After this they sometimes go to their homes and sing and worship until 4:00 in the morning. There are casette recorders everywhere. Individuals record the services and then play them back over their loud speakers at home the next day.

There was an alumni gathering. A special dinner arranged by Doris Fellows. What was on the menu? You could take your pick—moose, caribou, or beef! I couldn't decide, so I had some of each. It was great.

There are Northwest College alumni scattered all over Alaska—in the bush and in the cities. Some of them graduated many years ago, and some of them are new graduates and fresh recruits.

It is heartwarming to see them in their dedication, especially those who minister in the villages....away....to a small population of 75 or 100, but faithful to the call. It is a rugged life which calls for the best.

One asks himself, "Could I do that?" He answers the questions with a different answer—but I was not called to do that. His grace enables the fulfillment of the call wherever or whatever.

We salute the alumni of Northwest College serving in Alaska. May God's grace be with them.

COLLEGE ADMINISTRATION BUILDING TO MEMORIALIZE DR. NESS

The ministry of the late Dr. Henry H. Ness, will be memorialized in the naming of the Northwest College Administration Building in his honor at ceremonies scheduled during the 35th Annual Commencement at the College, 3:00 p.m., on May 30. Dr. Ness, who was instrumental in the beginning of the college 37 years ago, was also the first college president. The building, which symbolizes the role he fulfilled in the early administration of the college, will henceforth be known as the Henry

H. Ness Administration Building.

Dr. Ness served as president of the college from the day of its founding on October 1, 1934, until his retirement from the presidency in 1949, when he accepted an appointment by Washington State Governor Arthur B. Langlie, to be chairman of the Washington Board of Prison terms and paroles. Pursuant to Dr. Ness' service in state government, he returned to full-time pulpit work, assuming the pastorate of the First Assembly of God Church of Oakland. Following his pastoral work in Oakland, he retired from full-time ministry and resided in Hayward, California. He continued a parttime pulpit ministry and engaged in a ministry of writing. His latest book was Dunamis in the Church. It was published by the Gospel Publishing House in Springfield, Missouri, in 1968. After moving back to Seattle, Dr. Ness passed away, on January 27, 1970. He and Mrs. Ness had just commemorated their golden wedding anniversary before returning to Seattle.

Dr. Ness is remembered for a dynamic pulpit ministry and for the qualities of leadership needed in the establishment of the College. Under his leadership the College grew from an enrollment of 18 students on the first day its doors were opened in 1934 to an enrollment approaching 400 following World War II.

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The Reverend R. J. Carlson, retiring superintendent of the Northwest District of the Assemblies of God, and long-time member of the College Board of Directors, will be bringing a tribute to the late Dr. Ness. Acting Dean of Education, Amos D. Millard, will offer the prayer of dedication. Present will be Mrs. Ness, as well as members and friends of the family.

The newly named hall will be opened to visitors following the commencement exercises.

TEXAS COLLEGE PRESIDENT TO SPEAK AT COMMENCEMENT



Dr. Blake L. Farmer, president of Southwestern Assemblies of God College in Waxahachie, Texas, will address the 35th graduating class during Commencement Exercises at Northwest College, 3:00 p.m., Sunday, May 30. Dr. Farmer has the

somewhat unique experience of having graduated from all four divisions of the institution he now heads as president. These include the high school, the junior college, the threeyear Bible Institute and the Bible College. He received his Master's Degree at the University of Houston, and his Doctor of Education Degree at Baylor University in 1965. He has served as both vice-president and president of the Texas Junior College Association. He is also vice-president of the Texas Council of Churchrelated colleges. While serving as a public school teacher in Jacinto City, Texas, he pioneered the First Assembly of God Church in the living room of his home and saw it grow into an ultra-modern \$50,000 edifice within six years. Among other positions, he is a tellow member of the President's Council and advisory board to the President of the United States.

Being honored at the 35th Commencement, which will be held in the Pavilion on the college campus, will be 24 candidates for the Associate in Arts degree; 21 candidates for the Bachelor of Arts degree; and 6 candidates

for the Bachelor of Science degree. Two members of the graduating class and two alumni will be inducted into membership of the Delta Epsilon Chi Honor Society.

RETIRING CHURCH OFFICIAL TO BRING BACCALAUREATE MESSAGE



The Reverend Lyle B. Spradley, of Kirkland, will bring the baccalaureate address to the 35th Graduating Class at Northwest College on Saturday, May 29. The traditional service will commence at 7:00 p.m., with a processional of the 51-member graduating class.

Reverend Spradley, who served on the college staff as business manager before being elected as Secretary-Treasurer of the Northwest District Council of the Assemblies of God, will have completed 14 years of service to the District in that capacity. Prior to coming to the Northwest he served as District Secretary-Treasurer in the state of Montana. His pastoral career started in Washington State, from whence he originated. He has also served pastorates in Montana.

Special music will be provided by the College Music Department. Several minister-parents of the graduates will also participate in the service.



KING'S CHORALONS SCANDINAVIAN TOUR

A tour packed with variety and excitement has been specially planned for Northwest College King's Choralons Concert Choir. The Choralons depart Seattle via Scandinavian Airlines, Monday, June 21, 1971 and will return Monday, July 5. They will be ministering in the countries of Denmark, Sweden, and Finland. Highlights of this tour will include singing in the 3500 member Smyrna Church, and participating in the great Pentecostal MidSummer Conference in Finland. The choir will sing at the Hameenlinna Conference Youth Service in Finland and share in the services.

Pekka Ahonen, former student and alumni of Northwest College will be the Choralons personal guide while in Finland. Parents and friends are also invited to participate in this tour to the Scandinavian countries.

VIDEO-TAPE EQUIPMENT ACQUIRED



A new step into the electronic world of education was realized at Northwest College with the acquisition of a new General Electric Video-tape recorder and TV play-back combination, it was announced at the College today. The new equipment, which offers the capability of live-recording or TV program recording, opens up new learning possiblities, it was pointed out. The equipment is already being pressed into service by departments of instruction involving publis speaking, physical education, and Christian Education. The three-piece package includes a TV camera, a video recorder unit, and a TV play-back unit. The \$800 purchase was acquired by a combination of gift funds and by equipment grant funds through the U.S. Office of Education.

NORTHWEST COLLEGE SPEECH DEPARTMENT EXPANDS **OFFERINGS**

Communications skill is increasing in importance both in the world and at Northwest College, Several new Communications courses have been included in the Speech Department. Radio production, Discussion and Conference. Journalism, and the History of America's Public Address are among the new offerings. During the current academic year the department has opened the College radio station, KNCC.

Speech tournaments are an important part of the total communications instruction as well. NC students have profitably competed in speech tournaments in Missoula, Montana (Big Sky Tournament), Christian College Tournament (Eugene, Oregon), and at Seattle Pacific College. Communicating effectively is a vital goal for students who are studying at Northwest College.

SPIRITUAL EMPHASIS WEEK

The spring Spiritual Emphasis Week was held on campus April 5-7 and featured Pastor Fulton Buntain of First Assembly of God in Tacoma, Washington. His messages centered on practical Christian living. His sense of humor and rapport with youth made the week a spiritual highlight of the quarter. Reverend Buntain carries on an extensive ministry with the college youth in his own church.

Each evening was accentuated with times of spiritual renewal and dedication by mem-

bers of the congregation.
