Butterfield Returns

Rev. C. E. Butterfield, President of Northwest Bible College, returned home last week from Cuba where he and Rev. Dave Carlson, Walla Walla, have been holding special meetings for the past six weeks.

The first week of meetings was spent with Rev. and Mrs. Waldo Nicodemus in the church at Ciego. It is reported that sixty souls were saved during this series of meetings. The Christians were very receptive to the gospel message and teaching.

From Ciego they flew to Holguin, a city of 70,000 on the east end of the Island of Cuba. This city is impossible to be reached in any manner except by airplane. It is approximately 400 years old. The city is modern in Latin-American standards with the exception of having unpaved streets.

The Church in Holguin seats about 500 persons and is less than a year old. The people are newly saved and enthusiastic for the Lord. Twelve souls came to the altar for salvation during the week of meetings. Souls came to be saved each night.

Their third week of meetings were held with Sister Maxine Richardson at Baracola which is located on the extreme northeast tip of the island. This is the place where Columbus first landed in Cuba. They helped in evening services and held meetings for the native workers each day.

Bro. Butterfield and Bro. Carlson spent their last two weeks in meetings in the capital city of Havana.

MARRIAGE

The word "marriage" generally brings everyone to attention. It ought to! We are all married, in fact, we are polygamists. "To marry," means "to unite." More things can be united, however, than man and woman. What we are today, we are because of not only "whom" we have married but "what" we have married as well. We have been united with many things which, together with our inherited qualities, make us what we are.

Some people have been wed to politics. "Who will you vote for this year?" someone asks. "Why that's easy, I'm a Democrat and shall be 'til death do us part," is the answer. He is married to his political beliefs and nothing can change him.

Some are wed to religious beliefs. Their fathers were Baptists (or Methodists), grandfathers were Baptists, and they expect to be until they die. Nothing can open their hearts to receive anything further.

Others have wed purity; and nothing would allow them to be anything but pure. Others are honest; and they would never find money to be a temptation. Why? They are wed to the principle of honesty.

As each individual analyzes his life he will find that he has been married to various principles, ideals, and truths. The fortunate thing about these marriages is that one can obtain a divorce which even God recognizes. No doubt many have already divorced things they once were married to. As to which things we should divorce and which things we should marry, I believe that John 2 gives some directives.

This marriage at Cana was successful and blessed because of three things: (1) Jesus was present, (2)

Jesus was allowed to have His way, (3) Jesus was glorified in His work. Our past marriages should be evaluated in the light of these three things. If they come short we should ask God to divorce us from them. Any marriage contemplated should be approached similarly. If they can't come up to the standard we should never be united with it.
