MISSION BAND NEWS

Interest in foreign missions has always been high at Northwest Bible College and this year is proving to be no exception. The missionary offering, taken each Friday morning has been supported enthusiastically by the student body with the result that substantial help can now be given those missionaries who are in need.

The offerings received this year have totalled on an average of over eighty

dollars per week.

This fund is not idle, but is used actively where needs are presented. For example, in reply to a request for financial help made by Malchus Bennett of British Honduras, to aid his building program, one hundred dollars was sent him. His acknowledgement and thanks were read in a letter in Chapel December eighth. Perry Dymond of Honduras, Central America, was also given one hundred dollars to further the work in the Bible School there. His letter of thanks and gratitude was also read to the student body.

The missionary council has approved the plan of giving each missionary speaker in chapel a gift of thirty-five dollars, which is drawn from the mission fund.

Further interest in missions was stimulated by the messages of the Wilfred H. Morris family of Chosica, Jeru, and Bruce Frampton, radio missionary enroute to the Philippines to work with the Far East Broadcasting Company.

During this Christmas season some of the individual bands have undertaken the project of sending Christmas cards, and small gifts to missionaries on the fields.

Let us continue to pray and give, so that others who have never heard the story of Jesus might come to know the Master.


