# Wisdom's Call ...Northwest University's Letter from the President...

Wisdom calls out, "whoever finds me finds life and receives favor from the Lord" (Proverbs 8:35). She is all around, calling, often ignored, even shouted down. Too many distractions drown her out for many. But the few that heed her call find life and the Lord's favor. It is, precisely, the call of Wisdom that NU is here to amplify. "Carry the Call" is usually thought of in terms of the Call of God to God's Mission, the Call of Jesus Christ to take up our cross and follow him, or our divine vocation that gives us purpose and direction for life. Without a doubt, those are the things we mean, but we're also talking about the call of Wisdom.

In Proverbs, wisdom is personified as a manifestation of God. John 1:1 picks up the same idea in talking about Jesus as the Logos. Both scriptures recognize that all true wisdom comes from God, like every other perfect gift. We are told that if people lack wisdom, they should ask it of God, who gives it generously (James 1:5). So wisdom isn't hard to find, but it requires being willing to listen.



My prayer for NU students is that they will listen to and obey God. Discerning the Call for their lives will set them on a clear path towards success in fulfilling their dreams. But students should distinguish between mere goals and dreams. An example would be the objective of becoming President of the United States (POTUS). Such an objective makes a good enough goal, but it just isn't big enough to be an appropriate dream. Dreams shouldn't be about doing one thing or another, but rather about becoming a truly moral person. Rather than dreaming of being POTUS, it is better to dream of being the kind of person who would be worthy of leading our great nation. Many have led it without being worthy of it and were failures as people. Others perhaps were worthy, but never succeeded in getting elected. They were successful dreamers, even if they didn't meet their goal.

Before you leave NU, I hope you will discern your Call and commit to your dream. If so, you will have gained wisdom, and with it a life. As you read this page again later in life, I hope you will embrace again the dream of being the kind of person who deserves God's favor.







Throughout Orientation week, I could tell that everyone really was happy that I was here." Staff, Faculty, Athletes, and over 60 Orientation Leaders welcomed new students to campus.

The eighteen members of the Northwest University Jazz Band play charts in the big band swing tradition of Basie, Ellington, Goodman, Miller and Shaw. Whether the band is playing a bossa nova or samba, a ballad or funk, a shuffle or big swing feel, the energy they create with the big horn section and driving rhythm is contagious.


Contrary Motion is an eighteen member vocal jazz group that is designed to introduce vocalists to vocal jazz techniques such as scat singing, training the ear to hear dissonant jazz harmonies, the art form of swing, and Latin rhythms. They perform two on-campus concerts with the other ensembles and local community concerts.

Synergy Vocal Jazz ensemble is comprised of eight singers and a four member rhythm section. The vocal participants are selected through a rigorous audition that includes performance of a song from a Broadway musical or a standard tune from the Great American Songbook and sight reading an unfamiliar song.

All three ensembles have sung and played at church and community events, performed at Seattle Symphony's Benaroya Hall, competed at the Lionel Hampton Jazz Festival at the University of Idaho, and joined east Lake Washington public high schools in concert. -Ken Prettyman



In only four years students earn a bachelor's degree and certification to teach in public and Christian schools, specializing in one, perhaps two fields: Elementary (K-6 all subjects), Middle (5-9 humanities, science, or math), Secondary (5-12 social studies, mathematics, biology, or English/language arts), or K-12 (English language learning, choral and/or instrumental music, theatre arts, or health and fitness).

From the moment undergraduates identify with teacher education, they receive personalized mentoring from a dozen resident and part-time professors through advising, professional courses, and classroom-based coaching at more than thirty local schools.

Alternatively, students can earn the B.A. in another major and then continue with the School of Education for eleven months to acquire the Master in Teaching (MIT) degree plus teacher certification. That's two degrees and a professional license in just five years.

Northwest University prepares teachers, who are "learner-focused, adaptive, and holistic" in their practice and who "Carry the Call" to children, young people and communities around the world: Latin America, the Pacific Islands, East Asia, Africa, Europe, and North America. Our graduates make a profound difference in the lives of learners.


...Northwest University's Men's Soccer Team...
