

Even as we're branching out...

In 1934, Northwest Bible Institute was founded to prepare men and women for ministry. Over the past 70 years, the institution has branched out in many directions, but our roots have remained the same. We are as committed as ever to preparing disciples to Carry the Call.

Reflecting this significant growth, the Northwest College Board of Directors has voted to change our name to Northwest University.

This is a momentous occasion in the life of Northwest, marking the continued growth and success of this great institution.

There actually are two aspects to the change: university status and university name.

The first part has been unfolding for years.

With the addition of our new majors, including nursing, as well as new graduate programs in

Counseling Psychology and Business, Northwest College is well on the way to attaining the status of what is commonly understood to be a university.

The second aspect, deciding on a new name, involved collecting significant input from the public.

A task force led interaction with all constituencies of Northwest. including faculty, staff, students, alumni, and donors.

A wide-ranging survey presented several potential names to these groups, and Northwest University was the top choice by all of them.

This transition to Northwest University follows along the line of the institution's maturation over the vears from Northwest Bible Institute, to Northwest Bible College. to Northwest College, and now to Northwest University.

We are committed to becoming not just a university, but a respected university.

Our goal is to prepare students to Carry the Call with heart, head, and hand. Our graduates will be noted, by both the church and the world, for their character, comprehension, and competence.

The name change will be in effect and official in January '05.

Northwest has experienced significant growth in the past five years, as total enrollment has increased by over 35%. This past fall, enrollment totaled 1.161, including traditional, residence-based students, plus those in graduate and adult degree-completion programs.

What's the best way to prepare the ministers of tomorrow?

Is it spiritual enrichment? Is it academic principles? Or is it practical experience?

At Northwest College, we believe the right answer is: all of the above.

That's why, in addition to lively chapel services that enrich our students' hearts spiritually, and vigorous classrooms that enlighten our students' heads academically, we emphasize practical, real-world experience that trains our students' hands for immediate and effective ministry.


By the way, we believe this is also the best way to prepare the Christian communicators, nurses, and educators of the future.




Nursing students learning to serve at Bethel Assembly of God in Alaska.

Winning ON THE BASKETBALL COURT

Both the women and the men enjoyed six-game winning streaks to end their regular seasons and enter the playoffs.

Under Coach **Lori Napier**, the women earned a top seeding in the Cascade Conference Tournament and hosted the first home playoff game in their history. In that first-round game, they downed the defending champion, Southern Oregon University, 122-88.

They lost in the second round of the Cascade Conference playoffs, but went to the NCCAA National Championships in Frankfurt, Ky., and finished third.

The men travelled to Idaho for their first playoff game, but lost.

This year's total of 14 wins is a record for Coach **John Van Dyke**.

With no seniors on the team, they look for a strong title run next year!

Losing AT THE SUPREME COURT

In a 7-2 decision handed down Feb. 25, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled against **Joshua Davey**, a 2003 graduate of Northwest. The case, Locke v. Davey, challenged Washington State's right to deny Davey a scholarship based on his pursuit of theological study. The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled in Davey's favor last fall.

We are disappointed, of course. This ruling could have dramatic ramifications, as it seems to allow discrimination based on religion.

I spoke to Josh the day of the decision, and he's doing fine. He is now a student at Harvard Law, and his wife Mari is a student at Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary.

The decision produced a flurry of media attention for Northwest College, as TV and radio crews interviewed students and myself.

Surviving TRAGEDY IN MADRID

When terrorist bombs blew up a commuter train in Madrid, the world media focused on Spain and the reaction of its populace.

When local media learned that members of our debate team were in Madrid, they immediately focused on Northwest College.

Our primary concern, of course, was the safety of these students.

The first report we heard was from tour organizers, who told us that no students were harmed.

Complete relief came when **Gary Gillespie**, head coach of the Eagle Debate Team, called to report that they'd been exploring museums in an entirely different area of Madrid.

The media pursued the local angles of the story. That day, there was a TV interview with **Mercy Novak**, a 2003 grad who is the assistant debate coach (and our

Assistant Director for Alumni).

When the team returned, even though it was several days later, they were met at the airport for another TV interview.

As you might expect, these Northwest College students – who are trained to think on their feet and speak persuasively – did well on camera!

Throughout this entire story, we pointed out that it was not unusual for our students to be in far-flung corners of the globe.

We mentioned that students in our Missions and Intercultural Studies majors often go overseas, and that students in our nursing program had just returned from Alaska, India, Taiwan, and Africa.

In all of this – the story about Josh Davey and the story about our debaters in Madrid – the message that came through loud and clear is that we have some very sharp students.



Many hats,

When you read Gary Newbill's resume, the title of John LeCarre's novel, *Tinker, Tailor, Soldier, Spy,* flashes through your brain.

In Gary's case, how about this: *Teacher, Lawyer, Soldier, Dean?*

And that only leaves out school superintendent, college professor, and church elder.

This varied experience uniquely qualifies him to serve Northwest College as Dean and Professor in the School of Education, which is one of the fastest-growing and most highly regarded areas of the college.

Gary was born in Bremerton during World War II. His father was a shipfitter who helped build the USS Enterprise and served on its first cruise as a "plank owner."

Growing up, Gary was active in the youth group of his church, played sousaphone in the marching band, became an Eagle Scout, and during his senior year at West High School was "Yell King." "I became a Christian during my freshman year, at a Youth for Christ Rally," Gary recounts.

After high school, he attended Olympic Community College for two years, interested in pastoral ministry... and the military.

In 1962 he transferred to Seattle Pacific College and enlisted in the Marine Corps Reserve. He majored in History, intending to become a high school teacher.

With the escalating conflict in Vietnam on the horizon, Gary went on active duty, going to Officer Candidate School and becoming a Lieutenant. He was trained as an Infantry Platoon Commander and a Field Artillery Officer.

In 1965, after eight months in the Marine Corps, he married Karen. Until he was deployed to Vietnam, he and Karen served as lay leaders in the high school youth group at the chapel in Camp Pendleton.

Lt. Newbill arrived in Vietnam

and all on one great head!

in May, 1965. He served for the first six months as an Artillery Forward Observer, then as the Executive Officer of an Artillery Battery.

It's hard to imagine in these days of GPS systems that tell you how to steer your car to the right restaurant, and even how far it is to the pin on the golf course.

But before all this technology, Gary had to do it the old fashioned way, up close and dangerous.

"I never even used binoculars," he recalls. "I had to be that close."

As close as 100 yards to the artillery fire he was calling in on the enemy.

He lost his sergeant to wounds, and had to stay on duty for 24 hours. Out of the 100 men in his battery, the oldest was 32.

Lt. Newbill was all of 24.

In 1966, he returned to the U.S., to 29 Palms. Once again, he and Karen served high school students as lay ministers at the base chapel.

After a little more than two years, Gary was promoted to Captain. In 1968 he was mustered out of the Marines and became what he had expected to be all along – a high school teacher.

He taught in Shoreline from 1968 -1970, then went to Law School at the University of Washington. (During this time, he stayed in the Marine Corps Reserve, returning as Commanding Officer of a unit he had left six years earlier as a corporal.)

Gary served the Northshore School District as General Counsel from 1973-1979, then went to the Issaquah School District as Director of Personnel.

In 1982, he was promoted to Assistant Superintendent.

As always, he and Karen were involved in ministry. They began attending Westminster Chapel in 1973, getting involved in the Young Married Class. (They still attend that

church, just not that class.)

In 1975 their daughter Kari was born. She now serves as a third grade teacher at an Assemblies of God school in St. Charles, Illinois.

Their son Erick was born in 1978. He works as an administrator for Bellevue Christian Schools, near Seattle.

Gary continued to serve area schools, at Vashon Island, then

North Kitsap, then the Dieringer School District.

His first connection to Northwest College came in 1990, when he was asked to serve on a Professional Advisory Board. He did that, and was soon asked to teach a class in Legal Issues.

Around 1993, Karen joined Northwest as adjunct faculty, drawing on her experience as a third-

grade teacher in the Issaquah School District.

"In 1998, I joined the faculty at SPU, to be a Professor of Educational Leadership, at the Masters and Doctoral level, helping to prepare future school superintendents," Gary states.

He thought that was how he would end his career, even though he was contacted by Northwest College.

"I said 'no' to Northwest," Gary remembers, "but then I prayed about it."

He came here in 1999, the

same year he finished his Ed.D.

"Last year it was my pleasure and joy to see my first group of 30 students graduate – these were the ones I watched as they grew from freshmen to seniors."

The School of Education at Northwest College has a growing reputation for excellence.

"We intentionally go well beyond the minimums... to be thorough. And our own faculty supervise our student teachers, while many other colleges "farm out" that task to retired teachers."

Gary and his faculty work diligently to integrate their Christian faith into the classroom.

"There are techniques that allow teachers to convey their personal faith, even in a public school, without violating the law," he explains.

His goal as a professor and dean is not easy, but it is simple: "We believe that every child deserves a highly competent teacher. Our job is to provide those teachers."

HANDS-ON LEARNING

Beth Begley @ Crystal Springs Elementary

While student teaching at Crystal Springs Elementary School, Beth Begley has discovered the influence that a caring teacher can have on students' lives. Beth, an Elementary Education major from Lebanon, Ore., says, "Students are from all kinds of family backgrounds and you never know what is going on. You can be a consistent part of their lives, which is something that many students don't have anymore."

Beth feels that the diversity of the classroom she was placed in as a student teacher has prepared her to meet the needs of any child she will teach in the future.

"My cooperating teacher always tells me, 'If you can handle this class, you can handle anything."

Beth says that Mrs. LynnDee Ames, her cooperating teacher, is preparing Beth by helping her learn from her mistakes.

"She encourages me to be a little self-critical, in a good way, so I can see how I can improve," Beth says.

A favorite success story from her student teaching demonstrates for Beth the impact of a caring teacher. A boy in her third grade class was obviously unhappy when he came to school on his birthday. He was uncooperative in class, and Beth found several notes he'd written that said things like, "This is the worst day ever."


Beth knew that he had a difficult home life, and she guessed that no one from his family would come to school with a treat for his class, like other students' parents did. Beth tried to encourage him, but his behavior didn't improve, Beth talked to other teachers, and they found some Hershey's kisses.

At lunch, all the students sang "Happy Birthday" for this boy, and he got to pass out the kisses. The school's principal bought him a *Happy Meal* and invited him to have a special lunch with her.

Later, Beth found a note, left out where she would see it, that said, "This was the best day ever..."

Beth hopes that her career in teaching will provide her with opportunities to meet many more needs for many more students.

"I love to interact with the kids and be instrumental in their lives. Everybody remembers their favorite teacher from elementary school," Beth says. "When my students think back on their lives, they are going to remember me."

Aron Otremba says that one of the most important lessons he's learned in his internship at Maltby Assembly of God is that youth ministry "isn't all up on stage."

In fact, Aron, a Youth Ministries major at Northwest, found that all the behind-the-scenes work youth pastors do really determines the quality of their leadership.

Throughout Aron's internship, Andy Geer, the Associate Pastor of Students at Maltby Assembly, has given Aron many opportunities to take part in the daily work of a youth pastor.

Aron leads a senior high Bible study, directs the drama team, plays in the worship band, oversees the security team, and speaks each month at the weekly youth service.

Aron has learned that one critical responsibility is preparing youth to become leaders. And Aron has learned that emerging leaders need encouragement.

"Pastor Andy has told me that he wouldn't be able to do certain things if I wasn't there, and it is the same with the people who are doing the things that I don't see. They are all important," Aron says.

"It is important to keep your volunteers feeling encouraged."

As a small-group leader and drama director, Aron has been able to watch students grow as leaders.

Last summer, the youth of Maltby Assembly held a *Time to Care* "home missions" outreach, with community service, children's ministries, and drama.

Aron says about one of his projects for *Time to Care*: "I took ten kids and taught them an illustrated message, and they performed it after rehearsing for only four days."

Aron continues to be encouraged by the spiritual growth in these students, and he believes that their involvement in this drama was a reason for this growth.

A young man who attends Aron's small group is a particularly noteworthy example for Aron of how the students grew through last summer's ministry experience:

"After that [the student] really made a decision to follow God and learn more about him," Aron says.

"It is encouraging for me to keep doing what I am doing when we see the result in even one student."

Jennifer King @ KING5 Television

An assignment for her fifth grade class that required her to watch the evening news inspired Jennifer King's career choice. She remembers thinking as she watched the news anchors doing their job, "I can talk, and I could be on TV. I could do that."

Jennifer, a senior Communications major at Northwest

College, still believes she would make a good news anchor, and an internship last fall at Seattle's *KING* 5 News brought her one step closer to realizing her dream.

She applied to three local TV stations for internships, and her determination paid off when *KING* 5, Jennifer's first choice, offered her the position.

In addition to gaining invaluable experience, Jennifer was able to receive academic credit from Northwest College for her internship.

Once on the job, Jennifer started out doing research over the phone and on the internet. She called the different beats to get leads on stories and answered phone calls with story tips.

"I worked on the news desk, so that was where most of the calls came through," she says.

Later in the internship she was given more responsibilities, and she began going out to cover stories with reporters.

One memorable story that she helped with involved a man who was administering flu shots without a license. Jennifer did the initial undercover research on the story by going to the man and asking him questions about his practice.

"I was the first person there

from KING or any of the Seattle stations," Jennifer says, explaining that the man's practice was a scam and that the he had been caught practicing unlawfully in other states in the past.

Another incident that stands out in Jennifer's mind from her internship is the sentencing of Gary Ridgway, the "Green River Killer."

Jennifer worked as a runner for

the *KING 5* reporters covering the hearing. She says about being at the hearing, where the victims' families confronted Ridgway, "It was very intense. It is one thing to see the edited version on the news and another thing to be right there."

Jennifer was confronted with the demanding nature of a newscasting career when her boss at *KING 5* told her she would have to be at the station at 6:00 a.m. on the morning of the Ridgway hearing.

This and other experiences during her internship gave Jennifer a better idea of what it would be like to work as a television reporter.

She says about her internship, "I don't know if it

clarified my goals as much as it gave a realistic hue to my goals. It is such a demanding field. You have to be willing to give everything you can to it."

Jennifer also realized that some aspects of newscasting that seem effortless for experienced reporters really take a lot of practice. Sometimes the reporters would let her go on camera to practice opening and closing a story. She would then try to edit her footage into a story.

"It was so much more difficult than I thought," she remembers.

Jennifer also found it difficult to face the often tragic news that reporters cover every day. She wonders how reporters function who do not share her faith in God.

"I can't imagine not having faith in a newsroom," she says, "because there is a lot of filth that comes through, and it would be really discouraging."

She was sustained by her sense of hope in Christ, and by her desire to demonstrate that hope to others.

Jennifer sees a career in newscasting as an opportunity to make a difference.

"As cheesy as it sounds, I want a worthy career that can help people. I've always thought that news is more important than people stop to realize, and I think that as a Christian in the area I could do some good," she says.

"If I can tell the kind of news that is doing good in the world, then I would like to do that.

"Another thing I've seen through my internship is that there is a huge need for compassion, and that is what Christians could bring to the industry," Jennifer says.

"If nothing else, a Christian could bring a genuine heart and a sympathetic ear, and that is something."

A hallmark of the **Buntain School of Nursing** at Northwest College is a capstone, cross-cultural course taken in the final semester of the senior year. The student is required to participate in a month-long nursing and ministry immersion experience that requires effectiveness in a cultural setting different than one's own. This year's sites included Bethel, Alaska; Calcutta, India; Mt. Darwin, Zimbabwe; and Taipei, Taiwan.

Bethel, Alaska

Kathy Ross, April Morgenroth, Jodi Hayes, and Kimber Powell spent their month serving in a hospital in Bethel, Alaska, and in clinics in surrounding towns and villages.

UPDATES FROM ALASKA

On Monday I flew out to Akiak with a public health nurse. Akiak is a small village of about 500 upriver from Bethel. The public health nurses usually visit the villages

every six months to do immunizations, well child exams, and epidemiology. (A few villages have had major problems with TB.)

When we arrived in Akiak a man picked us up from the airport and took us to the clinic. Half an hour after we arrived we started doing immunizations on all the children. We did immunizations all day.

That evening Petra (the public health nurse) and I took a walk around the village. I saw filleted fish hanging on a wire to dry, fish traps; beaver traps, dwarfed birch trees covered in snow, barking sled dogs, people dressed in furs, and we even watched the sunset on the very frozen Kuskokwim River.

After I got home on Thursday I got a page from the Paramedic team that they were flying to a village on the Bering Sea about 120 miles away. They picked me up and took me to the airport. I got to fly copilot, so that was really fun.

The scenery here is beautiful. As we were flying you could see villages from the air. Most of the populations are under 1000, so they are very small. They are all scattered along the Kuskokwim and Yukon Rivers. I saw the beautiful mountain range from the air.

When we landed it was getting dark. The runway in the village called Hooper Bay was covered in ice. So the pilot put his brakes on and we slid for a while. That is an experience I'll never forget.

We got out of the plane and the Eskimos were there with their snow machines and they took us about five miles to the village to pick up a 17-year-old with heart problems.

Upon leaving one of the houses, I stopped. I was in such a hurry I hadn't even looked these people in the face. I saw a man who was clearly dying and was literally skin and bones. I put my hands together and bowed, acknowledging him and gave him a love smile. I'm not kidding, that man lit up and smiled the biggest smile.

The latter part of the day we met Bonnie Long, Mark and Huldah Buntain's daughter, at the original church. She was full of such amazing stories and history. You couldn't help but have your faith increased!








BECOMING A SIGNIFICANT DONOR

Maybe the payment for a new TV, DVD, or SUV could instead be an investment in preparing the ministers, missionaries, nurses and teachers of tomorrow. It could be a monthly check to Northwest College.


