

N orthwest College serves the Northwest area of the Assemblies of God, comprising the districts of Alaska, S. Idaho, Montana, Northwest, Oregon and Wyoming. The Board of Directors comes from these districts and includes the district officers, lay persons, Alumni President, Funding and Endowment Board Chairman and the College President. The Board totals thirty-one church leaders.

STATEMENT OF MISSION

Northwest College is on course. It continues in the direction in which it started over fifty years ago.

When its founders dreamed...prayed... planned...and worked to bring it into being, they resolved that Northwest would "...offer a thorough course of instruction in God's word to all students...provide for training pastors and evangelists...provide for training in Christian Education...foster missionary interest...help missionary candi-



dates prepare... provide training for ministry of music, chaplaincy, (and) teaching...encourage students to be filled with the spirit . . . live consistent lives...lead others Christ... form to wholesome, intellectual, social and spiritual attitudes...and prepare for citizenship in a P democracy and for active Christian service."

The historic faith is alive.

And, they wanted Northwest to "make a distinc-

tive contribution to Christian higher education and to the cause of Christ."

fter almost forty-five years of existence, the College was once again evaluated by an accreditation team representing the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges. In the crucial part of its report, when speaking of the purpose of Northwest the committee stated in part: "There is no question that these objectives determine all activities and the commitment of resources. Further, the desired outcomes *do* follow: the objectives are attained, the three are:

 Development of the whole person...
Inclusion of professional/vocational skills in the individuals' full development; and

3. Propagation of the historic faith

through the sponsoring church organization, the Assemblies of God.

These were the words of the Committee! How thankful we were to read them! They assured us...and the Higher Commission of the Association.

Now almost ten years later we are in selfevaluation again preparing for another visit from the same association. We again ask ourselves, "**are we on course?**" We believe we are! Northwest College is still doing what it was brought into being to do!

In its educational philosophy contained in its current catalog the College states: "...Its concept of education is distinctively Christian in the evangelical sense...It recognizes the authority of the Bible as a divine communication of truth. (Man is) a morally responsible being whose choices and actions determine his usefulness to his Creator and to his fellow men...As a creature of God, each man is an individual of intrinsic worth and dignity...Northwest has a commitment to truth...

mong the educational goals as presently conceived and presented in the College catalogue are such statements as "... Northwest seeks to cultivate Christian character in its students. It desires that each student shall maintain a right relationship to God and to his fellow men...Northwest is concerned with the intellectual development of its students...it endeavors to stimulate in its students a social and moral perceptiveness and realizes the importance of physical and mental fitness...In addition to the developing of the whole man...It recognizes a distinctive obligation to propagate the historic faith of the sponsoring church. Since its founding it has had and continues to have a particular concern for those vocational areas relating closely to the church's Great Commission."

The accrediting team found Northwest College's Statement of Purpose right up front in its catalog and basing its conclusion on it, said: "the desired outcomes <u>do</u> follow. . ." (The emphasis was theirs.)

Y es, we believe Northwest College <u>is</u> on course, as it has been from the beginning. We believe the desired outcomes <u>still</u> follow. And we <u>pray</u> God will help us to stay on course fulfilling its purpose.

MISSION: TRAINING

Key to a college such as Northwest is the word, training. NC seeks to provide more than an education (important as it is). NC seeks to provide opportunities for development of pro-



fessional and vocational skills. It seeks to make ministers of all of its students, believing God desires all believers to minister.

The model for training is Jesus, Himself, who chose students (disciples) to "be with Him." He instructed them; He showed them how;

All students are training for ministry, because God desires all believers to minister.

He sent them out; He evaluated their efforts. He *trained* them.

This is the task NC sees as its task!

In chapel, classroom, laboratory, library, Christian service of all kinds, internship and more, rich opportunities are provided to learn, to grow and to become a pastor, music director, missionary evan-

The options available to the student at NC vary from a oneyear Certificate of Christian Studies, to a two-year Associate of Arts Degree (serving as a basis for a

MISSION: PROPAGATING THE HISTORIC FAITH

Northwest College functions at the heart of the Great Commission. It is a school with a mission. It does seek to "propagate the historic faith."

In keeping with the great tradition of missions in the Northwest Region of the Assemblies of God, NC places strong emphasis on it...in the classroom...in chapel...in the missions convention. Its graduates are scattered around the world right now declaring the faith.

Across the region they are serving as pastors, as associate ministers, as pioneering pastors, as teachers, as church leaders. The high percentage of ordainees in each of the districts of the region each year attests to fulfillment of NC's mission to propagate the historic faith.

A recent survey of alumni showed that nearly 90 percent of the fouryear graduates went into the ministry fulltime or on to graduate studies, further preparing for ministry. The remaining 10 percent stated they were involved in lay ministry. Both groups rate their training received at NC "very high."

Increasingly, alumni of NC are finding

a place of leadership within the Assemblies of God beyond the local church. They serve in district offices, in national positions, and positions of leadership abroad. The record number of graduates of the immediate past years suggests this trend will increase.

Graduates of NC serve in a wide variety of places. Like Frank Cole, Northwest District Superintendent; Paul Goodman, Assistant Superintendent of Montana; Ron Dugone, Pastor of his home church in Idaho; Ken Benintendi, China Office Director in Hong Kong; John Sutton, Music Minister in Denver; Ray Noah, Christian Educations Director in Oregon, Dennis Davis, Pastor in Oregon; Kent Redfearn, a recent graduate, newly elected pastor of a large church in Anchorage. . . and the list goes on! Hundreds of them!

Over 11,000 have attended NC, been touched, developed and "sent." Over three-thousand have graduated. The influence of these lives in propagating the faith, in reaching the world with the gospel, in fulfilling the mission of NC...is unending!

SUPPORTING THE MISSION

riend of NC, after you have read this report, it's time to think . . . to talk directly "across the table" in an open way.

Do we really believe in NC's mission of: Personal Development of young lives? Training ministers wherever they will serve?

Propagating the historic faith?

The only real way we can answer this in the affirmative is to support NC in prayer and financially at the highest level we possibly can!

There are those who do! There is the Prayer and Living Endowment Fellowship...over 500 friends who pray for NC regularly and send at least \$25.00 per year around the time of their birthday. We need at least 1,000 prayer partners like this.

here is the Centurion Group, individuals who have committed to give a thousand or more dollars to NC each year. This group is growing. We need at least 100 Centurions.


here is the Funding and Endowment Board, professional people who are deeply committed to helping NC. They are training to be liaison friends of the College. They will be conducting seminars and contacting donors and encouraging them to give directly now and in wills and trusts. Already they have been a great blessing although the board has been in existence only a year and one-half.

M any churches of the Northwest area have written NC into their monthly budget. Some contribute substantially. But here I must speak directly. The percentage of churches which support regularly is far below what it should be and can be.

We should do at home what we do abroad. Most overseas missions work of our church now is training nationals. We "exported" the idea and it is working! But we need to see it as the thing to do at home, too. Missions support knows no boundaries! God's Son came to the world and told us to go to the world. May God help us to see this.

The Facts

The fact is our church is paying a smaller share of the education cost at NC now than it did in the past. Contributions levels have risen; but they have not kept pace with the cost levels. Note this: In 1970-1971 the contributors equaled 17.25 percent of the educational costs. In 1985-1986 they equaled 9.86 percent.



If the contributions had kept pace with costs they would be at twice the level they now are. Note this: Student Contributions Contributions Tuition as percent actual to & Fees of Total General Fund 1970-1971 \$39,195 17.35% \$83,398 1985-1986 \$2,505,865 9.86%

To have remained at 17.35 percent of the total contributions would have had to be \$526,035!

percent contributions at least. That would have been \$1,670,576. And think of this: One seminary of a solidly fundamental persuasion receives 80 percent of its support from contributions, endowment and other nonstudent sources. The students are asked to pay only 20 percent. Clearly the Assemblies of God and Northwest College has a long way to go in demonstrating its financial support of
