FACULTY APPOINTMENT TO CORRESPONDENCE INSTITUTE ANNOUNCED

Northwest College President, D. V. Hurst today announced that Dean of Admissions, Amos D. Millard, will be the first of two faculty appointments from the college to serve as writers for curriculum materials being developed by the Assemblies of God Foreign Missions Department's International Correspondence Institute.

The Institute, now headquartered on the campus of the Continental Bible College in Brussels, Belgium, is a newly-instituted outreach of the Assemblies of God Foreign Missions Department. It's outreach objectives are directed towards the rising literacy of populations around the world and are designed to reach the non-Christian student with a Christian evangelistic approach. The materials include courses to help the new Christian toward spiritual maturity and Christian service training for effective service in local churches. The Institute will also develop materials for use in Assemblies of God ministerial training schools.

Writers for the curriculum materials will include faculty members from the Assemblies of God Colleges in the United States. President Hurst indicated that a second appointment from among the faculty of Northwest College will be announced later. He added that it is planned that Dean Millard will take leave from the College for two months in the summer of 1973 to go to Brussels to work under assignment of the Institute.

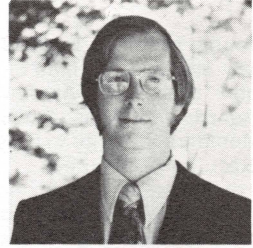

Heading the Institute is Dr. George M. Flatery, president, and serving as Academic Dean is the Reverend Melvin A. Grams. Serving as curriculum specialist is Northwest College graduate, Mrs. Louise J. Walker. Other administrative personnel include the Reverend Willard Cantelon, the Reverend Jerry McClure, and the Reverend Dale Barber, all of whom are appointed Assemblies of God Missionaries.

Dean Millard is author of the 1972 teacher-training book, **Learning from the Apostles**. He has been a contributing writer for National Sunday School Department of the Assemblies of God, as well as other publications published by the Gospel Publishing House.

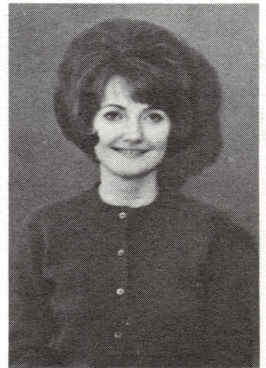
SCAN multiplies the available resource materials for library users. For example, a student needs a book which is not on the shelf in NC library. He furnishes the librarian with the name of the author and title. She

finds it in another library and the student will soon be able to check it out.

Miss Margaret Garman, NC librarian, accepted an invitation to serve on the Library Use of SCAN Steering Committee. The committee is charged with the responsibility of guiding libraries, as they make use of telephone type services for the improvement of services to patrons.

Special annuity advantages:

GIFT CREDIT. Recent changes in the law provide that the gift portion of an annuity may be spread over a five-year period.

INCOME TAX FREE. A good portion of the proceeds are excludable.

CAPITAL GAINS. Negotiable stocks or Bonds or Income Property can be used to purchase an annuity at its current value. No capital gains tax is payable even though the original purchase price was much less.

ESTATE TAX. Annuities are not subject to Federal Estate Tax.

DEAN TO TAKE LEAVE

Northwest College Dean of Students, Jack V. Rozell, will relinquish his duties as Dean of Students at the College after the current academic year, President D. V. Hurst has announced. He will embark upon a year's leave of absence to pursue

doctoral studies at Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena, California, it was indicated. President Hurst further announced that Dean Rozell plans to return to the college and serve as faculty the following year. His teaching field will be in Psychology, Counseling, and ministerial studies, it was noted.

Dean Rozell came to the office of the Dean of Students at the college in 1967 after serving a pastorate in Montana for several years. He received his B.A. degree from Whitworth College in Spokane, and after one year of interim study at Northwest College, went on to Fuller Seminary, where he received his B.D. degree before entering the pastoral ministry. During his tenure as Dean of Students at the College Dean Rozell completed a Master of Arts degree in Counseling at Seattle University. His program at Fuller Seminary will be directed toward the Doctor of Ministry degree, a program which he anticipates will require approximately one year to complete.

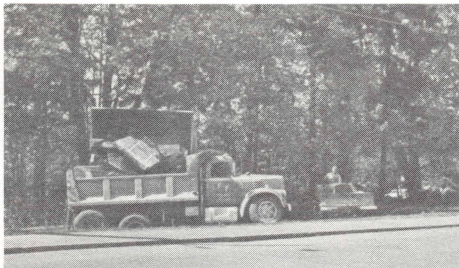
during the last five years, President Hurst said: "Dean Rozell has distinguished himself during his five year tenure at the college. 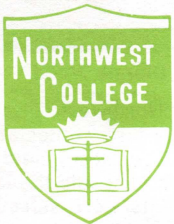
