Miss Midori Rikimaru, 1969 B.A. graduate of Northwest College, recently wrote President and Mrs. D. V. Miss Rikimaru was the third member of her family to come from Japan to attend Northwest College. In her letter she said, "It has been a privilege for me to study at Northwest College for three years. I have learned so many things through the College, your country itself, and the friends I have known." She went on to describe some of the spiritual benefits she received at the college while pursuing her education and indicated that she expects even greater spiritual benefits to accrue to the people whom she is serving in Japan.

Miss Rikimaru is teaching English conversation at the city hall in Kitakyushu City, Japan. She is also assisting in the work of the Sunday school and serves as organist in her home church. She will be teaching in a Christian high school next year. Miss Rikimaru was sponsored at NC by Col. and Mrs. Robert Foy, who reside in the Wildwood Heights area near the campus in Kirkland. President Hurst took note of Miss Rikimaru's statement as giving evidence of the value of the college's foreign

student training program.

# RESIDENCE HALL CONSTRUCTION CONTINUES

Work on Northwest College's new residence hall is progressing on schedule. At present, foundations have been poured and the basement unit is well into the primary stage of construction. Owen S. Hodges, business manager at NC, said that the next stage of construction will be the reception unit. This will join the new residence hall with the existing Beatty Hall. Target date for completion of the new three-story unit if set for January 1, 1970. The residence hall will provide additional housing for 101 men students, as well as recreation facilities and a prayer chapel. Construction is under the direction of the Vaux Construction Company of Kirkland.

The three Northwest College summer traveling teams came back to the campus in Kirkland, with success reports after summer travels which took them throughout the Pacific Northwest region. Speaking for the Carillons, a ladies' trio which ministered in Oregon and Washington, Miss Rosalie Nordby enthusiastically commented on the way that "the Lord worked" in the services and camps where they were. Giving the ASB's new Ford Econoline its "shakedown" travel, the ladies participated in five weeks of one night stands in various churches, and another three weeks of ministry in the Oregon District youth camps at Camp Santiam in the Cascade Mountains near Sisters, Oregon. They also participated in the Oregon District Bible Conference at Brooks near Salem, and in one of the Northwest District's youth camps at Fort Flagler near Port Townsend. Alumnus Receives Army Commendation

Chaplain (Major) John W. Simpson, United States Army, was cited for meritorious conduct and outstanding service from August 1966, to January, 1969, while assigned to the U.S. Army Garrison, Fort Amador, Canal Zone, Panama. A graduate of Northwest College in 1953, Chaplain Simpson subsequently studied at Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary, Mill Valley, California. He is presently serving in Viet Nam.

Chaplain Simpson was cited for "consistently performing his duties in an exceptionally professional manner, and for displaying administrative ability and creative talent," an army dispatch stated. Among other achievements, the citation noted his work in religious education directed to the children of Fort Amador, and effectiveness in public relations with local civilian communities in the Canal Zone and the Republic of Panama.

Chaplain Simpson's father, Mr. John W. Simpson, Sr., served on the Northwest College faculty for a number of years as instructor in the biological sciences until his retirement in 1967.

#### CALIFORNIA PASTOR FALL SPIRITUAL SPEAKER

The Reverend Kenneth R. Schmidt, pastor of the First Assembly of God, Santa Cruz, California, will be the Fall Quarter Spiritual Emphasis Week speaker at Northwest College on October 13-17. Pastor Schmidt has been a popular Bible conference and convention speaker in the Assemblies of God and in evangelical church circles. During his thirty years as a pastor and evangelist, his travels have taken him to over 40 countries of the world, where he has ministered to U.S. military personnel, teachers, and missionaries.

Rev. Schmidt served as a district official for many years in the California and Colorado districts of the Assemblies of God and has served on the regional board of the National Association of Evangelicals in Colorado. He served as Assistant Superintendent and General Presbyter of the Rocky Mountain District of the Assemblies of God during his 15-year pastorate at the First Assembly of God, Grand Junction, Colorado.

College President D. V. Hurst indicated that the public is invited to join students and faculty during the daily services at 9:15 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. in the College chapel.

At the retreat they will engage in various committee meetings and study groups as plans and preparations are made for the new academic year. Assistant Professor in Bible, Francis Thee, will be returning after a year's absence from the campus. Professor Thee has been at the University of Chicago pursuing doctoral work in biblical studies. ## The Golden Gate

(Flying Seminar Preview Series)

The prophet Ezekiel attached special significance to the eastern gate of the old city of Jerusalem. In vision he said it was through 'the way of the gate whose prospect is toward the east'' that he saw the glory of the Lord depart from the city just before God permitted the destruction of the Temple and the city by Nebuchadnezzer in 586 B.C. It was symbolic of God's withdrawal of His presence and protective hand from Jerusalem and the beautiful Solomonic Temple due to the sin which had defiled it.

Then in a burst of prophetic preview, Ezekiel was brought back in vision to the same gate to see the glory of God returning to the city and to the Temple in redemptive and

restorative power and grace. He said,

Then said the Lord unto me, This gate shall be shut; it shall not be opened, and no man shall enter in by it, therefore, it shall be shut.

It is for the prince; the prince shall sit in it to eat bread before the Lord; he shall enter by the way of the porch of that gate and shall go out by the way of the same.

Ezekiel 44:2,3

It was through this gate that the glory of God, in the person of Jesus Christ, entered on Palm Sunday as the populace spread flowers in His pathway and cried, "Hosanna" (lit. "Jehovah saves.") He also predicted that this same gate "shall be shut and not opened. . ." It awaits the return of the "Prince of Glory," whose feet will touch the Mt. of Olives which lies immediately to the east.

When the members of the Northwest College Flying Seminar visit Jerusalem in March, one of the things for which they will look will be the "Golden Gate" sealed up as part of the present eastern wall, exactly as Ezekiel prophesied. It was sealed by the Turks in the 16th century. On the slopes which fall away to the Kidron on the east, are numerous graves which many Jerusalemites of Christian, Jewish, and Islamic faith, believe will be

opened in resurrection on the Day of Judgment.
