




- WORLD OUTREACH

THE "BIRTH" OF A PREACHER

The other day it came into clearer focus for me than ever before—I believe more preachers are "born" at the altars of the local church than anywhere else!

It's not the college where they are sent to be trained, or the youth camp where Spiritual fires burn high and desires are stirred, or even the youth rally where commitments so often are made. These all have their place! They are a vital part of the process!

It's back where the idea first takes shape that it all begins. Back where the young man sees his own pastor at work week after week, where the claims of Christ and the message of His gospel first make their way into his awareness, where the seed of the idea is first planted by the Spirit using a faithful minister and teacher and reaching the heart of the young man.

If young men are "going into the ministry," they started back at the altars of their local church! If young men are heading for the mission fields, they started back where they first heard the message!

There is the exception, . . . true! But it's the many that set the pattern.

It follows then, if young men are not going into the ministry, if a church is threatened with a shortage in its pulpits, it must look to the source. The simple questions any pastor should ask are: "How many young men have started for the ministry under my influence?" And again, "Have I been used of the Spirit to challenge young men to listen first to the claims of Christ as they set their lives' courses?"

Let's keep the altars of consecration alive in the home church. Let our young men see pastors who thrill at the call of God, who love the ministry and would do nothing else, who enjoy the challenge and opportunities of full time Christian service, and who recognize the high privilege of having been given a ministry by Christ. As the Apostle Paul said, "I thank Christ Jesus. . . for that he counted me faithful, putting me into the ministry." (I Tim. 1:12)

The World Outreach Ministries program at Northwest College is an exciting new concept with regard to student involvement in Christian service. The 1960-70 academic year was the second year for this program. World Outreach Ministries (WOM) replaces the campus organization previously known as the Student Missionary Society.

There are seven major Ministry Interest Groups (MIG) divisions within the organization, including:

- CAMPUS
- CHILDREN/YOUTH
- EVANGELISM
- GOSPEL TEAMS
- INTERN
- SERVICEMEN
- WORLD MISSIONS



Within these divisions, there are approximately twenty-five different areas of service in which a student may become involved. Presently, all participation in the WOM program is on a voluntary basis. Approximately fifty-five percent of the student body was engaged in WOM activities last year. Though it is not required, some thought is being given to requiring field-work (or intern) ministry of all junior and senior men as a specific part of their ministerial preparation.

It is significant to note that within the WOM program and other student organizations on campus, there are about fifty student leaders functioning. This means that eight to twelve percent of the student body (a very high percentage as one reviews

student leadership on many campuses today) is involved in leadership responsibility. This practical experience adds an important dimension to the student as he prepares his life for the future.

Another unique aspect of this program is that there are nine faculty-staff members who work with the student leadership in an advisory capacity. The faculty work within areas of ministry that correspond to their teaching emphasis.

Through the World Outreach Ministries organization, students last year gave a total of \$9,934 to a wide variety of missions — outreach projects. One hundred fifty dollars was given to each of the districts that sponsor the college to be used in their respective home missions programs.

All seven Ministry Interest Groups functioned last year with several of them making noteworthy contributions:

EVANGELISM MIG: broadened its areas of ministry to include Seattle-Tacoma International Airport and the Seattle Center. Other outreach areas include the University District and Youth Action Crusades.

INTERN MIG: has become stabilized in its intern hospital chaplaincy program at Harbor View Hospital in Seattle.

SERVICEMEN'S MIG: was recognized by the Armed Services Department of the National Organization of Young Men's Christian Association for outstanding service to the men and women of the armed forces. The group received a certificate of merit and commendation.

The activities of this group also includes staffing a Servimen's Center in downtown Seattle.

CHILDREN/YOUTH MIG: has placed over eighty students in different churches of several denominations throughout the metropolitan area as Sunday school teachers, children's church workers, etc.

CAMPUS MIG: organized on campus between thirty and thirty-five prayer and share groups. Along with these there were weekly student meetings in the residence halls, both on an individual floor basis and as a total hall population.

GOSPEL TEAM MIG: organized and sent out various groups of

students for ministry in churches and missions throughout the Northwest. These teams usually consist of a musical group and a student speaker. One team (organized out of the Missions MIG) presented a dramatic sketch featuring world missions. The basketball squad also sponsored a gospel team within its organization and conducted services in several churches in Washington, Oregon, and Alaska.

The WOM program certainly affords the student at NC every opportunity for involvement in Christian service. This, together with the instruction and practical guidance given by faculty advisors, makes this aspect of student life at NC one of the most rewarding of all!

TOTAL COLLEGE COST COMPARISONS FOR 1970-71

In a recent survey, conducted by the Equitable Savings & Loan Association, college costs of both public and private educational institutions were surveyed for the coming 1970-71 academic year. These institutions are located in Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

Out of twenty-six private institutions in this three-state area, twenty-four were determined more costly to the student than Northwest College, while only one was less expensive.

Cost per student at the twenty-four higher expense ranked schools ranged from \$1,755 to \$3,710. In Washington state, Northwest College proved to be the least expensive private institution with the next least expensive school some \$425 higher in total student costs. These figures include tuition, fees, room, board and estimated cost of books needed for one year.

Studies further revealed that NC is not extremely more expensive than the leading state universities in Washington and Oregon. Differences here show that NC (with no tax support) is only \$233 to \$306 higher in total college costs for the year of 1970-71.

This extra investment in the lives of students proves well worth while as they study in a Christian atmosphere, with the advantages of a more personal faculty-student relationship. Add to this the many opportunities for Christian service, development of student's spiritual life, and the Christ-centered quality educational concepts of Northwest College. It makes training at NC the kind of experience a young person can cherish for a lifetime!

LIBRARY GRANT RECEIVED

Northwest College has been awarded a Library Matching Fund Grant by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare of the Federal Government in the amount of \$2,536.

The money is to be used to purchase new books for the library in the fields of general education.

The grant is to be matched by gifts from interested friends of the College, industrial and business firms.

The College has launched a Book-a-Month Club and have invited interested churches and C.A. groups to help build the library by the purchase of a book a month or, in the event the group is small, to purchase as many books as possible for the year.

The Accrediting Association has required the College to add 10,000 new volumes to the library. The cost of this undertaking will be \$50,000.00.
