



Northwest College President To Minister In Europe



Northwest College President, D.V. Hurst, will this summer fulfill a series of speaking engagements Europe under the auspices of the Foreign Missions Department of the Assemblies of God.

Leaving Seattle on June 13, the Reverend and Mrs. Hurst will journey to Stockholm, Sweden, for a reunion with members of Mrs. Hurst's family. While in Stockholm, Mrs. Hurst will be reunited with her father and brother, whom she has not seen since infancy in Africa, where her missionary mother died. She was reared and adopted by American missionaries, the Reverend and Mrs. Arthur F. Berg of Springfield, Missouri.

President Hurst will be pulpit guest in Stockholm's famous Philadelphia churchdistinguished as one of the largest Pentecostal congregations in the world with a membership of over 5.000. In Helsinki, Finland, he will be the guest speaker at the annual conference of the Finnish Pentecostal Churches. From Finland, President Hurst's itinerary will take him to Lacarno, Switzerland, where he will minister at a conference of Assemblies of God pastors and missionaries. He will then travel to Frankfurt, Germany to speak at an Assemblies of God servicemen's retreat. Servicemen who are stationed throughout Europe are expected to be in attendance. During his itinerary he expects to visit two Assemblies of God Bible Colleges on the European continent. Other engagements will take him to Rome, Italy, to Athens, Greece, and to the Gospel Tabernacle in London, England, before returning to the United States on July 15. This will be President Hurst's first trip to the European continent. Previous speaking engagements have taken him throughout the United States, as well as to Australia and the South Pacific.

Grads Receive Degrees

Seventy graduates received degrees at the 33rd Annual Commencement of Northwest College held on the campus Sunday, June 8. Bringing the commencement address was Mr. Wesley Dennison, vice-principal of the new Kentridge High School in Kent, Washington. Mr. Dennison called for a commitment to a disciple relationship with Jesus Christas the primary requisite for finding true meaning and purpose in life. The youthful vice-principal recalled his own college experience which resulted in a radical shift from material pursuits to dynamic spiritual realities as a result of a spiritual confrontation in a Christian college.

The colorful commencement pagentry began with cross - campus processional from the college library to the Northwest Pavilion where the commencement ceremonies were held. Special honors were accorded to two graduates who were inducted into the Delta Epsilon Chi Honor Society. They were Mr. Byron Newby of Helena, Montana, and Miss Evelyn Smith of Sedro Woolley, Washington. Also honored was an alumnus, the Reverend Akiei Ito, whose personal representative, the Reverend John J. Clement, was on hand to receive tokens of membership in the Society in his behalf. A resident of Japan, Mr. Ito, is the first alumni from abroad to be given honorary membership in the society through the sponsorship of Northwest College.

Honored By College

The Reverend C. M. Ward, international radio speaker for the Assemblies of Godbroad-cast, Revivaltime, was honored at the 33rd annual commencement of Northwest College with the conferral of the honorary degree, Doctor of Divinity. The Reverend Dr. Ward was cited for distinguished Christian service, outstanding leadership, Christian witness in the contemporary world, outstanding service in education, letters, and public service and service to the academic and ecclesiastical communities. The conferral of this honrary degree was the fifth such award to be granted by Northwest College in its 35-year history.

Dr. Ward was guest speaker at the June 7 college baccalaureate service. In his address he called for a renewed sensitivity to sin a day when wantoness and exhibitionism has

become a growing trend in the present generation.

College President D. V. Hurst was closely associated with Dr. Ward while serving as national secretary of radio for the Assemblies of God prior to his becoming president of the college in 1966.

NEW RESIDENCE HALL UNIT TO BE BUILT

One of the major decisions made by the Northwest College Board of Directors, in its recent June meeting, was to proceed with construction of a new \$300,000 residence addition to Beatty Hall. Construction on the new unit is to begin immediately. The new wing will extend westward from the present reception area of the hall and will provide housing for 101 men students, prayer chapel, residence quarters for an assistant dean of students, and recreation and snack facilities.

Architects Beckwith and Spangler of Bellevue are designing the new wing, which calls for an exterior accenting horizontal lines and utilizing brick and stucco panels that will be compatible with the design of the existing unit. In its interior design the new wing calls for wall-to-wall carpeting and "studio-type" rooms with bolster beds. A garden with patio landscaping design will provide a centerpiece in front of the new structure.

Growing enrollments at the college during the past several years have resulted in an on-campus residence shortage, particularly in the autumn quarter when enrollment presures are at peak levels. The new unit is designed to absorb present enrollments and to allow for a modest enrollment increase.

Target date for completion of the new unit has been set for January 1, 1970.

PRESIDENT HURST RE-ELECTED TO FOUR-YEAR TERM

New NC board of directors chairman, Paul A. Gray, reported recently that D. V. Hurst was re-elected to a four-year term as president of Northwest College.

President Hurst has completed his initial three-year term of office as the college's third president. According to Mr. Gray, the board's action to re-elect him to a four-year term was a significant vote of confidence and amounted to a commendation for the work he has done since coming to NC in 1966. Normally the appointment is made for a three-year term.

It was observed that during the first term of President Hurst, NC has continued in growth of the student body and in expansion of plant facilities. The accumulative enrollment has topped the 600 mark each of the last two years. The facilities of the college has kept pace with one major building being erected each year. These have included the completion of a residence wing, the major enlargement of the food service building and the construction of the learning center, almost doubling the classroom space on campus.

In the area of academic development itwas noted that the college had undertaken two major self-study and curriculum development programs directed towards institutional improvement and accreditation by professional and regional accrediting associations.

College Intensifies Training For Ministry

In an affirmation of its institutional distinctives, Dean of Education, Frank B. Rice recently indicated that Northwest College will intensify its ministerial training programs. N.C.'s curriculum has recently undergone considerable study and restructuring with a view of clearer articulation to the academic community. Its programs of study for ministerial training have been organized into full majors, together with a series of complementing minors.

Effective with the fall term, 1969, full majors will be offered in Biblical studies. Missions, and Christian Education. A divisional major will be available for those planning to go to graduate school or seminary. Minors will be offered in Pastoral Studies, Missions, Christian Education, Sacred Music, Philosophy, New Testament Greek, and Business Education. The minors in Pastoral Studies and Sacred Music are basically equivalent in content to a major. It is planned that the Sacred Music program will develop into a full major in the near future. The minor in Business Education is a supporting field of training useful for general purposes or for church office and staff workers who might combine this with Christian Education and Music for a dual port-folio in the local church.

Northwest College is a candidate for regional accreditation with the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools and is structuring and articulating its programs of study in a more traditional collegiate pattern. This gives opportunity for a mutual understanding among general educators, without abridgement of N.C.'s distinctive aims and purposes. Dr. Clarence Simpson, Dean of Education at Whitworth College in Spokane, has been serving as curriculum consultant. College administrators and faculty have indicated that the result has been a strengthening of N.C.'s program in the field of its distinctive emphasis, Biblical and ministerial training.

Summer Teams to Represent College

Northwest College will sponsor three student public relations teams that will travel throughout the Pacific Northwest states this summer. Emphasis will be placed on student recruitment as well as maintaining a general public relations contact and ministry between

Each of the teams consist of four members of the present student body at N.C. They have each developed a musical program that features a broad spectrum of Christian music. They will be presenting concerts and singing in youth camps throughout Washington, Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Utah. The groups include the Carillons, composed of Miss Rosalie Nordby of Clayton, Washington; Miss Trudy Wellman of Reedsport, Oregon; Miss Susan Brown of Coulee City. Washington; and Miss Ina McGhee of Maple Valley, Washington. The Messengers Trio include Miss Linda Benjamin of Campbell, California: Miss Sharon Wagner of Snohomish, Washington; Miss Margie Conger of Jefferson, Oregon; and Miss Margaret Rueck of Portland, Oregon. The third group are the Jubilaires, composed of Miss Mitzi Nylander of Malta, Montana; Miss Kathy Vaughn of Coulee City, Washington; Miss Arlene Harden of Richland, Washington; and Miss Dorothy Caldwell of Boise, Idaho.

Also traveling for the college will be members of the administration, including President Hurst; Director of Development, H. W. Crowder; and Public Relations Director, Ward M. Tanneberg. Reverend Tanneberg recently completed visits to youth camps in Colorado, Wyoming, and Nebraska. He will also minister and represent the college at youth and adult Bible camps in Washington

during the summer.



FLYING SEMINAR TO VISIT GETHSEMANE

There is no record in the Gospel that Jesus ever spent the night in the city of Jerusalem. Biblical indications that touch on how He spent His night-time hours there are associated with the Mount of Olives and a garden in the Kidron valley where he often retired to pray. The name Gethsemane is compounded from Hebrew components meaning a valley of olive orchards. Today there is a beautiful little garden embedded in the Kidron at the foot of Olivet on the east and the wall of the city silhouetting the skyline, above the vale to the west. Here our Lord descended into the depths of agony as well as into the depths of the valley of the shadow and prayed, "Not my will be done" while not only the blackness of night but the blackness of the sins of the world enveloped Him in this place.

One of the places to be included in the itinerary of visits during N.C.'s Flying Seminar next March will the Franciscan Garden with its eight old olive trees and the Church of All Nations built over a rock called the "Rock of Agony." Botanical tests applied to the olive trees (which still produce olives) indicate they are over 1,000 years old and that they stem from roots over 2,000 years old. Though the historian, Josephus, indicates that the Roman General Titus cut down the trees around Jerusalem during the destruction of the city in A.D. 70, it is held to be plausible that the present trees might well be rooted from the ones in existence when Jesus was there. The visit to this garden will give the tour group a perspective on the general environs and setting of this and other places in and around the city associated with the earthly mission of our Lord.
