There I ministered to the retreat — hotel "camp meeting" — of the great Calvary Charismatic Center pastored by Missionary Rick Seaward. Some 1,300, of the approximately 4,500 who attend the church, were present. General services, leadership sessions, pastoral sessions were conducted all morning and evening. It was intensive . . . and blessed. My those people know how to worship!

EVANGELIST DAVE ROEVER TO CONDUCT N.C.'S FALL REVIVAL OCTOBER 6-10

Throughout the week of October 6-10 the strains of "We've got the power . . ." and the message of Dave Roever will fill the Chapel at N.C. morning and night. In its Fall revival the college will feature the ministry of one of its favorite speakers, returning at the specific requests of hundreds of students.

Evangelist Dave Roever, burned beyond recognition or hope of survival in the Vietnam war, attributes his remarkable recovery "entirely to a miracle working God." While serving with the River Patrol Division of the United States Navy in South Vietnam, a phosphorus grenade, hit by a sniper's bullet, exploded in Roever's hand six inches from his face as he was poised to throw it into an enemy bunker. Hospitalized for fourteen months, and undergoing fifteen major operations (during one of which he was thought to have died), he says his ordeal has served to heighten his love for America and most of all his God.

In 1974 and 1975 Evangelist Roever returned to Vietnam, "this time," he says, "not with a M-16, but with a John 3:16" and reports that many of the South Vietnamese "gave their hearts to Christ." In addition, his missionary evangelistic crusades have led him to thirty-six nations, and he has had many appearances on university campuses, in high school assemblies, in concerts, youth conventions, and churches of many denominations throughout the United States and Canada. National television shows, such as the popular "PTL Club," have found his attitude and ministry most intriguing. The movie industry has solicited his story, Soul Survivor, for network television.

After his week with us two years ago, Dave returned to campus to film three telecasts and aired them during his program on T.B.N.

Those who can are invited to join with us in the services. All friends of N.C. are encouraged to pray with us that God will make it a week of *true revival*, commitment, seeking God and finding direction for life.

NEW ELEMENTARY EDUCATION PROFESSOR FOR 1986-87

This year is going to be a special year in men's athletics at Northwest.



They were also exposed to N.C.'s tremendous academic program, classroom atmosphere,


I am excited for the near year, and am looking forward to see what great things God has in store for us.
