From the President:

MINISTERS NEEDED

I received a report from the General Secretary's office stating that, the *rate of gain* in numbers of Assemblies of God ministers has slowed down since 1983. And, "we have declined in *actual numbers* of Christian workers since 1983," the report said. Furthermore, it was noted that "recent losses in enrollment in our colleges merit monitoring this important source of our ministers." The overall growth has been "healthy" for the decade just past.

I called our General Secretary, Rev. Joseph R. Flower concerning the report and he verified it.

Now that's where NC comes in. It's our business to challenge your people to respond to the divine call and then to train and equip them for the ministry.

And that's where you — our pastors, churches and NC friends — come in, too.

The response to call to the ministry starts at the local church altars, at the youth camp altars, in the Sunday School classes. Children, young people, sons and daughters need to hear ministry, think ministry, anticipate ministry. There's nothing like it in all the world! No other occupation is so rewarding!

You can do nothing better than challenge a young person to respond to the call!

What a fulfilling and exciting life it is!

I suppose there's nothing that stimulates response to consider ministry more than a

pastor who *loves* what he does and *communicates* that love to children and to young people. They see the living example and then say to themselves, "That's what I want to do. I want to be just like pastor ______" (put your name in there my friend and ask, "Is it happening where I serve?")

My father-in-law, A.F. Berg, (now deceased), but well known in our fellowship, pastored one church for twenty-nine years (Sioux Falls Gospel Tabernacle, First Assembly in South Dakota). I believe the greatest joy of his life was the fact that he could point to at least twenty-nine young people who had gone into the ministry under his ministry.

And I was blessed just the other day. Two separate stories came to me about two young men, one now in the ministry and another in NC heading for ministry. It was said I paid special attention to them "way back" when they were young. They never forgot it. One was said to quote the things I said to him repeatedly. The other said, "A college president paid attention to me. I must be somebody."

When I heard it, the verse, "Cast our bread upon the waters . . " came to mind. So that's where it's at. Ministers are needed and will be needed

It's in our hands to exemplify, to challenge, to encourage, to lead, to support, to train and educate and then send out ministers. And that's where NC and the local church work together . . . under God!

"MISSION 600" NC Sets 1986-1987 Student Subsidy Goal

Mission 600, the 1986-1987 fund raising drive has been launched by Northwest College. The "Mission" is to raise a subsidy for each of the approximately 600 students at Northwest College of \$258.00. 
Students:

THESE CHOSE NC

As the 1986-87 school year began in September, one thing became quite evident: many of the sharpest Christian young people from across the west chose NC as the place to further their education. We are proud of all our great NC students, but "these" are the "cream of the crop."

Once again we have a large number of quality students in the scholastic area. According to our records there are thirty of our new students who earned a high school grade point average of 3.5 or higher out of a possible 4.0. Of the thirty, twenty were ranked in the top 10 percent of their graduating class. Three of these were ranked first in their class (two had GPA's of 4.0), one was ranked second in his class, and two were ranked third. Our faculty always welcomes these academic achievers to our student body.

Five new students are here this semester who were winners in their District of the National Youth Scholarship (Mr./Miss CA). The winners are: from Montana — Mike Gunnarson and Michele Wiebe, from Alaska — Ginger Olsen, and from the Northwest District — Jonathan Cawston and Loria Carder. Each District chooses one or two winners who are Assembly of God high school

seniors, on the basis of scholarship (ranked in the top 20 percent of their high school graduating class), citizenship (active in their church, school and community), and commitment to Christ. We are thrilled to have these outstanding youth on campus and are happy to award the 1986 District winners a

\$1,000 scholarship, (\$500 per semester during the fall and spring).

Some other very talented youth also chose NC this fall. Twelve new students who were Teen Talent winners at the District and Regional Level came through the registration line and began using the scholarships NC provides for these musically talented youth. Three Bible Quiz winners also became NC students, to further their study of the Book they have begun to love. These fifteen Teen Talent/Bible Quiz winners will receive a total of \$27,900 in scholarships from NC, by the time they graduate, because we believe in their potential for ministry.

In the area of athletics we have some very . talented new students this year. Tonya Ashbooks, a 5'4" left-handed guard and honor student from Teiton, Washington, will be a starter for the NC girls basketball team. She played volleyball and basketball for Highland High School and attends Stone Church in Yakima. She had scholarship offers from several community colleges and one from George Fox, but chose to come to NC. God is helping her finance her education, without the benefit of athletic scholarships. She was looking for a school that would provide excellent Christian fellowship and training, and she found it here at NC. Bill Berger, a 6'7" freshman, was an "All State" basketball player from Colorado Springs, Colorado. Though highly recruited with many scholarship offers, he chose NC, to answer God's call. Another new talent for the "Eagles" is 6'8", Jay Anderson. He finished high school in Independence, Oregon, with a GPA of 3.96 out of a possible 4.0, and is now preparing for full time youth ministry.

These are quality Christian men and women who chose to train at Northwest College, and there are more. Maybe you'd like to join the number?

THE BILL FLISRAM STORY Almost One-Half Million Dollars In Service

I've been at NC over 20 years. But Bill Flisram has been here longer.

In 1965, my predecessor, President C.E. Butterfield, talked with Bill and his wife Mary. Bill had retired earlier from the Navy shipyards in Bremerton, Washington, where he had worked for over twenty years. But Bill wanted to serve the Lord at NC, and Mary, too. They came and Mary served as a Resident Dean for some thirteen years and Bill served in maintenance. Mary later retired, again.

But Bill is still at it! Over twenty-one years he has fixed . . . and fixed . . . and fixed. He knows the buildings and campus like the back of his hand. He loves the place . . . "pats" it like it were a grandchild.

He once crawled under a building and "cracked a rib or two," he said. A few days later he was back at it . . . working again.

Bill takes care of all the keys . . . perhaps 1,500 of them!

Bill just goes on . . . and on . . . forever, it seems. How old is he? "Well, somewhere above eighty," he says.

Why? That's the way Bill wants it. He even tried to pay for his own gas, used on campus.

Now . . . don't tell Bill I told you all of this. He would be embarrassed . . . and wouldn't like it!

But I felt you should know. You see, in terms of today's dollars and what Bill would normally have been paid over what he was not paid for the 21 years he has been at NC, the value of Bill's contribution so far is probably \$420,000. This has never been calculated before. And Bill probably would say, "Don't

do it now!" But I know Someone who keeps "the books" and will reward!

Reverend George C. Smith, pastor of First Assembly of God Church, North Hollywood, California, will speak for the annual Pastoral Ministries Lecture Series, November 18-20. The theme will be "Foundations of Spiritual Ministry," with workshops on "Worship Ministry," "Preaching Ministry," and "Altar Ministry."

He was born in Ottawa, Canada, raised in a minister's home and attended Eastern Pentecostal Bible College in Eastern Canada.

In his early years of ministry he pastored, evangelized and served as District Youth Director. He spent nearly fifteen years pastoring the Central Pentecostal Tabernacle in Edmonton, Alberta. In the summer of 1978, Pastor Smith assumed the leadership of Evergreen Christian Center in Olympia, Washington, which is one of the largest churches in the Northwest, and in 1983 moved to Southern California to pastor North Hollywood First Assembly of God, an historic church of the Assemblies of God.

He serves on the Board of Advisors for International Church Growth, an organization headed by Dr. Yonggi Cho.

HOW TO EASE THE TUITION LOAD —

Northwest College Offers
Tuition Bank, An Innovative Plan
for Tuition Savings Now
and in the 21st Century

Parents and prospective students are concerned about the increasing cost of tuition and the need to save enough to help with tuition bills. In order to give a hedge against increased tuition costs and encourage savings towards college tuition, NC has established a "tuition bank." Parents, grandparents and even children can buy tuition credits at NC's current cost and receive a tuition credit certificate of deposit in the name of a prospective student. Those credits can be used when the student is ready for College. The current cost per semester credit is \$151.25 (\$1815 for a full semester). To put the tuition bank program in perspective, if a parent would have purchased four (4) years tuition at Northwest College in 1970, the cost would have been \$2,640.00. The value of those tuition credits at today's costs would be \$14,520.00. A good investment and a great way to save for college. If tuition costs increase at the same rate, a semester of tuition purchased for \$1815 in 1986 would be worth \$10,205 in the year 2002.

Not only is the program a hedge against increased tuition, but the increase in the value of the credits is non-taxable and therefore the tuition bank may be a better choice than a savings account or trusts since taxes would have to be paid on the interest earned on the savings and in some instances even trusts.

What if the child does not attend Northwest? The actual amount paid into the tuition bank will be paid back if they desire to attend a different educational institution or if the funds are to be used for other purposes.


CORINA HOBBS ('82) was married to Leonard Kennedy of Casper, Wyoming, May 17, 1986. They reside in Casper.
