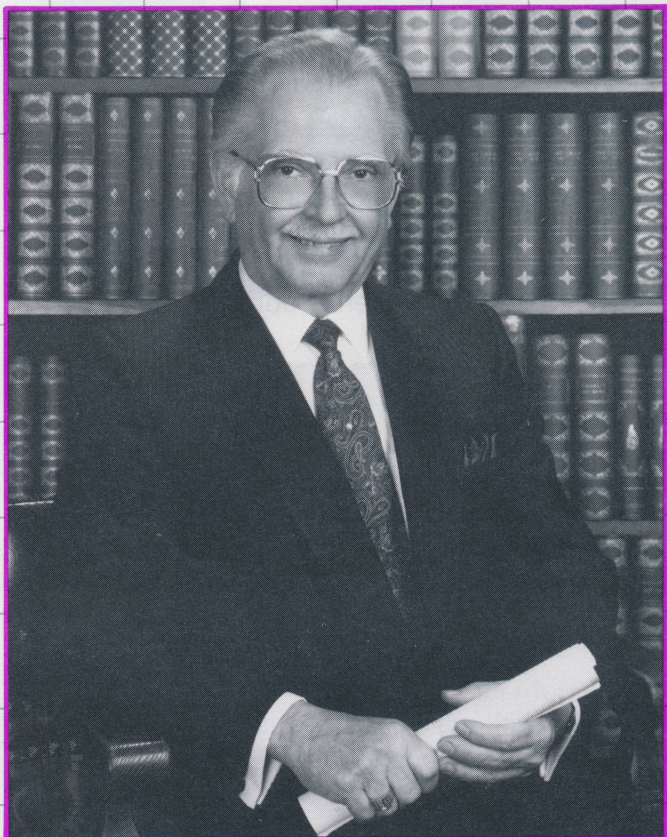

President Hurst's Retirement Announced

During the semi-annual meeting of the Board of Directors in late November of 1989, President Hurst read a letter expressing his desire to step down from the presidency in mid-summer 1990. The president was first elected in the board meeting of January 11-13, 1966. Thus, at his retirement which will officially occur August 15 of this year, he will have been identified with the College as its senior administrator for nearly a quarter century.

Commenting on the President's unusual record of tenure and accomplishment over the nearly 25 years that he has served as president, chairman of the Board, Rev. Eugene Born, said, "Under President Hurst's leadership a considerable number of achievements have been realized at the College. His tenure as president stands as something of a record in itself."

Chairman Born further stated, "In his tenure Dr. Hurst has led in enlarging the campus from its original 35 to the present 60 acres. Both campus development and academic development have continued throughout his tenure. His administrative and leadership skills are widely recognized and are evidenced in the financial stability Northwest College has enjoyed. He has blended the region including Montana, Southern Idaho, Alaska, Wyoming and Washington, as well as Oregon, into a strong supporting unit for Northwest College. Working with him the Board of Directors has exhibited a remarkable cohesiveness throughout this quarter century."

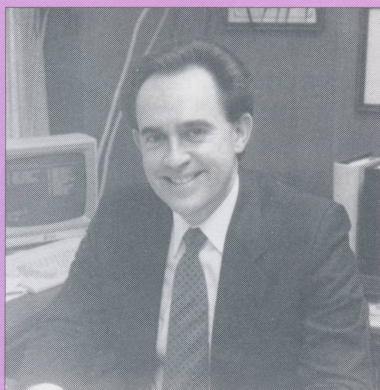
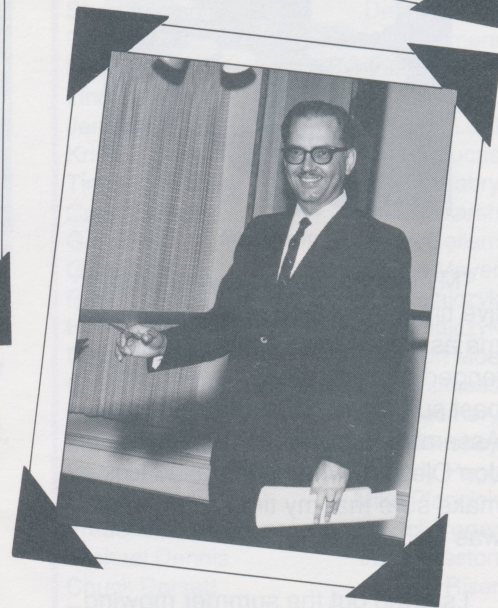
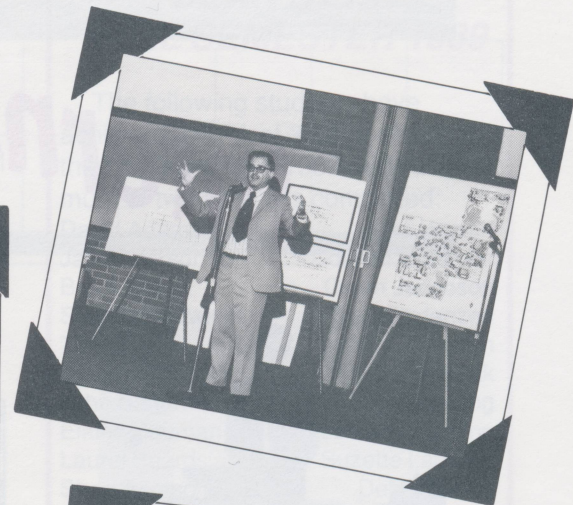
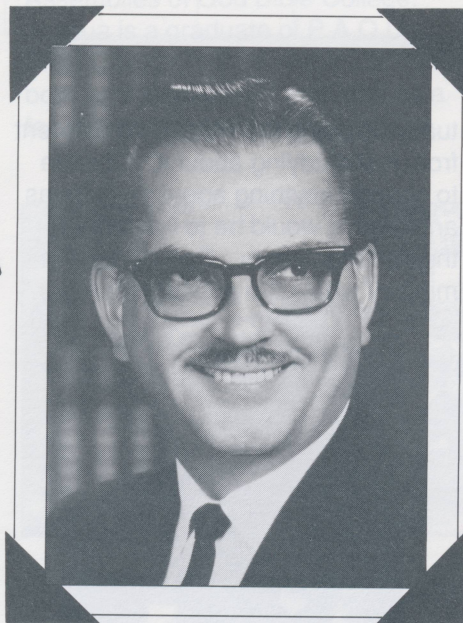
An administrator with forty years experience at Northwest College, Dr. Amos Millard said, "In the spiritual development of the College the President has sought to work closely with the students in their college chapel services, and in spiritual emphasis weeks with the objective of bringing before the students and faculty the leaders from out in the 'market place' of ministry together with the values and reason-for-being of the Pentecostal movement and the Assemblies of God."

How does the President view his role in the long range work and history of Northwest College? He readily acknowledges the distinctive roles of his predecessors, Dr. Henry H. Ness, founding president, who served almost 16 years, and Dr. C. E. Butterfield, who served as president for 17 years prior to Dr. Hurst's presidency. He significantly finds the integration principle in the classic words of the Apostle Paul, "I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the increase. We are fellow workers for God." (1 Cor. 3:6-8)

When asked what he would do when he retires, he said, "I'll be around," with a twinkle in his eye. He expects to spend considerable time in the work of the Pacific Rim Centre, he hinted, and speak, consult, and write. "I have been invited to consult with an association of Bible colleges," he added. It will indeed be difficult for President Hurst to resign himself to the proverbial "rocking chair."

In his letter of intent to retire he commented on his warm relationship and work with the College board and the many constituencies of the College. Notwithstanding the board's invitation to him to continue on as long as he desires, he said, "I believe the time has come for me to step aside as President. God has graciously blessed our joint efforts as we have sought to fulfill His purposes for the College. I believe it is time for someone else to assume the leadership of Northwest College. Whoever is chosen will have my blessing and help in whatever way can best be given."

Randy Barton Elected Mayor of Kirkland

On January 2nd, in its regular meeting, the City Council elected Randy Barton to a two-year term as mayor of Kirkland. Having served two years on the Houghton Community Council (a sub-council of the

city), and two years on the city council, fellow members asked him to let his name stand for election as mayor.

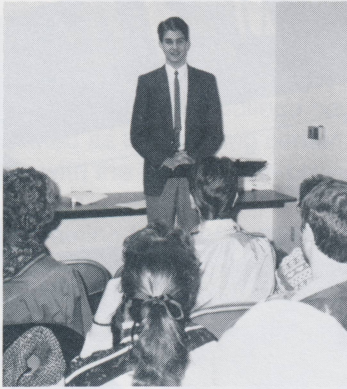
Kirkland has a Council/City Manager form of government. Hence, the mayor serves as chairperson of the Council, presides at city functions, represents the city at ceremonial functions, relates to the city manager in behalf of the Council, represents the city in county and inter-jurisdictional meetings, and performs various other duties as the city's chief citizen. The City Manager, the Chief Executive Officer of the city, runs it under the direction of the Council.

This is the second time an administrator of the college has been called upon to serve as mayor. President Hurst served on the council twelve years and as mayor four of

those years. In commenting on Randy's election the President said, "He is very qualified out of his legal, administrative, and ministerial backgrounds to serve the city in this way. We are honored that he has been chosen by his fellow council members. This speaks well of the acceptance Northwest College has in this thriving suburb of 35,000. Randy has displayed a quickness to grasp issues in a comprehensive way and to handle a heavy work load with seeming ease. He and his wife Bobbi will represent all of us at Northwest College well."

In commenting on his election, Randy said, "Our challenge is to be able to manage our growth and maintain the quality of life we've had in Kirkland. I believe growth, development, and quality of life can co-exist."

An internship is a necessary complement to classroom work. To ac-

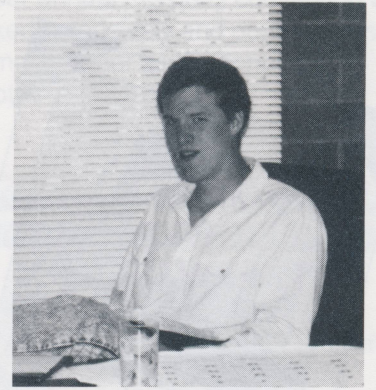

NORTHWEST COLLEGE TEAMS WITH DIVISION OF FOREIGN MISSIONS

A new venture in missions jointly sponsored by Northwest College and the Division of Foreign Missions of the Assemblies of God is being launched, President D. V. Hurst announced at the College recently.

The program will carry the name, "Pacific Rim Centre for Cross-Cultural Studies" with the College being designated as the working center and partner with the DFM for the project.

The training focus of the program will be cross-cultural studies, a training focus which expresses the missionary outreach of the church in the contemporary scene, it was explained. The geographic focus will be the "Pacific Rim," encompassing the broad sweep of peoples from the U.S. to the Asian continent and the South Pacific, an area which encompasses the largest populations on earth today. The College is suitably located and equipped to meet this challenge.



President Hurst signed a "Covenant of Ministry" helping launch the Pacific Rim Centre.

The Board of the Division of Foreign Missions and the Board of the College have approved a very significant "Covenant of Ministry" which states how the two entities will work together in promoting the mission of

the church through the training and appointment of career specialists. The primary target will be the training and sending of teachers of English as a second language to such countries as the People's Republic of China, Dr. Hurst explained.

The industrialization and internationalization of Asia is certain to open and maintain channels of communication and commerce which are opportune for reaching the world's largest populations in ways that traditional missions have never touched, it was explained.

Over the years, due to its location and its philosophy of institutional mission, Northwest College has trained a considerable number of Asian and South Pacific nationals for Christian ministry.

Dr. Hurst, who will be retiring from the presidency of the College after nearly 25 years, plans to give continued attention to the venture. Interestingly, the Pacific Rim represents the field over which his late brother, the Reverend Dr. Wesley Hurst, served as Field Director for the Division of Foreign Missions. President Hurst, who has traveled and ministered extensively around the Pacific Rim during his tenure at the College, has observed the need "first hand." He has stated, "Interestingly, both Rev. Robert Houlihan, my brother's replacement as Field Director, and I had been thinking along these same

lines separately. When he ministered in our annual missions convention we talked extensively and our thoughts came together as if planned by another."

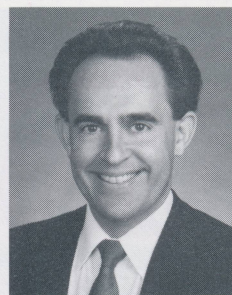
BOARD AFFIRMS BIBLE COLLEGE FUTURE FOR NORTHWEST

"At a time when much discussion has been held in the forum of the Bible College movement concerning the distinctives that qualify a Christian College as a Bible College, the Northwest College Board of Directors took a significant action to go on record as committing the College to continue seeking to qualify as a Bible College," President D. V. Hurst said today. The Board's statement was to give "its firm instruction that Northwest College continue to seek to qualify for AABC accreditation, that the administration, Academic Planning Commission, faculty and Academic Affairs Committee in all of their deliberations concerning academic programs development and enrichment, keep this directive in mind..."

The president stated, "This action does not preclude the College from developing new majors or programs which may be directed towards fields other than professional ministerial training. But it does require that the qualifying distinctives for Bible College accreditation be met through the maintenance of curriculum requirements making a minimum of 30 semester hours of Bible and Theology a central requirement for all disciplines leading to a baccalaureate degree and the requiring of Christian service as an integral part of all disciplines in the College. The action essentially affirms the College's commitment to its historical purpose and character dating back to its founding 56 years ago. It also affirms the validity and the intensified need of the College's historical Christian mission in the contemporary world today, just as it acknowledges and affirms the continuing and unchanging purpose of the Church in a changing world," the president said.

PRESIDENT HURST MAKES \$110,000 RETIREMENT GIFTS

At the time of his recent announcement of plans to retire from Northwest College as its President, Dr. D. V. Hurst gifted \$110,000 out of family resources to the Northwest College Endowment fund by establishing three separate charitable remainder annuity trusts. These trusts eventually will establish endowed scholarships for students.

The Northwest College Endowment Fund is one of the largest and fastest growing of such funds of any Bible college in the United States. In keeping with the nature of such trusts the gift will provide earnings income for family members during retirement years. Upon their demise the entire corpus of each trust will provide the scholarships and meet other ministry needs on the Northwest College campus.

Vice President for Development, Randy Barton, states, "Normally, an institution or college makes a retirement gift to its president. It's fantastic that Dr. Hurst has shown his commitment to Northwest College, not only during his over 24 years of service, but even in his retirement."

Charitable remainder trusts are a great way for individuals who are planning on leaving charitable gifts at their death to receive current tax benefits for those gifts, reduce asset management responsibilities, receive an income for the rest of their lives and avoid costly probates. A remainder trust works especially well for an individual who has appreciated

real estate or stocks or other assets that would generate income taxes if sold. Individuals interested in charitable remainder trusts should contact the Development Office of Northwest College.
