FRANK B. RICE APPOIN

Professor Frank B. Rice, Professor of English at Northwest College since 1962 was appointed new Dean of Education at the College, President D. V. Hurst announced recently. Prof. Rice will assume his new post effective with the coming academic year. The appointment was confirmed by the Board of Directors at its June meeting, President Hurst indicated.

A native of Houston, Arkansas, Mr. Rice completed his Bachelor of Science in Education degree at Arkansas State Teacher's College, Conway, Arkansas, which he followed with graduate studies at the University of Arkansas between the years 1956-61. Prior to his coming to Northwest College he completed work for and received his M.A. degree in English at Memphis State University, Memphis, Tenn. At the present time he is completing doctoral studies at the University of Washington.

Prof. Rice came to Northwest College with an impressive record of experience in teaching and ministry behind him. As an educator he has taught all three levels of American education, commencing with elementary education in 1948, then as a high school teacher in both public and private education 1955-59 and more recently in college-level education since coming to Northwest College. His experience in Assemblies of God education dates back to his days at Southwestern Assemblies of God College, 1956-59.

In the field of pastoral ministry and Christian education, Prof. Rice served as pastor of three churches in Arkansas prior to becoming educational director of the First Assembly of God Church of West Memphis, Arkansas from 1959-62. In the field of youth work, he served as Christ Ambassadors Representative in the Arkansas District for four years and as Sunday School representative for the same district for three years. He is an ordained minister of the Assemblies of God.

During his academic career Prof. Rice has achieved honors twice—the first time as Valedictorian of his graduating class at Houston High School, Arkansas, and the second time when he was granted membership in the Alpha Chi Scholarship fraternity at Arkansas State Teacher's College in 1950.

Prof. Rice has authored several published articles—two of which appeared in the Pentecostal Evangel, one of the Assemblies of

God Educator, and in keeping with his field of academic specialization, he authored a poem published in the **National Poetry Anthology** in 1965.

Prof. and Mrs. Rice live in Redmond, and Mrs. Rice is also engaged in education as a public school teacher in the Lake Washington School District.

In response to his new appointment, Deanelect Rice told of his conviction concerning the will of God in the matter giving prayer and thought to the invitation to assume administrative leadership of the college's academic program. President Hurst noted that his appointment has been hailed with expressions of favor from both faculty and student body. He succeeds John W. Lackey, who has resigned from the college effective with the conclusion of the current year after serving as Academic Dean for seven years.

NEW FACULTY APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED

Eight new faculty appointments for the 1967-68 school year have been announced to date by College President D. V. Hurst. It is observed that the new appointments are for the most part, necessitated by anticipated enrollment increases at the college.

Coming back to the faculty as a full-time instructor in Physical Education and Health Sciences is Mr. Floyd Beam, A former student at the College before entering a tour of military service in Europe, Mr. Beam completed his training in Physical Education at the University, where he received his B.A. degree in 1965. While at the University he served as part-time instructor at the College and has also completed four years teaching experience at Lakeside School in Seattle and two years at the Lake Washington Special Education Center in Kirkland. In addition to his teaching duties at the College, Prof. Beam will serve as coach for the School's varsity athletic program.

Assemblies of God Missionary James Belmore will teach part-time in the field of Missions at the College while enrolled in graduate studies for his M.A. degree in Missions at Seattle Pacific College.



the past five and one-half years in public education in the fields of history and athletics. Prof. Johnson also commenced his college career with Bible College training at North Central Bible College before entering St. Cloud College, where he earned his Bachelor of Science Degree. He willcomplete requirements for his MA in History prior to joining the N. C. faculty this fall.

Joining the Music Faculty of the College is Miss Yvonne Mitchell. She is the daughter of Reverend and Mrs. Leon Mitchell of Loveland, Colorado. Miss Mitchell completed her Bachelor of Music Education degree at Evangel College and completed another 13 hours of graduate work at Colorado State College. She brings with her teaching experience in public education, and during her college days at Evangel College, traveled with the concert band and for one summer with a ladies' trio.

Another Assemblies of God educator, Mrs. Henning Olson, will assist in the field of

English on a part-time basis at the college during the coming year while carrying on other teaching work at the University of Washington. She earned her B.A. with an English major and her M.A. in Scandanavian languages at the University of Washington and has completed some work in doctoral studies at the University.

Mr. Paul V. Ribali will serve as acting Librarian at the college for the coming year. Originating from Walsenburg, Colorado he has had library experience in public education in Texas and in Colorado. He earned his B.A. at Colorado State College, Greeley, Colorado, and has completed graduate work at the University of Denver.

President Hurst indicated that he expects to make some announcements of further appointments before the staff for the new school year is completed. The number of faculty service on the teaching staff for the coming year will be the largest in the school's 34year history, it was noted.

NEW CONSTRUCTION IN PROGRESS

New construction on the campus this summer is majoring in a remodeling and enlarging of the College Dining Hall providing for the doubling of kitchen and dining space. College President, D. V. Hurst, indicated that the new dining area will provide for a total of four dining areas including carpeted dining rooms for faculty, small student groups, and committees meeting for food service during business and special social occasions. A staff dining room is also in planning in addition to the primary dining area. A planted patio area will grace the exterior of the building, it was said.

In the new kitchen space being added to the building, two new cold storage facilities will be added, including a walk-in freezer. A new convector oven will be installed in the bakery section, and new dishwashing equipment are among other equipment improvements planned, it was indicated.

College Business Manager, H. W. Crowder, reported that the \$75,000 enlargement project will provide a service capacity for up to 600 students, and will facilitate banquets and other special food-service functions. Architectural work is being done by Bryant and Butterfield of Everett, and for the first time, construction is being done by a commercial construction firm, the Vaux Construction Co. of Kirkland. Previous construction on the campus has been handled by the College, it was noted.

In other campus construction being completed during the summer, the College Bookstore in the Student Union Building, is being enlarged, and new office space is being developed in the Faculty Office Building to provide for additional faculty offices, a conference room, and new quarters for the Registrar's offices. All projects are being geared towards a completion target-date for the opening of school this fall.
