### ENROLLMENT INCREASES

#### BROTHER BISHOP RETURNS

NBC welcomes the return of Rev. Richard W. Bishop to its teaching staff this quarter as instructor of Homiletics. Since last June Brother Bishop has completed much of his work for his Doctor of Philosophy Degree as well as carrying on his duties as pastor of the Bethany Baptist Church.

For the benefit of the new students, Brother Bishop graduated from Central Bible Institute and Seminary in 1938 and received his B.A. Degree from Taylor University in Upland, Indiana in 1941. He has been an ordained evangelist and pastor since 1943 at which time he also began graduate work at the University of Washington for his Ph.D. He first taught at NBC in 1945-1946 and returned in the fall of 1947.

Brother Bishop reports that he has completed all of his courses and seminars in history, his major field of study, and all of his courses and seminars in the Far Eastern studies, his minor, except for a research paper on "The Marshall Mission to China." Also, he is preparing for his second of two required examinations in French and an examination in German, both of which are required of all Ph.D. candidates. After passing an oral and written examination in four fields of history, Brother Bishop will arrange his research material and begin writing his thesis entitled "Henry the Seventh's Control of the Episcopacy."

BROWSING IN THE LIBRARY

What did the world look like before the flood? After the flood? How could Noah get two and seven of every living creature into the Ark? Can we prove conclusively that there actually was a universal flood covering the entire earth? Is the alleged discovery of the remains of Noah's Ark on Mount Ararat by a Russian aviator a true account?

In The Flood, Dr. Alfred M. Rehwinke offers satisfactory solutions to these puzzling questions. He makes a thorough study of this great historic catastrophe and convincingly upholds the truth and reliability of the Biblical account. He furnishes Scriptural and scientific evidences to contradict unbelieving critics who deny that perfect harmony exists between the Bible and natural science.

This book is a recent addition to the NBC library and Bible scholars will want to read it.

Another recent addition of interest is Alleged Bible Contradictions Explained by George W. DeHoff.

Students in the Linguistic's class will appreciate God's Word in Man's language by Eugene A. Nida. Dr. Nida directs the work of translation for the American Bible Society. In this book he tells the story of how the work of translating the Bible into foreign languages and dialects is accomplished. Imagine a language which has 120 ways of describing walking, or untangle the meaning of a Bolivian Quechua word like this: ruwanayashaskasniyquichejmantake. These and many other such problems confront Bible translators in all parts of the world. Dr. Nida tells the stories of the tireless workers who have devoted their lives to spreading the Word of God.

IMPROVEMENTS PROVE BENEFICIAL

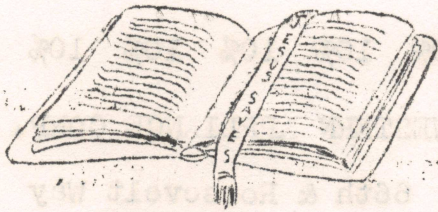
"Is there any mail in box 89?"
