Newsweek said Sarah Palin's Assemblies of God background shows "theological naiveté" and that her faith represents the difference between "enlightened religion" and "evangelical religion."

Other mass media news stories have called Palin's religious beliefs "politically explosive," "extremist," "off the wall" and "kind of nuts."

Recently, a journalist said that Palin's "views might strike some as offensive, even radical, but they're not atypical for a Pentecostal congregation."

Though Christians have many diverse perspectives, Palin's religious beliefs have come to represent evangelical Christians, and particularly, members of the Assemblies of God. But the negative glare of the media grossly misrepresents the true nature of the group, said Bob Cook, executive vice president of The Alliance for Assemblies of God Higher Education.

"We have an allegiance to a higher Being, and we believe He is the God of the Bible and the God of the Universe. So if that makes us radical, then fine, we will be radical," Cook said, "but to say that we are radical in ways that separate us from other Americans and we have some snobbish arrogance – that's just not true." introduced, we have not had news agencies that have made contact – real contact – with the general council of AG – with the national office. You would think that they'd want to do their homework," he said, adding that, "instead, they're finding some YouTube deal for some pastor here and there. We're just hoping that they will do a thorough job in investigating the Assemblies of God."

Palin has remained unapologetic in the scrutiny of her faith. "Nobody is going to convince me that my foundation of faith is not good for me and for my family no matter the mocking, no matter what anybody says about it," she said in an interview earlier this month.

While the spotlight on religion shines brightly on Palin, Democratic Vice-Presidential candidate Joe Biden's Roman Catholic background has gone largely unnoticed, according to the pewforum.org.

Sen. John McCain and Sen. Barack Obama have handled the media beam on religion differently. While they have mentioned their Christian faith in the campaigns, political analysts have pointed out their reticence to be as open as Palin.

Obama said he feels the pressure from voters' disapproval of his religious beliefs.

## What Happened To The Flightless Bird?

Feathers were ruffled when The Flightless Bird, an underground newspaper, landed on the Northwest University campus last spring. But the paper was not printed in rebellion, insists Nathan Austin, one of the creators. It was simply a replacement for the school newspaper, which ceased publication last December, he said.

Austin decided to start the paper when he heard that there had been an underground paper at the university some years before.

"I thought, why don't we just do that again? Open up the floor to free thought again. The paper's gone," he said. "It was not necessarily something we wanted to bash the school with."

Students either hailed issues of The Flightless Bird or hastily threw copies into recycle bins. Although the paper started as an alternative to The Talon, it became a vehicle to voice controversial topics that may not have been published in the university's sanctioned newspaper, Austin said.

The underground paper ran articles critiquing administration and school policies. It also criticized religious controversies including Benny Hinn and other televangelists; and discussed efforts to stop human trafficking.

"I felt there was a constriction of student media and student thought. Even The Talon seemed like it was very much controlled by the administration – made to sound a certain way," Austin said. "I understood that, as a school, there are rules, but it's college for Pete's sake. We are thinking crazy thoughts, 'What does this mean? What does that mean?'We have questions and we didn't want questions to be silenced." The Flightless Bird published five issues. Each printing was between four and five regular printer pages in

length, which were stapled together and distributed across campus.

The paper followed the concept of a zine. An issue contained between three to six articles, including political cartoons or illustrations of some kind.

"The Flightless Bird gave students a chance to, not only broaden the material that was being discussed, but also to openly criticize things that they saw on campus – to question, critique things that they saw," said David Thompson, advocate of the paper. "The administration was a little pissed about it because they felt The Flightless Bird was undermining their authority."

Controversial issues were not the concern of the administration, asserts Paul Banas, vice president for student development. "Our primary concern is good journalism. We aren't afraid of anything that students want to communicate, but we do want to help students apply good journalism practice," he said. "We demand that we use good journalism skills in reporting: that it is well reported, both sides are represented, and there has been care not to be slanderous. I think that is important."

Some students remarked that the writers of The Flightless Bird were "cowardly cowards" for remaining anonymous, explained Austin. "There were a lot of people asking why we didn't just put our names on it," he said. "Sure, but I would kind of like to get my degree and not be expelled."

The Talon shut down last year after the editor resigned. "The paper ceased to publish because there weren't any students who wanted to be part of it," said Banas. "I wish that the energy that was put into The Flightless Bird could have been put into The Talon. That those who had the motivation to put it together stepped up to the plate for a solution to The Talon."

With The Talon back in print with a new staff, some students are hopeful for the paper's success. "I see The Talon having a lot of potential to have students getting involved. Because the school is so small, the paper has the potential to be very relevant to the students," said Thompson. "Taking the initiative to interact with the community, those on staff should be able to gauge what the students want to hear and adjust accordingly."

Austin sees a dilemma with the Talon staff being only female. "It would be good to have a real balanced perspective in all aspects I suppose. Diversity would be a good thing," he said.

Currently, there are no plans for The Flightless Bird to go back into print.



### BUDGET CUTS ACROSS CAMPUS

The university is facing a \$600,000 shortfall in its operating budget due to low enrollment.

The expected enrollment is down three percent, which amounts to 21 students, said Executive Vice President Dan Neary. He blames current economic instability for the drop.

Provost Jim Heugel had to cut \$150,000 from the academic budget for the year. Equipment funds and the provost's travel fund were cut by \$80,000. The equipment funds are used to buy items such as projectors, chairs, white boards, music instruments and science equipment.

An additional \$70,000 was cut from the library book budget. "I hate not buying books, but this year on such short notice it seems better than to cut money from faculty and departments who were expecting it," Heugel said.

"Any time you cut the book budget, we get a little freaked out," admitted one professor.

"You don't want to go to the well of books very often because that could be a big problem. If we have a shortfall next year, we'll have to find different areas to cut, but we'll have more time to plan," Heugel added.

Other budget cuts would be made in funds that are not directly tied to the academics of the university, Heugel said. Fewer people may be hired this year, according to Les Welk, university board director. Neary also plans to put less money into long-term reserves for future needs, such as carpeting.

Neary expressed optimism that the cuts would go mostly unnoticed by students. However, some faculty members have concerns.

"It's not that students don't get a good education, because they do. It's just that they don't get the education they could be getting," said one professor.

Neary and President Castleberry both hope that graduate and LEAP enrollments, as well as fundraising efforts would help cover the shortfall so fewer cuts would be needed. "We've been setting records in fundraising, and we have very good hopes that this year is going to be a banner year," Castleberry said. However, Welk cautioned that it is more difficult to raise funds for basic operations than it is to get support for projects such as the Health and Sciences Center. The board is "hopeful" for these additional revenue sources, he added, but it still expects to see cutbacks this year. Northwest remains financially stable despite hard economic times, according to an email President Castleberry sent to faculty.

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## **NORTHWEST UNIVERSITY BUYS MILLION DOLLAR HOME FOR PRESIDENT**

The Northwest University Board of Directors just closed on the purchase of a \$1.05 million dollar house next to the campus for the president.

From his new home at 5222 111th lane, President Castleberry will be able to walk to work every day and to host students, friends, alumni, and possible donors to the school.

"I'm really delighted that I'm going to have this wonderful tool that will help me do my job better," said Castleberry.

Although this year has been financially tough for the school, ad-

ministrators emphasize that the purchase of the house has no connection with the three percent cut in the operating budget.

According to Executive Vice President Dan Neary, the house was purchased using the Foundations Note Fund. Investors deposit money into the fund, and it is available to the school for projects. The school borrowed the money from this fund and will pay it back at an interest rate significantly lower than if it had been a regular mortgage.

The Note Fund is never used for regular operations. The house was not paid for out of tuition dollars, nor did it affect the annual budget, according to Neary.

The house will be owned by Northwest, and the president will pay rent to the school.

Les Welk, chairman of the Board of Directors, acknowledged that students may be skeptical

> about this purchase, especially amidst a budget shortfall. He offered two reasons the board decided to continue with it.

"It is two totally separate funds and decisions. They do not interact or relate to one another," Welk said, in reference to the house fund and the operating budget. "In buying the home, it doesn't exacerbate or exaggerate the operational budget problem."

Secondly, "In buying the home, we're asking the president to place a very high emphasis on creating relationships and friendships that may result in monetary compensation and fundraising for the university. He's taking a very aggressive and sophisticated approach to that, and we felt that the home would only be a tool that would enable him better to do that job."

When Castleberry arrived in 2007, housing him became "an immediate issue, since he was from out of the area," said Welk. He moved into the university-owned duplexes temporarily, and he had hoped eventually to purchase his own home. When his house in Springfield didn't sell, the board began looking for other options to help him live affordably near campus.

"We came here out of a deep conviction that God had brought us here, and we would have lived in the duplex houses as long as we needed to. Being here on campus gives me a sense of what's going on that I'm not willing to give up," said Castleberry. He explained that he would not have been able to afford a home in Kirkland and would have faced a long commute if he had tried to find a home on his own.

The Board had originally considered building a house on a piece of property the

university already owns on 59th Street. However, due to a soft market, they soon realized that they could purchase the house near the chapel for about the same price as it would cost to build, said Dan Neary. That would free up the other property for other school buildings, such as more duplexes, and the newly purchased house would become another asset.

While Neary's office was only in charge of finding the house, not making the final decision, he says he supports the purchase. "It's a good move. We've got a history of good deals in terms of property ownership."

Les Welk added that the house was appraised at a much higher value than what the school paid for it.

It does not take an expert knowledge of economics to realize that we are facing tough financial times. At this point, economists are not arguing over whether or not we are in a financial crisis but the magnitude of the crisis. Some think that it is the worst financial crisis since the Great Depression; others argue that it is the worst crisis in the history of the United States.

However, for students in colleges

With the advent of easy credit and other ways to finance one's personal debt, spending more than you earn is very easy to do. A report by the St. Louis Federal Reserve shows that the national savings rate has dropped from 10% in 1980 to 0.4% in 2006. In our culture, it is becom-

ing more difficult to be patient and save for things. Resist the mainstream American cultural ideal of quick riches and overnight success and save now for things you want in the future. Finally, it is imperative that you a bachelor's degree make, on average, \$20,000 per year more than those with only a high school diploma and individuals with advanced degrees earn an average of \$50,000 per year more. Although incurring student loan debt to become financially sound may seem counterintuitive, it is actually one of the best ways to ensure that you become and remain secure.

The current economic crisis is frightening. Businesses going bankrupt, government buyouts of private businesses and personal hardships abound. Even in all of this chaos and confusion you can become financially secure by creating a budget to control your money, spending less than you earn, and staying in school to increase your future earning potential.

"Part of the reason I think it's always difficult for public figures to talk about this is that the nature of politics is that you want to have everybody like you and project the best possible traits onto you. Oftentimes that's by being as vague as possible, or appealing to the lowest common denominators," **Obama told a Chicago Sun Times** reporter. "The more specific and detailed you are on issues as personal and fundamental as your faith, the more potentially dangerous it is."

Though media's floodlights on the candidate's religious beliefs appears particularly strong in this election, Professor Leroy Johnson believes it's just politics as usual.

"We think that this is such a dirty, personal campaign," he said, "but I could take you back through American history, and campaign after campaign of this kind of dirty politics, because it works."

The public scrutiny of a presidential candidate's religious faith reaches back as far as the 1960's, when evangelical voters became concerned about President John F. Kennedy's Catholic background, according to Johnson. He said that religious hot-button issues such as abortion showed up in the campaigns of Jimmy Carter and Ronald Reagan as they tried to woo Christain voters.


"Practically every candidate since then has had to talk about their faith, because people expect it. There are so many Christians that these guys know that they have got to play to them," Johnson said.

A primary concern for Cook and other leaders in the Assemblies of God is that the negative portrayal of Palin's faith will taint evangelicalism as a whole, and thus turn people away from a potential relationship with Jesus Christ. "We are just trying to let people know, study us, look at us, don't just make a snap judgment about what you heard," Cook said.

Johnson suggested that these offenses are often dismissed by the public after voter ballots have been tallied. "They know that people will forget about that stuff, Comments? Contact Rachael Harris but right now we'll concentrate

on it and maybe it will swing some people away," he explained.







Open dorms: a concept that chills some and enlivens others, a magnet of opposing viewpoints, and a make-over recipient this school year thanks to a student senate proposal in the works.

Most everyone who has experienced open dorms has a story to tell of some notorious instance that either turned them away from the idea or sent them galloping in gleeful favor. One fellow dorm resident narrated a familiar scenario in the men's halls last fall: "During open dorms all of the guys dust off their

guitars, and play worship music. They tell the visiting girls that, 'This song came to me in my third hour of prayer." Pathetic? Possibly. But strategic? Absolutely.

This manipulated setting, though, often turns students away from the typical open dorms situation and sends them in pursuit of a more "normalized" system.

If I could pin a metaphor to the current scenario encompassing open dorms, I'd use that coined by NU's Community Life-

Director, Bethenee Engelsvold. Open dorms provide the opportunity to floor "shop," she explained in an interview earlier this month.

Now, a fraction of dormitory residents (freshmen anyone?) solicit their individual floors and rooms, while visitors browse for the most enticing company. Hopefully, after changes are made to the current system, residents will enjoy a "visitation" option as well. When the shopping metaphor is applied to this new idea, the dorms can magically transform from window shops into a coffee house-style lounge.

A collection of students, though, prefer the current system. They view open dorms as an opportunity to initiate acquaintances that would not have come about in the focused atmosphere of classes.

Still, others call for the end of any

open dorms system, pointing out the numerous alternative locations for creating friendships other than the privacy of one's dorm room.

"We've got[ten] to this point where we have a lot of strong opinions in different areas and we're trying to find a solution that best accommodates everybody," Engelsvold said.

Thus evolved the open dorms community chat, hosted by Engelsvold this month in Perks lounge. Students seated in rows on couches or lounging on

the floor gathered, with an attitude of resolve, to discuss the possible changes to open dorms.

NUSG President Jadon Haynes, explained that a Student Senate Committee aimed at community improvement will compile students' ideas into a formal proposition. First the Senate and then Northwest administration must pass the proposition before it can take effect.

The most prominently proposed change involves a new visitation policy, in which dorm residents may invite visitors during an allotted time. How would this system differ from open dorms? The visitation idea would allow a longer range of visiting hours, Engelsvold explained. In addition, visitors would be required to sign in and leave identification before being escorted by the student to his/her room. The forum, though, surprisingly left

one question untouched. In pursuit of an answer, I contacted Engelsvold and Paul Banas, vice president for student

development, hoping they might shed some light on my query: Why doesn't Northwest have completely or mostly open dormitories like UW or SPU?

"I think our current housing structure makes that a little difficult," Engelsvold said, referring to the dorms' single sex features such as bathrooms, "But beyond that, I think philosophically there probably [are] some values that encourage us to be wise about coed dorm situations."

"We want to be careful to have a community that promotes Christian thinking [and] decision making about relationships," Banas said.

Engelsvold later cited the on campus apartment buildings as a successful co-ed living situation, in support for the housing structure theory.

"It [the proposal] needs to be wholly and completely from the students," said Englesvold. "That being said, I know that the student leadership is cognizant of the fact that resident life personnel have to staff the event. So, if there's nobody on duty before seven PM, it's unlikely that we're going to have open dorms or visitation before then."




Cressey: There was an expectation coming into this show that you would win once again. How are you feeling about the outcome of the show?


There you have it. Mo-Dolla's has spoken. Overall, the 2008 Talent show provided laughs and entertainment to the Northwest Community.

#### It's Okay




## Late Night Outreach




Houston's late night ministry
