I love the feeling of a shovel in my hands.

To be more precise, I love the feeling of a shovel in my hands



during a *groundbreaking* ceremony. The shovel means that after weeks and months – sometimes years – of planning and prayer, a project is ready to come to fruition.

On June 21, 2006, I held a shovel as I stood on the sloping lawn just west of the Ness Academic Center.

Beside me stood members of the Board and the administrative team at Northwest University, as well as representatives of three notable Seattle companies: Lorig, Mithun, and Sellen.

In front of me stood faculty, staff, alumni and students. We were all there for the official groundbreaking of the **Health and Sciences Center**.

We held a brief ceremony, we prayed, and we took our shovels and broke the ground. Since that day, heavy equipment has dug into the ground with more than just symbolic effect. This was indeed a great day.

Prime Time for Northwest

This is certainly a prime time for Northwest University. The growth of academic programs, particularly the School of Nursing, has made this new building a top priority. We are proceeding with construction of the Health and Sciences Center even as we work to raise the funds for it. Does that mean we're getting

ahead of ourselves? Are we being financially foolish... or faithful?

I can assure you that our Board would not let us proceed if we were being foolish. It may help your faith, as it has helped ours, to see how God has worked on behalf of Northwest University.

More than 20 years ago, wise administrators who preceded us worked out an agreement with the NFL's Seattle Seahawks. They leased part of our campus, made improvements to the land, and built a large office complex. That work and that construction would pay for the first 20 years of the lease. After that time, they would start paying rent... or move on.

For a couple years now, we've received good-sized checks. But recently, the Seahawks decided they needed more space and have announced they will move.

Thus, this wonderful facility will be ours to use in 2008.

But that's just part one of the miracle. The building at 6710 is part two. We've told you about this before, how an office building near our campus, built during the height of the dot-com craze, became available, and how the Lord helped us acquire it. This building is now appraised at twice what we paid for it just three years ago.

The Seahawks' facility and the 6710 property have provided a bit of a financial "safety net" for the university. It is similar to the equity a home owner might see.

This safety net, however, ought to remain just that – a safety net. We are aggressively raising funds for this new building, and we will not place its cost on the tuition that is paid by our students.

At the same time, our board realized there is a time for action. Seeing equipment "in the dirt" would mobilize responses to our fund-raising efforts.

In our times of planning and prayer, we read the story of Joshua leading the nation of Israel across the Jordan. The waters of this great river did not part until the priests actually stepped into the river. We believe that God is at work in a similar fashion for us right now.

As we step out in faith, He will provide the miracle.

As I said, this is a Prime Time for Northwest University. Over the past half-dozen years, we have built several smaller buildings – including apartments for students and duplexes for faculty and staff.

However, the Health and Sciences Center is the most significant project since the Hurst Library nearly 25 years ago.

We have just added our third graduate program, the Masters in Teaching. Our School of Education has a sterling reputation, and it looks like this new program is off to a great start!

But even as we construct new


In this issue, we'd like to share stories about two alumni from an earlier era. They are now in their peak years... in prime time.

It is always encouraging to read about other Christians and to see how God works in their lives even through times of difficulty and discouragement.

Carry the Call - conference one

Northwest University held its first annual *Carry the Call* conference during three chapel services of Spring Semester. The conference explored and explained Northwest's vision to equip students to *Carry the Call* with Heart, Head, and Hand. **Dr. Don Argue**, President of Northwest University, spoke on "Heart." **Kristen Waggoner**, a Northwest alumna and an attorney with the Seattle law firm Ellis, Li & McKinstry, spoke on "Head." **Philippe Vallerand**, a businessman and member of the Northwest University Board of Directors, spoke on "Hand." "Jesus calls his followers to himself. That is our primary calling," stated Dr. Don Argue. "But then He calls us to other tasks – our secondary calling. Even deeper than this, He calls us to discipleship. So to limit the word 'calling' to a particular stage in salvation is to miss the forest for the trees. To be a disciple of Jesus is to be called.

"Our secondary calling is what we do in life. That's why you are here at Northwest University. But you must understand that your dedication to Christ always comes first," he said.

"Attempts to separate a person's life along the lines of spiritual versus secular is dualism," Dr. Argue explained. "Terms like 'full-time Christian service' make it seem as if those not working for churches or Christian organizations are only part-time in their service to Christ. But that is not the message of the New Testament.

"This does not take away one degree from vocational ministry. In fact, in the past seven years, while this university has grown almost 50%, our School of Ministry enrollment has increased by 73%. When you have an environment that is New Testament, the Holy Spirit is the one who will call and motivate properly."

Dr. Argue quoted Martin Luther: "The works of monks and priests, however arduous they be, do not differ one whit in the sight of God from the works of the laborer in the field... All works are measured before God by faith alone."

Dr. Argue explained, "If all that a believer does is done out of faith for the glory of God, then all the dualistic distinctions are diminished. There is no higher vs. lower or sacred vs. secular. Everyone, everywhere, and in everything fulfills his or her secondary call – in work and life – in response to God's primary call – to the Cross."



Kristen Waggoner's law practice focuses on civil and appellate litigation. She recently represented parties in Washington's same-sex marriage lawsuit in which the State Supreme Court ruled in her clients' favor, upholding state marriage laws in a closely watched decision.

Waggoner told students about her calling to law at the age of twelve. She said that God told her, "You are called to defend Christian schools and churches and religious liberty."

Waggoner continued: "That is only the first sentence in it. The rest, which fills up an entire notebook page, tells me how hard it's going to be and how I am not really going to like it, and how I need to prepare myself. It is all about preparation for the calling. It's not about the grand dream of reaching it. Well, that is my life. Preparation is a lifelong endeavor. Calling is a lifelong endeavor."


She challenged students to live their calling now: "If you don't have the moral courage to stand up for what is right now, and if you don't have the strength to get intimate with your God right now, you won't later, either," she stated.

"The habits that you are dealing with right now will be the habits of your future."

Waggoner added, "You will be the next generation of leaders... and leadership takes courage.

"We lead with compassion. We lead with empathy, but we lead and stand for what is right. Instead, so many of us want what the world has. We want its comforts, we want its riches."

Waggoner concluded by stating her hopes for Northwest University students: 'I dream that you will, from this point forward, see your preparation not as a stage you pass through... but as a life-long endeavor. I trust that you will be a risk-taker, and that you will risk all for pursuit of your calling."



Philippe Vallerand, a businessman and member of the Northwest University Board of Directors, spoke on the active application aspect of Carry the Call.

He began by telling students that God will help them discover their calling: "If you listen, you will know in your heart what you are good at and what you love to do. That's not accident. God made you that way."

Of his own calling as a businessman, Vallerand said, "We do business all around the world. Yes, we have success, but its purpose is centered around a clear sense of mission. I know I am on a mission."

He continued, "Today we live in a global economy, so we travel all around the world, six or eight times a year. Business bridges culture and ethnicity. People who will normally not talk to you will open up because you do business. Be encouraged, because the Lord is using business today to open doors that nothing could open before."

Vallerand said, "In my passport there are many stamps, some from places you cannot go into as a traditional missionary or even be a Christian. But as a business person you will have access and be able to engage in those nations. If you are called to a "ministry" of business, you can go places where often pastors and missionaries are forbidden to go in that capacity."

Vallerand added, "If you lead someone to Christ, if you touch someone's life, these are eternal consequences. Your job or the money you generate will not in themselves have eternal consequences. It is how you use your talents and treasure that will. All that you are and all that you have are to fulfill the mission... making Jesus' love known in all nations."

BOB FOX A REAL FISHER... OF MEN

On a back wall of the sanctuary at Parkhill Assembly in Billings, Montana, is a metal sculpture.

It features a few fish, swimming under a bronze banner that says, "Follow Me... Matt. 4:19."

You recall the verse – Jesus telling his disciples, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men" – and it strikes you as entirely appropriate for a church.

But it's more than just a nice sentiment. It's an indication of the passion of the man who has pastored this church for 25 years: Bob Fox, Fisherman.

Falling in Love with Montana

Today, Bob Fox loves Montana. He loves to hunt and fish, to just be outdoors. You'd think he was a native Montanan.

Actually, he grew up in Bellingham, Wash.

"My dad was a postman," Bob recalls, "and he was the most godly man I ever knew."

Bob's father, Josiah, attended Northwest (then a Bible Institute) for one year before World War II. "He never made it back to Northwest," Bob states, "but he made it possible for all five of his children to attend. As a result, four of us are in fulltime ministry, and the fifth is an active layperson."

Bob is the oldest, followed by Jim, a contractor active at Ferndale Assembly of God; Carla, who married Myron Ness and serves with him as pastors at Westport; Karen, who married David Groft and pastors with him in Lake Stevens, and Alan, who married Christy and pastors in Coulee City.

When Bob arrived at Northwest, he knew just one other student. When it was time for the election of class officers, she nominated him for President.

When he made the required speech, a student named Donna noted that he "sounded sincere."

Donna sang in the Choralons, while Bob was point guard on the basketball team for four years. Somehow their paths crossed.



They began dating during their sophomore year and married after Bob's junior year. He had served as Freshman Class President, Sophomore Class President, and ASB Vice President during his junior year.

"Once I got married," he laughs, my political career was over."

His pastoral career, however, was about to begin.

Bob's call to ministry had been solidified by his professors at Northwest.

"I was deeply influenced by Gordon Fee, Amos Millard, and Dan Pecota," he recalls. "LeRoy Johnson was always offering encouragement. He really reached out to us."

When Bob graduated in 1970, his advisor, Dan Pecota, gave him "a gift I still have today, a New English Bible. And I remember what he said: 'Now we can be friends.'"

Bob and Donna were Youth Pastors for a year in Woodburn, Ore., and pastored for five years in Darington. For

another five years, from 1976-81, Bob served as the District Youth Director for what is now the Northwest Ministry Network.

Then a door opened to pastor Parkhill Assembly of God in Billings, Montana.

"It wasn't something we initially desired to do," Bob recalls. "But we definitely felt God calling us. We obeyed, and it's been great."

Fishing for Men

Today, Bob doesn't stop fishing for men when he goes fishing for trout.

"We have a variety of ways for men to build their friendships and to reach out to others," he notes.

"We have hunting and fishing trips, where men from our church bring a non-Christian friend."

The men of his church share the results of their expeditions at an annual Wild Game Dinner.

Bob and Donna have raised four boys: Brian, Brad, Robert, Jr., ("the best cook in Montana"), and Brandon. Donna went on to earn her B.A. and M.A., and now is an elementary school teacher.

Bob serves on the Board of Northwest University, by virtue of his position as Secretary of the Montana District, where Paul Goodman, another Northwest alum, serves as Superintendent.

"Paul is a very capable leader, a man of great integrity," states Bob. "I'd trust him with my life." In fact, he'd even take him trout fishing.









SALLEE CONN TURNAROUND ARTIST

From a very young age, Sallee Conn had an idea of where she wanted to go. She just had no idea of how to get there.

"I was interested in ministry from the age of 12," she recalls. "But at that time I didn't see any women in ministry outside the traditional role of a pastor's wife or a missionary's wife."

She came to Northwest University (then Northwest College) in 1968 with a sense of direction accompanied by uncertainty.

One of her earliest encounters was with Maxine Williams, her advisor, who urged her to major in Christian Education.

"I said then that I wasn't going to be a teacher or a preacher," Sallee notes. "But it's funny – now I am both."

Meeting Jim Conn

She met Jim Conn at the end of her first quarter at Northwest, and they married after her junior year.

She graduated in four years, and moved to Oregon where Jim would serve as a youth pastor.

"It was our intention to job share, but that didn't work out," she remembers. "I served as a volunteer church secretary and hid my passion for ministry. It was a painful experience."

A New Chapter in Anacortes

After several years in Oregon, the Conns moved to Anacortes to serve on the pastoral staff of Al and Joann Baunsgard. "The Baunsgards are gifted mentors," she states. "As they worked as partners in ministry, they became my role models."

To the Marshall Islands & Tonga

In 1976, Sallee had just earned her teaching certificate in English when they received a letter from Dave Oleson (now the Director of the Intercultural Studies program at Northwest University).

That letter led to a year in the Marshall Islands.

"This was a fabulous time for us," says Sallee. "It broadened our perspectives and planted a passion for missions."

In 1981, Jim and Lou Hance visited the Conns, who had returned to Anacortes, and asked, "When are you coming back to the islands?"

"It turned out to be a prophetic statement," says Sallee.

"We began the application process and were appointed missionaries to the Kingdom of Tonga in the South Pacific."

In Tonga, Sallee directed Religious Education programs in the public schools and taught in the Bible School.

"In Tonga, more than 20 years after I first began to realize a call to ministry, I began to experience the opportunity to express my gifts in ministry," says Sallee. "I had numerous chances to speak and to teach."

A Setback

She expected to stay in

Tonga for the rest of her life, but it didn't work out that way.


"We had to leave Tonga and return to the U.S.," says Sallee. "That is actually Jim's story, and it was very painful."

They were encouraged to deal with certain issues and went to *Emerge* to do so.

"I was externally compliant with the process," Sallee recounts, "but internally I was resistant. The way it worked out, however, the experience changed my life."

For months after leaving Tonga, Sallee felt rootless and alienated, little realizing how God would give her ways to turn negatives into positives and turn closed doors into open ones.

"The fruit of what I'm doing today is a result of our time in Tonga," notes Sallee.



Tough Choices

When it seemed a door was opening to go to Cambodia, the Conns had a difficult decision.

"Our son Ryan was just 13, and the input we received helped us see how difficult a relocation would be for him," Sallee states. "We decided our son was the top priority, so we remained in the Seattle area."

The Conns began attending Shoreline Community Church, and when the Educational Ministries Pastor resigned, Sallee took over on an interim basis.

Her pastor? Rev. Les Welk, now Superintendent of the Northwest Ministry Network.

"It was just assumed by many that we were planning to continue as missionaries," says Sallee. "When it became apparent that

the Lord was leading us in new directions, Pastor Welk offered both of us ministry positions at the church."

On to Fuller

"During my undergraduate days at Northwest, I wanted to go to seminary, but I didn't tell anybody," Sallee recalls.

In 1992, doors opened for her to attend Fuller Theological Seminary, where she earned an M.A. in Theology.

"Working on my seminary degree confirmed that gender was not an issue and that God knew what He was doing," she notes. "Gifts make a way for themselves."

Renewing Others

Sallee was at church council in 1997 when she had a conversation with Dr. Jack Rozell. He was founding a ministry dedicated to missionary care and encouragement. When they realized the vision they all shared, the Conns were invited to join Jack's team.

"Missionary Renewal Asia Pacific has been a great fit for both Jim and me," states Sallee.

Another door was about to open. At Fuller, Sallee began to think about a Ph.D., even though she was the first in her immediate family to even earn a B.A.

Sallee and Jim were at a convention near Spokane when they visited Gonzaga University and discovered its doctoral program in Leadership. She was accepted, and finished her Ph.D. in 2004.

Sallee and Jim now have a world-wide ministry, with conferences and consultations in the U.S. and in Asia. Sallee also teaches in seminaries in Asia.

"My mission now," Sallee says, "is to assist vocational ministry people to fully become the persons God created them to be."

Her ministry today is a result of steps she took during the painful days after they left Tonga.

"God doesn't waste pain," Sallee states. "He transforms it for our good, and His glory, in amazing ways."

THE HEALTH AND SCIENCES CENTER

A new home is under construction for the Mark and Huldah Buntain School of Nursing

Six years ago, building on our growing academic program, plans rapidly came together that would birth another dream at Northwest University.

Highly qualified personnel, quality academic programs, students with a unique burden, inspired leadership, and the generosity of key donors all came together to bring about the *Mark and Huldah Buntain School of Nursing*.

Students were enrolled and educated in our program, which prepared them for the *profession* of nursing as well as the *calling* of nursing.

In addition to thorough study of the theories and techniques to meet the demands of nursing, students were discipled by nurses who were driven by compassion.



At Northwest, nursing students learn not only in the contexts of the classroom and the clinic, they also learn in the contexts of the chapel and the mission field.

The first class of these uniquely qualified nurses graduated from the *Mark and Huldah Buntain School of Nursing* in 2001.

Our nurses are already meeting human need through skilled hands of compassion in a variety of contexts around the world.

In many ways, these nurses are becoming available at just the right time.

It is not at all uncommon for news reports to highlight the desperate need for nurses in our communities and around the world.

Today, in just Washington state alone, there are 1,800 nurses needed to fill existing hospital vacancies. Government agencies predict that there will be a shortage of registered nurses in Washington that will exceed 25,000 by the year 2020.

The *Mark and Huldah Buntain* **School of Nursing** is a reality.

Today, over 160 students are pursuing a life of service through nursing at Northwest University. The growing School of Nursing has been located in two different temporary quarters. It is served by the University's science programs, which function in labs that were originally built 40 years ago.

Our nursing students have exhausted every available space, and we are already at capacity.

Building for the Future


In order to sustain our vital nursing program, and to enable continued growth, we must build the Health and Sciences Center.

The School of Nursing needs dedicated space for nursing skills labs, classrooms, and faculty offices.

In addition, the University's Science Department needs updated chemistry, biology, environmental sciences, and physics labs to serve the School of Nursing as well as the University's entire academic program.

The Health and Sciences Center will also provide opportunities for other growing programs and new programs that could include academic majors like pre-med.

Teams, including members of the Northwest University faculty, board and administration, have utilized recognized experts to design a quality facility that will meet our needs for the future.




Under Construction

The Health and Sciences Center, now under construction and scheduled for completion August 2007, is a two-story, 45,000 square-foot project designed to enable the continued growth of Northwest University.

The Mark and Huldah Buntain School of Nursing will be located in the building, as well as the University's Science Department.

The project will benefit the University's entire academic program in that it will directly facilitate a number of academic programs and will free space in other facilities.

ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR Tim Marks – In His Own Words

I decided I wanted to be a teacher in my high school years. I attended Northwest with the desire to be trained to teach in a special way – a way where every child leaves my class feeling wanted, cared for, and seeing God through me while at school.

That would be my mission, that would be my calling, and that is what I hoped Northwest University would train me to do.

I started teaching in 1993 at a small private school on Whidbey Island. It was an interesting year leading and instructing a multiage class. While at the school I was able to launch the school's athletic program.

My wife and I enjoyed the setting of Whidbey Island, but moved back to Kirkland the following year. Two years later, (1996) while a staff member at Chief Kanim Middle School, we were honored by the Department of Education as being one of the United States best schools by being award the Blue Ribbon Award for Education.

Then, feeling led by God, my wife, Cindy, and I moved to North Idaho. In 1998 we were blessed to be offered jobs in the Coeur d'Alene School District as instructors. While teaching at Fernan Elementary it has been my privilege to be a member of a staff that has won the Excellence in Education award each of the seven years I have taught there. In 2003, I had the unexpected honor of being chosen by the graduating class to be their speaker at their graduation. No honor can be greater than being appreciated by the children in my mission.

Then in 2005, again unexpectedly, I was chosen as an Outstanding Teacher and presented an award at a surprise assembly in October.

However, one of the most impacting teaching events happened to me during the 2004-2005 school year. My mission and my calling would be tested greatly during the last half of that year.

Did You Hear About the Homicides?

The phone rang at 7:00 a.m. to the question, "Did you hear about the homicides?"

There had been a triple homicide at one of my students' home, and he and his sister were missing.

My heart dropped when I heard that news; no reaction seemed appropriate enough.

That shock and disbelief led me to ask some questions of myself as the boy's teacher.

Did he know I cared for him as a person?

Did he feel valued by me? Did he learn about God through my actions?

I believed that I could answer yes to these questions, but it didn't lessen the load of a heavy heart or of now leading his classmates through a horrible tragedy.

I had to make some decisions about how to lead the children in handling DJ's (that is what we called the boy) disappearance.

One of the first things I did was to only allow the students to dis-

cuss the situation with an adult. This eliminated rumors and gossip. We were also going to be hopeful, so we kept DJ's desk in the same place for the rest of the year, ready for his return.

The Children Amazed Me With Their Caring

The children persevered through this well. I was amazed by their caring for each other, and for their missing friend.

Two instances of their caring and comfort in the room happened in the first few weeks of the disappearance.

One of my students, who went by the nickname "Pal," had told his mom that there was no need to worry: "It was in God's hands."

The other had to do with a boy who asked, "Can we pray for him (in the classroom)?"

I replied, "You and anyone in this class may pray for him by yourself at anytime you want."

This question and my response led to most of the class saying they prayed for DJ every night.

Along with prayer, they wore ribbons, buttons, and went to candlelight vigils all in hope for DJ's and his sister's safe return. Meanwhile, the effect the disappearance and murders had on me was much more than I expected.

This was not my son or daughter, but the time put in with students makes it feel like you have lost one of your own.

I began to lose my appetite, and sleeping through the night was very rare.

There was a sort of surrealness that surrounded the whole situation. It was almost unbelievable that this had and was really happening.

There were the interviews by detectives, the FBI coming to check DJ's desk for anything that might help, and watching this real-life mystery reported and discussed on FOX news.

That summer, DJ's sister was miraculously found, but DJ had been abused and then murdered at a campsite in Montana by a vile and evil predator.

As I sat in the funeral service saying goodbye to DJ, I remember thinking about the child that I truly believe has gone home to the Lord; my mission with him now was complete.

I hope that every child leaves my class feeling wanted, cared for, and seeing God through me while at school.

That is my mission, that is my calling, and that is what Northwest University trained me to do.
