

Ministry Teams

There are many tangible ways for the students of Northwest College to learn to *Carry the Call*. One of these opportunities lies in the Summer Ministry Team (SMT) program. Students who

wish to be part of this program must qualify for **T.O.P. GUN** (Training Orientation Preparation), in which they learn a variety of key concepts about how to be effective in ministry. To represent the college in a summer ministry team, students must successfully complete this program.

Teams prepare all year to go "on the road" in the summer, to camps and churches throughout the Northwest Region. Preparation includes a weekly class, including seminars on altar work, etiquette in ministry, integrity in leadership, cpr/first aid certification, and much more.

Teams chosen to represent Northwest College on the road this year are **H2O** (Hope to Others), **Pocket Change**, **Force 84**, and **PB&J** (Peanut Butter 'n' Jesus).

Nursing program gains approval, accreditation, and dean

The *Mark and Huldah Buntain School of Nursing* achieved three milestones in recent weeks, gaining state approval, regional accreditation, and its first dean.

■ On Nov. 19, the Washington State Nursing Commission met with college representatives to review our proposal to open a school of nursing. The proposal, for a Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing, was accepted unanimously.

■ In March, the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges granted accreditation to the new program.

In fact, the NASC applauded our efforts, noting that the written proposal was one of the finest they had received in recent years.

On Dec. 1, Dr. Don Argue, the college's president, named Carl Christensen, Ph.D., RN, the first Dean of the School of Nursing.

Dr. Christensen, a Fulbright Scholar and a

Registered Nurse, holds a Ph.D. in Public Administration from The George Washington University, and a Master of Nursing from the Oregon Health Sciences University. He has taught at Seattle Pacific University and has held positions of responsibility with the U.S. Health Care Financing Administration, the

U.S. Public Health Service, and a variety of health care facilities.

The nursing program was designed under the leadership of Dr. Don Argue, Dr. Marshall Flowers, Dr. David Elmes, and Dr. William Randolph of Northwest College, and senior consultant Dr. Annalee Oakes.

The first class of students will enter the program this fall. The formal dedication will be held Sept. 29, 2000.

A distinctive feature of the program is the emphasis on inter-cultural nursing, with the option of serving on a foreign mission field in the final semester.

A \$100,000 grant from the Bethesda Foundation and a \$100,000 gift from Lloyd and Inez Martin are helping to fund the start-up of the School of Nursing, which is named for Mark and Huldah Buntain, Assemblies of God missionaries to India.

Alumni.



Really happy to be here!

On Oct. 19, 1993, Myles Corrigan was on the sidelines of a Pac 10 college football game when his heart "blew up."

He was so deeply engrossed in the game, he didn't realize right away what had happened.

As part of his coaching responsibilities that autumn afternoon in Berkeley, CA, he had to signal the offensive plays.

His presence was vital to the University of Washington. Without him, his quarterback wouldn't know what plays to run.

So for a few minutes he ignored the numbness surging through his left leg.

Soon, the seriousness of his situation was too great to ignore. Nearby, an injured player was resting on a pair of crutches. Coach Corrigan gestured to the young man and borrowed his cruches.

Then, under his own power and in front of more than 50,000 unaware fans, he hobbled off the field.

He had suffered an aortic aneurism. Medical experts would have judged his chances of survival at just one to three percent.


"But they wouldn't have taken into account that God's hand was on my life," recounts Myles.

His life had begun in 1944, when he was born to parents he never knew – an army sergeant getting ready to go off to World War II, and a "beautiful blonde" from Austria.

His parents gave him up for adoption. His foster parents soon shipped him off to a Catholic boarding school.

"I was raised by a bunch of nuns in Southern California," recalls Myles.

"If you could earn salvation, I would



have qualified," he remembers. "I did everything I could. Early mass on Friday and Saturday. I was an altar boy. I did everything just right."

But there was still an emptiness inside. An emptiness that grew. When he left the Catholic school, he went to live with his foster aunt. She died the summer following his 9th grade graduation. So he went to live with his foster grandmother, who died the day after he graduated from high school.

"There I was, one day out of high school, and totally alone in the world."

He went to college, intending to become a speech therapist. But he got involved in coaching, and quickly found success in that field.

He also found the Savior.

"One day a friend invited me to an outing for *Campus Crusade*. I went, and accepted Christ as my Lord and Savior. He totally filled the void that was my life."

His life went well after that. He married

Suzanne Southard, and they had two boys, Brent and Todd. He rapidly moved up the coaching ladder, first in high schools and then in the college ranks.

He had reached the heights of his coaching success that Saturday afternoon when he slowly walked off the field on crutches, his body growing numb.

God's hand was at work. For a few blocks away there was a hospital, with skilled and compassionate men and women who quickly came to his aid.

He survived, miraculously. But he would never coach again. He spent five more years at the University of Washington in the office of the Athletic Director.

Then he was introduced to Dr. Don Argue, president of Northwest College. (Myles had known about the college for years, of course. He is a member of the board at Tacoma Life Center, where Fulton Buntain is pastor.)

"We soon realized he could make a significant contribution," said Dr. Argue.

This past fall, Myles came on board as the Executive Director for Enrollment and Athletics.

"He has been an incredible force on campus," reports Dr. Argue. "His skills as a coach are very much evident as he trains and builds his management teams.

For Myles, his new career is a great opportunity.

"Every day, I try to put into practice my favorite verse of scripture: *Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit, but in humility consider others better than yourselves*, Philippians 2:3."

Myles is really happy to be here. We're really happy he's here, too.

Northwest grad featured in *Christianity Today*

Note: The following is from an article in the February 7th issue of **Christianity Today**, featuring the ministry of **Dean Jackson**, a 1985 graduate of Northwest College.

A Peacemaker in Provo How one Pentecostal pastor taught his Congregation to love Mormons.

Dean Jackson recalls his childhood days of traveling with his missionary parents to donor churches during furlough. "Night after night, my father would describe our ministry in Japan, and then at the end of the service, I'd watch people shaking his hand. This was the late sixties, and beefy veter-

ans of World War II would come up and say, 'Well, Brother Jackson, I suppose it's a good thing that somebody goes and tells them dirty Japs about the Lord.' If I heard that phrase once growing up, I must have heard it 50 times."

The young Jackson was hard-pressed to reconcile the comments of those American Christians with the world he knew in the Far East. "I met a lot of wonderful people, but I never met a 'dirty Jap.'" The Jacksons made friends with neighbors, business people, and civic leaders—Buddhists and Christians alike—finding them most often to be gracious and intelligent.

In time Jackson followed his father's footsteps into the Assemblies of God ministry. After serving churches in Amarillo, Texas, and Jackson Hole, Wyoming, he came in 1991 to a setting almost as foreign and cross-cultural as the Japanese mission field: Provo, Utah.

It has been said that while Salt Lake City may be the

head of the Church of Jesus

Christ of Latter-day Saints (LDS), the heart lies 35 miles south in Provo, where Mormons make up 94 percent of the population. This city is home to Brigham Young University (BYU)—less than a mile from Jackson's modest church, Rock Canyon Assembly.

You cannot drive the tidy streets without noticing well-known Mormon names: yard markers for "Osmond Real Estate," signs pointing to the 23,000-seat Marriott Center arena on the BYU campus.

The impressive Missionary Training Center swarms with a new batch of 5,000 young men every three weeks, gearing up for their two years of door-to-door service.

There are no slums, and only one liquor store for 100,000 residents. Few restaurants open on Sundays. The city virtually shuts down on Monday night: it's "Family Home Evening." The Provo phone book lists but one Catholic and only 15 Protestant churches for the whole city; most have attendance below 100.

Meanwhile, the listing of 158 different Mormon "wards" takes up nearly five columns in the White Pages. The BYU listings take up another five columns.

Into this environment came Dean and Marlys Jackson with their two small children.

Northwest Singers "getting on the map"



The **Northwest Singers** from Northwest College are putting themselves on the map this year with a new twist on a familiar tune of touring.

Under the direction of **Dr. Robert Engle**, the choir is enjoying a new type of relationship-building with area churches.

Dr. Engle's goal is to expose students to a variety of church worship styles. Two specific formats were begun in the fall semester. In two of the churches visited, the Singers ministered in the language of the congregation: Japanese and Samoan.

In another church, the Singers joined the church choir for practice during the week prior to the visit, and then sang with the church choir on Sunday morning, in addition to singing independently. This approach gave our students the opportunity to meet church choir members personally before singing with them and for them.

This idea was first tried at New Covenant Church in Rainier, WA. The Singers had a rare opportunity to learn gospel music under a gospel director, alongside gospel choir singers. The idea was enthusiastically received by our singers, the congregation, and the host choir.

"This format provides both the churches and our students a unique learning experience and serves to intensify relationships in both directions," says Dr. Engle. "We intend to continue experimenting with these and other formats to increase the bonds between the college and the churches we visit."
