New Dean Of Students Appointed

The Reverend Jack V. Rozell of Cut Bank, Montana has been appointed to the post of Dean of Students at Northwest College effective with the coming summer, College President D. V. Hurst announced recently.

The Reverend Mr. Rozell will succeed Dean Daniel B. Pecota, who has served on the college faculty since 1958, and as Dean of Students since 1964, and who has elected to resume full-time teaching duties at the College, it was stated. The Reverend Mr.

Rozell originated from Lewistown, Montana but completed his secondary and initial college education in eastern Washington. He graduated with his B.A. at Whitworth College, Spokane, in 1959 where he majored in Psychology and subsequently took a year of Bible training at Northwest College in 1959-60 before entering Fuller Theological Seminary. He was graduated from the seminary with his Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1964.

While attending Northwest College the Reverend Mr. Rozell pastored the Rainier Valley Assembly of God Church in Seattle. He also served at the College as its Christian Service co-ordinator. While attending Seminary he served as Assistant pastor at the Trinity Assembly of God Church in Pasadena. After graduation from the seminary he took the pastorate of the Cut Bank Assembly of God Church where he has served until now.

Mr. Rozell has also been active during his college career in student life. While at Whitworth he held a number of important student posts including that of a student body president, Gospel Team Director, Spiritual Leader for the campus, and dormitory proctor. He was a member of the Whitworth Acappella Choir for three years and was listed in Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities, in 1959.

Dean Rozell is married, and his wife Adel, is a Registered Nurse. She completed two years at Westmont College in Santa Barbara, California and is a graduate of Deaconess School of Nursing in Spokane. The Rozells have one daughter, Colleen Ann, 2-1/2 years old.

Commencement Speakers Announced

Northwest College President D. V. Hurst recently announced that Dr. J. Arthur Stewart will bring the commencement address at the college's thirty-first commencement on June 4 An educator and Assemblies of God lavmen. Dr. Stewart is principal of the Kent-Meridian Senior High School in Kent, Washington. He is a member of the Northwest College Lav Council and serves as chairman of the Council's Faculty and Curriculum Committee. Dr. Stewart's college work was completed singularly at the University of Washington where he earned his B.A., M.A., and Ph. D. degrees respectively between the years 1940-1952. In professional circles Dr. Stewart has served as President of the Puget Sound League of Senior High Principals Association. He is presently Sunday School Administrator for Calvary Temple in Auburn, Washington. The Commencement will be held on the campus in the Northwest Pavilion at 3:00 p.m.

Preceding the commencement will be baccaulareate services for the 1967 graduating class in the College chapel, at which time the Reverend James Swanson, pastor of the First Assembly of God Church of Portland, Oregon will bring the baccalaureate sermon. A new innovation for the baccalaureate this year will be its timing for a Saturday evening at 7:30 p.m. — a time and day selected in the interest of accommodating parents of graduates and other guests who may wish to drive to the campus for the service.

This year's graduation roster will include approximately 50 graduates from the Bible and Junior College and represents the largest graduation classes since 1950.

EDUCATIONAL COSTS DOWN IN RELATION TO EARNING POWER, DEAN SAYS

In spite of "spiraling" educational costs today, Northwest College Dean of Education, John W. Lackey, has shown that is requires fewer hours of labor output to meet today's educational costs than it did to attend a Bible Institute 22 years ago. The Dean's calculations are based on the comparative pay scales of today in relation to the cost of going to Northwest College as compared with the tuition plus labor output required of him to attend a mid-west Bible Institute in 1944-45.

He explains that while \$200 paid the cost of tuition, board and room at the school he attended, he was required to add to his payment a total of 333 hours of labor during the school year which was valued at the rate of 60c per hour. Today he noted that the work output required of students attending Northwest College at the going scale of \$2 per hour would require of them only 316 hours to meet today's cost of tuition, board and room at Northwest College. On this basis the Dean concludes that it ''costs less to go to school today in relation to students' earning power than it did two decades ago.''

Northwest College students today enjoy one of the best labor markets to be found anywhere in the country and are receiving unprecedented wage scales for their work. Another economic phenomenon in today's educational picture is the unprecedented amount of student aid from government and private sources.

CAMPUS BROADCAST REACHES 25 MILLION

"It's 'Revivaltime,' across the nation and around the world!" A familiar sound to millions of listeners, these words were heard in person by a capacity audience which filled the new chapel of Northwest College to witness the origination of the broadcast on April 16. The Revivaltime rally and broadcast origination climaxed the week's on-campus Revivaltime Crusade at the College with the Reverend C. M. Ward and the Revivaltime team.

After the 30-minute pre-broadcast rally had been completed, the moment for the broadcast to commence had arrived amidst an atmosphere of tense expectancy. Program Director C. T. Beem gave the opening cue to Cyril McLellan, "Revivaltime" choir director, and suddenly the scene was transformed into a Sunday evening evangelistic service with Lee Shultz, secretary of the Radio Department and producer-narrator manning mike and script as program announcer.

All the elements of a typical evangelical church service were included — congregational singing, special music by the "Revivaltime" choir, which in this instance, was composed of members of the two Northwest College traveling choirs, and a dynamic message entitled "Backlash," by the Radio Speaker C. M. Ward.

It was stated that the "On-campus" Re-

Lay Council Rated "Productive"

In terms of accomplishment the third annual Northwest College Lay Council was rated "the best yet" Council Secretary, the Reverend H. W. Crowder said in summing up the meeting. The Council was held on the campus April 14-16 and was moderated by Yakima Businessman, Mr. Donald Skidmore, who serves as Council president. The Council adopted as its project the 120/1000 plan as a means of contributing towards debt liquidation on the College's new chapel. To date a total of \$15,000 has been raised. It was reported that last year's campaign to pay for the chapel pews had been eminently successful.

The 175-member council of business and professional men added 9 new members to its roster. New members received were Mr. Dale O. Anderson of Canby, Oregon; Mr. Paul E. Griffin of Seattle; Mr. Les Inkster of Calgary, Alberta; Dr. Frank C. Lambert of Kirkland; Mr. Duaine R. Malakowski of Tacoma; Mr. Tom Newell of Tacoma; Mr.

vivaltime Crusade was a "first" for the Revivaltime Team among Assemblies of God Colleges. The broadcast from the campus brought the College and Assemblies of God higher education to attention before an international audience estimated at 25 million listeners reached around the world through 511 radio stations. Stan Noble of Calgary, Alberta; Mr. Leland Pease of Federal Way, Washington; and Mr. Charles Royal of Kent. The Council secretary's office reports that 76 members together with their wives were registered for the three-day meet, which was tied in with the on-campus Revivaltime Crusade in progress on the campus at the time. The Council heard Revivaltime radio speaker, C. M. Ward address their Banquet during convocation.

One change in the officiary of the Council was the election of Mr. Lawrence Dormaier of Hartline, Washington, as a regional vicepresident, succeeding Mr. Arthur DeAlton of Spokane.

While the men of the Council were conducting their business, their wives met in their organization known as the Northwest College Lay Council Ladies Auxiliary. They elected officers in the persons of Mrs. Wesley Johnson of Bellevue as president; Mrs. Philip Youngquist of Poulsbo, Washington, as vicepresident; Mrs. Robert Butterfield of Everett, as Secretary; and Mrs. Allen Dormaier of Kirkland, as Treasurer. The auxiliary also adopted a project for the coming year to purchase two additional over-head projectors for the college and to raise \$150 for pictures to furnish the College dining hall. The activity feature sponsored by the ladies during the meet was a tea and style modeling of clothes which they had made.

Jeaturing the Faculty

After completing a service tenure of almost eight years as Librarian at Northwest College, Peter W. Ahlstrom has seen the

College's library grow from holdings of 9,700 volumes to its present 22,000 volumes. He has followed its operations from its quarters in the college's location in Seattle to the new campus, where the library is presently quartered in its third location on the new

campus—each move representing a milestone of growth in the college's book holdings as well as in its student body.

Mr. Ahlstrom came to Northwest College as a student in 1956 after completing a year at the University of Michigan in 1954-55. Michigan was his home state. He was graduated from Northwest College with his B. A. degree in June of 1959 and immediately assumed his duties with the College as its librarian. At the same time, he enrolled in the School of Librarianship at the University of Washington in the summer of 1959 and subsequently in the School of Librarianship of the University of Denver, where he attended during the summers of 1960-62. He was graduated at the University of Denver with his M.A. in library science in 1962. He is a member of the Christian Librarians' Association.

Mr. Ahlstrom has also been active as a writer. He has served as editor of the Alumni News for the Northwest College Alumni Association since 1964 and was instrumental in raising the level of the publication from a mimeographed form to a multi-lithed publication utilizing photographs and a standardized publication format. The News has since been published as part of the College bulletin, **The Northwesterner**. He authored an article published in the Assemblies of God **Educator** entitled ''Making the Library Meaningful'' and has been a contributor to the news service of the College from time to time.

The Ahlstroms have three children, Christine Marie, age 6, Thomas, age 4, and Susan, age 1. Mrs. Ahlstrom is the former Sandra L. Anderson, who like her husband, originated from the state of Michigan.





Northwest College Launches 120/1000 Drive



Northwest College President D. V. Hurst unveiled plans for the College's debt liquidation on the new chapel at the third annual Lay Council which convened on the campus April 14-16. The plan is called the 120/1000 drive. Under the plan it was explained that 120 chapel shares at \$1000 each would be offered to interested friends and churches associated with the College. President Hurst referred to the drive as a means to "share the spiritual ministry to the student body." It was indicated that each share-holders' name will be presented with a personal momento plaque indicating his "ownership" of a share.

Lay Council Secretary H. W. Crowder re-



ported that the Council voted to participate in the drive as its project for 1967. Individual members have to date pledged \$15,000 towards it. The Council project for 1966 was the raising of several thousands of dollars to help pay for the new pews in the chapel. Many churches and other individuals helped as well, permitting the successful completion of this project, President Hurst reports.
