The

It's been my privilege to travel abroad considerably in recent years, to visit missionaries alumni of Northwest, and others—to minister in many countries and preach in a significant number of overseas Bible schools. I never cease to be impressed by the work of our missionaries, their dedication to the task and their enlightened efforts to be more effective in the work.

I am particularly impressed by the work of the overseas Bible schools, the work of literature distribution and the massive new effort at correspondence school missions as evidenced in I.C.I. Of course, I have long been impressed by the mass evangelism efforts our church has sponsored for many years and have participated in a few of these efforts.

During November of last year, I was privileged to spend three weeks in the Orient ministering in Tokyo, Seoul, Hong Kong, Singapore and Manila. I also touched down on Taiwan. In that time I preached twenty-five times, including ministry in four Bible schools and F.E.A.S.T. I preached a one week's youth crusade in the great church in Seoul, Korea, pastored by Cho Yonggi, and saw over 300 young people saved and many—including 40 in one service—filled with the Spirit. A Japanese Christian pastor was joyously filled with the Spirit during the meeting and then fasted four days.

That revival crusade is something I will never forget. Words fail to adequately describe that great church and its ministry.

I received a special thrill, however, in ministry in the Bible schools and at F.E.A.S.T. I suppose it's because they so closely relate to what I do at Northwest College.

I saw again so graphically where the minister-yes, the missionary-is trained and where their whole thing called "missions" begins as far as the Assemblies of God is concerned. **The Stateside Bible college is a fountainhead of Missions!** I believe in it! And I believe it deserves your missionary support!

Debate training both in the classroom and in inter-collegiate competition at Northwest College is quite new and provides students with a broader, more practical range of experiences in communication skills. This year the NC debate team schedule included tournaments at Oregon State University, University of Washington, Seattle Pacific College, University of Montana and others. Kathy Bodtker of Albany, Oregon and Diane Wood of Anchorage, Alaska, as a team, have distinguished themselves at these tournaments as top flight debaters. At the Western Washington Annual Viking Speech Tournament held recently at Bellingham, for example, the NC debate team won the first four qualifying rounds only to lose the next round to another team (which they had already defeated in the qualifying rounds). The team also participated in a tournament at Oregon State University in Corvallis.

Don Tarno, professor of Speech and Missions, says that their prayer before departing for each tournament best sums up the debate teams primary purpose: "May God help the group do their best as though everything we do were for the Lord Himself!" Mr. Tarno observed that there is a fresh recognition before each tournament that the Lord Himself is the source of debate skills.

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Campus Days Guests To Hear Education Leader

Dr. G. Raymond Carlson, Assistant General Superintendent of the Assemblies of God, will be guest speaker at the Northwest College's Annual Campus Day convocation on campus April 7, it was announced at the College today. Dr. Carlson, himself a former president of one of the denomination's institutions of higher learning, the North Central Bible College in Minneapolis, Minnesota, oversees the work of Assemblies of God educational department at the denomination's headquarters in Springfield, Missouri. Dr. Carlson will be on campus for the College's Spring Quarter Spiritual Emphasis Week April 3-7, it was explained.

The traditional open-house event known as Campus Day has been an annual occasion staged for high

school seniors and other high schoolers, their parents and pastors and youth sponsors, since the college moved to its new campus in Kirkland about 12 years ago, it was noted. It is designed to acquaint them with educational opportunities offered by the college. The event has brought to the campus over 800 guests during the past several years. The guest list represents places from throughout Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and from as far away as Alaska and California.

Coordinating the event this year will be Dean of Students, Jack V. Rozell, together with the college administration, faculty, and student leaders. The day's schedule will include campus tours, class visitation, informational workshops, a special chapel presentation and concluding with an evening musical rally in the college chapel. Youthful visitors from distant places will be bringing sleeping gear for a "slumber party" type of overnight accommodations sharing space with host students, while adult sponsors will be housed in faculty homes and other off-campus facilities, it was explained.



N.C. students several years ago gave the 1st offering to launch the Robeson's television ministry in Nicaragua. Missionary Robeson said: "We are reaching thousands through weekly nationwide half-hour T.V. programs. For \$60 such a program can blanket the entire country with the gospel." He gave a colored slide presentation showing a volcano in full eruption and the 3 new selfsupporting churches in Managua, Nicaragua, C.A. which they helped to establish. Their correspondence school work, under Carol Robeson's direction, now numbers over 600 students. Mr. Robeson, a recording artist, played several trumpet solos. Rev. Byron Newby (Asst. Pastor, Everett, Wash.) auctioneered for the Box Social and Linda (Benjamin) Newby assisted her husband in an old-fashioned sing along.


MRS. MOLLIE PERKS GREETS ALUMNI
