From The President

Revival Fires Burn at Northwest College

PENTECOSTAL PRINCIPLE DEMONSTRATED

The genius of the Pentecostal Movement expressed so often in its watch-word verse: "Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit..." was again demonstrated through a week of ministry on the campus Sept. 30-October 4. Normally it would be expected that this watch-word would come from the "old-timers" of the movement, but this time it was updated to a new generation coming from a young man, the Reverend Ronald Prinzing, pastor of the First Assembly of God of Whittier, California.

College President D. V. Hurst shared the preaching with Reverend Prinzing last year in the Nebraska district camp. The two plan to return as a team again next year for a similar preaching engagement.



Pastor Prinzing's message to the students and faculty was framed by the expression of an intense love for God as a foundation stone of personal character upon which to minister. He emphasized the necessity of knowing God (not just knowing about God) and of waiting upon God, letting Him minister to the needs of the people through the power and guidance of the Holy Spirit, Many who know the spirit and character of the Pentecostal movement would term this approach to the ministry of God "Old Time Pentecost." Those whose roots may go back into other segments of the Christian church might see in it "Old Fashioned Methodism" of revivalism which touches most Christian movements back to apostolic times.

During the week of Spiritual Emphasis, several have been filled with the Spirit. Most who came to Northwest have already experienced an initial infilling. Many and varied testimonies of God's grace and provision were rich evidence to the work of the Spirit being wrought. Students reverently grasped Pastor Prinzing's words from service to service, sometimes responding with tears, raised hands, and the clapping of hands. These lessons and lines of truth and principle were written upon the hearts and lives of these young people, not just in their minds, giving Christian education its fullest dimension of distinctive meaning.

With a record enrollment and this emphasis week of revival fire, those on campus often hear the phrase, "We're off to a great start!"

College Has Record Enrollment



When Assistant Dean of Men Pat Bridgman welcomed Montana student Bill Rohner to the men's residence hall, he was unaware that the new freshman would help swell NC's enrollment to a record high. Bill plans to follow in his father's footsteps and is now preparing for pastoral ministry.

Commenting on the new record, College President D. V. Hurst said that the new record is remarkable in face of declining enrollments and rising costs in higher education as a whole. He feels that the distinctive values of Christian education have been brought to bear in the decisions of many young people who are seeking spiritual values in their educational pursuits today. His conclusion would seem to be supported by the increased enrollment in the Biblical Studies division.

When registration for Autumn Quarter classes at Northwest College had been completed, it was clear that the College had a new enrollment record, spanning its 41-year history. The 560 students (including 9 auditors) who enrolled in autumn quarter classes eclipsed the previous record of 548 set in 1968, and the new figure is a four percent increase over the number enrolled for the same quarter last year.

Of the total number enrolled, 69 percent are enrolled in the Biblical Studies division—marking an increase of 5 percentage points over last year. Enrollment figures also show that 54 percent of the students are men—a ratio nearly the same as last year.
