WHAT'S HAPPENING?

So often I am asked, "What's happening at N.C.?"

Well, I'm glad you asked. Let me tell you.

Enrollment is up!

In the fall we had 671, which was down slightly from the year previous. But in the winter quarter we now have 715. This is an increase of forty-four, twice as large an increase from fall to winter as we have had in the last twenty years. Much of the increase is Freshmen . . . thirty-one more than last year.

These are students studying the Word of God . . . gaining knowledge . . . developing skills . . . growing . . . and preparing to serve Christ and His church! *I'm encouraged!*

The academic program has been improved.

As we have reported before, the Elementary Education major is in place . . . approved for the next five years by the State of Washington. Seventy students are enrolled in the program and we had our first graduate last year.

The new Behavioral Sciences major is in place. A total of sixty-seven students are enrolled in this, the first year of the major.

Next year we launch our new Christian Formation program of classes. They will include classes in: Foundations of the Christian Life, Evangelism in the Christian Life and Prayer and Worship. Also, we have a Women in Ministry course. All Freshmen will take the first two their first year. This program is designed to give direction and experience in Christian growth right in the classroom.

We are converting to semesters next year. Classes will start September 8, right after Labor Day. The first semester will conclude December 18. The advantages of the semester plan to the students are many. One of the chief ones is to get a "jump" on the summer jobs in early May and a full four months of summer in which to work. As a part of the semester conversion process we have made many improvements in the curriculum.

The Funding and Endowment Board is developing.

It had its first meeting in late October. Included were representatives from Montana,

Idaho, Washington and Alaska. Additional members are joining the Board. Materials are being prepared for them. We believe this unique Board will mean much to the churches and to N.C. as they start visiting the churches and working with potential donors.

The Endowment is growing.

As Dr. Randy Barton reports regularly in his column, the endowment is growing as sizeable gifts are being made, especially gifts of appreciated property. This is a way wherein the donor can benefit greatly personally and benefit the school, too.

The total endowment, the Founders Fund, should soon reach one and one-half million. What a blessing it is and will be!

The spiritual tide on campus is strong.

I'm pleased with what is taking place amongst the students. I wish all the friends of N.C. could visit one of the worship chapels and see and participate. I know they would be encouraged, too!

Potential students are inquiring about N.C.

Our Vice President-at-Large, Rich Wilkerson, is telling the story. The District Youth Directors of the Northwest region are, too. And young people are asking about N.C., what it offers, and making decisions to come this way.

The need for ministers, evangelists, missionaries, associates, teachers and trained lay workers has never been so great. The field is the world. The harvest is ripe. As a friend of N.C., I encourage you to urge young people to ask God if, indeed, He has a place for them in the harvest field. Who knows? Maybe great things will happen in the lives of young people at N.C. whom you encouraged to enroll next year. It can happen!

Together we can continue to make good things happen at N.C.

We are reading the Bible.

Our Vice President-at-Large, Rich Wilkerson, and I challenged all on campus to read the Bible through during the school year. He worked out a schedule and we published it. All received a copy (faculty and students). It's

interesting and helpful to be involved this way . . . to speak from the portion being read . . . to read sections in chapel services, etc. And the discussion many times in committee meetings and in personal association goes to the chapters of the day before. Talk about edifying! What could mean more?

So, good things are happening at N.C. More next month!


The goal of Northwest College is to provide the worship atmosphere and the spiritual challenges to develop a dynamic well-rounded Christian attitude for life and service.




