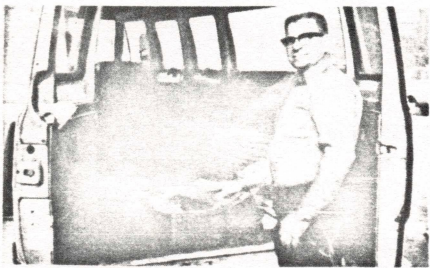
From The President

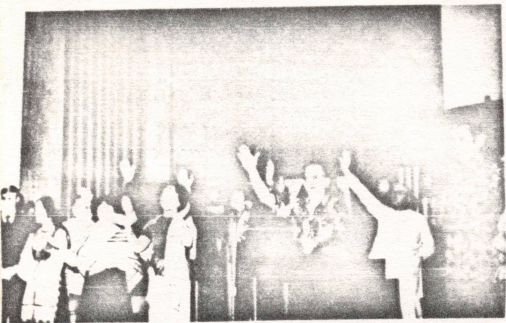
Pastoral Seminars

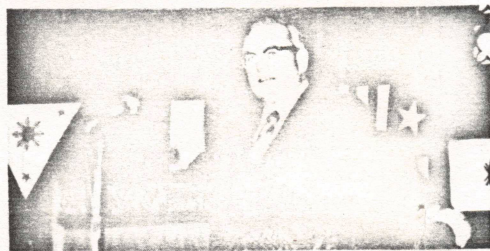
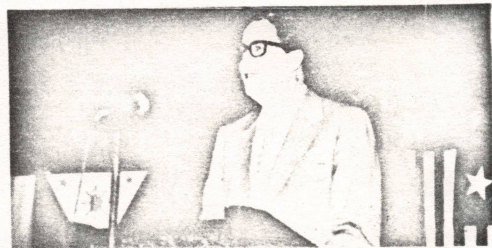

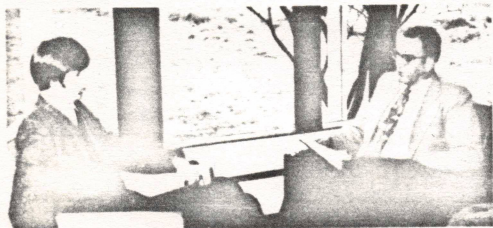
Oregon students at Northwest College pose with their District Superintendent, N. D. Davidson, following a chapel service during Superintendents Week at which he was the guest speaker.

Missionary Fire

Missionary fires burned at Northwest College last week as the College's 50 heard missionary Mark Buntain of India tell the story of missions in India. After 20 years, the popular veteran missionary speaker came back to the campus having been one of the College's first Spiritual Emphasis Week speakers in 19 that year that the College inaugurated the Spiritual Emphasis Week program.

College President, Dr. D. V. Hurst, observed that Missionary Buntain's devotion for the work of the Lord and for the missionary cause in India was marked by love and compassion, kindling missionary fires throughout the College's student body. He came out twice daily to hear him speak. He described with colorful detail the freshness the miraculous and continuing evidences of the power of the Gospel to some of the world's most impoverished and needy people to whom he ministered in the city of Calcutta, India.

Visibility was added to the week's events—one at the beginning of the week and another at its conclusion. The "kickoff" event was the traditional International Food Festival, planned by the students in the flag-draped College Dining Hall with an international decor on the evening of Friday, January 19. The colorful occasion was highlighted by the missionary theme by way of food samples from countries around the world and also by a missionary skit designed to communicate the purpose and urgency for world missions.

A new tradition inaugurated at the conclusion of the week added visibility to the missionary theme. It was a processional which included missionaries on home on furlough, missionary faculty, administration, international students, and students from missionary homes abroad. They attired themselves in the costumes and clothing representing more than a dozen countries of the world. The colorful procession at the Friday morning chapel service gave visible impact to the theme that had been presented throughout the week.

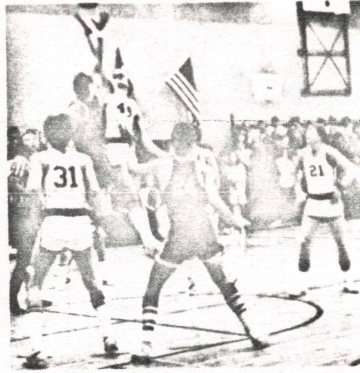
The message of world missions was thus presented by sight, by sound, and by action. More importantly, it was idelibly sealed by the impact of the Spirit's moving in the hearts and minds of responsive young people.

Dr. Hurst observed that he felt that the students and faculty at the College were inspired and challenged in such a way as to expect long-range effects upon

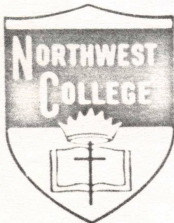
