

### The Spirit of Place

D. V. Hurst

"Develop an optimum Spirit of place" in the Christian college, said Dr. Earl V. Pullias, to Christian Educators at the N.A.E. conference in Portland. He is Professor of Higher Education at N.S.C.

And he went on to explain what he meant. "An environment of learning in which the best in personality and character can grow. The environment or spirit of place is composed of all the parts of the college taken together: The buildings and grounds, the purposes and ideals, the student body, the faculty, the Board of Trustees, the Administration, the various staff members, the secretaries, yard workers, custodial personnel, all working together form the atmosphere of the college. The general spirit educates more deeply and more permanently than any of the parts. The church related college strives, therefore, to make the campus a place of beauty, truth, goodness, and love-of healing and growth."

"The community of the whole teaches, heals, builds and educates!" he said.

Speaking in the same conference, Dr. Jacob Hershman, Chief, Institutional Eligibility Unit of H.E.W. (an Assemblies of God layman) said, Christian Higher Education has an "atmosphere of eager anticipation and spiritual exultation, an atmosphere of faith. Its not just secular education with a halo! There is theological thinking involved! It begins with God! All learning includes faith!...

"In the philosophy of a Christian oriented school," he said, "A student at some point will find himself standing face to face (alone) with God! In the inner sanctuary, not just in the outer courts of life!"

And this is what it is all about—education at Northwest College! These men said what I have been thinking! The Spirit of place—the total environment of learning!



### The Passing of a Pioneer

The Reverend W. R. Hurst, father of Northwest College President, Dr. D. V. Hurst, passed away April 21 in Lincoln, Nebraska. Funeral services were held in the Havelock Assembly of God Church of Lincoln on April 24th. Bringing tributes to their father were Reverend Hurst's two minister sons — Dr. Hurst, President of the College, and the Reverend W. R. Hurst II, Field Secretary for the Far East of the Assemblies of God Foreign Missions Division.

The Reverend Mr. Hurst was ordained to

the ministry in the Advent Christian Church in 1921 and transferred in to the Assemblies of God in 1934, where he became one of the pioneers of the movement. He pastored churches in Nebraska, Minnesota and Wisconsin as well as engaging in evangelistic work throughout the Mid-West and Southeast part of the nation. Typical of the life he lived were the words he articulated with spiritual fervor at the time of his passing, "We've got to go forward!" They express the pioneer spirit that characterized his life and ministry.

### General Council Official to Speak at 37th Commencement

The Reverend Bartlett Peterson, Secretary for the General Council of the Assemblies of God will speak at the 37th Commencement at Northwest College on May 27, it was announced today by College President, Dr. D. V. Hurst. The occasion will be used to honor the Reverend Mr.

Peterson with the conferment of the honorary degree, Doctor of Divinity, Dr. Hurst said. Reverend Peterson has been a prominent figure in the Assemblies of God dating back to his work as a district officer in the Minnesota District, where he served as District Secretary, District Superintendent, before assuming the presidency of Central Bible College in Springfield, Missouri. He served as president for ten years. He became General Secretary of the General Council of the Assemblies of God in 1960, a position which he still holds.

Bringing the Baccalaureate message on the evening before the Commencement will be a well-known Assemblies of God pastor, the Reverend Marion Ravan, of Medford, Oregon. Pastor Ravan served as youth director for the Oregon District of the Assemblies of God for

a number of years and then as National Representative in the Sunday School Department.

The closing exercises will highlight the college careers of approximately 67 candidates for graduation who will receive their degrees. Of this number 45 are candidates for the Bachelors degree from the division of Biblical Studies and the remainder are candidates for the Associate degree from the division of General Studies.

President Hurst said that the public is cordially invited to attend the services and indicated that the Baccalaureate service will be held in the College Chapel at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, May 26th, and the Commencement, which will be preceded by a colorful cross-campus processional, will be

held in the Northwest Pavilion on the campus at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, May 27th.


