INSTRUCTIONS TO GRADUATES
1966

Baccalaureate Service

1. Graduates will meet in the library, toward the rear, at 7:00 p.m. It is necessary to come at this time to pick up robes, arrange hair, and to form the procession.
2. The robes will be on racks in the library. After the service you may do one of two things:
1) If you would like to have it over Saturday to have pictures taken, etc., you may be responsible for the gown between the Baccalaureate service and the Commencement service.
PLEASE NOTE: These gowns wrinkle easily and so should not be carelessly thrown over chairs or radded up. In addition, they are not fadeproof, so should not be left hanging in sunlight for long periods of time. 2) You may return the gown to the rack in the library and it will be brought to Northwest Pavilion, where it may be picked up again on Sunday in the EAST lobby in time for the Commencement service. PLEASE ZIP UP THE GOWN WHEN HANGING IT BACK ON THE RACK, both for this service and after Commencement, so that it will not slip off while being transported.
3. Corsages should not be worn on graduation gowns.
4. Carry your Bibles. It is suggested that the girls carry only a small clutch purse, if any. Carry the Bible in the left hand, with open side in the hand, elbow bent (arm not hanging down).
5. Line up according to the order below. You will occupy the first five rows in the left hand section, nearest the piano. The faculty will come in ahead of you, but will leave this section open for you.
Note that rows 3, 4, and 5 are not completely filled. Keep yourselves grouped in the center of the row, i.e., four on each side of the center divider.

6. These who occupy the platform are first in the procession, then the faculty, then the graduates immediately following. Stay about an arm's length apart, but do not try to march or to keep step.
7. The faculty will remain standing until after the graduates are in place.
8. Everyone will then remain standing, the audience will rise, and the invocation will be given, after which all are seated.
9. There is no recessional; everyone is dismissed after the benediction.

Commencement Service

1. Marching practice for graduates, and academic procedure practice (this includes ALL graduates, Th.B., B.A., and A.A.) will be at the Northwest Pavilion on Thursday, fourth period, IMMEDIATELY after chapel. IT IS IMPORTANT THAT ALL GRADUATES BE THERE AND PROMPTLY, because some students have work schedules later in the morning.
If you have a class scheduled for that hour, report to the marching practice and the instructor will be advised of your absence.
2. On Sunday afternoon, June 5, if you did not keep the cap and gown after the Baccalaureate service, you may pick them up in the EAST lobby of the Pavilion. Instructions for caring for the gowns will be found in the manila envelope holding the cap. IT IS EXTREMELY IMPORTANT THAT THEY NOT BE PRESSED WITH A HOT IRON; if left hanging for a while, most of the wrinkles will shake out.
It is a good idea for the girls to bring a couple of small safety pins for the collars, because sometimes the pins formerly with the gowns have been lost.
3. Meet for a final checking and prayer in the EAST locker room.
4. For a fee of 50¢, the graduates may keep the tassel of their mortarboard as a souvenir. See Mrs. Moffet by Friday BEFORE graduation.
5. It is suggested that the men remove their coats before wearing gowns if the day is warm. Gowns plus a suit coat can be uncomfortable. WHITE SHIRTS, of course. The suit coats can be locked in the office of the P.E. teacher with the girls' purses or left hanging in the locker room if you prefer.
6. Carry Bibles as at the Baccalaureate service. Girls can leave their purses in the office of the P.E. teacher, which will be locked during the service, or better still, may be left with relatives or friends in the congregation.
7. If you plan to have friends or relatives take pictures of you receiving your degree, they should be seated toward the front on the left side (facing the platform). In this position they will be facing the graduate as he receives the degree and as he leaves the platform. PLEASE ASK THEM NOT TO TAKE PICTURES DURING PRAYER OR DURING THE MESSAGE. Rows 1 and 4 on the left side (east) will be reserved for those with cameras.
8. The processional order is on the next page. During the recessional, the graduates leave first, followed by the faculty. As soon as this line is out the door, the service is over and the congregation may leave. There will be no reception.
9. The recessional line will go out the two rear doors and form a line on the concrete in front of the building so that friends and relatives may congratulate them.
10. Caps and gowns should be returned to the racks in the east lobby before leaving the pavilion.

GRADUATION PROCESSIONAL
1966

Flags, faculty, speaker and directors will precede the graduates. Arrangement of the directors is not given below because their attendance is unknown at present.

The two lines will proceed in several ways: Those on the platform, (see sketch), will come to the center of the platform chairs, meeting from each side. Faculty members will turn right into the front right-hand (west) section. LEAVE THE FRONT ROW EMPTY. Directors will turn left into the front left-hand section (east). LEAVE THE FRONT ROW EMPTY. Notice that not all rows are full. Leaders of groups meeting at the center (graduates and platform people) should be careful not to go beyond the center of the row.

The procession will come through the two rear exit doors. Cue for the procession will be a fanfare on the organ, by Mrs. Crowder. Remain standing until after the invocation.

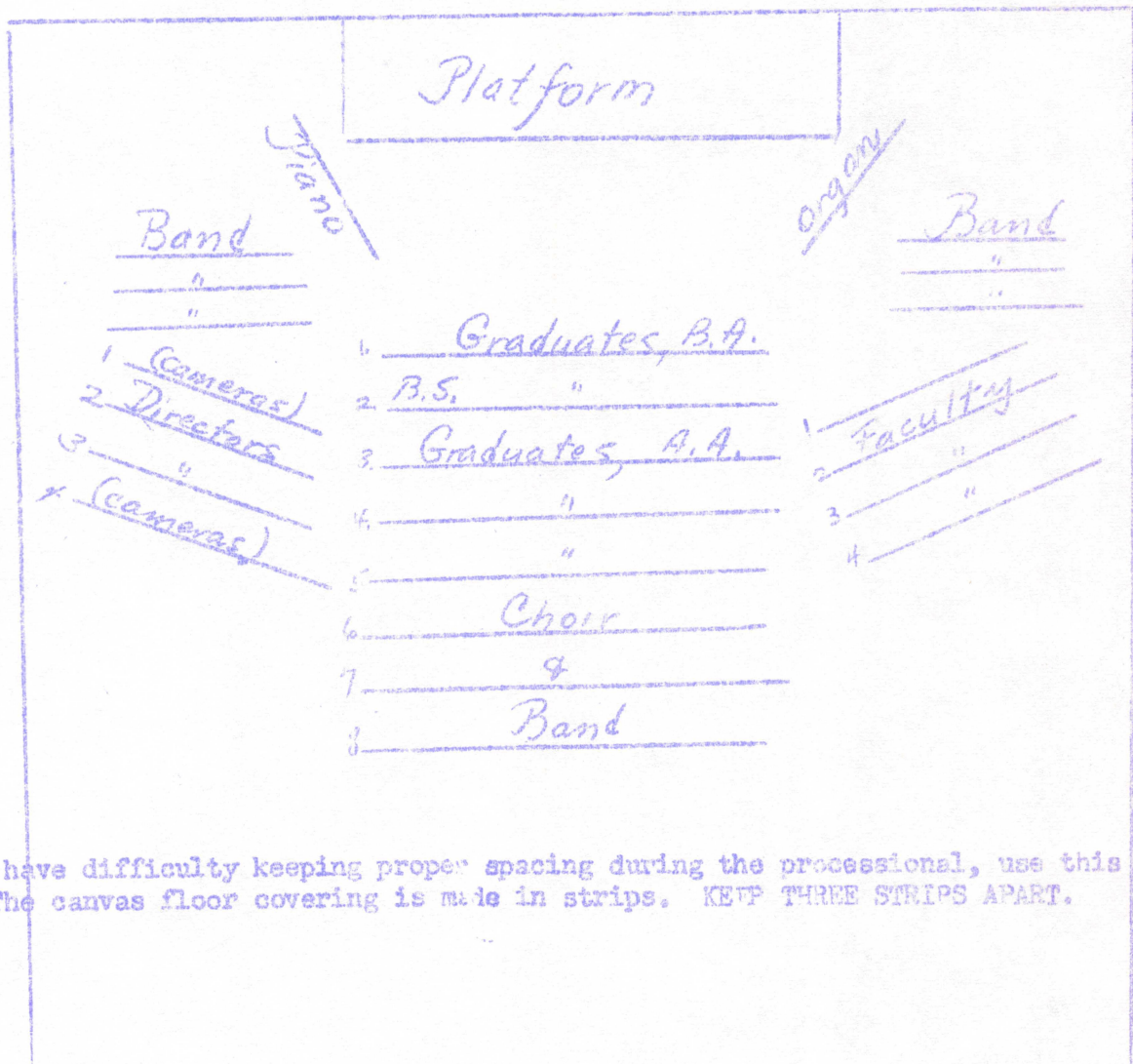
Recessional: Graduates first, beginning with B.S.'s and B.S.'s, then A.A.'s, then Faculty and directors.
