Record Growth, Year Eight

Enrollment at Northwest University totals 1281 this fall, which makes this the eighth consecutive year of record enrollment!

This year, enrollment in graduate programs, including the new Masters in Teaching, is up 13.7%.

Over the past eight years, Northwest University has grown 51%. As remarkable as the overall growth has been, even more remarkable is the growth in our School of Ministry. During the same period, the School of Ministry has grown 84%!

One reason for this incredible growth is an emphasis on hands-on experience in ministry, such as the annual trip to the Dream Center in Los Angeles.

Dream Center A DOSE OF REALITY

Located in the heart of Los Angeles, the *Dream Center* has over 150 active ministries all hours of the day and night. A short-term missions trip to the *Dream Center* has become a life-changing experience for School of Ministry students at Northwest University. It gives them an opportunity to combine classroom knowledge with practical, hands-on experience in a setting unlike anything most people ever see. From Sept. 23-30, students were involved in *Dream Center* ministries, including *Metro Kids*, *Under the Bridge* Feeding Program, *Hope for Homeless Youth*, Bus Ministry, and the Food Truck. Below, three students share their testimonies.

Our team was led by Kent Ingle, Dean of the School of Ministry, Professor Chris Corbett, Professor Mike Thompson and Randy Martin, our Missionary in Residence. The *Dream Center* is a very old hospital that has been turned into a mission that has several ministries within it. We were able to participate in several ministries, including *Metro Kids*, which is basically a "side-walk Sunday school" for kids in different neighborhoods. They have several trucks they take out every day to different very poor neighborhoods in LA. They set up kind of like a VBS for the kids. We played games, sang songs, shared the gospel, but basically were there to love these kids and show them Christ. Those kids didn't have much at all, but they were so happy and were so thankful, it was a humbling experience.

This trip was a humbling, life-changing experience. The fact that there is this kind of poverty in our own country was shocking. Our team worked great together and really supported and encouraged each other throughout the week, as there were some hard times.

On the last night we were to walk down Sunset Strip and share simple words of love to those walking by.

The "strip" is lined with restaurants and night clubs. Beautiful people are everywhere, driving exotic cars and wearing designer clothes. We were to carry large wooden crosses with signs posted to them that stated basic truths such as, "Jesus would have died to save you alone" and "Jesus loves you".

I was carrying a cross towards a western-style restaurant and bar with outdoor seating. As we began to approach, people began to mock us and laugh. I felt like I was being punched in the stomach and spit on at the same time. This brief moment could not even compare to an instant of the pain Jesus suffered as the people mocked him. However, it sure changed my perspective.

I think my favorite was the food truck ministry, in which a few of us went to South Central and sorted, bagged, and served hundreds of packages of food to families in need. In doing so, I was able to just enjoy talking with the families and children and use my Spanish, since many didn't speak English.

One day, I met a little nine-year-old girl named Shaniah. She told me of how several of her brothers had been killed. It broke my heart to see someone so young have to go through that, but to see the hope she had brought me to tears.

One night our team went to Santa Monica for a homeless youth outreach. I met an 18-year-old boy named Angel, who asked me, "Do you know the answer to the million dollar question: 'Will I go to heaven when I die?'" I sat there for a moment at a complete loss for words. Then I said, "That's up to you to answer." By the end of our conversation, several of us led him in the salvation prayer. We encouraged him to go to the service at Angelus Temple the next night and he did.

Randy Martin, MIR*

*MISSIONARY IN RESIDENCE

"Missions is at the heart of the Assemblies of God movement, and Northwest has achieved an integral role in our movement's outreach to the world," states Randy Martin, who is serving this year as the *Missionary in Residence* at Northwest. "I have a deep burden to help prepare students who will minister cross-culturally."

Although he has taught at Northwest for only a few weeks, Randy is impressed with his students' commitment to missions.

"I think about half of them have been on a missions trip, and many have been on several."

He notices their cultural awareness and notes its importance.

"Sensitivity to other cultures needs to be emphasized," Randy states. "It is basic to all cross-cultural ministry."

Randy has also noticed the call on students' lives.

"The passion for missions I see here is very real. I believe many of today's students at Northwest have great potential to serve in the Kingdom of God," he adds.

"I feel that my experiences as a missionary have uniquely prepared me to positively impact the lives of students who are studying at Northwest in response to the Great Commission."

Deep Roots

Randy has deep roots in both missions and Northwest.

His parents, Rev. Les and Earle-in Martin, served as missionaries in Malaysia from 1867-1981 and in Singapore from 1983-1998. In fact, Randy lived in Malaysia for nearly eight years until returning to the U.S. to attend Northwest.

Randy, his parents, both his

siblings, and his sister's spouse are all alumni of Northwest, as is his son Christopher.

His wife Colleen is also a graduate of Northwest. She was called to be a missionary at the age of 16 while she was an exchange student in Japan, during her junior year of high school.

Randy and Colleen met at Northwest, and were married on

August 15, 1981, after graduating from Northwest. They were wed at Marysville First Assembly, which is Colleen's home church.

After graduation and marriage, Randy and Colleen served in Oroville, Wash., and Hunters, Wash.

Missionaries to Indonesia

In 1990 they became missionaries to Indonesia, appointed by

the Assemblies of God.

They went to Bandung, West Java, for language study in 1992, and from 1993 to 1996 Randy served as a teacher and the business manager at Parakletos Advanced Theological School in Tomohon, North Sulawesi.

Since 1997 he has served as teacher and Dean of Student Ministries at the Satya Bhakti Advanced Theological School in Malang, East Java.

In addition, Randy has served as Indonesian Field Fellowship Coordinator and, from 2003-2005, as the East Java District A/G Home Missions Department Director.

Colleen ministers to children and trains leaders. She regularly travels across Indonesia giving seminars on children's ministries, and she teaches at the Bible school in Malang, East Java.

Randy and Colleen's year at Northwest was preceded by the marriages of two of their three children.

Their son Chris (not pictured) married Micki McLean of Cave Junction, Ore., on July 29.

On August 26, their daughter Cherrisse married Josh Webb.

He, as you might guess, is also a Northwest alum.

Eagles IN ACTION!



Cross Country

The Northwest University Cross Country team raced at the University of Washington's Sundodger Open held at Lincoln Park in Seattle.

Gabe Molinaro (far left, #162) led the men's team, running the 8-kilometer course in 26:40, a personal best by three seconds.

Northwest University was one of only five teams in the meet to place two women in the top-25.

Kjerstein Bailey (left, #158) led the women with a 15th place showing. Her time of 22:35 on the 6-kilometer course was 12 seconds faster than her previous best at that distance. Beth Knudtson finished in 22:47, good for 24th place overall.

Bailey successfully defended her 2005 Conference crown Nov. 4 in La Grande, Ore., running eight kilometers in 18:41. Beth Knudtson finished right behind Bailey, placing second for the Eagles in 18:45.

This ensured both of them of bids into the NIAA National Championships in late November and also earned them All-Conference and All-Region status for their races.

Soccer

The Northwest University men's soccer team defeated Warner Pacific, 1-0, in overtime in the Eagles' final game of Cascade Conference play. Northwest (7-9-1, 4-7-1 Cascade Conference) and Warner Pacific battled to a scoreless tie after 90 minutes of play. It was senior night at the Lake Washington field, where Northwest plays many of its home games, and graduating seniors Chris Peterson, John Buttle, Ryan Vander Pol and Josh Bean were honored during a halftime ceremony. At right, Chad Thornton (#8), a junior from Spokane.

The women's soccer team opened its first-ever season with a victory, then went on to a solid season with a record of 5-8-2 overall and 2-6-1 in the Cascade Conference.

Northwest junior Shauna Marshall (#12, lower left) was named to the Cascade Collegiate Conference All-Conference Second Team. The young Eagle team returns everyone next season except senior Stephanie Amundsen, who was honored in the final home game of the season.

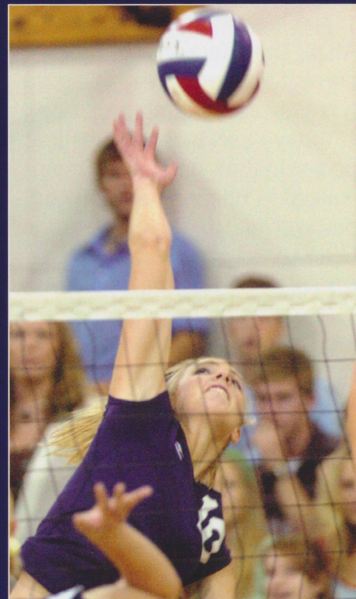

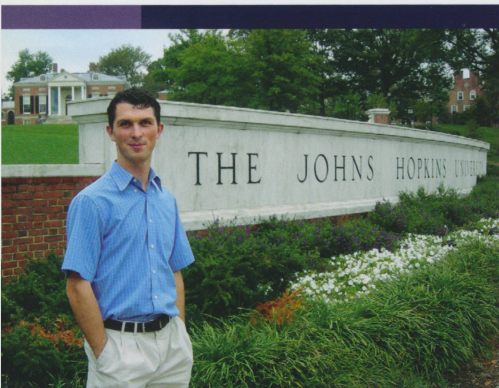

THE NEW HEALTH AND SCIENCES CENTER

YURI SEMENYUK *Science as Ministry*

Yuri Semenyuk is determined to combine his passion for ministry with his love for science. The 2005 graduate of Northwest is now at the Johns Hopkins Univer-



sity, pursuing a Master of Science in Environmental Engineering.

"This degree will give me the tools necessary to tackle the most serious environmental challenges in both the U.S. and developing countries," Yuri says.

Yuri, who was born in the Ukraine and moved to the U.S. with his family when he was eight, says that he inherited his appreciation of higher education, and especially Christian higher education, from his father.

"In the Soviet Union, the church was persecuted for gathering to worship God," Yuri says. Several of Yuri's relatives, including his grandfather, were imprisoned for their Christian faith.

"Christians were not allowed to study past grade school. You had

to denounce Christianity and become an atheist in order to get a higher education," Yuri says. "My dad had a great desire to study, especially in a Christian context."

That father's desire was passed down to the son. "Ever since I was a child, I wanted to study in a Christian college, but I had no idea where or how," Yuri says.

Then his older brother Ivan attended Northwest. Ivan told Yuri about the education he was receiving, and Yuri made up his mind. He applied to only one college—Northwest University.

"One reason I chose Northwest was that I could study for my career and also get a biblical background," Yuri says.

"I also felt that Northwest had a very diverse curriculum. I took

classes in psychology and philosophy even though they had nothing to do with my program, so that I would be more competent in the real world."

An Environmental Science major, Yuri was challenged in his classes with Dr. D.J. Jin, Dr. Bill Randolph, and Dr. Eric Steinkamp.

"Dr. Steinkamp really emphasized a call to action. When we discussed various environmental crises happening in the world, he would challenge us to do something about it."

Yuri discovered that he could combine his passion for ministry with his love for science and make a big difference in developing nations: "I think it is critical to show the Word in deeds."

He plans to improve the infra-

structure of developing countries in Latin America so communities can have good drinking water.

While studying at Northwest, Yuri spent a semester studying in Costa Rica and Nicaragua in the *Council for Christian Colleges and University's* (CCCU) Latin American Studies Program. And although Yuri was there to learn, he found plenty of opportunities to serve, by helping a local church build orphanages and daycare centers.

While preparing academically for his future, Yuri continues to serve around the world. He went on missions trips every summer while studying at Northwest, and has been on two more since graduating in 2005. So far, he's ministered in Nicaragua, Argentina, Paraguay, and the Ukraine.

MARIAN MARTIN *Africa Couldn't Wait*

(Editor's Note: This is excerpted from an e-mail Marian sent from Africa shortly after she graduated from Northwest University in 2005 with B.A. degree in Nursing.)

This is the poorest region of South Africa, and to put it mildly, it has been a complete shock to my system. It is different. Literally everything is different.

For instance, there was a Meningitis outbreak in one of the surrounding schools. I drove 30 miles on a dirt road to help vaccinate nearly 400 children. When it was over, I went to wash my hands and there was no water. Seriously. Many of the clinics

here don't have running water.

Another time, I was in the Operating Room watching a leg amputation, the most gruesome surgery I have ever seen. All of a sudden, the electricity went out. There was a back-up generator, but they had to use flashlights to see, because the lights were not hooked up to the generator.

After the procedure, the man didn't wake up because he was overmedicated on narcotics. The doctor that I was assisting didn't know what to do.

Not that I know everything there is to know about the medical profession, but I believe I can speak for myself and my Buntain School of Nursing peers that we know that a common antidote for over sedation is the drug Narcan.

Another doctor told him to give the patient Narcan.

The biggest problem here is AIDS. The infection rate is 80 percent in surrounding villages. It is truly a devastating disease.

Today I was in the out-patient pediatric clinic when a woman walked in holding her beautiful petite child. Her daughter had just been tested for HIV and the results had come back positive.

How do you tell a mother that her child will eventually die?

The depth of pain is tangible and the look of hopelessness is seen everywhere. There is not one aspect of society that HIV does not affect. The ramifications of this savage plague know no end in this broken and bleeding land.

Honestly, what separates us from this madness? It boils down to location, geography, birth.

I was born in a land of the free and they were born in the land of death. And forgive me for asking a "tough" question, but "Why?"

Why is there such immense suffering with a complete lack of hope? I trust God, but I do not pretend to understand all of his ways.

I cannot help but think that we all have been given a cup of water, and if we all were to combat this wildfire together, something would have to happen.

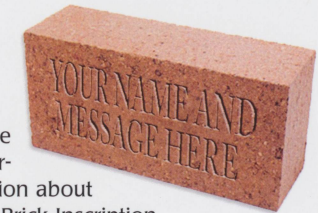
Thank you for allowing me to pour out my heart into words. I trust all is well with you all.

In addition, Northwest University's Science Department needs updated chemistry, biology, environmental sciences, and physics labs to serve the School of Nursing as well as the University's entire academic program.

The **Health and Sciences Center** will provide opportunities

for other growing programs and for new programs in the future.

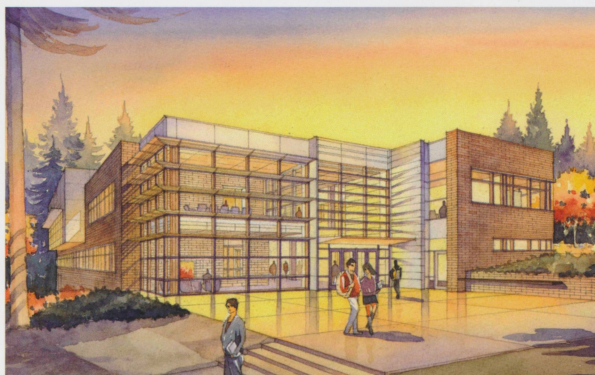
Teams that included Northwest University faculty, board and administration have worked with recognized experts to design a quality facility that will meet our needs in this vital area.

The new **Health and Sciences**

Center is scheduled for completion in August 2007. It is a two-story, 45,000 square-foot project that will be in Northwest's main academic hub, between the Ness Academic Center and the Hurst Library. It will be ideally located along a newly created pedestrian thoroughfare.

A grand, two-story open space will welcome students, faculty and guests into the building.

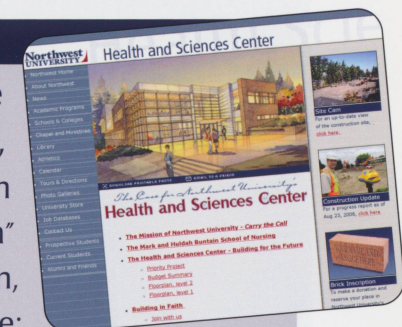
The bottom floor will be entirely day-lighted to the west. The design will provide for easy access, helpful for those students and faculty who need to work on both floors.

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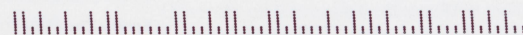
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
