### PIONEER COMMEMORATED IN NAMING OF RESIDENCE HALL

The late Reverend Dr. Frank Gray was commemorated on the campus of Northwest College when a new residence hall for men was named in his memory at ceremonies on June 7. Dedication ceremonies were held following the College's 34th commencement. The recessional from the commencement exercises held in the Northwest Pavilion became a processional to the reception center in front of the new residence hall where the ceremonies were conducted.

On hand to give a resume of the life and ministry of the late Dr. Gray was College President Emeritus, Dr. C. E. Butterfield. He noted that Dr. Gray, whose superintendency of the Northwest District Council of the Assemblies of God extended during the formative years of the college's history between 1937-1951, had set an example and tone of excellence with respect to the spiritual life and the testimony of the young ehurch movement in the Pacific Northwest. Dr. Gray was among the first persons to serve as chairman of the College board of directors.

Also participating in the ceremonies were two associates of Dr. Gray and of the College. They were Reverend B. P. Wilson, superintendent of the Alaska District Council of the Assebmlies of God and member of the College directorate, who gave the envocation, and the Reverend Allan S. Ellis, former member of the College faculty, who gave the prayer dedication. Responding for the family of the late Dr. Gray was his son. Mr. Paul Gray, Tacoma businessman and present chairman of the College board of directors. Moderating the program was College President D. V. Hurst. Representing the architectural firm of Beckwith and Spangler was Mr. Leon Spangler. The Vaux Construction Co., builder of the new hall was represented by Mr. Jim Vaux, president of the Company.

Following the ceremonies, an open house of the new three-story \$307,000 facility was scheduled. The new 101-student-capacity unit displayed wall-to-wall carpeting throughout, lounges on each floor, a prayer chapel, recreation rooms and utility areas.

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### FACULTY REVEAL EXTENSIVE AND VARIED MINISTRY EXPERIENCE

A recent survey among the faculty at Northwest College reveals that the faculty not only has significant academic preparation but an extensive and varied range of professional experience. Twenty-six faculty members chalked up a total of over 698 cumulative years of experience ranging all the way from pastoral, evangelistic and missionary ministry to public education and librarianship experience.

In keeping with the ministerial training emphasis of the college's four year curriculum, it was noted that 13 faculty represent a total of 87 years of pastoral experience (averaging 7 years per person) while another 8 have spent a total of 18 years serving as associate pastors. Ten have given a total of 18 years in evangelistic ministry.

In the field of Christian education, 11 members have behind them a total of 36-1/2 years of professional experience as CE Consultants or as ministers of CE in local churches. In youth work, the survey reveals that 13 faculty represent a total of 41 years of service as ministers of youth or in other youth ministries.

In the field of missionary service, two faculty have served on foreign fields and another five as home missionaries, representing a total of 13 years of experience. In the field of sacred music, 4 persons tallied 25 years of experience while another 2 indicated a total of 28 years of experience in radio ministry, while serving for the same number of years as ministers of visitation and in periodic pulpit ministry.

As would be expected, the primary emphasis of experience comes in the field of teaching and administrative work. Here an aggragate of 306 years of experience comes into view with 23 persons showing 175 years of teaching experience in Assemblies of God higher education; 9 persons with 69 cumulative years in administration work in Assemblies of God higher education, and 13 persons with a total of 62 years of experience in non-Assmblies of God education, primarily in public institutions.

One member of the faculty has given 5 years in active service in the military chaplaincy and another 3 years of active service in non-military chaplancies. Still another six individuals show a total of 37 years of service in denominational administrative work. The College librarian has acquired nine years of experience in both college and public librarianship.

In addition to these activities, six members of the NC faculty have written books or have contributed to periodicals and journals relating to their respective fields of specialization.

College President D. V. Hurst noted. . . .

'If the question be raised, 'Are members of the NC faculty classroom theoreticians, or are they experienced in their respective fields of teaching?' it appears that the results of the survey come through loud and clear for experience as a backup to their educational preparation and ministry.''

FORMER BOARD MEMBER PASSES

Mr. Alfred Anderson, long-time member of the Northwest College board of directors, passed away recently. Mr. Anderson, who resided in recent years in Helena, Montana, was one of the first laymen to serve on the board. He participated in Montana State government, having been at one time the state Secre-

In 1954 he was appointed to the College board of directors. At that time he was in the real estate business in Hamilton, Montana. Upon retiring from active work as a businessman he moved to Helena and continued to serve on the College board until 1968.

Mr. Anderson's family ties with NC go back to mid-1940's. His daughter, the late Mrs. Luella Peterson, graduated from the College in 1948. Another daughter, Mrs. John Johnston also attended the college. His son-in-law, the Mr. John Johnston, is a past officer in the Northwest College Lay Council.



# SERVICEMEN SAY, "THANKS FOR CARING!"



"Let's reach the servicemen who come to Seattle for the Lord Jesus Christ!"

This might well be called the theme of NC's Servicemen's MIG (Ministry Interest Group), one of several MIG's operated within the World Outreach Ministry program of Christian service.

Stirred by the fact that thousands of servicemen, many on their way to the battlefields of Southeast Asia, come through the Seattle area and are not reached by any effective Christian witness, some thirty NC students determined to do something about it. Led by senior student Art Tipon (himself looking toward a career in the military chaplaincy), and by MIG advisor John Pope (assistant professor of religion and philosophy and active reservist chaplain), these students have ministered effectively.

Their primary activity is the operation of a Servicemen's Center, located in the Little Chapel in downtown Seattle. Rev. L. J. Franks is the pastor there. The students work from 4 until 10 p.m., each Saturday, giving up study and recreational time to reach these men for Christ. You may find them inviting servicemen to the Center, serving refreshments, entertaining and encouraging them with their main objective being to win them for Christ. Since last November, when the Center was started, over 600 men have come in, with many of these committing their lives to Christ.

Besides the Center, the students also sponsor Sunday dinners for the men once each month. As many as thirty soldiers at a time have responded.

They have also conducted a vesper service each month at the Armed Forces YMCA. About forty attended the last service of the school year. After all, what serviceman could turn down a good home-cooked meal or an inspiring "songfest" with a fine group of concerned young men and women who have begun to "do" for Christ?

Recently, a serviceman came to Mr. Tipon and expressed verbally the sentiment of many of the men who have passed through the Center, or who have been reached in other ways by students from Northwest, saying, "Art, thanks for caring!"

## SECOND "FLYING SEMINAR" ANNOUNCED

The second Flying Seminar to the Holy Land is planned for March, 1971, according to Northwest College President D. V. Hurst. A tentative departure date has been set for March 11. The itinerary will be developed within a 15-day structure.

Leading the tour will be President Hurst. Assisting him will be Daniel B. Pecota, professor of Bible and Theology at the College. The tour itinerary will concentrate in Israel, but will also touch several other Mediterranean countries of Biblical significance.

The College's First Flying Seminar in March, 1970, was termed very beneficial from an educational viewpoint. Thirty-three individuals within the seminar program made the tour. Because of the continuing interest in the seminar and the high degree of educational opportunity, it is tentatively planned to conduct the seminars annually.
