# From the President

# "FOR THE STUDENTS"

Northwest College exists for Christ and His people! It is for the students, so many of whom have a ministry call on their lives, and all of whom are encouraged to think of life ministry regardless of their chosen occupation.

Key campus developments are now in progress and will soon be finished "For the Students." including:

- I. A total refurbishing of the student center exterior.
- 2. The development of part of the academic quad, between the library, the student center and Millard Hall (including much needed new stairs).
- 3. An all new athletic field for soccer and intramurals.
- 4. New tennis court surfaces. How they have needed it!

The cost of these projects is \$154,000.

Is is believed that the Friends of Northwest would like to step forward one more time and pay for these developments "For the Students."

These developments are well underway as I pen these lines and should be nearly all finished (except for final landscaping) by the time they are read. What changes they make!

The student center was the only building on campus when the college acquired the property 30 years ago. It is structurally sound. The building has had interior work and rearrangement several times having served as cafeteria, classroom and library in times past. It may get more interior

adjustments as use needs change. But the renovation of the exterior makes it look like a new building.

Located at the center of the campus, it will serve as a new "frontispiece" for the college, the main building one looks at as he drives up the new entrance.

The new athletic field is located at the center of the lower campus, too, and right next to the single student residential area. It will receive much use for soccer, intramurals and other activities. Automatic sprinklers are installed so that a high quality playing turf can be maintained.

The academic quad is located between the library, Millard Hall and the student center. Eventually it will be a lovely arrangement of plazas, benches, conversational areas and

planting strips. The current developments will fit into the long-range plans. The quad will be the academic center of the campus.

And the tennis courts! How often we have had requests for their resurfacing! Installed when the college first moved to Kirkland they have long needed re-development. Now they will get it. No more turned ankles and balls bouncing unpredictably. Tennis will be fun again and the students will love those who make this possible.

So the projects are underway. The Board of Directors acted in faith and said. "Do it! We're sure that the Friends of NC will pay for them."

These projects are not "income producers." Therefore, they have to be paid for "as we go."

- A Pastoral Ministries laboratory and prayer chapel including a baptistry, wedding and funeral equipment, and audio visual equipment.
  - A state-of-the-art interactive classroom accommodting from 12 up to 120 persons and equipped with audio at each student position, video for receiving and sending and interactive communications technology. It will permit receiving lectures from or sending them to other sites and even

permit simultaneous classes jointly conducted between the campus and off campus sites. It will be designed to serve the continuing education needs of the church.

# FINANCIAL RESOURCE GOALS

Serve the needs and desires of the church and the students by:


- 1. Expanding the Founders Fund, the long term endowment fund of the college, to \$20,000,000.
- 2. Increasing college generated student financial aid to equal 20 percent of all tuition.
- 3. Increasing designated and endowed student financial aid to equal 20 percent of all tuition.
- 4. Developing all financial aid so that students on the average pay no more than 60 percent of their tuition costs.
- 5. Endowing two faculty chairs.
- 6. Increasing the support from alumni, friends, churches, sponsoring districts and interested foundations.
- 7. Building the strategic support group of friends of Northwest College Centurions contributing a total of \$100,000 per year.

# STUDENT MINISTRY GOALS

Serve the needs and desires of the church and students by:

- 1. Appointing a full time Decade of Harvest and Student Ministries Director at the college.
- 2. Securing total student participation as prayer partners in the Decade of Harvest.
- 3. Equipping and sending a student Decade of Harvest church planting team to each district of our region annually.
- 4. Developing a sequenced Christian service, internship, practicum and field education student ministry program integrated with the academic program and the life service goals of the students. Christian service then will have entry, intermediate and advanced levels. This will result in a personal placement file covering the academic work, Christian service and leadership development of each student.

# PASTOR AL MUNGER NAMED COLLEGE PASTOR-IN-RESIDENCE

Pastor Al Munger has been named Pastor-in-Residence at Northwest College by President Hurst. Pastor Munger served Christ Memorial Church in Poulsbo for thirty-three years. He and his wife Erika will live in the Firs, the married student housing complex of the campus. Pastor Munger has an office in the student center and is available to the students for counsel and prayer. He will speak in chapel regularly and in residence hall devotions.

"This is an exciting and new concept for Northwest College,"--President Hurst said in announcing the appointment, "Pastor AI is a pastor at heart. He will have little assignment but to be 'available to the students' with Bible in hand, a warm heart, and a readiness to spend time with stu-

dents. And living in the Firs will be special for Pastor and Mrs. Munger as they will be available to the married students, so many of whom will soon be in ministry themselves, and are now in their final formative years."

Erika Munger will coordinate the services of the "Pantry", the married student "food bank." Erika is excited about this opportunity to serve the students working alongside Pastor Al.

The following additional aspects of Pastor Al's job description highlight the key role he will have on campus:

- Serve under the President and in a collaborative role with the Dean of Students.
- Symbolize and model the highest possible spiritual life, commitment and ministry in a constant visible presence on campus.
- Serve during the weeks of the school year when classes are in session.
- Serve as a mature "pastor figure" on campus who is available to students for one-on-one conference, spiritual counsel and encouragement.
- Augment the efforts of the administration and faculty as all seek to promote total spiritual life and growth on campus.


