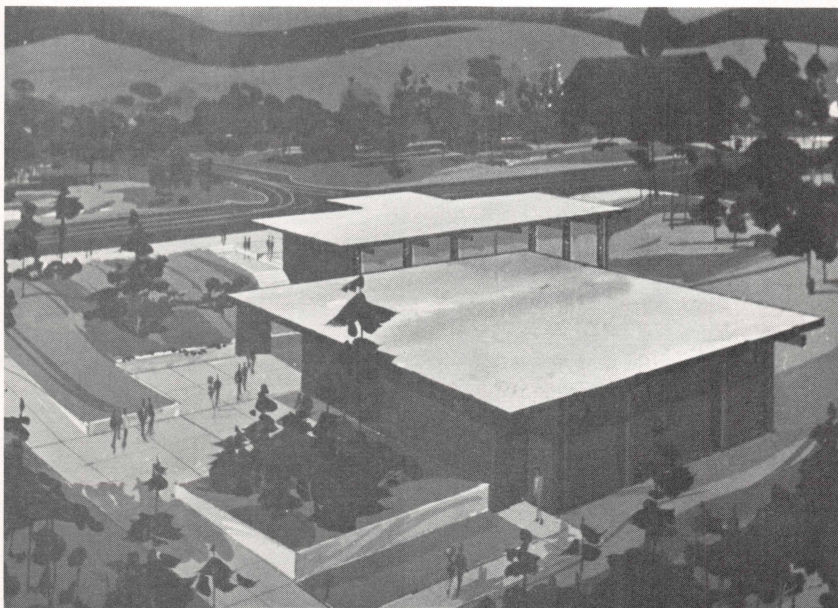

From the President



The line of action in life is drawn between things that just happen and things that happen "on purpose." It is voluntary versus involuntary. It is premeditated action with forethought versus impromptu spontaneous action or happening.

It is on this line of division that a college rises or falls. An institution that sets forth its objectives clearly and then sets out to achieve those objectives can be measured in terms of its continuity as related to them.

When a responsible body of men such as a Board of Directors sets forth its objectives and then adopts the means whereby those objectives can be achieved neither the purposes nor the means can suddenly be altered by any one person. This is the reason a Board such as the one that directs the affairs of Northwest is so important. Each brings to the decisions of the body his background, his understandings, and his commitments. Each builds strength of purpose into the institution as a whole and all together in their group insure against erosion or sudden change of purpose.

The purposes of Northwest College as contained in its constitution are:

To provide undergraduate educational services in the framework of Christian philosophy and faith which will:

Provide an introduction to the basic fields of learning;

Train those interested in fulltime Christian service;

Provide terminal and transfer educational programs for those seeking general college experiences and preparation for senior college;

Assist in each student's acquisition of a knowledge of God's word and the moral and religious values of the denomination;

Encourage its students to know God's will and become an effective Christian witness in the contemporary world;

And help each student through intellectual, spiritual, physical and social development to attain an integrated Christian personality and to live a full selective life.

Careful thought, soul searching and effort to determine what is the will of God have gone into the adoption of these purposes. The same careful thought and effort is expended in seeking to fulfill them.

Record Turnout on Campus Day

A record turn-out of 822 guests were registered at the College's annual Campus Day open-house held at Northwest College April 5, the College Campus Day Committee announced. The guest list included approximately 120 on the pastoral guest list, 35 parents, 21 youth sponsors with the great majority being high schoolers and young people of post-high school age. The previous record was last year when approximately 650 guests attended the event, it was recalled.



Guests were given tours of the campus and opportunities to visit classes of their choice with the major activity centering in the college chapel during which time they heard Northwest District Youth Director, the Reverend Ward Tanneberg, challenge today's youth with a message on the topic "World, Get Off my Back." They were also given a special presentation on educational opportunities at the college and admissions and student life on the campus. An impromptu basketball game organized by Coach Floyd Beam between the NC Eagles and prospective Eaglets provided afternoon recreation. The day concluded with an evening Singpiration in the college chapel sponsored by the Associated Student Body.

Capturing the distance record for the occasion were four carloads of Montana youth together with their pastors including the Reverend Ellwood Grissom, State Youth Director in Montana, Pastor Erwin Rohde of Great Falls, Pastor Merrill Johnson of Kalispell, and Pastor Lawrence Plumley of Columbia Falls. Other visitors from significant distances included Pastor Warren Combs and some of his young people from Nampa, Idaho. Some young people from southern Idaho flew in for the day, it was observed.

New Building Plans Unveiled

Before a capacity gathering of campus guests and students filling the chapel of Northwest College at its annual campus day on April 5, College President D. V. Hurst unveiled plans for the construction of a new learning center on the campus of the college. The new structure will include the first two units in a complex of four buildings and will consist of one unit of split-level design and an auditorium unit connected by a common foyer. The complex will be located on sloping terrain between the chapel and the student-union building. The units will house three class rooms seating approximately 60 students each and a graduated-floor auditorium seating 250 persons, which can be subdivided into two lecture halls by a movable sound-proof partition. The two units will also include three new faculty offices.

The plans, presented first to the college faculty on April 3, were drawn by Bellevue Architects Beckwith and Spangler Associates. Builder will be the Jim Vaux Construction Co. of Kirkland. Chairing the Campus Planning Commission which is directing the planning and construction for the College Board of Directors is D. V. Hurst, President. Cost of the construction is set at approximately \$100,000 plus furnishings and the completion target date is set for Sept. 15, in time to put the new facilities into service at the opening of the coming school year. The new facilities are expected to provide classroom space for which the college has experienced need as a result of its enrollment increases over the past several years. (see front cover)

Mr. Elvin Huston was Associated Student Body president during the 1966-67 school year; Mr. Jerry Snyder is current Associated Student President. Mr. Nordby was vice-president of the student body during the 1966-67 school year, and Mrs. Bonnie Smelser has held the post of Associated Student Body Secretary-Treasurer.

Nominations are made on the basis of scholarship, leadership, participation in educational and extracurricular activities and general citizenship, it was explained. The publication provides a national basis of recognition for college students and their respective colleges. This will have been the first time for Northwest College to participate in the publication.

In detailing some of the background data on the new faculty, President Hurst indicated that Mr. Blewitt, who holds his Master of Education degree and is in candidacy for his Ed. D. at the University of Wyoming, has been in public school administration for the past fourteen years. Mr. Turner, who holds the M.R.E. degree from Conservative Baptist Seminary in Denver, has been in Religious education and youth work since 1959. Mr. William Randolph, who matriculated into his college work at Northwest College in 1958, completed his baccalaureate work in education and biology at Cascade College in Portland, and is in candidacy for his Master's degree at Eastern Washington State College. A Breath of Fresh Air

In the feature "Evangel Readers Write" published in the March 10 issue of the *Pentecostal Evangel*, Mrs. Oscar Peterson of Forks, Wash., points up a very significant difference between secular education and Christian education as it is taught in Northwest College. Featuring the Faculty

Professor Jack Dorwart champions the cause of Language Arts at Northwest College, having taught English Composition and Literature during his two-year tenure of service with the college. During the current academic year he carries the major instructional load in English Composition and is one of four instructors assisting in this particular field.

Born in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, Mr. Dorwart shares his birth date, July 4, with the nation. It was while attending Central Bible College in Springfield, Mo., that Mr. Dorwart felt called to prepare himself to teach English. Upon completing his work at CBC and receiving his B.A. degree in Bible in 1963, he embarked upon his studies in Bradley University, Peoria, Illinois. Upon completing his work there for his M. A. degree in English in 1966, he was invited to join the faculty at Northwest College.

Among other activities making up his background experiences, Prof. Dorwart worked for the National Cash Register Co. 1953-55 and served in the United States Air Force as a Radar repairman in 1955-59. Following this, he had a "brush" with sales work for the Fuller Brush Co., before enrolling in Bible College.

Prof. Dorwart is married, and his wife Barbara, who is also engaged in the field of education, teaches in the Rose Hill Elementary School near Kirkland.

President to Address National Conference

President D. V. Hurst will be one of the speakers to address the Assemblies of God Council on Evangelism to be held in St. Louis, August 26-29. The Council, which is billed as "unprecedented" in the denomination's history, will be keynoted by an address from Dr. Thomas F. Zimmerman, General Superintendent of the Assemblies of God. President Hurst will address the Council on the topic, "The Ministry of the Church to the Saints,"--an address scheduled for Thursday, August 29. President Hurst is serving on a National Committee on Advance which is doing an intensive self study of the Assemblies of God and has given guidance to the development of the plans for the special Council.

The purpose of the Council is to provide an opportunity in which the Assemblies of God gathered together can take a fresh look at its mission in today's world, to examine its reason for being and to project ways of fulfilling it. It has been stated that the meeting can be even more significant for our time than the meetings in 1914 in which the Assemblies of God came into existence.

STUDENTS TO EXPRESS 'CHOICE '68'

Northwest College Dean of Students Jack V. Rozell, today announce that Northwest College will participate with the 2,500 colleges and universities throughout the country in an expression of their political choices pertaining to the 1968 elections and on national issues. Faculty sponsor for the project will be history instructor, LeRoy Johnson. Student coordinator for the project is sophomore pre-liberal arts student, Jack Buck of Seattle.

Mr. Johnson explained that students will indicate their choices on potential presidential candidates in preferential order and will also express their viewpoints on some of the national issues including the war in Vietnam.

The project is sponsored by **Time Magazine** and is intended not only to get an expression from college-young people throughout the country, but to contribute to political education and to stimulate interest in contemporary affairs.
