hours, Italy would attack her 17 vessels at anchor there. England yielded to the pressure of the Italian dictator. Early the next morning the British ambassador to Italy went to the Venetzia palace and came to terms with the Duce. The result was that England retired to launch forth on a colossal rearmament program. A British statesman who commented upon the situation made the remark that the prestige of England suffered

more from this setback than it had suffered since the loss of the 13 American colonies.

To strengthen her position in the Holy Land, Italy is using the Catholic church. I was impressed, while in Palestine, to notice the increase of Catholic influence and domination. Wherever possible the Catholic church is acquiring land in that country. It is evident from Revelation 13 and 17 that the two powers which rule Palestine toward the close of this age, are to be the revived Roman Empire and the Roman church.

When these two shall acquire control of the Holy Land, an agreement will be reached with the Jews according to Daniel 9:27, in which the anti-Christ will enable the Jews to return to their native land without restrictions and give them complete freedom to develop it. Isaiah 60:9 tells us that they shall come with the ships of Tarshish to bring their silver and their gold with them. Under the protection of the anti-Christ, the Jews will then be able to make Palestine their national home. But, according to Scripture, they will not get the country by might nor by power, but by the Spirit of Jehovah of Hosts (Zechariah 4:6).

World War at Jerusalem

When the anti-Christ shall demand the worship of all men, the Jews will rise up in revolt. God has purged the Jews from idolatry and they will never fall down to worship the anti-Christ or his image. From the 14th chapter of Zechariah we learn that God will gather all nations against Jerusalem to battle, and, in Jeremiah 30, we read that this great wave of persecution will be Jacob's trouble. Jeremiah 31:3 tells us that God loves the Jews with an everlasting love and consequently will restore them again to this land. Because of this love, Zechariah 14:3 assures us that the Lord shall go forth and fight against those nations as when He fought in the days of battle in ancient Israel.

Zechariah 12:10 declares that God will pour out His Spirit upon the house of David and a national revival and a recognition of Christ as the Messiah will take place. In that day the feet of Jesus shall stand on the Mount of Olives and He shall come to usher in the Millennial age. We learn from Zechariah 14:16 that every one which is left of all the nations that came against Jerusalem shall go up from year to year to worship the King, the Lord of Hosts. In that day the Jews will become the world's missionaries and the remnant of Israel shall convert the remnant of the gentiles to the truth of

Conditions Serious In Eastern Europe

Sthe Russian and Eastern European Mission field are graphically

described in a letter received recently at N. B. I. from Brother Paul and Sister Gladys Williscroft who left Seattle early this spring for Danzig, alleged free state between Poland and Germany, where this young couple from N. B. I. are entering the Lord's work. Here are some paragraphs from the letter:

"What's that? A siren, and another! What a blast! Ah, they're dying down a little. But, one, two; no, several more—and the shricking continues for 15 minutes. Danzig. It's a preliminary test for an aerial attack protection drill. Now Danzig isn't always like this, but there's plenty of excitement here big parades (Nazi), sometimes a mile or so long, just men marching, mostly in uniforms, some divisions singing, a band here and there; little parades of boys 10, 12, or possibly 16 years of age; flags flying from all offices, stores and apartments.

"A few days ago Brother Tomi and Brother Forester of Hungary appeared in Danzig. They informed us that they are having serious difficulties now with the authorities. Many of the believers have been ruthlessly beaten. Six in particular who were caught holding a meeting without permission were tied to benches by the police and the bottoms of their feet beaten till they were twice their normal size.

"There is a large church in Budapest, where Brother Tomi is pastor, which is in danger of being closed. The Bulgarian constitution guarantees religious rights, yet much persecution comes from local authorities, the believers (it is usually in villages composed mostly of ignorant peasants where the persecution takes place) not being wise enough to get their constitutional rights. However, these 'supposed-to-be' democracies of eastern Europe are doing all sorts of unconstitutional things these days and getting away with it, so we do not know just what the outcome will be.

Pentecostals Join Baptists

"The Mission is taking diplomatic action through the American ambassador to Hungary, and also through the Hungarian ambassador to England in the name of the Assemblies of God in Great Britain and Ireland. This problem of non-recognition has been solved in Latvia, Lithuania, and Esthonia, in Danzig just two weeks ago, and partially in Germany by the Pentecostal churches joining the Baptist Church. The Baptists have allowed them to do this and still keep their doctrine and preachers, although in some cases it has rather 'Pentecostalized' the Baptists. In Hungary the Baptists are too narrow-minded for this solution. But we are trusting that the Lord will work it all out. This is only one of many problems.

"Nine American missionaries take care of everything in connection with the supervision of the work here at headquarters. Most all of the work on the field is taken care of by native workers. The American missionaries in most all cases labor in a supervisory capacity, whether on the field or here at headquarters. However, needless to say, at present and for a good while to come, our labor is not much 'supervising', but after we are thoroughly familiar with activities and problems, our work will, of course, broaden.

"Our Reem Biblical Institute is an interesting place. In one sense it is a rather miniature League of Nations, so many nationalities are represented. The two main languages used are Russian and German, and some of the students have difficulty understanding either; but for the most part, those two are all that are used. When speaking to the students in English, two interpreters are required. It is a slow process which we both have used. The students are

A huge map of their home missionary field, the United States, has been constructed by the band members. This is drawn in colored wax crayons upon muslin, and upon its surface every Assembly of God work will be indicated.

The band will climax the year's activities with the presentation to the student body of a program having for the theme, "What our land needs is Jesus."

Heart of Africa Appeals for Light

them from darkness to light and from the power of Satan unto God." Those words form a part of the commission our Lord Jesus gave our great pioneer missionary, the Apostle Paul. See Acts 26. Our Lord has not changed since that time, nor His Word; He still calls, chooses, and in due season thrusts forth the ones who, like the apostle, are "not disobedient unto the heavenly vision".

The interior of Africa is the black heart of that dark continent, black because full of the abominations poured out from hell. In the heart of Africa the power of Satan has not been challenged down through the ages. Not a ray of God's marvelous Light pierced through that darkness until a couple of generations ago when God finally succeeded in focusing the attention of His children in the northern climes on that black spot—"the open sore of the world".

During the past few decades the Belgian government has done much toward alleviating the physical suffering of the Congo natives. That blood-curdling traffic in humanity, as well as inter-tribal wars, have ceased. The men, as well as the women, are now engaged in useful occupations, under the direction of government officials. However, these humanitarian efforts can not turn them from the power of Satan unto God.

Age-long fears and superstitions, kept alive and nurtured by the witch doctors, will still make the natives put their trust in charms and fetishes, hellish rites and rituals. Throughout life these must guard and protect the possessor and practitioner from harm. Should they fail to do so and misfortune in some form overtake the individual, it means that he has been the victim of an enemy. If the identity of this enemy is not known, a witch doctor can ferret out the secret, find out by consulting the demons who has put the curse on this person, or perhaps administered poison. Woe be to the individual against whom the sorcerer holds a grudge, or who perhaps might be an eyesore to some friend of his; such an individual is sure to be found guilty and dealt with summarily.

What won't a witch doctor stoop to for revenge or filthy lucre? In consequence the natives live continually in an atmosphere of fear, hatred, suspicion, revenge—the kind of atmosphere the prince of the powers of the air breathes in and upon and around his subjects. Something quite different, indeed, from the happy state of natural innocence which a certain type of people unfriendly to Missions vainly imagine, people who know neither the true conditions prevailing among the raw heathen nor the power of God.

The government officials do try to keep an eye on the more atrocious activities of the witch doctors; as a result the most heinous practices and crimes are perpetrated in secret. Secret societies are legion. White man is permitted to witness only the more harmless mob-outbursts of grief or hilarity.

I shall never forget the first time I witnessed a death dance in one of

our villages. The brother of the chief had just died, so there was a big crowd of mourning relatives and official mourners. According to custom the women had discarded their scant clothing and robed themselves in only a few fresh, green leavesand a coat of whitewash smeared all over their black bodies. When we arrived these preliminaries were over. What a gruesome sight met our eyes! These ghastly heathen women were dancing in a large circle, screaming and yelling and throwing themselves on the ground. Then they would hoist one of the dead man's daughters onto their shoulders and carry her around. (This daughter, by the way, is now the helpmeet of one of our leading evangelists.) All the while, huge drums were echoing and inciting this diabolical display.

Orgy Expresses Sorrow

When the women had exhausted their strength the men proceeded to perform. Their mourning apparel consisted of tattered pieces of clothing or old, dirty loincloths. In that way the men and the women took turns, meanwhile drinking and eating and working themselves up to a still greater frenzy. But for our presence they would have kept this up night and day without interruptions for perhaps a week, the length of the orgy depending on the social status of the deceased. The two nights we were there they had to observe the law made by white man for white man and grant us peace and quiet. And with that peace reigning within that the world can not take away, we rested, safe in our Father's keeping.

Why this gruesome exhibit? It partly expresses, in a crude way, genuine sorrow; but still more it expresses fear. The mystery of death frightens them. The demon world is coming too close for comfort, so in their blindness they attempt to frighten away the demons through this heathenish exhibition of the flesh and the indwelling devil—as if they could cast out devils by the prince of the devils!

25 At Prayer Meeting

We had several meetings, with a fairly good attendance. The Word can cleanse the atmosphere. That first prayer meeting I attended in the jungles, with about 25 nearly naked, ebony-hued shining bodies kneeling with their faces close to the ground, calling out to God for mercy, made a deep impression on me. I can still see them completely filling the outer portion of our temporary home, the adobe rest house made for visiting white men, with only a (Continued on page 22)

feeble lantern flame to scatter the darkness.

"To open their eyes and to turn them—from the power of Satan unto God." Civilization can not do that, neither can education do it- only God Himself can break the fetters ensnaring and enslaving these benighted souls. We know that only "the entrance of His Words giveth light", and that His Word "is quick and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword'. We have the privilege to bring that Word right into the enemy's camp. We confirm their belief in evil powers, but then we proceed to tell them that that is only half of the story: There are also good powers, good Spirits, a Creator who loves them, who has prepared a way of escape for them through His only begotten Son, and He is anxious to make this known to them. In Satan's darkness there is fear and hatred, in God's light their is love.

Girls Sold for Wives

But if love is something foreign to them, how can we make them understand it, or begin to desire it? I believe we can go anywhere in this world and find that mothers, and to some extent also fathers, feel a tender affection for their children. Every mother suffers and sacrifices for her child; hence, she can not help but love. The African mother loves her child, and he generally reciprocates that love in a clumsy way, even after he is grown up. What untold heartaches many an African mother has suffered as her little girl, perhaps only 7 or 8 years old, has been torn away from her in consummation of a sale negotiated between the child's father and another man who is either adding this child-wife to his own household, or else buying her for a son or a male relative! Hence, using what little family love we can discover as a starting point -provided our own lives are Christcentered, so that our words convey warmth and reality—we can attempt to unfold to the natives the dimensions of God's love — love, deep enough to reach down to that devil's cesspool, the interior of Africa, and lift them up, up into the glorious heights of blood-washed, born-again, filled-with-the-Spirit, children of the living God, heirs and co-heirs with Christ. What a glorious reality, hallelujah!

Does it work? One of our most fiery evangelists spent years as a child in the den of witch doctors, learning and practicing their satanic craft. A woman also who was

Call for God-Sent Missionaries

THE GREAT field of Manchuria, with a population of about 33 million souls, is directly unaffected by the Japan-China war at present. Our Pentecostal missionaries are working for the Lord there as freely as can be expected and precious souls are being saved continually. We are also glad to report of outpouring of the Holy Spirit from time to time. Believers are being baptized in the Holy Ghost as on the day of Pentecost; and also the power of God is manifest in healing of the sick.

With the growth of the Assemblies of God work in that field comes the need for more missionaries. Some of our faithful co-workers are coming home on furlough this summer and others will be looking for a time of much needed rest in the homeland within another year or two. There will, therefore, be openings for new missionaries, preferably married couples, but also single persons.

Must Have Vision of God

The great essential for anyone desiring to give his life in service for the Lord in the foreign mission field is a real vision of God—a vision of His greatness, His holiness and unfailing mercy. A true revelation of Jesus Christ and the finished work on the Cross of Calvary prepares our hearts for the wonderful indwelling of the Holy Spirit, and being filled with the Spirit we have the promise of power to be His witnesses unto the uttermost part of the earth. It is also very essential to have a definite call from God to the foreign field as well as to the home field. It is the God-sent missionary who has good success in his work. Those who are Spirit-filled should be Spirittaught, and those who are Spirittaught will know the will of God and be definitely sent by the Holy

Another very important essential for successful work for the Lord on the foreign field is to have a Godgiven ministry. Many come to the field without a definite line of ministry. Such missionaries generally find it very hard to fit into the situation and work there, and often become very discouraged. It is generally expected of missionaries to be able to take the leadership in all branches of missionary work. We are on the field not for training, but to train the natives for Gospel work.

A brother missionary will be looked to for some definite line of

work such as ability in "rightly dividing the Word of Truth" and training the natives for pastoral work.

Teachers in Demand

There is a great demand for Bible teachers and any missionary with a teaching ministry is welcome everywhere. There is also great demand for missionaries with the gift and ability to take the leadership in evangelistic work. This we find to be one of the great needs to be met in training an efficient native ministry. There is also great need for men with executive ability. Not every missionary has this ability and the work of the Lord will often suffer because of lack of efficiency along this line.

A woman is an important member of the missionary staff. Any of the afore mentioned ministries would be as essential in her line of work as in the work of any brother. Where there is a brother in charge of a mission station, a woman missionary generally is expected to take charge of Sunday School work, not only to teach but also to train the natives for that important line of work. She will also have charge of the work among the girls and women, which means not only much class work but also much visiting in the homes. A sister missionary generally is expected to be able to teach music and in any growing church on the foreign field we find a great demand from among Christian workers for training along this line in order better to fit them for Gospel work among their own people.

Jesus said: "I say unto you, lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest. And he that reapeth receiveth wages. and gathereth fruit unto life eternal: that both he that soweth and he that reapeth may rejoice together."

E VERY individual has the privilege of roaming out into the realm of the speculative, but no man has the right to be too sure about probabilities. The imaginative may be entrancingly interesting, but it cannot be declared to be Truth. Imagination may touch truth, but it is just as likely to consort with error.

No realm is more open to speculation than the prophetic field. Men's imaginations have worked overtime to set forth dreams in terms of positive facts. Many books have been written by the determinate counsel of men as the outcome of wild rides into the rough seas of pure speculation. Many prophetical books are in the discard today because time has revealed the untruth of their prognostications. There is a freakish tendency in human nature to revel in fairy tales. As a rule fiction is delighted in more than fact. It is not difficult for the dreamer to engage his audience in the oratorical recital of his dream fancies, but there is an inevitable awakening, and the dream vanishes in the floodtide of realities.

What a colossal field for speculation is futurist conception! For instance, what varied visions come forth concerning millennial glory. The visionary is entitled to visualize, but he becomes a nuisance when demanding a place in the sun of true understanding. No man can go beyond Biblical utterance and not be foolish. The great concern of life is reality. The facts of life are too enormous to be minimized; they are too stern to be swallowed up in the nonsensical. Exaggeration is a lying jade; its practice is fatal to conscience. The easiest place to exaggerate is in the realm of the unknowable, and the easiest pathway of deception is where men and women can be duped. It is a common function to "strain at a gnat and swallow a camel" but the operation is ridiculous.

The safest place to walk is in the pathway of knowledge. There is enough in Divine revelation that is understandable without paddling in the unknown depths of the mysterious. The safest plan is to wade out into Truth with feet touching the bottom of certainty— beyond that there is always danger. It may be entertaining to walk around in the maze of uncertainty, but entertainment is not constructive; and after all, the builder is God's man.

Seek and Find, Then Come

Profound things are not mysterious - they are discoverable, and discovery is the objective of the human soul. Jesus said "Seek, and ye shall find," giving us a sure ending to the search. To seek, and find not, is a heart-breaking proposition, and God never mocks the human race. The blessing promised in the last book of the Bible is to him that readeth, which is of necessity the proof of enough understanding to make the reading worth while. The invitation of the Christ to "Come" carries in its heart the promise of getting something at the end of the quest, and the beauty of the Word of God is not in its mystery, but in the unveiling of the veiled.

Truth often is wrapped up in mystery to the uninitiated. Did not Jesus say that Truth was hidden from the worldly wise, but was revealed to the simple-hearted — not simple-minded? Yet it is well to remember that Truth can help the human soul only in experience. Truth as an abstract has no power in life —but Truth as an experience giveth life. "Now we see through a glass darkly" is a Bible quotation, and is evidence enough of human limitation in intelligence, but we await the Divine revelation in eternity to wipe the glass, and give a complete understanding of Truth which will meet the requirements of a perfect being. Knowing as we are known will clear up all mystery, and make Truth eternally powerful.

Guessing may be a good thing to play at but it is a poor thing to live by. A "guess-so" Salvation is farcical; experimental Salvation is glorious, for it is God's Truth made manifest. Try His way.

Mercy for the sinner, Help in hardest place, Everything for nothing— That is GRACE.

To Enter God's Kingdom:

I. THERE IS A GATE

1. The barrier that shuts man out from God is unmovable.

It is unmovable because of Divine holiness and righteousness, and human sinfulness and weakness. God's holiness and righteousness are the strength of the demand of the righteousness required by the law. These are unmovable, for God must maintain them. They need to be Divinely satisfied.

Man's sinfulness and weakness make it humanly impossible for him to produce the required righteousness. Therefore, the barrier is unmovable.

2. The barrier that shuts man out from God is Insurmountable

It is insurmountable because the claims of the law are too lofty for sinful man to scale them in his own strength and on the ground of his own merit.

If there were no gate, there would have been no hope of access unto God. No HOPE is a condition of sad despair; but there is a Gate, and thus a way of access unto God.

This gate is Christ, who is "THE DOOR OF THE SHEEP" and "THE WAY" of access unto God (John 10:7,9 and 14:6; Ephesians 2:12-18). All access unto God the Father is based upon the redemptive work of Christ upon the cross.

II. THERE IS ONLY ONE GATE

Under the dispensation of grace, there is only one way of access unto God—the Son Jesus Christ (Acts 4: 12; John 14:6).

There was only one door to Noah's ark. Everything that entered had to go through that door, from the greatest to the smallest creature. By it Noah and his family had to enter. No entrance there meant no entrance at all.

The imitation way to Salvation, the invention of Satan, is "the way of Cain" (Jude: 11; Hebrews 11:4; Genesis 4:1-7). This way has the Divine "WOE" pronounced upon it. How solemn all this! The man who takes this way is eternally UNDONE, HELPLESS and HOPELESS!

Any attempt to approach God, except upon the ground of the merits of the death and Blood of Christ, has upon it the Divine "WOE."

The way of Cain is:

1. The way of human religion (Genesis 4:3).

It is the way of self-righteousness and pride. It is the way of the denial of sin and of the need of an atoning sacrifice. In short, it is the way of human opinion and religion, and not God's way to your soul's Salvation.

2. The way of deliberate ignorance

Cain had a revelation of how to approach God acceptably (Genesis 3: 21, 24). But he was a rationalist, an unbeliever, and so rejected Divine revelation. He deliberately refused the light of Truth and so was blinded by Satan.

3. The way of Divine rejection (Genesis 4:5).

Cain rejected God's way of approach to Him and so was rejected by God. Compare John 3:36. "He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life: and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him."

4. The way of unyielding pride (Genesis 4:5-7).

To refuse the Divinely provided sin-offering meant to be abandoned to his sin, and so to be ruled by it. Cain proudly refused to come in God's way, even after God in grace offered him another chance. He was given up to his sin and so became its utter slave.

5. The way of manifest hatred (Genesis 4:8).

Compare 1 John 3:12). Cain hated the true man of faith.

6. The way of Divine condemnation (Genesis 4:11).

Compare John 3:18—"He that believeth on Him is not condemned: but he that believeth not is condemned already, because he hath not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God."

7. The way of Hopeless Despair (Genesis 4:13,16).

For Cain there was no more forgiveness, neither any more access unto Jehovah, but HOPELESS and UT-TER despair.

III. THE GATE IS WIDE ENOUGH

The "gate" is strait (narrow) because of the new birth, life, nature and walk demanded (John 3:1-8; Romans 6: 4; Ephesians 4:1). The "gate" is strait because of Divine holiness and human sin.

But, the gate is open to all who will enter (John 3:16; Titus 2:11). Only those are excluded who exclude themselves through wilfulness and unbelief. Such are eternally under the wrath of God (John 3:36).

Day of Miracles ... Not Passed

THE day of miracles is not passed! On October 23, 1937, I was in an aeroplane accident near Tacoma. The plane was completely demolished and four of the eleven passengers were killed. I was picked up unconscious and rushed to the hospital—with no hopes of recovery as far as the natural was concerned, but earnest prayer of the saints was made in my behalf and thank God He heard and answered!

I lay unconscious for three weeks and during that time not much was done other than the giving of two blood transfusions, while oxygen was administered to aid breathing. I had concussion of the brain, causing me to be irrational for weeks. I had more than 22 bones broken in my chest, and the left lung punctured, causing hemorrhages. Because of my crushed chest, my left arm was paralyzed and I contracted pneumonia. My back pelvis bone was severely broken, causing anxiety as to my being able to walk again. My left kidney was punctured and I had other internal injuries, a bad cut in my leg and many bruises.

During those weeks of pain and suffering I realized the faithfulness of God's Word which says: "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee", for "when thou passest through the waters, I will be with thee; and through the rivers, they shall not overflow thee; when thou walkest through the fire, thou shalt not be burned, neither shall the flame kindle upon thee. For I am the Lord thy God."

The day I was released from the hospital the doctor exclaimed, "I never expected you to leave this place, 'in this manner'." In other words, he inferred that he never expected me to leave the hospital alive. The nurses and doctors spoke of it as the "Miracle Case" and my attending physician admitted that a "Higher Power" was bringing me through.

Although I lost 30 pounds in weight, today I have regained 20 of those, and am getting stronger. To Him be all the praise and glory for ever and ever.
