Faculty Announce Summer Plans

After several years of intensive advanced schooling programs, several members of the Northwest College faculty will return to more relaxed summer routines, while others continue to study, and still others venture out in summer ministry and missionary assignments,

a survey at the college reveals.

Pursuing a normally busy travel and speaking schedule for the summer will be three of the College's administrators. They include Dr. D. V. Hurst, President, whose summer speaking itinerary will take him to the midwest as well as throughout the Pacific Northwest; Director of Development, Reverend H. W. Crowder, who will travel to Bible camps in Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming, and then conduct two seminars in Oregon at the Golden Years Retreat and at a Women's Missionary Council retreat; and Public Relations Director, Ron DeBock, will coordinate the travels of five college travel teams and work in the interest of Student Recruitment.

Four Northwest profs will be returning to more normal routines after intensive doctoral studies over the last several years. They include Academic Dean, Frank B. Rice, who will complete his work for his Ph.D. in Education at Washington State University: Professor Robert Swaffield, who completed his work for his Ph.D. in Musicology at the University; Professor Daniel Pecota, who has completed work for his Doctor of Ministry degree at Phillips University and Jack V. Rozell, who is completing work for his Doctor of Ministry degree at Fuller Theological Seminary. Dr. Swaffield expects to prepare his dissertation research for publication in journals.

Continuing in summer studies will be instructor, Jack Dorwart, Professor Tarno, Professor Thee, and Miss Lois Winter.

On the missionary trail this summer wil be three Northwest faculty. They include Dean of Admissions, Amos D. Millard, who together with his wife will journey to Brussels to work with the summer seminar of the Foreign Missions Department's ICI program (International Correspondence Institute); Professor Dwayne Turner, instructor in Christian Education, who will participate in the Northwest District mis-

sionary outreach (SAM) in Hawaii; and Reverend and Mrs. Lester Kenney, missionary to the Philippines, who will itinerate in preparation to return to regular missionary duty. Math instructor, Mrs. Kathryn Tulloch, expects to leave together with her husband for missionary assignment under the Christian and Missionary Alliance in Penang, Indonesia in July.

Several other Northwest faculty have European travel plans. They include Professor Dorothy Amundsen, and Dean of Women, Bessie Guy. Tentatively planning to visit Paris and Europe on a business trip with her husband (who works for Boeing Co.) will be French

Instructor, Mrs. Kathryn Lindquist.

Among those traveling and working closer to home will be Miss Kristi Brodin, who will assist at the Fort Flagler youth camp, Miss Esther Dine, who will visit her home in Colorado and travel to California; Mrs. Doris Olson, who will visit family and relatives in California: Instructor, Bill Randolph, who will work in two kinds of harvest in Central Washington (church and wheat), and Professor Maxine Williams, who will visit her parents in Springfield, Missiouri.

Entering upon a career of semi-retirement after a life-long career of ministry and teaching will be Professor Donald H. Fee. Appropriately, the Fees expect to journey to California for a Homecoming where Professor Fee pastored in the early 1930's. Professor Fee expects to continue in study and research during coming months, he indicated. He will teach part-time at the college during the coming academic

year, it was noted.

College Honors General Council Officer

The Reverend Bartlett Peterson was the Commencement speaker.

Dr. Peterson was cited for his long career of service in Christian Education and in administrative leadership and ministry. His educational background started at Christie University in Duluth where he spent four years and continued in the University of

Central Bible College. He served as President of Central Bible College for ten years before embarking upon his present work as General Secretary of the Assemblies of God which post he has held for the last 12 years.

In reading the citation of achievement, Northwest College Academic Dean, Dr. Frank B. Rice, noted that Dr. Peterson, has served 38 accumulative years in various positions of leadership in the Assemblies of God—ranging from District Secretary for the Minnesota District Council to District Superintendent of that District to his present post.

In pulpit ministry his 9 years of pastoral work in the Minnesota district was noted together with 4 years of evangelistic work and 6 years of work with Revivaltime. He currently serves in memberships on the Board of Directors of the National Religious Broadcasters and on the National Association of Evangelicals Radio and Television Commission. He has authored numerous articles in various Assemblies of God publications as well as those published abroad. Dr. Peterson's ministry has taken him to 28 countries.

In his commencement address to the 1973 graduating class at Northwest College, Dr. Peterson urged them to seek a compassionate, positive and constructive ministry to the spiritual needs of the world, rather than to become preoccupied with nonessentials — a message which he based on the "heartbeat" of the Gospels.



Professor Fee Awarded Delta Tau

Climaxing 20 years of service at Northwest College, Professor Donald H. Fee, was awarded the Delta Tau Award of Honor at the College's 37th Commencement on May 27. Professor Fee will be going into semi-retirement status following completion of the academic year. College President, Dr. D. V. Hurst announced upon presentation of the award. The Delta Tau award is given for distinguished service and contribution to the work of the College. Professor Fee will teach on a part-time basis during the autumn and spring quarters of the coming year, Dr. Hurst said, Professor Fee has served on the College's Planning Commission during a major portion of the time that he has served on the College faculty. Prior to joining the faculty he served on the College Board through membership on the Northwest District Presbytery. Professor Fee hopes to do some writing upon retirement, he said.

71 Receive Degree At 37th Commencement

Amidst the pageantry and color of flags, honor guards, and academic symbolism seventy-one graduates received degrees at ceremonies marking Northwest College's 37th Commencement exercises on the campus on Sunday, May 27th. Bringing the Commencement address was the Reverend Dr. Bartlett Peterson, General Secretary for the General Council of the Assemblies of God. Dr. Peterson was honored by the college by the conferral of the honorary degree, Doctor of Divinity, during the commencement ceremonies.

With cryptic analogies Dr. Peterson urged the graduates to enter into a positive, constructive approach to ministering to the world's needs.

English since 1962. He is currently in candidacy for the Ph.D. in Educational Administration at Washington State University. Dr. Swaffield was awarded his Ph.D. in Musicology last October and has served on the college faculty since 1969.



Alums Honored At Commencement



College To Host Summer Institute

Northwest College will host the Summer Institute on Scientific Creationism August 27-31, College President Dr. D. V. Hurst announced. The Institute is one of five to be held throughout the U.S. and Canada sponsored by the Institute for Creation Research and cosponsored by Azusa Pacific College in Los Angeles. The institute is open to students, teachers, pastors, church youth directors, and interested laymen. The institute may be taken for college credit. Three quarter credits are available in the institute.

The institute will offer 30 class hours of lectures and panel presentations, dealing with such topics as Creationism, Origin of Life, Evolutionary Mechanisms, Fossil Records, Geophysics, Evolution, Philosophy and Social Science. Bringing a five lecture series on the special topic of "Evolution, Philosophy and Social Science" will be Dr. John N. Moore, Professor of Natural Science at Michigan State University. Other members of the faculty will include Dr. Duane T. Gish, Associate Director of the Institute for Creation Research, and Professor Harold S. Slusher, Assistant Professor of Physics and Director, Kidd Memorial Seismic Observatory, University of Texas in El Paso.

Cost of the five-day Institute, including college credit is \$110 with board and room (without board and room \$70); without college credit \$75 with board and room, \$35 without board and room. Pastors, youth leaders, laymen and others may attend the course without credit, it was explained. Professor Johnson earned his B.S. and M.S. degrees at St. Cloud State College and was engaged in public education in Aitkin, Minnesota before joining the College faculty in 1967.
