KING'S CHORALONS T

The Northwest College King's Choralons 40-voice concert choir recently toured throughout Denmark, Sweden and Finland in a special goodwill series of sacred concerts. The group spent two days in Copenhagen and then traveled by bus and ferry to Gothenberg, Sweden to participate in a city-wide tent crusade. The choir then traveled to Stockholm by rail and ministered in the Philadelphia Church city-wide tent crusade. A flight to Finland took the group to Hameenlinnen for appearance at the Mid-Summer Pentecostal conference of Finland. Attendance at this conference totaled 20,000 persons. After the conference and a free day for sight seeing, the choir continued to tour through Finland and visited the cities of Turku, Jyvaskyla, Kuopio, Kotka, and Helsinki. Some one to three appearances were made by the choir in each of these cities.

The response to the ministry of the King's Choralons far exceeded original expectations. Every night there were those who responded to the invitation and accepted Jesus Christ as their Savior.

The Scandinavian Christians were warm and extended a hearty welcome to the young people from America. Finnish Pentecostal leaders were lavish with their compliments concerning both the choir's ministry and the conduct of the members of the group.

The choir returned to America on July 5 tired, ... but thrilled with the opportunity for ministry that had been afforded them.
