

## From the President...

In reporting to the College Board of Directors at its annual meeting I said in part:

## Fifty Receive



A capacity crowd filled the auditorium seating and bleachers at the Northwest Pavilion on the campus of Northwest College, Kirkland, Wash., June 4, to witness conferral of degrees upon 50 graduates at the college's 31st commencement. The graduates and audience heard Dr. J. Arthur Stewart, principal of Kent-Meridan High School address them on the vital role of heart attitudes and spiritual rectitude in successful adaptation of education and training to life's work. Dr. Stewart is a well-known educator and Assemblies of God layman in the Northwest. He is a member of the Northwest College Lay Council.

Among the 50 graduates six were graduated with honors based on their cumulative grade point averages in college. Two were graduated Magna Cum Laude—Mr. Allan Hulten of Seattle; and Mr. Wilbur Metcalf of Rimbey, Alberta, Canada; and four were graduated Cum Laude—Miss Lucille Hafelfinger of Ontario, Oregon; Miss Karen Larson of South Bend, Washington; Miss Linda Kay Nelson of Doty, Washington; and Miss Susan Tan of Manila, Philippines. College records indicate that the 1967 graduating class is the largest in 17 years. Twenty-two received Associate in Arts degrees; 20 received Bachelor of Arts Degrees; seven received Bachelor of Science degrees; and one received the Bachelor of Theology degree.

## FOUR NAMED TO HONOR SOCIETY

At the commencement ceremonies, one member of the 1967 graduating class and three alumni were inducted into membership of the Delta Epsilon Chi Honor Society. From the membership of the 1967 graduating class was Mr. Allan Hulten of Seattle, who was cited for membership on the basis of scholarship attainment, leadership, and character qualifications. Cited for honorary membership were three alumni, all graduates of the class of 1947. They were the Reverend B. P. Birkeland, pastor of the First Assembly of God Church, Spokane, Washington; the Reverend Wesley E. Bjur, staff member of the University of Southern California; and the Reverend William Hanawalt, Dean of Students at Evangel College, Springfield, Missouri. Nominations were made by the faculty of the college on the basis of recognized leadership attainment and character.

Presiding over the induction ceremonies was College President D. V. Hurst. The Honor Society was founded thirteen years ago among the member colleges of the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges. The Northwest College chapter now has a roster of twenty-six graduates and alumni, who have been granted membership in the Society.

## STUDENTS INSTALL 67-68 OFFICERS

In simple but impressive ceremonies conducted by the Associated Student Body of Northwest College, new student leaders for the forthcoming academic year were installed in a student assembly at the College. Installed as new Student Body President was Mr. Jerry Snyder from Springfield, Oregon, succeeding president Elvin Huston of Sedro Woolley, Washington. Installed as new ASB vice-president was Mr. Leon Moore of Boise, Idaho, and installed as new ASB secretary-treasurer was Miss Gayle Greenland of Redmond, Washington.

New student missionary society leaders were also installed. They are: Mr. Mohan Maharaj of Trinidad, president; Mr. Jay Littlefield of Sterling, Colorado, vice-president; and Miss Janet Eldred of Kelso, Washington, secretary-treasurer. Retiring missionary president was Mr. Ken Benintendi of Cherry Grove, Oregon. It is noted that Mr. Benintendi is the son of missionaries on the field, while his successor, Mr. Maharaj, represents a national missionary-evangelist from Trinidad. At the point that the new missionary secretary was installed it was announced that Northwest students had given over \$8000 to missions during the 1966-67 school year—a new record in missionary giving.

## NEW FACULTY ANNOUNCED

In one of the concluding chapel services of the year at Northwest College, College President announced to the student body several new faculty appointments for the coming school year. Coming to the college as Professor of history will be Mr. LeRoy Johnson of Aiken, Minnesota. Professor Johnson has taught in the public school system in Minnesota for the past five years and has also served as an athletic coach. He will serve as assistant coach at Northwest College, President Hurst indicated. Coming to college as new Dean of Students will be the Reverend Jack Rozell of Cutbank, Montana. He will succeed Dean Daniel Pecota, who will return to full-time teaching duties at the College.

Mr. Leslie Gangwish will join the faculty as professor of English and speech. Mr. Gangwish comes from Grays Harbor County where he has several years' tenure in the public school system there. He has served as president of the teacher's association in his area. A new full-time instructor in physical education will be Mr. Floyd Beam of Seattle. Mr. Beam is currently teaching in the Lake Washington School District. At the College he will instruct men's physical education classes, carry teaching duties, and serve as athletic coach for the College.

President Hurst indicated a new appointment in the College's top academic post—Dean of Education—to be filled by Professor Frank Rice. Professor Rice will succeed present Dean John Lackey, who has resigned to assume a similar post in another college. Students responded with a spontaneous ovation to retiring Dean Lackey and likewise expressed their pleasure at Professor Rice's appointment.



## *Featuring the Faculty*

The Reverend H. W. Crowder is Director of Development at Northwest College. He joined the college staff in 1955 with the portfolio assignment of Assistant to the President in which position he devoted himself primarily to fund-raising for the College. His present position is his third, and was preceded by his ten-year tenure as College Business Manager from 1957 to 1966.

A Washingtonian by birth, the Reverend Mr. Crowder was brought up in the little community of Tenino, near Olympia. Shortly after his graduation from the Tenino High School, he entered the ministry, taking the pastorate of the Yelm Assembly of God Church near Tenino.

He was ordained to the ministry by the Northwest District Council of the Assemblies of God in 1935.

Following his initial pastorate at Yelm he served in pastorates at Olympia, Oak Harbor, Deer Park and Auburn until 1939. He then left pastoral work temporarily to enter business, serving on the sales staff of the Western Auto Company. In 1944 he resumed pastoral service, this time at the Morton Assembly of God Church in Morton, Washington. In 1946 he moved to Olympia where he pastored the East Olympia Community Church while also working as local manager for the Crown-Zellerbach Paper Company. After another two-year interim from 1951-52 during which he was Sales Manager for the John Mansville Company in Grays Harbor County, he took the pastorate of the Colfax Assembly of God Church from which he came to Northwest College in 1952.

Not only has Mr. Crowder drawn upon his experience in the business world for his work at the College, but he has managed to "sandwich" in some academic work along the way. He completed a course in Business Administration with the LaSalle University in 1957 and took some course work at Northwest College in 1957-58.

The Reverend Mr. Crowder's wife, Minerva V. Crowder, was raised in the manse of a Methodist minister. Mrs. Crowder teaches organ at the College. The Crowders have one daughter, Mrs. Glen N. Rich, whose husband is a minister of the Assemblies of God.

# Three Teams To Represent N.C.

Northwest College Public Relations Representative, the Reverend Warren D. Bullock, announced recently that three student teams will travel for the College fulfilling summer itineraries in the interest of student recruitment. The teams will make presentations at Youth Camps and Bible conferences, and will contribute in a ministry of music in various churches throughout the Pacific Northwest region of the United States, he said.

Traveling in Oregon will be the Ambassadors Trio. Members of the trio are Mr. Elvin Huston, senior student from Sedro Woolley, Washington; Mr. Jerry Snyder, senior student of Springfield, Oregon; Mr. Raymond Sparre, senior student from Federal Way, Washington; and Miss Sue Fusch, sophomore student from Seattle, Washington. The Public Relations office indicated that the trio is booked for five youth camps in Oregon, the Oregon District Bible Camp at Brooks, and at various churches in the District. College personnel will be traveling with the group in the interest of the school. Their itinerary will start July 2 and continue to September 3.

The Treble-Heirs Trio, composed of Miss Linda Morse, senior student from Toledo, Oregon; Miss Cherie Miller, freshman student from Everett, Washington; Miss Jane Fowler, freshman student of Lincoln City, Oregon; and Miss Judy Henning, freshman student from Tacoma, Washington, will itinerate principally in the states of Washington and Oregon, June 25 to August 27, Mr. Bullock said. ## CHAPEL SHARE PLAN RECEIVES RESPONSE

College President D. V. Hurst announced recently that to date the College's recently launched 120/1000 fund-raising drive to liquidate indebtedness on the new college chapel has received a significant response. He indicated that thus far subscriptions have



been given the college for 27 shares, making a total of \$27,000 towards the project. The goal is to reach \$120,000 with 120 subscriptions of \$1000 each by friends and churches associated with the college.

The drive was launched at the recently-held Third Annual College Lay Council on the campus April 14-16, at which time the Council pledged \$15,000. Holding the distinction of being the first "share-holder" to subscribe to the drive is the Reverend B. P. Birkeland, pastor of the First Assembly of God Church of Spokane.
