From The President

"The challenge of the 70's was the topic of the panel during the recent Northwest College Lay Council session. I was asked to "look ahead" and see what the 70's held for higher education such as we have at N.C. When I looked, I saw five words

which summated the challenge.

Foundations. In a world being shaken as never before, men will be forced to return to the foundations as never before. If they crumble...but man does not like to think of that! The Russian General, Pyotr Grigorenko, recently declared "insane" for his protest of the invasion of Czechoslovakia and his defense of the Crimean Tartars. wrote in his diary (smuggled to the West). "whenever I used to find a contradiction between the writings of Lenin and life, I saw only one solution: Return to the source. to Lenin. It was an error. Our life has undergone too many changes to be able to consult what was written in 1924, or even in 1953." The foundations of life will be examined by men as they look for surety in the 70's. Thank God for the Rock, Jesus Christ! He is unshakeable and will meet every test for those who have built on Him! The foundations Northwest provides are sure!

Purposes. The question "why?" will be asked as never before—"What is the reason? What should we really strive to accomplish?" These are questions youth will ask again and again. In a world living between the two poles—knowledge explosion and discovery on one hand and threatened oblivion on the other—youth will not settle for the superificial, for trivia or for facade. They will want reality and ultimate purpose!

Values. Values will be tested in the 70's as never before. Indeed, they have been in the late 60's. Youth will ask 'What is worth holding on to ...working for ...fighting for? What is really worthwhile? What has real value? Values will be sorted in the 70's! And a college like N.C. will be in the middle of it for youth will do the sorting!

People. A big battle in the 70's will be over people! The challenge will be to get them and to hold them—faculty and student, doing the will of God. Finding and keeping

committed people will be the big task. The enticements and allurements will be many. The enemy of men's souls will use his greatest weaponry. But the victory is the Lord's! He already has prevailed and will prevail again!

Finance. The need for support will be greater than ever. Inflation is hardest on the work of the church which is made possible by the relatively small contributions of many. And Northwest College, while trying to do more than hold its own, trying to improve...to build...to strive for excellence will meet that test in the

70's!

Here N.C.'s reason for being will be tested! The questions will be, "What is worth doing? What must be done?" Not, what would be nice to do if we could?" Still, there are other words not found in the look ahead but rather in the look up. Words like faith...hope...confidence... assurance...promise! Those who are victorious in serving God do not walk with their heads down! They never did! They look up! And there they see other things. The 70's will be challenging...but victorious! "He cannot fail for He is God," and "We are co-laborers together with Him!"

Dr. C. J. Simpson, well-known educator and Executive Vice-President of Whitworth College in Spokane, will be the Commencement speaker at the thirty-fourth Commencement at Northwest College, 3 p.m., Sunday, June 7. Dr. Simpson has served for the past two years as curriculum consultant to Northwest College.

Twice chosen by the senior class of Whitworth College to deliver the Commencement address there, Dr. Simpson is frequently called on for public speaking engagements. He will speak to the graduating class and the Commencement congregation on the topic, "In the Forever

Fading, Building Forever."

"His devotion and contribution to the cause of the Kingdom of God and Christian Education make it particularly fitting that he should be selected as Northwest College's Commencement speaker," stated President D. V. Hurst.

NC's Flying Seminar Completed

Northwest College's first flying seminar was rated a successful educational venture by the 33 participants, following two weeks of intensive travel throughout the Middle-East, March 13-26. Traveling an estimated 18,000 miles by air and land while engaging in some fifteen field trips in Rome, Egypt, Cyprus, Israel, and Greece, the seminarians received a comprehensive exposure to the many points of Biblical, archaeological, historical, and geographical interest for which they had prepared during the winter quarter.

The seminar party included students and faculty from the college, together with pastors and lay participants from throughout the Pacific Northwest, the Midwest, and Alaska. They reportedly experienced "an usually smooth trip." The group was given opportunity to view some of the recent excavations in Jerusalem near the Wailing Wall which dates back to Herodian times and earlier. Several were granted special permission to visit inside the famous Dome of the Rock and the El Aksa Mosque (closed

since the August 1969 fire) in the interests of their educational pursuits.

As significant as the sites relating to the past, was the opportunity to view present-day life in the Middle East—with its paradoxical blend of the ancient and modern, together with the eastern and western customs and dress. The tour graphically presented opportunity to observe the tension factors at work in the Israeli-Arab conflict. The seminarians reported significant evidences of determined involvement on the part of major east-west powers in their struggle for control of this strategic part of the world. The development of the land of Israel along scientific and agricultural lines remains one of the sharpest points of contrast with the surrounding cultures. Mr. Millard, tour instructor, indicated he felt that this energetic and enterprising people are driven by a mystic force of nationalism, which they themselves admit they do not really understand.

About half of the seminar group remained for an additional week of optional tour in Europe before returning to the college campus.

Everett Pastor to Bring Address

The Reverend Eugene A. Born, pastor of Bethany Temple in Everett, will bring the Baccalaureate message to the 1970 graduating class of Northwest College on Saturday, June 6, at 7:30 p.m.

Pursuant to his graduation from Northwest College in 1938, the Reverend Born pastored churches in eastern Washington and Montana. Before coming to his present pastorate in Everett, he served as pastor of the First Assembly of God in Missoula and was Assistant District Superintendent of the Montana District of the Assemblies

of God. He also served on the College Board of Directors at this time. Pastor Born was chosen by the Northwest College Alumni Association as "Alumnus of the Year" this past February.

Also participating in the service will be representative ministers from the surrounding area. Music will be provided by the College music department. The public is cordially invited to join the College constituency and the graduates for the special occasion, which will take place in the College Chapel.

COLLEGE TO GRADUATE SIXTY-THREE

Sixty-three candidates for graduation will receive their degrees in Commencement exercises at the thirty-fourth Commencement of Northwest College. About one-half of the graduates will be from the two-year General Studies programs and will expect to continue their education in other colleges and universities. Fifty-five percent are four-year grads who have prepared for ministry and service in the Church. The majority of students completing programs in liberal arts will go on to teacher-training, and the majority of graduates in the division of religion have completed their specialization in Pastoral Studies.

Library Recieves Gift

Mr. and Mrs. Alver E. Lofdahl recently presented the Northwest College Library with a 2" x 2" microform copy of the Holy Bible, using World Company's No. 715 copyrighted text. The microform is the PCMI Microform process of the National Cash Register Company. The 773,746 words of the Bible are found on this 2"x2" plastic. The library has found the form to be most readable when magnified 450 times on a light microscope. The College truly appreciates this thoughtful gift.

ASB PURCHASES SECOND BUS




A Glance at NC's Sixth Annual Lay Council
