Miss Williams was born in Plattsburg, Missouri. She graduated from the Northwest Bible and Missionary Train-ing School in Minneapolis. In Minneapolis, she taught four years at the North Central Bible Institute, at the same time attending summer terms and the Valley State Teachers' College in North Dakota. She also attended the Southwest Missouri State College in Springfield, Missouri, and night school at the University of Minnesota. Later she came to Seattle and took her B.A. degree at the Seattle Pacific College with Christian Education as a major.

To gain first hand information for her missions course at N.C.B.I. she spent two months in Cuba during the summer of 1948.

The bands meet during the chapel period each Friday morning. Specific needs are brought before the individual bands pertaining to their field. Much of the time is spent praying for these needs.

Interest is also stimulated by missionary speakers both in chapel and in the individual bands. Rev. Paul Wright from Nyasaland, Africa, showed some movies of that country to the student body on October 10. On October 13 the students were inspired by the ministry of Mrs. Nettie Juergenson, missionary to Japan, both in chapel and the Oriental band.

Rev. and Mrs. Maurice Petersen spoke briefly on November 9 and showed pictures taken in the Belgian Congo, Africa. They told us they were making plans to return to the field as soon as finances are available.

Letter writing stimulates interest in most of the bands. The Oriental band received letters from James Vigna on the Tibetan border and Fred and Kathleen McGrew of Singapore. Brother Ketcham has written to the India band. Former students in pioneer work are the main correspondents of the Homeland band.

More materialistic projects are also being carried on by some of the bands.

This was a healthy Christian environment, which probably accounts for the fact that today all of the seven Williams children are in full time gospel work.

The youngest brother, Morris Williams, is a missionary in Nyasaland, East Africa; the oldest brother is a teacher at the Southern California Bible College; and her sister, Mrs. Paul Schoonmaker, is a missionary in North India; and the others are ministers' wives.

Miss Williams has been a pioneer in gospel work, part of which has been in the woods of Northern Minnesota.

Sunday School Organization, now her favorite subject, was made practical by experiences in North and South Dakota, and Montana, where she held teachers' training classes and conferences for a number of years.

Miss Williams confided that sewing and knitting for seventeen nephews and nieces was her hobby.

Miss Williams taught American History, Speech, and Practice Teaching this term, and will be teaching Introduction to Christian Education, Advanced Speech, Practice Teaching, and Church History, this coming winter quarter.

Piano Needed


