

FACULTY FOCUS: WARREN



Warren Bullock first felt a

call to ministry when he was just 11 years old. But when he was a teenager getting ready for college he looked back at that call as just emotion. After all, it happened during the period of time his mother was dying of cancer.

Then the Ambassadors came. They were a Northwest College ministry team comprised of Al Hulten, Dave Harrison, Gerry Robison, and Jerry Roles. Their ministry convinced Warren to head to Northwest College, which he did in the Fall of 1960.

"Education was important to my dad," recalls Warren. "He grew up during the Great Depression and wasn't able to attend college. He felt that he missed so much. As a result, he was adamant about the value of education. That's one reason why we funded a scholarship in his name: R.A. Bullock."

Warren's time at Northwest included "lots of gospel team work," he remembers. He also served as ASB President.

He liked the college so much he stayed for a fifth year to complete

a Bachelor of Theology degree. Well, okay, there's a little more to it than that – a co-ed named Judi who was finishing her degree during Warren's fifth year.

"That's really why I stayed," laughs Warren.

He and Judi were married in 1966. They went to Oregon for a year to work in public relations for Northwest. Then the college's PR Director, Ben Birkeland, took a church, and Warren returned to the college and assumed that job.

After working at Northwest, and then finishing a Masters at Seattle Pacific University, the Bullocks took a church in Portland.

"It had only 16 members," admits Warren, "and it still wasn't a unanimous vote for us to come."

The Bullocks spent five years at Rockwood Assembly of God and saw it grow from 16 to 250.

Then they became the pastors at Spanaway, now Sound Life.

"This was the longest and the most fruitful of my pastorates," states Warren. "When you stay longer, you are able to see the fruits of your efforts. Longevity definitely has benefits."

After eleven years at Spanaway, the Bullocks moved to Calvary Temple in Seattle.

"This was the toughest position of my ministry," recalls Warren. "They had 23 board members, and I'm a consensus kind of guy! But overall, it was wonderful."


As Warren served churches of different sizes and saw them grow, he learned about what it takes to be a successful pastor.

"A pastor must adapt his style to the growth of the church," he points out. "As the church grows, you must delegate various tasks to trained people so you can concentrate on what you do best.


"In a small church, you can spend most of your time with the entire congregation. In a mediumsized church, you spend most of your time with your lay leaders. And in a larger church, you spent most of your time with your staff."

In 1990, the Assistant Superintendent of the Northwest Districtof the Assemblies of God resigned, and Warren was elected to that position.

In 1994, the Superintendent resigned, and Warren was elected to replace him. He was Superintendent himself for eight years.

In 2002 he accepted his new position as Dean of the School of Ministry at Northwest College.

He continues to serve as an Executive Presbyter of the General Council of the Assemblies of God.

His years as a pastor and church administrator have given him a valuable perspective on the needs of the church and the role of the college.

"People today are demanding new options and services of the church. They don't want just one service at 11:00, they want multiple service times. And they expect various programs, everything from children's ministries to counseling," states Warren. "As a result, our churches are demanding new options of the college."

He understands the challenges he faces as Dean of the School of Ministry.

"Our challenge at Northwest College is to keep pace with the changing needs of the church." A basic question that is often asked by young people who want to prepare for ministry is "Why education, and not just training."

As you would expect from the former pastor, Warren turns to the Word:

"A basic Biblical principle is how to adapt," states Warren.

"The apostle Paul, of course, was the great adaptor. In his letter to the Corinthians (9:19-23) he says, 'I have become all things to all men so that by all possible means I might save some."

Warren believes that students today must learn to adapt to the world and needs around them.

"Styles change. Training only equips you with one method. Education gives you the undergirding framework, the principles, so you are able to change as the need arises."

Warren is now working for the college, but he believes his duty is still to serve the church.

"Although we can't do everything – at least not immediately – we are committed to providing what the church needs," he states.

By Popular Demand!

One of the most requested new majors at Northwest College over the past few years has been Children's Ministry. Many of the requests have come from Senior Pastors who want to add a Children's Pastor to their staffs. At a recent Pastors' Council, ten of these pastors pledged the funds to launch this new major.

The first person hired for the new major is **Chris Corbett**, who comes to Northwest College having served since 1992 as the Children's Pastor at Oak Hills Church in Eagan, Minn.



A trip to Africa taught Superior's Rachel Nettleton just how suffocating fear can be, but it also demonstrated how much she could lean on her faith to free her from that stifling terror.

The 21-year-old senior at

were staying at, but we didn't even trust them.

"You hear the sirens going off; you hear the wild dogs; you hear the hyenas; you hear women screaming; you hear gunshots going off; you hear people just outside your door talking in a lan-

guage that you don't understand, and it's pitch black. There's no light or electricity – electricity is shut off at 9 o'clock. You're scared."

Nettleton's African experience did not start in this fearful manner; rather it began with her sojourning to a continent she dreamed of visiting since she was a young girl. From the moment she learned last year that she would be able to complete her college internship under the tutelage of Assemblies of God missionary – and a former Northwest College alumna – Darlene Barker, Nettleton couldn't make the time pass fast enough



ended up there at the end of June. A post-September 11 search that began in the rubble of New York City, the crumbling walls of the Pentagon and a smoldering field in Pennsylvania continued in Malawi – a country that is slightly smaller than Pennsylvania, inhabited by more than 10,000,000 people, shares borders with Mozambique, Zambia and Tanzania and owns a sub-tropical climate.

The thought of Americans hunting for their Muslim brothers did not go over well with many Malawian citizens, where the median family amid the riots, killings, arsons, looting and general chaos, but that became increasingly difficult for three white women who easily stuck out among much darker-skinned Malawians.

"We were driving around town with this bright green pickup truck with an

Assemblies of God logo on it wherever we went," Nettleton said. "We were in the limelight 100 percent of the time. We saw people get shot, and that was really hard ... one of them was a little girl. Seeing men walking around with machine guns takes time getting used to. I was used to that because I've seen them in South America. But to see them just open fire was scary."

The events only became more frightening and dangerous for Nettleton and her new friends. Even though she resided in the relative comfort of a duplex in a walled



even talk about together because it breaks your heart and is terrifying – it's stuff that you don't want to think about."

One such event occurred during a trip to the market in the nearby town of Mangochi.

"We were in the market on a Saturday afternoon – just getting food and trying to stay low-key. We turned around and saw these Muslims carrying bricks and walking toward us," Nettleton said. "We stopped what we were doing and left as fast as we could."

That same weekend, through

A Summer in Africa: Faith Put to the Fire

Northwest College in Kirkland, Wash., is a veteran of missionary trips. Nettleton has traveled to Costa Rica, Honduras and Nicaragua in Central America as well as South America's Peru in past summers, but those journeys did not fully prepare her for dealing with deadly anti-American demonstrations, full-blown riots, the burning and looting of Christian churches and the sight of people being gunned down in the country of Malawi.

"I'm glad to be back in the United States – I took it for granted," Nettleton said during a recent interview at her parents' home in the East End of Superior. "At night we would wake up every two hours because we were fearful. We had gatekeepers at the complex we until she landed on African soil.

She arrived auspiciously enough at the beginning of June and immediately went to work learning all she could about being a missionary, along with another intern, Brandy McDonald from Maryland. When Nettleton and McDonald were not busy shadowing Barker, they were giving seminars to children's church workers, preaching at local churches and at the Assemblies of God School of Theology, ministering to young people and participating in a vouth camp.

However, just as Nettleton was beginning to grow somewhat accustomed to the language, food, climate, customs and wildlife of her temporary home, the political tinderbox that is Malawi ignited when our nation's search for terrorists income is only \$300.

"A lot of the violence stemmed from our government deporting members of al-Qaida there," Nettleton said. "Al-Qaida members were hiding out in Malawi. They were hiding there because Malawi has a Muslim president and they believed that he would protect them.

"Our government found them and took them out of there. Muslim is the main religion in Malawi, so you had thousands of people there upset at their president for letting the Americans take them. They were mad at their government and white people – especially the Assemblies of God because they were started by white people from America."

At first, the trio attempted to conduct business for the Lord as usual, community of missionaries, where each home had a gate and guards around it, there were concerns about the people who were paid to protect them from the encroaching lawlessness.

"Out of the 15 guards, there were only three that the missionaries themselves trusted," Nettleton said.

In little less than a month after she arrived in Africa, Nettleton was wondering and praying about her safety there. Although she relayed some of her anxiety to friends and family back in the United States via the Internet, she found it difficult to put into words everything she was going through.

"It was just a fearful time," Nettleton said. "There were things that the three of us girls experienced together that we couldn't much prayer and heartfelt discussion, it was decided that Nettleton and McDonald would return to the United States early rather than risk their safety much longer in the unstable country.

Their internship requirements had been fulfilled, so it did not make sense to risk their lives much longer.

So, instead of staying until the end of August as she originally planned, Nettleton was back on an airplane and returning to America nearly a month early, in the waning days of July.

Other than the embraces and well wishes from her loved ones, the familiarity of the American culture and a much cooler climate, one of the first differences Nettleton noticed about being back home was the absence of her fearinduced insomnia.

"That first night home was the first time that I didn't pray for safety when I went to bed," Nettleton said.

Nettleton said she will use her experiences to become a missionary who acts as a go-between for missionaries out in the field and their supporting churches back in the United States.

Ironically, prior to leaving for Africa earlier this summer, Nettleton wondered aloud to a friend if she would ever come to a point in her life when she would be totally dependent on her faith in God to get through the days.

That point came sooner than she ever dreamed it could.

"In Africa everything took effort," Nettleton said. "Getting up in the morning took effort; praying took effort. It got to a point where my joy was not there if I did not ask

for it; my strength was not there unless I asked for it. I told Darlene, 'If I didn't know the Lord, I would have left for home the second day I got here.'"

Nettleton is now back in Kirkland beginning her final year of college and season of playing basketball for the Eagles. She is eager to complete the requirements for her major in missions.

In some ways, the early days of a new school year seem the same, but in others, Nettleton knows that she will never look at life quite the same way again.

"I accept that everything is subject to change," Nettleton said. "I learned to live one day at a time. Christianity is based on faith, and mine is definitely strengthened now." RACHEL NETTLETON

Moving Toward University Status and Name

The Northwest College Board of Directors took a significant step toward moving the institution to university status and name in their May 2003 meeting.

The Board has officially studied the issues surrounding this change for the past two years. Their recent action solidified their intention to establish Northwest as a university; their action also included a timeline that scheduled selection of a specific name in December 2003 and an official name and status change January 2005.

"The Board has set into motion a great deal of activity that will progress through the next several months," stated Dan Neary, Senior Vice President for College Advancement. "We will now include several groups, including alumni and students, in discussions that will help us advise the Board on exactly what the name ought to become.

"Many possibilities have been discussed. At this point it seems very likely that the word Northwest will remain in the name.

"Some of the possibilities that have received positive responses so far include *Pacific Northwest University* and *University of the Northwest.*" "The issue of name change, and specifically University, has been a topic of discussion in every meeting of the Board of Directors since my time here," states Dr. Don Argue, who just began his sixth year as President.

"In the minds of some, Northwest College is already what is commonly understood to be a university. In the minds of most, we are on our way. We are committed to becoming a respected university and we have taken a number of important steps toward that goal."

Rev. Les Welk, Chairman of the Board, added, "With so many of

our peer institutions changing their names to include University, the question has been on the minds of our Board members now for several years.

"The names *college* and *university* are taking on different meanings. We could not ignore this change, especially as we intend to attract additional students and donors."

The College has experienced significant enrollment growth over the past five years. Total enrollment has increased by over 30%. Fall 2002 enrollment totaled 1,120; 852 students studied in the traditional, residence based program with the remaining students studying in graduate and adult degree completion programs.

The Academic Program has grown with significant additions including Psychology, Communication, English, Environmental Science, History, and Nursing; this Fall the University began offering Children's Ministry and Intercultural Studies majors.

In May, Northwest conferred degrees on the first graduates to receive the Master of Arts in Counseling Psychology. This fall, the first class of students began studies in the new Master of Business Administration program.

"The college is changing, because our churches are changing."



When I was growing up, I always heard that if you wanted to be a pastor, you had to make sure you married a girl who could play the piano.

Of course, that was a very long time ago, before the invention of electricity, and microphones, and amplifiers, and *PowerPoint*, and Worship Leaders.

When I was growing up, a half-century ago, my local Assembly of God church consisted of a pastor, his piano-playing wife, and volunteers in the roles of Sunday School Superintendent and Song Leader. The latter was typically my uncle Noble, who moved his arms around in time to the music, but with absolutely no understanding of basic conducting patterns.

Somehow, we muddled through and loved Jesus and gave money to missions and sent young people off to college.

The churches I have attended and worked for in these opening years of the 21st century are much more complicated.

The volunteer song leader is now a staff

position whose title is Music Pastor or Fine Arts Pastor. He serves as Worship Leader on Sunday mornings, and he definitely knows what he's doing, with back-up singers at microphones, a choir and orchestra, and *PowerPoint* on big-screen TVs.

In other parts of the complex, the Children's Pastor and the Youth Pastor and the Seniors Pastor and the Marriage and Family Pastor and the Visitation Pastor are all hard at work.

And that's just on Sunday morning. During the rest of the week, the staff includes business managers, computer network administrators, communications directors, web developers, counselors, and, as often as not, instructors for the schools that are part of the church's ministry.

It's not your father's Oldsmobile, and it's not my father's church. And I'm not saying it's good or bad, I'm just saying what it is.

When I was growing up, I went to a Bible College and earned a degree in Pastoral Studies, because that's how you prepared to serve the church.

Today I serve at Northwest College, and I write brochures that announce that we have more than 50 academic programs.

Members of the faculty tell me that our students today are as dedicated to serving the Lord as any they have ever seen.

So it is not a question of Northwest College losing its focus on ministry. The abundance of majors isn't because we have lost our commitment to the church, it's because the church itself is changing.

And as Warren Bullock points out, the church is changing its programs because the world and our culture are changing, and the people in our churches are demanding new resources.

Which simply means that all sorts of new doors of service and ministry are opening to our graduates. Even for a young woman who plays the piano and wants to marry a pastor.


