



AUTUMN EMPHASIS WEEK MARKED BY PRAYER

One of the remarkable features about the Autumn Quarter Spiritual Emphasis week with evangelist Joseph Johnson was the protracted prayer, College President D. V. Hurst observed as he evaluated the week held on the campus October 9-13. He noted that students remained in the chapel to pray night after night until past midnight while others gave themselves to prayer in the dormitory rooms, in the lounges and in other places. Some prayed until 4:00 o'clock in the morning, and many were filled with the Holy Spirit, it was reported.

Another observation noted by the College's President was the evangelist's strength in preaching, which he likened to a "four-bottom plow" which plowed deep and wide. "It is significant in the present times to see young people respond to this kind of preaching and to truth presented in the 'old-time Pentecostal' style," he added.

The schedule for the series was moved up earlier in the quarter than heretofore in the 14-year history of the weeks in the college's past in an "effort to get off to a good start by focusing attention on spiritual things," Mr. Hurst further noted.

Schedules for the winter quarter will be a Missionary Emphasis week January 15-19 featuring the Reverend Everett L. Phillips, missionary executive from the Foreign Missions Department of the Assemblies of God, Springfield, Missouri. Mr. Phillips is field secretary for Africa. The third Spiritual Emphasis week scheduled for the current academic year will be April 8-12 and will feature the Reverend Murray McLees, well-known pastor of Eugene, Oregon, First Assembly of God Church and a popular convention speaker in the Assemblies of God.

LAY COUNCIL PLANS LAID

The Executive Committee of the Northwest College Lay Council recently met and laid preliminary plans for the Council's Fourth Annual meet on the college campus April 12-13. The Council will convene on a Friday-Saturday schedule again this year, it was indicated. Its two day meet will culminate in the Council's Annual Banquet. The guest speaker will be announced later, it was said. Council President is Yakima businessman, Donald Skidmore.

The Music Department at Northwest College announced plans for two music concerts featuring Christmas music. One will be a musical chapel service at 10:20 a.m. on December 6 at which time the music department will feature its two choirs, a ladies' ensemble and other special musical talent. A member of the Northwest College Board of Directors, Mr. Portin is a professional cameraman. In the televised film he captured the charm and friendliness of the tiny Dutch country, as they traveled through Amsterdam's canals, the busy seaport of Rotterdam, the Hague, and the 17th century town of Delft famous for its internationally marketed blue patterned Chinaware. His camera also caught colorful scenes of flower markets, wooden drawbridges and ancient squares, and of special historical significance the film showed the spot where Henry Hudson set sail for the New World and the house where the Dutch Master, Rembrandt lived and did his famous paintings.



Northwest College's 1967-68 basketball schedule was released recently by Dean of Students, Jack V. Rozell, at the College. The College, which is a member of the Pacific Northwest College Conference, is scheduled to play a total of fourteen league games and is thus far scheduled for four non-conference games. The college team, known as the Eagles, will play under the supervision of Dean Rozell as athletic director and will be coached by college Coach Floyd Beam and Assistant Coach, Leroy Johnson. Both are experienced coaches in high school athletics.

Featuring the Faculty

Professor Daniel B. Pecota is known on the campus of Northwest College for his popularity as a teacher and for his counsel to young people. His nine-year career at the college has engaged him actively in the classroom and in administrative work.

Though originating from Passaic, New Jersey, the San Francisco Bay area was his home prior to entering college at Southern California College, where he was graduated with his B. A. degree in 1951. While at college he met his wife, the former Esther Bartsch of Fresno, California. Upon graduation from college they were married and continued to serve the pastorate of the Newport Beach Assembly of God Church until 1953. It was after this that Prof. Pecota entered Fuller Theological Seminary. At the Seminary he earned his B. D. degree in 1958 and subsequently his Th. M. in 1961.

Upon graduation from seminary in 1958 the Pecotas moved to Seattle where Prof. Pecota entered the service of Northwest College in the fall of that year. His initial teaching experience, however, was gained at Fuller Seminary where he served as a Teaching Fellow from 1956-58. In 1964 Mr. Pecota stepped into administrative work at the college, serving as Dean of Students—a post which he effectively discharged until 1967—when he made the decision to return to what he calls his “first love”—the classroom. His major fields of instruction at the college are New Testament Greek and Theology.

Mrs. Pecota is perhaps as well known on the campus as any other member of the faculty and staff, for she serves as manager of the college bookstore, and this year supervised the establishment of the new operation of the Snack Shack in the Student Union Building. The Pecotas have two sons, Stephen Bruce, age 14, and James Earl, age 11. They are active members of Calvary Temple in Seattle, where Prof. Pecota serves as an elder.
