More Emphasis on Serving Students

The Executive Committee of the Board, at their September 1990 meeting, authorized that an audit be done to ascertain the effectiveness of our recruiting and retention here at the College. D. H. Dagley Associates, of Atlanta, Georgia, conducted the audit interviewing all of the administrators, selected faculty members and 14 students. Their findings were extremely insightful and helpful.

At their fall meeting, the Board of Directors, through the committee process, all studied the Dagley report. The Board authorized the President to reorganize the administrative arm of the college to more effectively meet the recruiting and enrollment challenges of the College.

A new department has been established for ENROLLMENT SERVICES. At the writing of this report, the Director of Enrollment Services has not yet been identified. The D. H. Dagley Associates have been contracted to provide limited services for the six month period, beginning March 1, 1991, which will include selecting the new director, the selection of the recruiters, and the restructuring of this new office which will include: recruiting, admissions, and financial planning.

There has been a retitling of two other administrative offices. The Office of Business Affairs will be renamed the Office of Administrative Services. The Development office will be called the Office of Advancement.

Owen Hodges, who has faithfully served again in the role as acting Vice President for Business Affairs, requested that he be relieved of his duties assumes his role of semi-retirement and part time work basis in the Job Placement/Search Office. His request has been honored in the realignment process.

Dr. Cal White, who has been serving as Director of Admissions and Records, has moved into the position of Vice President for Administrative Services, which includes the Business Office, the maintenance supervision, grounds supervision, and food and housing on the campus.

Dr. Randy Barton's title has been changed from Vice President for Development to Vice President for College Advancement. He will continue, in his office, to oversee college development, the fund raising activities, the Alumni Association and will also assume the responsibility of publications, public relations and church relations.


Jacqualyn Randolph has assumed the new position as Registrar. She will continue as a part-time faculty member along with overseeing the registrar and records responsibility in that office.

All of this re-alignment and restructuring is going on for one purpose and this is to better serve the student. This College does not exist for self-serving of administrators, faculty or the President, but is here to serve the student and to equip them for wherever God will direct them in their life, occupation and service. This has been the motivation behind these realignments in administration and function and we dedicate ourselves to this high calling.

Foster To Return To Pastoral Ministry

Reverend Bob Foster, who has served at Northwest College for the last five years as Assistant to the President for College Relations, will be leaving the College on June 1, 1991, with plans to return to pastoral ministry. Bob served NC effectively in all areas of public relations and student recruitment including: publications, printing, advertising (magazine, College handbook, newspaper, television and radio), choir scheduling, summer ministry team scheduling and training, field representation and editing the "Northwest", the College's bi-monthly magazine.

The administrative position, Assistant to the President for College Relations, is being phased out as part of an administrative reorganization plan that has been in progress since November 1990. Two new positions are being established and staffed. The new Director of Public Relations will work under the Vice President for Advancement, Dr. Randy Barton.—The other new post, the Director of anrollment Services, will be an

administrative position overseeing recruitment, admissions and financial planning.


"I'm thrilled to see these changes come," commented Foster, "and I believe that this emphasis on student recruitment with personnel, time, budget, training and organization, along with the addition of new majors, will help NC realize its enrollment goal of 1000 students by the year 2000." Reverend Foster also expressed his excitement in returning to pastoral ministry saying, "I've never lost my pastor's heart and love for people." Foster returns to a field of ministry with which he is familiar. since he served twelve years in pastoral and district ministry before coming to NC.

President Dennis Davis stated, "It has been my privilege to know Bob Foster before he came to Northwest College and to observe his life and ministry. He is a quality individual and one of the finest Christian gentlemen with whom I have had the privilege to know and work. He has been a blessing to the College during his years of service and has been a particular blessing to me in my transitioning into this office."

Throughout this region, Bob has impacted the lives of many as he has so well represented Northwest College. He has established himself as a friend to many of our pastors and to a great number of young people with whom he has worked closely in their areas of summer ministry and representing NC. Bob will be missed as a member of the Administrative Team here at the College and we wish him, Mary Lu and the children God's best as he transitions back into pastoral ministry after five years of service here at Northwest College."

Dr. J. Melvyn Ming, who served at Northwest College as Vice President for Academic Affairs, from 1985 through 1988, and a member of the faculty since 1976, has committed to return to Northwest College beginning the 1991-92 academic year.

Dr. Ming has spent the last three years serving as Academic Dean at the Asia Pacific Theological Seminary, formerly known as FEAST. Dr. Ming and his family will continue their leadership with APTS until August 15, 1991.

Upon his return to the United States, he will assume his responsibilities at the college, serving as coordinator for the majors of Christian Education and Youth Ministries. He will also provide strategic leadership in the area of Internship and Placement for all Church Min-

istries majors. His service as a liaison to the churches and pastors of our constituency will be of great benefit to the Northwest College student who wants effective internship and placement experience in preparation for Decade of Harvest ministry.

His tenure in a cross cultural ministries assignment at APTS will enrich Northwest College in its ongoing commitment to the ministry challenges presented by the Pacific Rim. Dr. Ming has stated that he is enthusiastic about his return to mininistry and leadership which will mit him to have direct and meaningful contact with students, faculty and the broader constituency of Northwest College.

1991 Missions Convention

The annual Missions Convention was held on the campus of Northwest College February 2-8, 1991. Our theme this year was "FULLY COMMITTED...to the Lost."

Featured events during the week included a Kickoff Brunch on Saturday, a Missionfest Display in Dickey Plaza, a Global Prayer-a-Thon, and morning and evening services held daily in the C.E. Butterfield Chapel.

We were delighted to have Dr. Eleazer Javier, General Superintendent of the Assemblies of God in the Philippines, as our principal speaker for the convention. The entire campus community was touched again with our call to reach the lost as Dr. Javier challenged us with his inspiring messages. Also participating in the services throughout the week were numerous missionaries, many of NC's international students, and our own Missions professors and student leaders. Many of our guests were Northwest alumni.

Our Faith Promise Commitments for February 1991 - January 1992 were received from students and faculty on the final two mornings.

The Faith Promises this year totalled over \$20,000, a sizable increase over last year's commitment. Most of the money received will be used in one of three ways:

Nineteen students, under the supervision of Professor Larry Malcolm, spent the entire spring break ministering in inner-city Philadelphia, PA with the staff of New Life Church pastored by Rev. Tony McCreary. They left from the NC Campus at 4:30 a.m. March 2nd and returned at midnight on March 10th, weary but changed for the rest of their lives.

Let me share some excerpts from their daily diaries:

Saturday, March 2nd

The only thing I felt during the initial tour of the city was complete shock. I wanted to cry, but all I could do was sit and stare out the windows as we passed by countless drug dealers, prostitutes, broken-down burned-out buildings, and TRASH...it was just piles and piles everywhere I looked. So right now inside I feel angry and shocked, because this is America.

Sunday, March 3rd

Today we went and picked up all e boys and girls for church. They are so ragged and smelly, but I've never seen more beautiful faces and been more touched by a child in my life. They just mob you, looking for any little bit of love they can get. The service was incredible. Caren Emery.

Monday, March 4th

Today was Monday and we started out the day with a prayer meeting at 5:30 a.m.. That's very early! Today Caren and I sorted clothes that had been given to the church. It took all day long. It was really sad to see most of the clothes that people brought in. 90% of the clothes were just rejects. People are so materialistic they will never give something good for others.

Tuesday, March 5th

Well, today started at 5:30 again...I worked with William on construction. I had a really fun day. I also went visiting to the projects. 18 stories full of people. It was so oppressive and bleak! There was graffiti all over the walls that was really bad. There were crack vials on the ground.

Wednesday, March 6th

Today I worked with William again...He just got out of prison one month ago...He's working for the church now. It's so incredible to see how much God changes people's lives. I think the Lord is teaching me to be accepting (of others)...Jennifer Johnson.

Thursday, March 7th

On our day off we visited the historical sites where our nation was birthed.

Friday, March 8th

A small child with dark eyes watches the action on Third and Delancy. Her brothers are either outside or trying to get some sleep. Mother is crashed out on the floor. senseless. To this child God has the face of a great loveable beagle named Snoopy* who bounded into her life last fall with candy, games, singing and Bible stories. He brings laughter and joy to the streets and hope for the future, and reason to keep on reaching skyward, knowing there is a God in heaven who loves and hears and cares...Laura Neumayer.

In 1989 Coach Brodin was named the National Christian College Division II Basketball "Coach of the Year." One former player, Rachel (Elenbaas) Olson, asked Kristi to be with her when she delivered her first child, since Rachel's mother had recently passed away. Miracle Comeback

The term "miracle team" has taken on new meaning for the men's basketball team at Northwest College. Coach Doug Filan and several of his starters were in a van that went off the road near Walla Walla on a road trip, November 19, 1990, the Monday before Thanksgiving. Several of the players were hurt, the most serious of them the leading scorer Jason Filan, the coach's nephew. Coach Filan's injuries put him in the Intensive Care Unit in a Walla Walla hospital, with a strong possibility that he would not survive the injuries. Some of the players spent time in the hospital as well, but none were as critical as their coach.

Northwest canceled the five remaining games prior to the Christmas break. Contrary to the doctors' expectations, Coach Filan was out of the hospital and recouping at his parents' home even before Christmas. When school resumed in January all of the players excepting Jason Filan were back on the practice floor. Jason has served as Doug's very able assistant coach and helper. After the accident the Eagles' record was fourteen wins and seven losses. They ended the

season at the top of the standings in the Pacific Northwest College Conference and won a regional tournament in Fullerton, California, earning a return trip to the National Christian College Division II National Tournament. Most of the members of this year's team were at last year's tournament, and bettered last year's ex-


perience by ending as runners-up to Kentucky Christian College.


