

From the President

A New Year Under Way ...My 23rd at N.C.

The applications had rolled in at a record rate compared to recent years. The number of students who planned to return was up, too. As the year approached excitement and anticipation could be felt all across campus...in the offices...the residence halls...the cafeteria...everywhere. But projections were guarded...they always are. One can't count the students until they have actually checked in.

Some thought we would be up by fifty (50), reaching 626. Some thought seventy-five (75), reaching 651. One dared to suggest ninety-nine (99), reaching 675. I didn't dare to think that high. Projections based on previous percentages actually showed the lower of those figures, 626.

When all the students had registered and were accounted for, including the night classes, the total reached 689, a gain of 19.5%.

The excitement of anticipation transformed into a euphoria of realization. No one had suggested, or even dared to think we would jump, 113 students. But we did! Materialization on new applications was the highest in years!

The applications had suggested the number of men would be up most. And they are. Actually the ratio is now 352 men and 337 women, a good balance across campus.

Most importantly, it is sensed the quality of students is high, too. And the spirit of revival pervades the campus, expressed by lively praise in chapel, an impressive Fall Revival with Rich Guerra, of Sacramento,

California and a spontaneous, student-led prayer march circling the campus at the beginning of the year.

What wonderful signs these are as N.C. prepares to do its part in the Decade of Harvest.

The Theme is "Called..."

For a number of years we have selected a theme for the year. This year it is "Called..." It provides a point of emphasis for chapel ministry, for the Fall Revival and for the Missions Convention, when it will be "Called to the Harvest."

The theme fits the year, it seems, when so many have heard the call of the Spirit and have enrolled at N.C. We could hardly have foreseen the strong enrollment when we agreed on the theme early in the spring!

Friends and Alumni Banquet A Success

The class of 1938 returned to celebrate fifty years. Other classes celebrated their decade, or twenty-fifth or fifth in reunions. Hundreds of friends of the College joined in to fill the banquet hall at the Four Seasons Olympic Hotel in Seattle to over-flowing. It was a great evening with "A Nostaglic Look At 50 Years: 1938-1988."

The slide and image magnification presentation captured attention recalling old scenes and showing current campus views. The interviews with representative alumni from the reunion classes and Mrs. Anna Ness and Mrs. C.E. Butterfield were

Students In Ministry

Student Fulfills MAPS Assignment to Africa

The northern part of Ghana, Africa is mainly Moslem in religious belief. The Assemblies of God has a Bible School in the large village of Kumbungu, where 8,000 people live. "My MAPS assignment was to organize the library, help in the Friday night children's service, teach in the religious classes in the public schools, and help in two crusades," said Darlene Barker. She spent

two months in this hot climate working with missionary David Vespa and his family.

A number of things made a strong impact on Darlene's life. They were:

- 1. The poverty and number of beggars,
- 2. The reality of death, as someone died almost daily,
- 3. The shock of seeing how children are not considered for salvation, and
- 4. The strong belief of the pastors for God to perform miracles of healing. She saw a number take place, including a deaf person who was able to hear after prayer.

Darlene's call to Ghana was reconfirmed as she had the privilege of ministering there for two months. She testifys, "I thank God for the opportunity to go there this summer."

Evangelism Leader Is "Fired Up"

Participation in the Chicago Outreach sponsored by the Illinois District gave Atapana Mamea, the leader of the evangelism ministry group at Northwest, a new outlook on the ministry of evangelism by Northwest College students.

"Pana," as he is known to his fellow students, has led the evangelism group at N.C. for three years. This summer's experience gave new enthusiasm as well as practical insight as to the "how" of evangelism in the inner-city.

After two days of classes in street witnessing and follow-up this fall, the group made a "prayer-walk" through the area in which they would be witnessing. As Pana tells it, this experience made him more aware that the task of evangelism is a "spiritual battle." He also has a new appreciation for the people leading the outreach and finds most impressive the fact that it was the "older people" leading the outreach. The renewed knowledge that evangelism is not a concern of the "young" alone is helping him to see the involvement of the whole of the church in evangelism, from student to district official.

It is through experiences like those found in the student ministry organizations at Northwest and outreaches like the one in which Pana participated that future ministers are inspired and formed to carry on the task of evangelism.

N.C. Students Serve At Remote Alaskan Village

Mark and Shelley Hollis were MAPS workers in Point Hope, Alaska this summer. This Eskimo village is located at the end of a 20-mile gravel spit sticking out into the Arctic Ocean. It was almost continuous daytime for the entire two months as the village is 370 miles north of the Arctic Circle. Over half of the 500 inhabitants are children.

Culture shock was the first thing Mark and Shelley had to deal with. For the first four

weeks, the men of the village were frequently hositle, often telling them to go home as they were not welcome. The children were friendly and they opened the door. "We played ball together and they would visit our apartment over the church, anytime and without knocking!" the Hollis' reported.

The strong superstitions of the Inupiat Eskimos make it difficult to reach them with the Gospel. The cultural hold is strong. They will listen to the message of Christ and just add it to their beliefs. Mark had the opportunity to

preach one service per Sunday. Mark and Shelley's ministry also involved visitation and repair work on the church building.

The people of the village don't live by the clock. They are never in a hurry about anything. The extreme cold of winter has made them adapt. This is reflected in their personal relationships. It was a joy for Mark and Shelley to see them open up and invite them into their homes the last four weeks of their assignment.

Mark and Shelley feel the call of God to pioneer a new work in another village of the Inupiat people. Mark has already talked to the District Superintendent of Alaska about their plans following graduation from Northwest College. He is thankful for the missions training he and Shelley have received.

N.C. Elementary Education Graduates Go Into All The World

There have now been four graduating classes of students from Northwest College with Elementary Education as their major. Many of these students have taken positions across the Northwest and overseas.

Lisa Etulain, a graduate of 1987, felt a calling into public schools. To pursue her calling she was "ready to go anywhere." Through the Career Fair at the Tacoma Dome she met the personnel representatives from the Walla Walla School District. After an interview Lisa was hired by that district and is now in her second year there. She loves her work and feels that Northwest College gave her a thorough preparation for teaching in public schools. Lisa said, "I hold my own against graduates of Eastern Washington University."

This past spring four of our graduates took positions with Christian schools overseas. Two went to Guam, one to Okinawa, and one to the Dominican Republic. Each year more positions are open to our graduates in the Christian school ministry than can possibly be filled.

Thank God for the impact of N.C. Elementary Education teachers--here in America as well as overseas--in both the public and Christian schools. If predictions are correct, there will be an increasing shortage of elementary teachers in the years to come. Northwest has begun its program for just "such a time as this." N.C.'s Elementary Education program is certified by the state of Washington for kindergarten through the eighth grade, and all of our graduates do student teaching in public schools.







Scholarships Make It Possible

Tangen Memorial Scholarship

A memorial scholarship honoring the lives and ministries of Robert B. and Mildred E. Tangen has been established to perpetuate their ministry by providing scholarships for young men and women attending Northwest College.

Six months after their graduation from N.C. and their wedding, Robert and Mildred Tangen sailed for China to begin work as missionaries in that distant land. Before they were able to finish language training, war broke out and they were ordered to evacuate to the Philippines. While there, the Philippine islands were bombed and occupied, and they were taken as prisoners of war when Mildred was four months pregnant. She gave birth to their first-born son in a P.O.W. camp and they were eventually able to return to the U.S. when their son was three years old. After a year and one half at home, they returned to China with two little boys. After two years they were again forced out of China when the Cultural Revolution began. They pastored for several years in Seattle before Robert passed away. Mildred returned to missionary service for six years with the Chinese people on the island of Taiwan.

The adversities and challenges that this couple faced in missionary service were astounding, but because of their love and commitment to God and His work, they kept going and answered the call of God.

Family and friends of the Tangens have made an initial contribution to endow this memorial scholarship so that earnings can be used each year to assist others in getting their training for missionary service. Scholarships will be awarded to students at Northwest College who show outstanding ministry potential and who are majoring in missions.

Additional contributions to the Tangen Memorial Scholarship Fund can be made at any time by other friends of the Tangens and Northwest College. Who knows, the next scholarship recipient may be a future missionary to China.

Memorial Scholarship Established Honoring Dan Wolf

In April of 1965, while he was a student at Northwest College, Dan Wolf was tragically killed while working at a gas station in Seattle. Dan was talented musically and was active in music ministry in high school and college.

His father, Mr. George S. Wolf of Seattle, Washington, has recently established the Daniel Sidney Wolf Memorial Scholarship for incoming freshmen to Northwest

College who indicate a desire to major in church music, and who have outstanding academic qualifications. Mr. George Wolf, himself a talented musician and outstanding poet, feels that the memorial scholarships are a tremendous way to invest in the lives of young people with not only musical talent but those who exhibit strong character, academic excellence, and a commitment to one's fellow man.

Musical talent runs deep in the Wolf family in that Mr. Wolf's son, Don Wolf, is the Minister of Instrumental Music at the Carpenter's Church in Lakeland, Florida.

A Daniel Sidney Wolf Memorial Scholarship was awarded this year to Gary Shatswell of Modesto, California. Gary is a


