From The President

Having just concluded the Egypt-Israel-Athens-Corinth part of the first Northwest College Flying Seminar with thirty-three "Seminarians," I reflect. Was it worthwhile?

Emphatically, yes! Israel and church history, in fact, the whole Bible, seemed to "come alive" during the trip. The expressions of overwhelming satisfaction by all who shared in the seminar suggested they had absorbed much. This was not just sight seeing; this was study. It was one continuing spiritual experience! From early morning to late evening every day was filled with viewing it all and relating it to the Biblical records. There is so much to see and feel, to think through and digest. It's almost incomprehensible that so much has transpired in so small a geographic area. One's mind is bombarded at every turn as he covers the land and views its records.

But a trip to the cradle of Christianity is not just a study of history. It is a study of what will be! One senses prophetic fulfillment everywhere. The nation is marching forward in this fulfillment. One feels a rush of preparation. He senses destiny in the making all around him.

That God chose this people and this land and that he will accomplish the purpose of his choice presses insistently to the surface of awareness. There is something different here. There is a force at work. Without desiring it, the nations of the world must look this way and must be involved. Too much is at stake. Where for centuries armies have marched and where layer of civilization has been laid upon layer, the armies of the world will march once again, and the final showdown will be witnessed in one last layer.

It is inspiring and faith building to see prophecy being fulfilled in the land where so many of God's promises have been fulfilled before. For the young minister-in-the-making to see all of this first-hand early in his development has value beyond measure. Such a seminar must profoundly affect the very foundations of his ministry and enrich it from that day on.



The Northwest College Eagles recently completed a successful basketball season with an over-all win-loss record of 16-8, with one additional postseason victory over Puget Sound College of the Bible. The Eagles came from behind on Campus Day to beat PSCB 84-77.

The Eagles finished their league play in third place, behind Western Baptist and Northwest Christian. Since Bob Fox is the only senior on the ball club, Coach Hillbrick is looking forward to the possibility of a strong veteran team effort in 1970-71.

Alumnus Chaplain Awarded Bronze Star

Chaplain (Major) John W. Simpson was awarded the Bronze Star Medal by the U.S. Army for distinguishing himself by meritorious service in connection with military operations against a hostile force in Viet Nam during his current tour of service there. The citation states that "Chaplain Simpson demonstrated exceptional diligence and perseverance in his demanding duty assignment." Due to the shortage of chaplains in the area he was commended for not only covering the personnel in his area of primary responsibility, but for spending much of his time in isolated areas conducting services, visiting and counseling. The citation further commended him for initiating projects through regular military channel and for working with and through local Vietnamese pastors and military personnelsomething that contributed "immeasureably to the personnel in the IV Corps area and to the improvement of Vietnamese-American relations." In summary the citation said, "Chaplain Simpson's performance of duty was in keeping with the highest traditions of the U.S. Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military.

Chaplain Simpson, who has been recipient of several army awards for outstanding service, was graduated from Northwest College in 1953. His father, Mr. John Simpson Sr., was on the faculty of the college teaching in the field of biological sciences until his retirement several years ago.

- RECENT CHAPEL GUESTS -

Artistry at the keyboard and an inspiring testimony from a most talented young musician marked the recent Chapel service on February 25 with Dino Kartsonakis. Dino began his musical career "by accident" at the age of three when he went to the piano as his family returned from a Sunday morning worship and began to play simple melodies. Following high school the pursuit of his musical career included studies at the Juliard Conservatory of Music. While in the armed forces Dino played with a military orchestra. His overseas duty in Germany also highlighted his musical talent as he played in the Officers Club and in moraleboosting concerts for the servicemen as well as in foreign relations capacity for the government. Dino also had the opportunity, during his tour of duty in that country, to study in the renowned music conservatories of Munich. He is currently residing in California.

Dino's ministry is unique in that heutilizes his musical genius, molded by years of dedicated study, to beautifully express the Gospel message in music. During the chapel service he took several requests from the floor and delighted faculty and students alike with those songs. The standing ovation given him at the conclusion of the chapel was testimony to his inspiring presentation.

Reverend **Dwight McLaughlin** was also a recent chapel guest at NC. Reverend McLaughlin, a native of the Centralia area and ordained in 1930, has ministered for several years throughout the state in pastorates which include Walla Walla and First Assembly of God, Tacoma. He served as district superintendent for the Northwest District from 1951 to 1958. His more recent ministry includes pastorates in Bakersfield and Ventura, California. Reverend McLaughlin has also served as a general presbyter and executive presbyter of the General Council of the Assemblies of God.

In his recent chapel message, Reverend McLaughlin spoke of the youth emphasis of the church's ministry in his recent California pastorates. He told of several key high school athletes in the city who have accepted Christ as Saviour and have since become vitally involved in the church. With that same youthful touch, Reverend Mc-

Laughlin communicated effectively to the chapel audience on the importance of the Word and prayer.

John Hall, noted Gospel and sacred music recording artist, presented a musical concert in the college chapel on March 3. Known as "Big John Hall" to many acquainted with his bass part in the Stamps Quartet and in the Blackwood Brothers Ouartet, he is currently involved in evangelistic services across the nation. He is a Texan and he is His six-foot frame, his "big" smile, and his talented bass tones were a unique blend as he "reached down" both in bass notes and in devotional message to present several inspiring musical favorites. Taking advantage of the occasion, John Hall spoke to the students of some lessons learned during his own college days.

John Hall is from a minister's family and among thirteen brothers and sisters are numbered several ministers and missionaries. Although not with him on campus, his wife Theta and their small daughter also travel with him. John Hall is often joined by his wife in concerts and worship services which take them many miles from their home

base in Nashville, Tennessee.

Reverend A. S. Ellis, pioneer Pentecostal minister and former instructor at Northwest College, addressed the faculty and students in chapel on March 10. Reverend Ellis gave an informal and very inspiring resume of what the ministry involved in the early days of pioneer work in northern British Columbia. Mr. Ellis spoke of the rigors of travel and other challenging experiences occuring during the opening works in logging camps and other isolated zones. His was a testimony concerning God's faithfulness to guide, provide, and bring many persons to Christ during his ministry there.

Reverend Ellis first came to the Northwest District in 1923 and was involved in evangelistic work. Ordained in Canada in 1925, Rev. Ellis ministered throughout the district including pastorates in Anacortes, Leavenworth, Puyallup, and Sumner. During the ten-year span, 1943-53, Mr. Ellis served Northwest College as an instructor in missions. Rev. and Mrs. Ellis presently

reside in Seattle.
