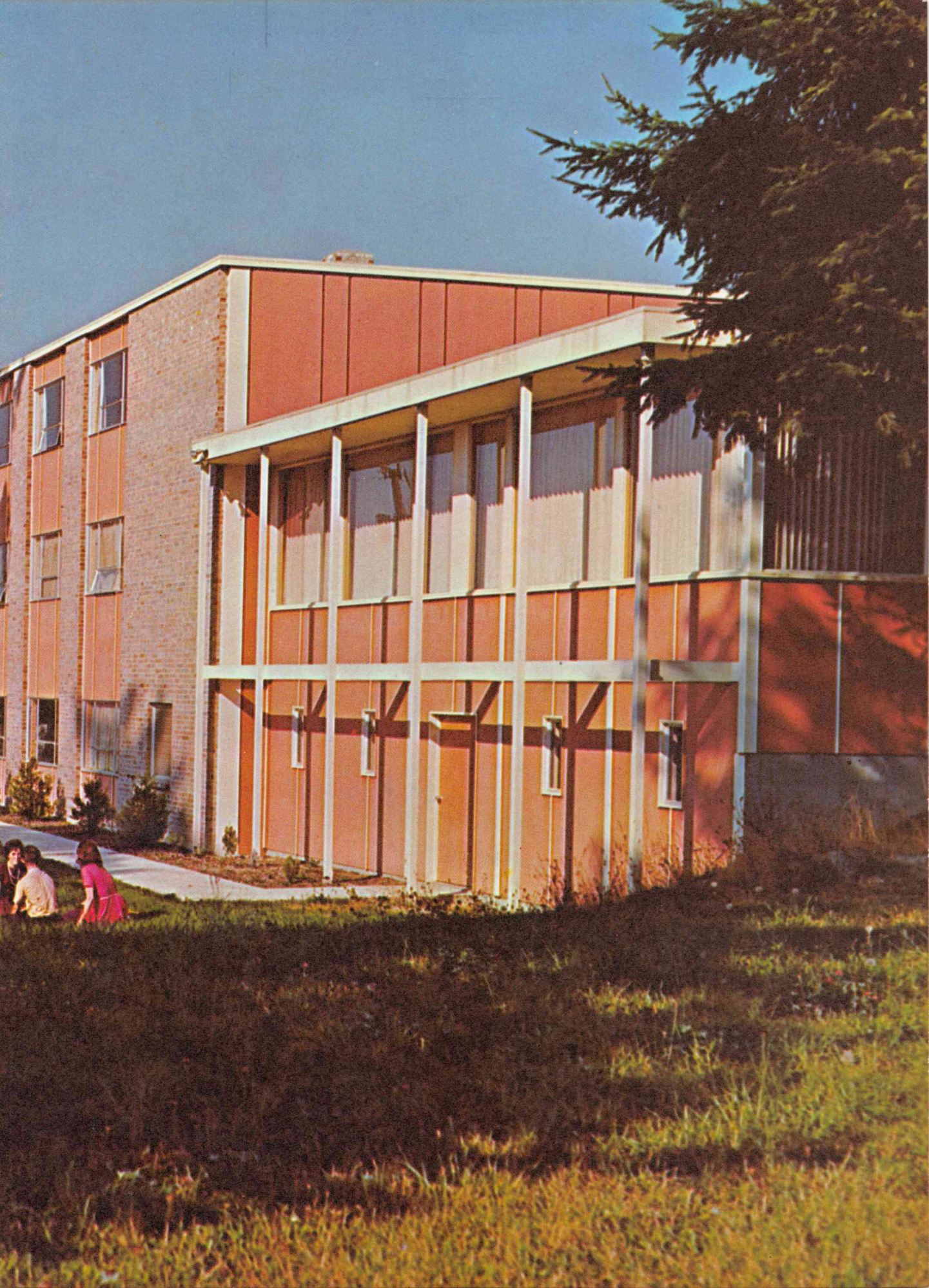

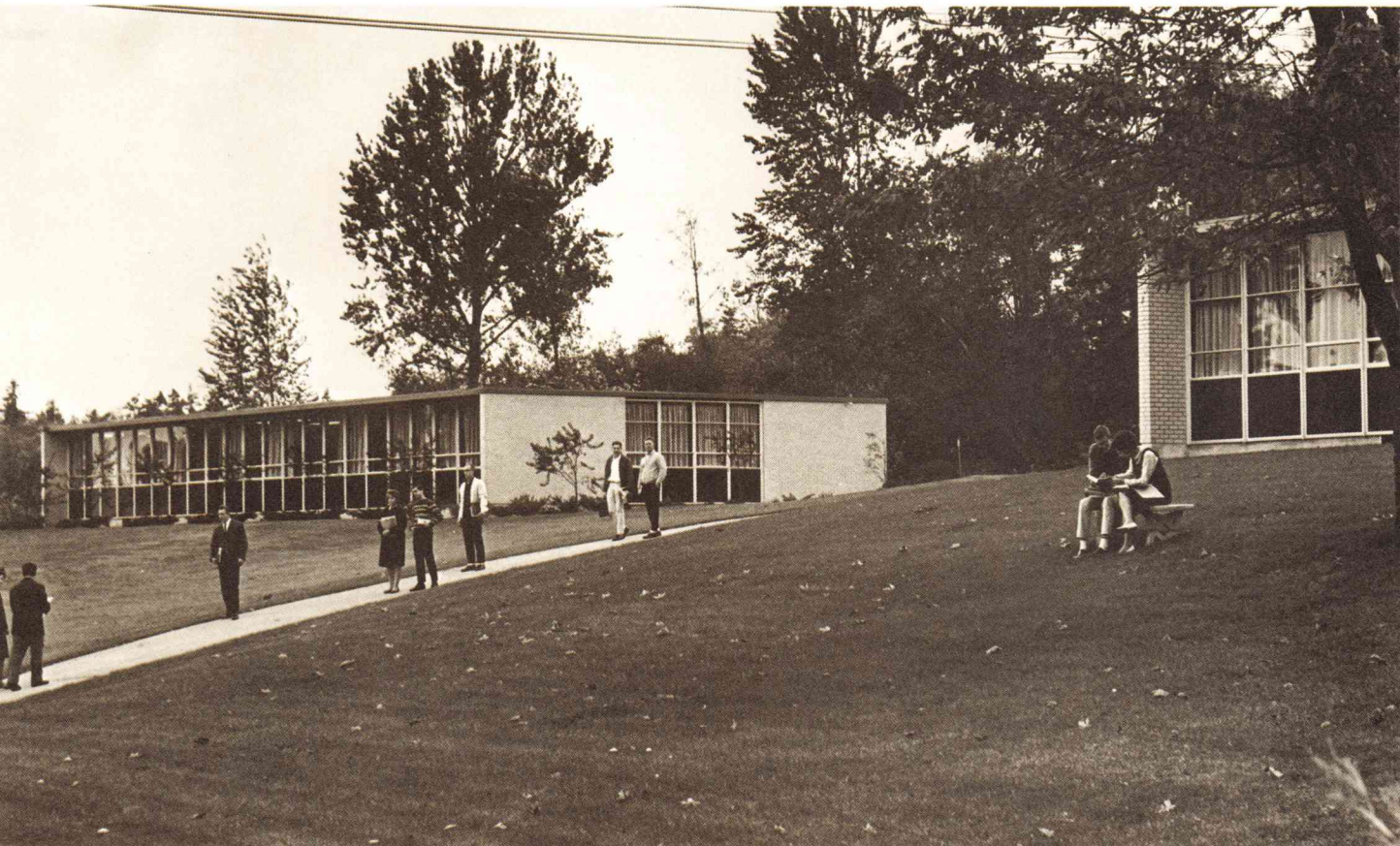
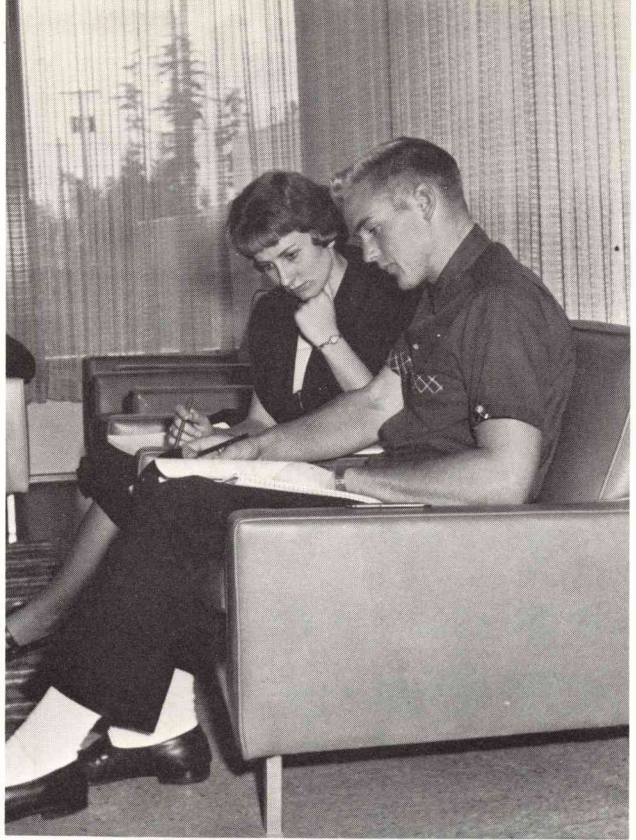




AROUND OUR CAMPUS

BEATTY HALL

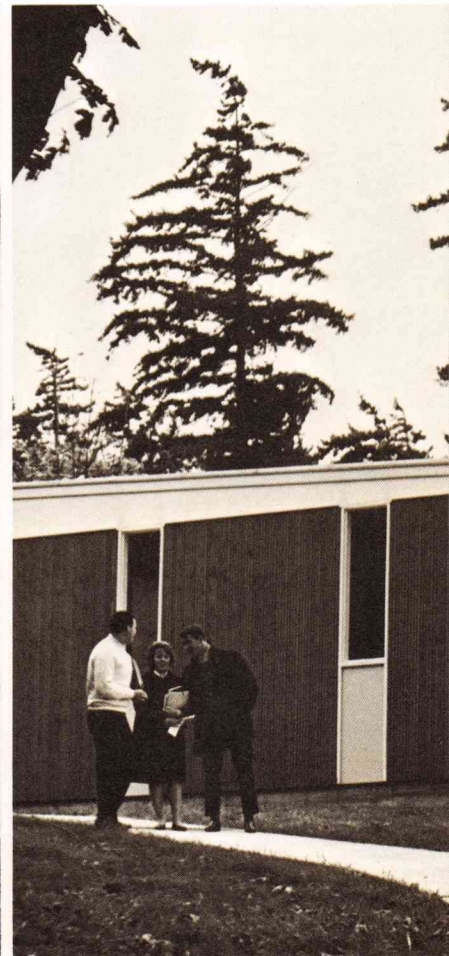
The Men's Residence Building, one of the ten beautiful buildings here at Northwest College, overlooks Lake Washington, the Olympic Mountains and Seattle. It was completed in the summer of 1962 and named in memory of Charles C. Beatty. Rev. Beatty came to the school in 1934 from Minneapolis and served for 15 years as the first Dean of Northwest Bible Institute, as the school was then called. The two year-old residence hall houses one-hundred-four young men that will fulfill the central purpose of our school—to tell others of the saving power of Jesus Christ.

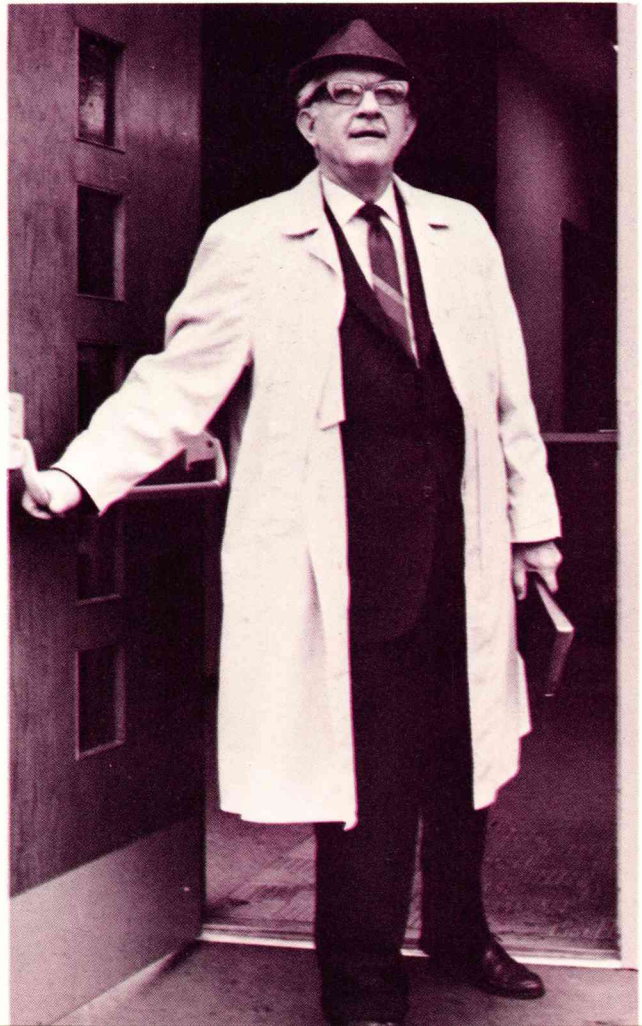

CAFETERIA

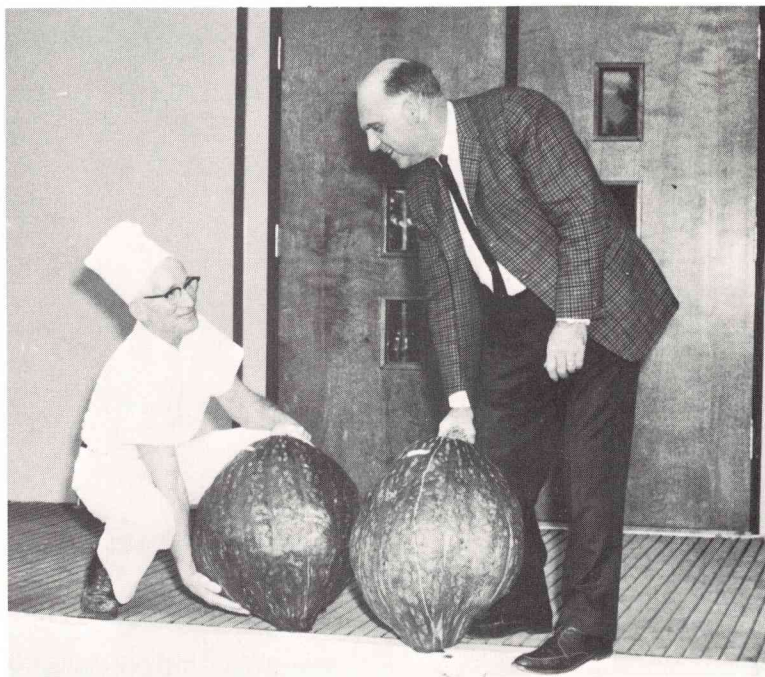
Students of Northwest College are privileged to have as head chef this year Seth Greenhaw. Mr. Greenhaw was formerly the chief baker at the New Mexico Military School, and having had this experience in cooking for large numbers of hungry young men, Seth is well able to meet the demands of hungry college students. Betty Morency, the dinner cook, and Seth make out the menus and cook the meals for 185 people every day.

The Cafeteria, which is two years old, has a capacity of 400 in the main dining area. During the year, several banquets, for alumni, businessmen, and faculty are held in the dining room. A student staff of men and women serve meals and wash dishes and kitchen utensils.

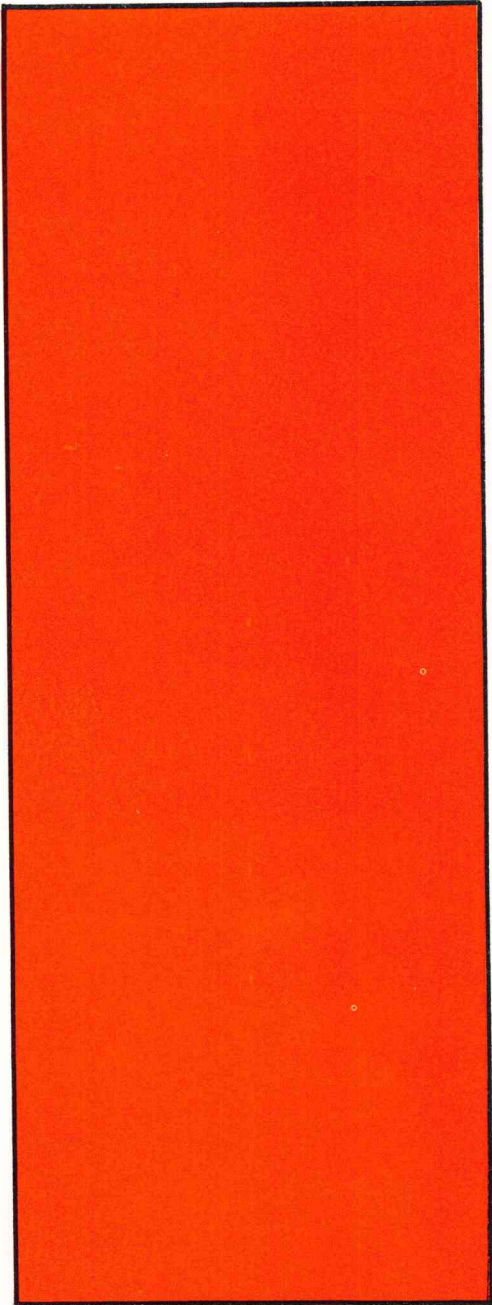

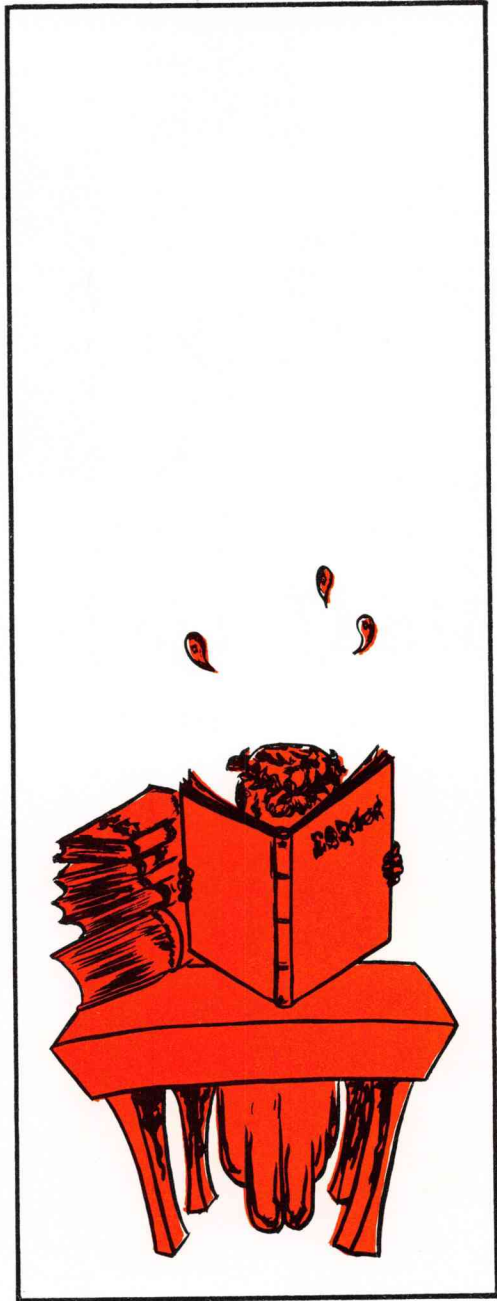

THE A.S.B.

ASSOCIATED STUDENT BODY

The Associated Student Body of Northwest College is composed of all students attending the school. The beginning of the 1963-64 school year found 269 students enrolled as members of the A.S.B. These students represented thirteen states and nine foreign countries.

Through the Associated Student Body Council, students are given a representation in matters relating to student affairs. Student body and class officers, with a faculty adviser, form the A.S.B. Council. Their weekly meetings serve as channels through which student interests can be expressed. School-wide projects and activities are planned and carried out under the jurisdiction of the A.S.B. Council.

The A.S.B. fund, which is maintained by the tithes and offerings of students, is the source of revenue for school projects. A major project at the beginning of the school year was the completion of the tennis court. Other projects were initiated and directed by the Associated Student Body during the year.

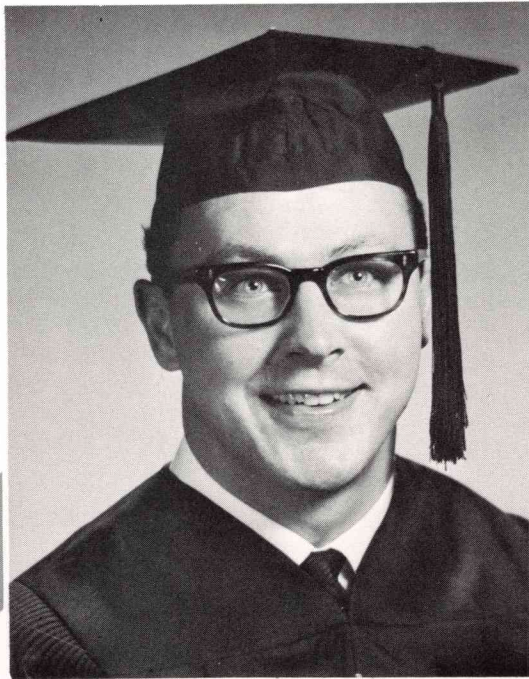
A number of social activities provided times of fellowship and fun. In addition to the annual Harvesttime Social, Christmas concert, missionary banquet, and the spring all-school picnic and banquet, students enjoyed class socials, singspirations, talent nights, and school-wide outings. Social gatherings were also conducted in the respective residence halls.

In the service of the Lord, students participated in Christian service assignments and regular weekly street meetings and attended dormitory prayer meetings. Daily chapel services and a Spiritual Emphasis Week each quarter encouraged fellowship with God, while missionary interest was stimulated by participation in mission bands.

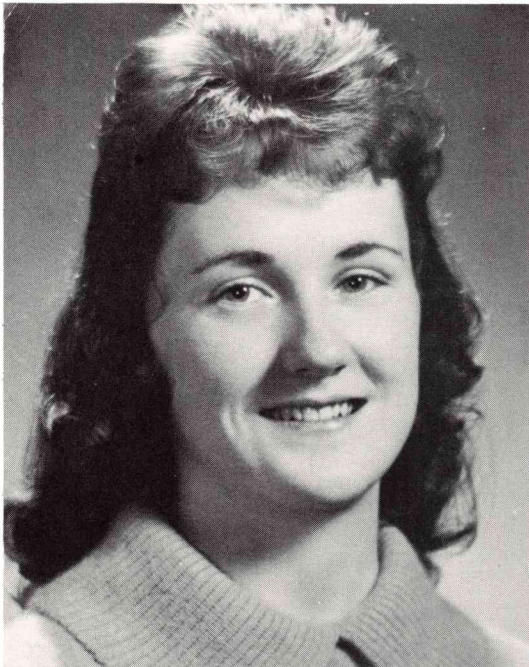
Through the interest and efforts of the Associated Student Body, Northwest College continues to progress in favor with man and with God.



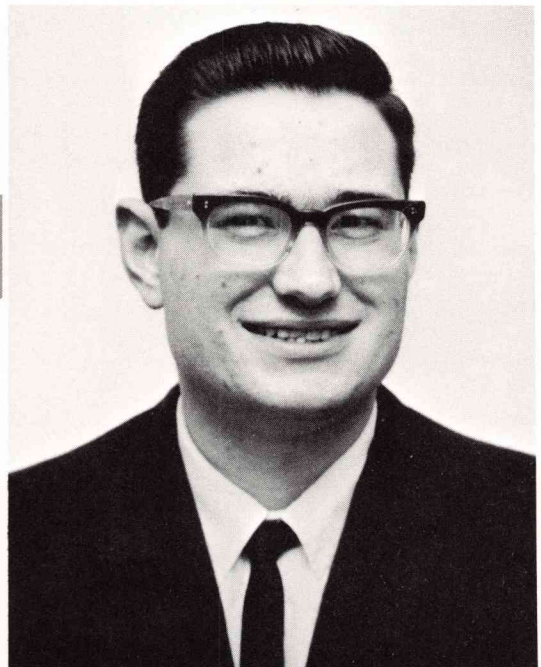

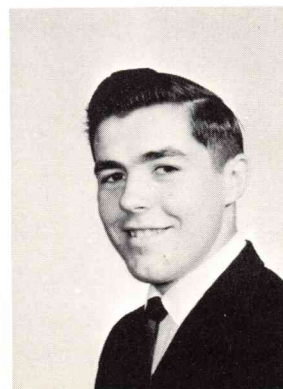
The freshman class this year is the largest in several years, and soon after their arrival on campus many of these students began taking part in student activities and offering their talents to the school by assisting in many ways.

John Fitzgerald Kennedy

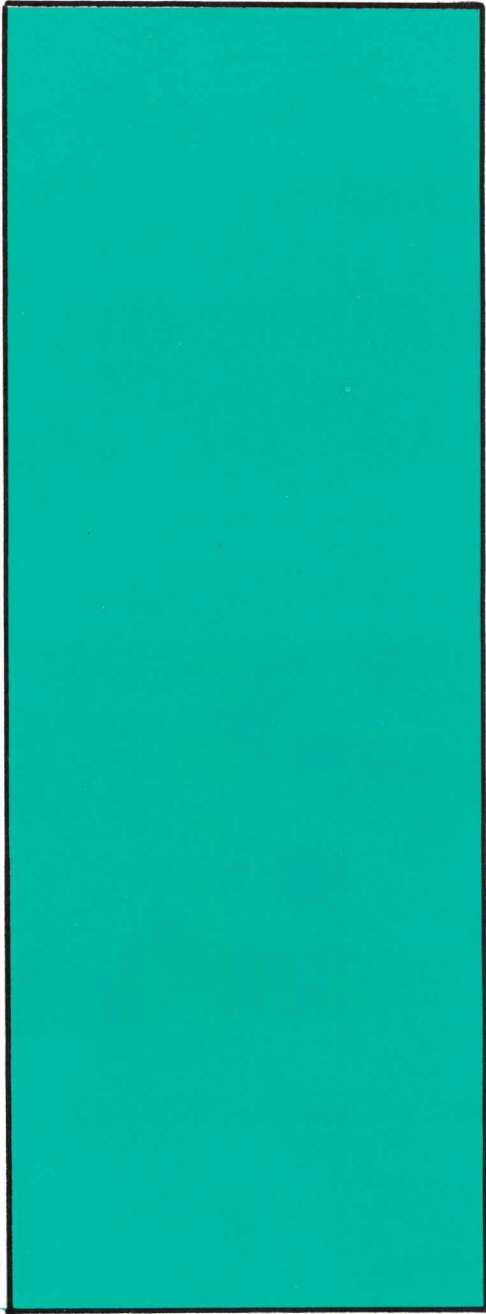

Through dedicated effort the Missionary Society of Northwest College seeks to help fulfill the Great Commission, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." This is done by giving to, praying for, and serving in a practical way many Assemblies of God missionaries. As a member of one of the five prayer bands, each student is provided an opportunity to share in the commission through prayer and contributing to mission projects.

Students are encouraged to pay part of their tithes into the Missionary Society fund. Individual bands may receive credit for the offerings given by members of each particular band. The goal for the entire year was \$7,000.

Further interest is created by special missionary speakers who visit individual band meetings and address joint sessions. Letters from the "representatives abroad" present needs and report progress on foreign fields. A missions banquet each year helps to encourage vision for the world's lost multitudes. In addition, the spring quarter Spiritual Emphasis Week carries a missionary emphasis.

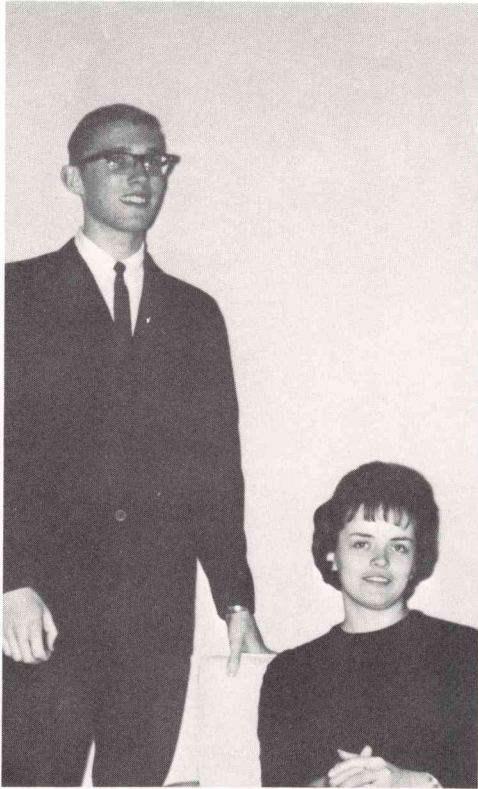
Student missionary work is encouraged by the Society. Summer months find students working on Indian reservations and conducting Vacation Bible Schools to help spread the Gospel to needy areas.

During the 1963-64 school year, in the winter quarter, each band in turn prepared a display booth which was set up in the cafeteria. These displays, by means of pictures, maps, and various objects from the countries represented, presented the missionary endeavors that are being carried on throughout the world.

Missionary Society activities are directed by the Missionary Council, composed of the executive officers, council advisor, and the officers of the five prayer bands. Once a week the Council meets to discuss the business at hand and to plan future activities. Dedicated leadership is reflected in the practical accomplishments and missionary vision of each prayer band. As a result of these untiring missionary efforts, students respond to God's call to give of their time, means, and entire lives to carry on the work of missions in the ripe and needy harvest fields of the world.

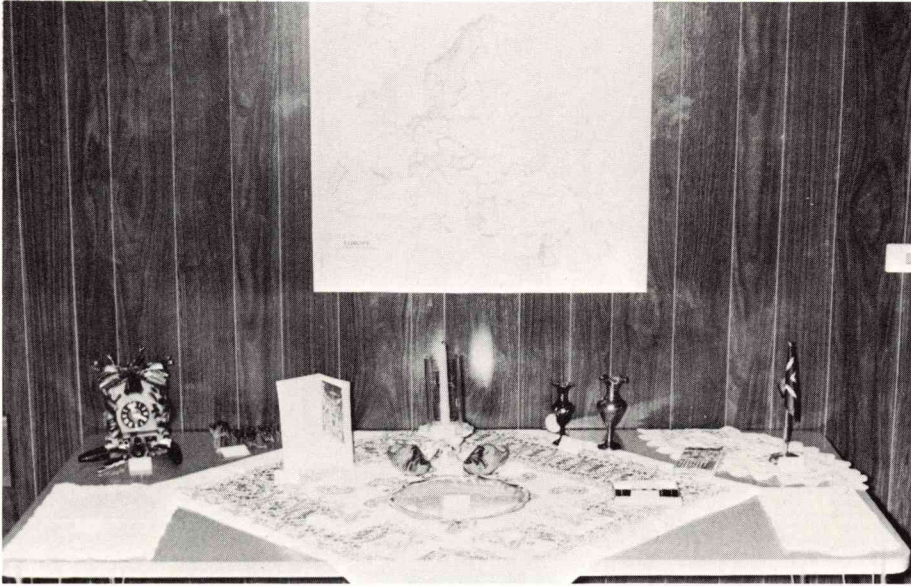

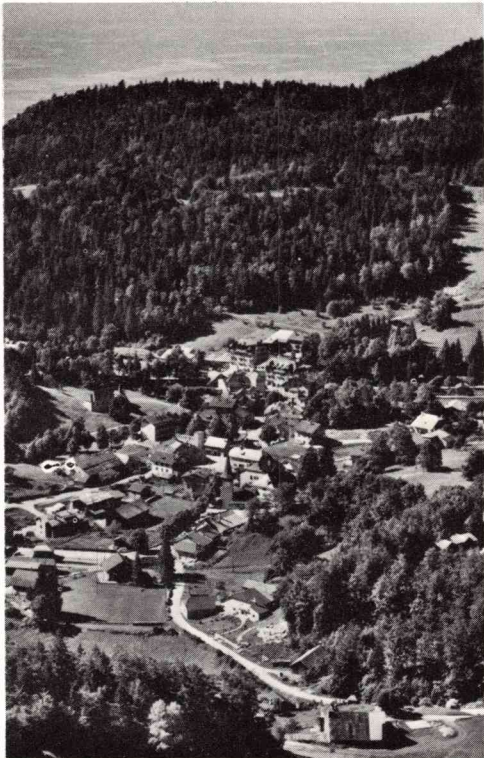

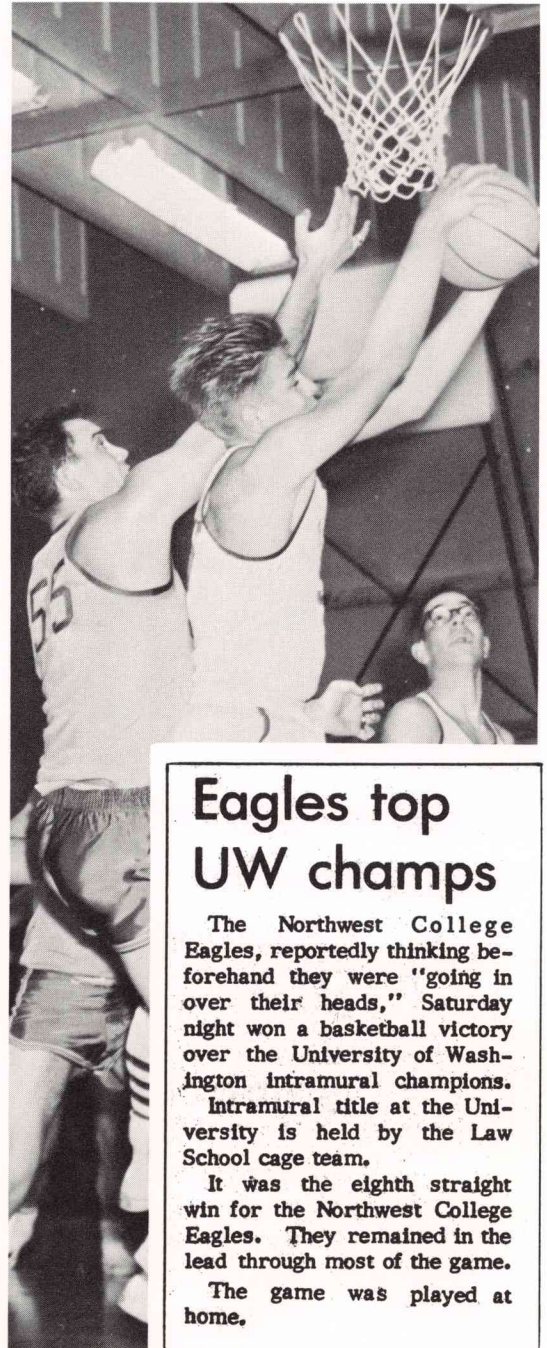
"EAGLES" VICTORIES IN BASKETBALL
