We are excited about what we can offer you – the chance to earn your B.A. Degree, from top professors, in a Christian community, with a group of other adult professional learners!


Here are some of the features of this great program:

CDC

CREDIT BY DEMONSTRATED COMPETENCY

You may be able to earn up to 30 semester credits through the CDC (Credit by Demonstrated Competency) process, using the methods below.

PORTFOLIO (LIFE LEARNING)

Using this method, you prepare a portfolio describing specific work, activity, and life experiences and document the learning that has resulted from these experiences. These credits can come from a number of different sources, including workshops, seminars, military training and service, self-study, classes, training programs, and work experiences. Please note, it is learning (and not merely experience) from these sources that is evaluated, the results of which warrant the award of credit. In the admission process, the LEAP Degree Program staff will provide you with an estimate of the number of CDC credits you might receive through this process. A fee is charged per credit hour submitted for assessment (see separate *Tuition and Fees* insert).

SPONSORED PROFESSIONAL TRAINING

As "sponsored" implies, this learning is always accompanied by some type of earned credential. Licenses, certificates, diplomas, earned ratings or professional "cards" all fall under this area of learning. Boeing training, EMT, Real Estate or Insurance Licenses, certifications such as scuba diving, and some military training are all potential sources for credit granted through SPT.

Northwest College utilizes many recommendations made by the American Council on Education (ACE). The Council's recommendations are recorded in The Guide to the Evaluation of Educational Experiences in the Armed Services, a companion publication to The National Guide to Educational Credit for Training Programs.

Because of transfer limitations enforced by its accrediting commission, each SPT recommendation made by ACE must be individually evaluated. Students who have learning that have been analyzed by the ACE should complete a SPT worksheet. This worksheet will

FAQs about CDC FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. What is Credit by Demonstrated Competency?

Many activities in our adult lives result in learning equivalent to what would be learned in a college course. CDC is a process for documenting and presenting selected life learning for evaluation for credit.

2. What kind of experiences count as college credit?

All kinds, but we want to emphasize that it is the *learning* from the experience that is evaluated, not the experience by itself. The learning can be from work, military experiences, hobbies, sports, family life, licenses, and seminars and workshops you have attended.

3. What areas are acceptable for credit?

Learning in areas that are customarily considered college-level subjects. Business- or ministry-related areas are naturals, but we want you to consider learning in areas like psychology, economics, politics, languages, sports, fine arts, music, and science as well.

4. What standards does the College use to assess my work?

Northwest College is a member of the Council for Adult and Experiential Learning (CAEL) and follows its assessment guidelines. These are national standards used in hundreds of colleges and universities across the country.

5. How much credit can I earn?

Up to 30 credits may be earned through CDC, including standardized and departmental exams.

6. How much documentation do I need?

A good guide would be to provide as much documentation as you reasonably can or an amount that reasonably equates to a semester's work for a college student. If your CDC paper is in original poetry, include 25-50 original poems; if it is in early childhood development, a bibliography of books you have read as well as classes, lectures, and other related activities might be sufficient for documentation of learning.

7. How do I know if my experience will qualify for credit?

Your counselor will help identify those areas in which you could reasonably expect to earn credit. The burden is on you, however, to describe and document your learning to the satisfaction of a college professor.

8. What is a portfolio?

A portfolio is a notebook you compile which contains your proposal for credits, life application essay, annotated list of learning sources, your resumé, and documentation of your experience.

9. Who evaluates my portfolio?

Portfolio evaluation is done in two parts. Trained staff in the Degree Program Office will evaluate seminars, workshops, and licensures for credit. College faculty members will evaluate life application essays for credit.

10. Will I get all the credit I apply for?

There is no guarantee on how many credits you will receive. In



be reviewed by the CDC Advisor and recommendations will be made to the Registrar.

STANDARDIZED EXAMS

The College accepts credit recommendations from three national program examinations by which you may earn credit in addition to the modules and the Credit by Demonstrated Competency process. These are:

- College Level Examination Program (CLEP), a national set of exams on selected topics offered on a regular basis.
- Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Educational Support (DANTES), a national set of exams developed by the military and covering college introductory courses in 50 different subject areas.
- Advanced Placement (AP) Examinations, a national set of exams to substitute for specific courses at Northwest College.

These tests may be taken at Northwest College at convenient times throughout the year or at several other local colleges and universities.


COURSE CHALLENGE EXAMINATIONS

Any Northwest College student may request a course challenge exam in order to satisfy certain

The grade recorded on your transcript is a "P" for passing. A challenge exam may not be requested for a course required in the major.

You may contact the LEAP Office to determine if a challenge exam exists for the needed course.

fact, you may not receive any credit at all. It depends on how well you have explained your experiences and the learning that resulted from them.

11. What are my deadlines?

We encourage you to finish your portfolio in the first semester of the degree program.

12. What kinds of licenses, seminars, and workshops will count as credit?

Usually, seminars and workshops that are post-high school level are accepted. The general rule-of-thumb is that 45 "seat hours" is one semester hour. Many seminars have already been evaluated for college credit by the American Council of Education (ACE) or other recognized groups. These evaluations are often accepted by the College.

13. Do my licenses have to be current to receive credit?

No, as long as you can document the fact that you once had a license, and that the course you took to prepare for that license is not already on a college transcript, we will evaluate the learning it took to earn the license.

14. How much does it cost to have my portfolio reviewed?

The charge is \$40 for each credit hour for which you apply.

15. What if my Portfolio is not accepted for credit?

We hope that we will be able to advise you well enough that this

will not happen. However, you have the option of rewriting your essay and resubmitting it once without additional cost. In fact, this may be suggested by the evaluating faculty member.

16. When will I know if my portfolio has been accepted?

You will usually know within three to eight weeks after submitting a portfolio how much credit has been awarded.

17. Do I have to use CDC?

No, this is completely up to you. But often this is the least expensive and fastest way to get credit.

18. Will this transfer to other colleges?

While we follow national standards in evaluating CDC, it cannot be assumed that CDC credit will transfer to other colleges. You will need to contact the specific college to find out if they'll accept CDC credit in transfer.

19. What are my next steps if I choose to pursue CDC?

- Fill out the life experiences worksheet available from the LEAP Office and gather together documentation of licen sures, certifications, military experience, job training, etc.
- Make an appointment with the CDC Advisor to review these areas of potential CDC.
- Enroll for a CDC Workshop.



Paying for LEAP

There are a variety of resources available that can help you finance your new degree:

Financial Aid

State and federal grants, and federal Stafford Student Loans are available.

A **Free Application for Federal Student Aid** (FAFSA) must be filled out and sent to the Federal Student Aid Programs for processing. Applications can be received from the LEAP Office, or they can be electronically filed through the Internet: www.fafsa.ed.gov (The code for Northwest College is # 003783).

A Northwest College Financial Aid Application must also be completed and submitted to the Financial Aid Services Office (FASO). This office will notify you of all aid for which you qualify.

Employer Assisted Payments

The College will provide whatever information your employer needs to approve the program or the individual modules within the program. A grade report will be issued approximately two weeks after the end of each module, enabling you to submit your reimbursement requests on a timely basis.

Even though you may be reimbursed for educational costs by your employer, you are expected to use one of the payment plans offered by the College or negotiate a separate payment schedule with the LEAP Financial Coordinator if tuition is not to be paid in full at the time of registration.

Veterans Assistance Benefits

The LEAP Program at Northwest College is approved for Veterans Administration Benefits. You can contact the Veterans Coordinator at the Registrar's Office or your local Veterans Administration Office for assistance.

The Fine Print

Payment of Accounts

Arrangements for tuition, books, fees and all other charges are to be made each semester at registration with the LEAP Financial Coordinator. Each student will be required to sign a contract/promissory note agreeing to payment terms prior to the start of class each semester.

Monthly Payment Plan

A student who is unable to pay the full balance due at registration may be offered the Monthly Payment Plan.

This payment schedule is calculated by subtracting disbursable financial aid (net financial aid funds) from total semester charges, equaling the net semester cost.

Net semester cost is divided into six equal payments. The first payment is due at registration, with the rest of the payments due on the 25th of each month.

Books are to be paid in full at each semester registration.

Late Fees

A late fee not exceeding \$50.00 will be charged for each payment that is not received by the last business day of the month in which it is due.

The first payment will be considered late if not paid by the first day classes are offered. A grace period will be given for the arrival of Financial Aid.

Aid not arriving by the last business day of the month following registration will be considered late and may be subject to a late fee.

Finance Charge

Finance Charge at an annual rate of 12% will be assessed on the balances owing on the last business day of the month following registration and on the last day of each subsequent month. The monthly payment plan is interest-free for six consecutive on-time payments. Interest will continue to accrue on a monthly basis but will be reversed after receipt of final payment. Any accrued finance charges will not be reversed for those months the payment is late. These charges will be due with the next scheduled payment.



Community Affirmation

STATEMENT

Northwest College seeks to relate biblical Christianity to every area of life, both on and off campus: to academic disciplines, to co- and extracurricular activities, in the

residence halls, in the local community, and in one's personal life. It assumes that all members of the Northwest College community desire meaningful involvement in the process of Christian higher education as they seek to express their faith in the context of an Assemblies of God college. We affirm the biblical description of attitudes and behavior unfitting for a Christian: "The acts of the sinful nature are obvious: sexual immorality, impurity and debauchery, idolatry and witchcraft, hatred, discord,

jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, dissension, factions and envy, drunkenness, orgies, and the like" (Gal. 5:19-21a, NIV). Through the help of the Holy Spirit

we strive to allow none of these to be part of our behavior. We affirm also the biblical description of attitudes and behavior fitting for a Christian: "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control" (Gal. 5:22-23a, NIV). We seek to maintain a vital relationship with the Spirit so that such attitudes and behavior will be evident among us. We seek to follow Christ's example of unselfish love in our actions, attitudes, and relationships.

We strive to maintain stewardship of body, mind, time, abilities, and resources. We strive to integrate corporate worship, personal faith, and intellectual growth. Faithful attendance and support of a local church are integral parts of that process.

Northwest College recognizes that not all believers share the same standards in matters of behavior the Bible does not specifically address. As members of this community, however, we also recognize the importance of respecting the values and goals of the College and will, therefore, seek to conduct ourselves in a manner that will bring only credit to the gospel and to Northwest College. Since we are also part of the larger society, and in order to "let our light shine out" we will strive to main-

tain good community relations in respect to governing authorities, social activities, and business dealings.
